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Introduction

The Highway Safety Plan (HSP) is required by the U.S. Department of Transportation (U.S. DOT), NHTSA regulations. The HSP consists of four major sections: Performance Plan (PP), Highway Safety Plan (HSP), certifications and assurances and HS Form 217 Cost Summary.

The Performance Plan describes the processes used to identify Virginia's traffic safety problems. It proposes the projects and activities Virginia plans to implement to reach its performance goals. The PP also includes performance measures for each goal to track progress from a baseline toward meeting the goal by the specified target date. Additionally, the HSP describes the grant funded projects and activities that Virginia will undertake to reach the goals identified in the Performance Plan.

Mission Statement

To reduce crashes, injuries, fatalities and associated cost by identifying transportation safety issues and developing and implementing effective integrated programs and activities.

This mission will be accomplished by:

- Administering federal transportation safety grant programs
- Providing assistance to communities in identifying transportation safety issues and solutions
- Developing and implementing effective, integrated programs and initiatives to address traffic safety concerns
- Collecting, maintaining and analyzing traffic records and crash statistics, and
- Tracking and supporting federal and state traffic safety legislation and initiatives

Delegation of Authority and Organizational Staffing

The Code of Virginia, Section 46.2-222 through 224, gives written enabling authority for highway safety and the responsibility to carry out assigned state highway safety office functions to the Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV).

Virginia's Highway Safety Office is comprised of 24 staff members including field personnel, and the Traffic Records Electronic Data System (TREDS) Operation Center. After TREDS was implemented on July 2009, the TREDS Center's main function is now focused on conducting Q and A of the state's electronic police crash reports and related DMV business processes.

In October 2006, the Grants Management program and staff were realigned to report directly to the budget section of the Financial Management Services Administration. This transfer of responsibilities put into place internal controls allowing for a system of checks and balances between the awarding of grants and the distribution of grant funding. The working relationship with the Virginia Highway Safety Office has not changed as a result of this realignment.

Brief descriptions of each position of Virginia's Highway Safety Office are as follows:

Governor's Highway Safety Representative: The Commissioner of the Department of Motor Vehicles serves as the Governor's Highway Safety Representative.

Governor's Highway Safety Coordinator: Responsible for providing agency oversight of Virginia's highway safety program.

Governor's Highway Safety Office Director: Provides direct oversight and is responsible for planning, organizing and administering the operations and programs of the Office of Highway Safety. Directs the administration of the Highway Safety Office to include Program Development and Implementation, in addition to Traffic Records, Planning, Research, and Evaluation.

Policy and Planning Specialist II: Provides support to the VAHSO/Director. Coordinates VAHSO administrative processes. Serves as the VAHSO legislative coordinator. Coordinates and develops Virginia's highway safety plan and annual report. Oversees the planning and implementation of the annual Judicial Transportation Safety Conference and Governor's Highway Safety Awards. Prepare and submit grant requests on behalf of the VAHSO.


Deputy Director for Program Development and Implementation: Development of problem identification and effective countermeasures. Responsibilities include comprehensive monitoring, tracking and evaluation of approved highway safety projects.

Deputy Director of Traffic Records Management, Reporting and Analysis: Responsibilities include managing, implementing and directing the statewide traffic records data system (TREDS), crash data management and analysis, strategic highway safety planning, and serving as the coordinator for the state's traffic records program and the traffic records committee.

Program Managers/Grant Monitors: Responsibilities include monitoring and evaluation of approved highway safety projects within the various countermeasure areas; dissemination of information; public awareness campaigns and media events, and presentation of safety education programs.

Highway Safety Traffic Records Supervisor: Supervises staff responsible for managing statewide traffic crash data; providing analysis and data pertaining to traffic records and highway safety studies and countermeasure programs; developing performance measures for the HSP and the annual Highway Safety Evaluation Plan; and providing and updating traffic crash data on the agency web site.

Office Manager (TREDS Operations Center): Supervises staff responsible for conducting Q and A of the state's electronic police crash reports as well as related DMV business processes.



Executive Summary

Through sound leadership, proactive partnerships and the unwavering commitment and hard work of dedicated staff and countless numbers of transportation safety officials and organizations, Virginia has been successful in forging partnerships that have allowed us to implement many successful statewide highway safety program initiatives. The Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) provides States a method to continue building and improving their highway safety system. Virginia pledges to continue establishing new and innovative programs that will capitalize on our strengths in an effort to expand and enhance our overall highway safety program. We will, through a systematic, cooperative, statewide effort, continue to build upon the success we have achieved in striving for the most effective and efficient highway safety program in the nation.

The FY 2013 Highway Safety Plan is submitted in accordance with NHTSA Order 960-2A and FHWA Order 7510.3A dated June 10, 1983.

The Highway Safety Plan identifies Virginia's key safety needs and guide investment decisions to achieve significant reductions in injuries and deaths on all public roads. The plan is intended to:

- Address safety challenges on all public roads so that safety programs can align and leverage the Commonwealth's resources across all stakeholder programs;
- Integrate the four "E" approach of transportation safety- Education, Enforcement and Engineering, Emergency Medical Services (EMS).
- Provide a comprehensive framework, with specific data driven goals, objectives and emphasis areas for reducing highway injuries and deaths on all public roads.

The National Highway Safety Act of 1966 provides federal grants to states to support coordinated national highway safety programs. The Virginia Highway Safety Office (VAHSO) is responsible for administering these federal highway safety funds and performs the following functions:

- Problem Identification: Identification of actual and potential traffic safety hazards and the development of effective countermeasures;
- Administration and Grants Management: Includes management of the highway safety program, monitoring legislative initiatives, development of federal highway safety proposals; distribution of federal funds to state, local and nonprofit agencies and the preparation of the Annual Highway Safety Plan;
- Monitoring and Evaluation: Includes monitoring and evaluating approved highway safety projects, data analysis and the preparation of the Annual Evaluation Report; and
- Public Information and Education: Includes development and coordination of numerous media events and public awareness activities targeting specific priority areas

The VAHSO provides grants for programs which are designed to reduce the number of crashes, injuries, fatalities and related economic losses resulting from traffic crashes on Virginia's roadways. Local governments, law enforcement agencies, state agencies, academic institutions and private non-profits can apply for NHTSA's pass-through funding for projects related to various areas of highway safety.

Virginia transportation safety officials have systematically analyzed highway safety problems and corrective strategies. Based on the results of this analysis, it has been determined that Virginia can make a positive impact on improving highway safety by placing a major emphasis on the following program areas:

<u>Occupant Protection</u> is an issue that needs focused attention in Virginia. Correct safety belt use is a proven method to achieve a greater measure of safety in crashes, regardless of the other factors involved.

<u>Impaired Driving</u> resulting from the use of alcohol/drugs is another persistent problem that contributes to fatal and serious injury crashes. While much has been accomplished in the past, improvements are needed to strengthen and enhance existing programs.

<u>Motorcycle Safety</u> has become even more important. With the increase in motorcycle classifications and registrations, Virginia has experienced an increase in motorcycle crashes and an increase in fatalities. Enforcement, training, education and awareness are key components to focus on to address this issue.

Speed and Aggressive Driving (often manifested in speed) have a profound impact on the safety of Virginia's roadways. A targeted emphasis focused on enforcement and education will continue to raise the awareness of the dangers and implications of speed and aggressive driving

<u>Distracted Driving</u> continues to be an issue on Virginia's roadways. More of a focus will be given to distracted drivers who do not keep their eyes on the road while driving and those who are using the cell phone.

<u>Traffic Records</u> (and data analysis) is the foundation of every state highway safety program. The timeliness and accuracy of comprehensive data is essential in valid problem identification needed to plan strategies and allocate resources toward highway safety.

Areas also eligible for consideration in state and local grants, but to a lesser extent: Planning and Administration, Pedestrian/Bicycle Safety, Roadway Safety, Driver Education, Community Traffic Safety and Police Traffic Services. As decisions are made on grant funding levels, an assessment will be made for the prospective grants to make a meaningful contribution to traffic safety and assist the Commonwealth in achieving its safety goals.

Virginia's Political Structure

Virginia's current governor is Robert F. McDonnell (R). The Commonwealth's bicameral legislature consists of the House of Delegates and Senate of Virginia. The present State Constitution, adopted in 1970, provides that the House of Delegates shall consist of 100 members and the Senate shall consist of 40 members. All members of the General Assembly are elected by qualified voters within their respective House and Senate districts. The terms of office are two years for members of the House and four years for members of the Senate. (Members may not hold any other public office during their term of office.) The following table identifies how the legislature is currently comprised:

State Demographic Analysis

Virginia has a very diverse traffic mixture that includes urban, suburban and rural driving populations, an active tourism market, several military installations, diverse cultural communities that speak many languages, and many college campuses spread out across the state. It also borders two of the busiest metro areas for traffic, Maryland and Washington D.C.

There are 39 cities and 95 counties in Virginia. The capitol is located in Richmond. The provisional total population of Virginia for 2011 was 8,096,604. Virginia has 7,636,407 registered vehicles, a 0.93 percent increase from 2010. There are 74,156.53 roadway miles. Of those 63,047 are secondary roads (85%), 9,990 are primary roads (13%) and 1,119 are Interstate roads (1.5%). Virginia's vehicle miles traveled (VMT) decreased slightly 2.19 percent in 2011.

The combined number of licensed drivers in Virginia is 5,662,416. Virginia's law enforcement community consists of 125 city and county sheriff's offices and 242 police departments which includes private, institutional and collegiate departments. It also includes 7 state police divisions within 48 areas of the state and 2,008 state troopers.

There are 73 Acute Care hospitals, 3 Level 1 Trauma Centers, 4 Level 2 Trauma Centers and 5 Level 3 Trauma Centers.

Legislative Changes

During the 2012 Virginia General Assembly, several pieces of legislation were passed to address highway safety. The following laws were enacted and became effective July 1, 2012.

DUI Ignition Interlock; required on first offense as a condition of a restricted license:Requires customers convicted of DUI 1st, as a condition of a restricted license, to install ignition interlock on at least ONE vehicle owned, co-owned, leased or operated. The court may allow customers to travel to and from the facility that installed or monitors the ignition interlock device. The Restricted License Conditions – Ignition Interlock Order (DC-266) has been revised to allow courts to indicate whether ignition interlock is required only on one vehicle or on all vehicles.

Motorcycles; **driving two abreast**: Eliminates prohibition against motorcycles from traveling two abreast in a lane designated for one vehicle.

Motor carrier and commercial driver's licensing; amends several licensing laws: Establishes the authority of DMV motor carrier size and weight compliance agents to issue civil penalties for violations occurring at fixed, permanent scales and for IFTA violations.

DMV; Behind-the-wheel exams; minimum holding period for learner's permits and commercial driver instruction permits: Increases the period of time an adult, at least 19 years old, must hold a (noncommercial) learner's permit from 30 days to 60 days before attempting the road test. This change applies to learner's permits issued July 1, 2012 or later.

DMV; **Behind-the-wheel exams**; **maneuvers checklist**: Requires individuals who have not completed an approved course of driver's education to present a driving maneuvers checklist prior to beginning a DMV-administered road skills test.

DMV; **Behind-the-wheel**; **requirements for examinee's vehicle**: Requires the motor vehicle to meet the safety and equipment requirements specified in Chapter 10 of Title 46.2 (46.2-1000 et seq.) and to possess a valid safety inspection sticker.

Virginia Highway Safety Performance Plan Development Process

The HSP development process consists of a number of stages:

- Problem identification utilizing various data
- Planning to select and prioritize goals, objectives and performance measures
- Participation from traffic safety related partners
- Development of funding priorities
- Issuance of Grant Application Announcement for grant funding of programs
- Review, negotiation and approval of grant agreements
- Implementation

The Virginia Highway Safety Office (VAHSO) HSP is produced annually and is developed through discussions and meetings coordinated by the VAHSO. The initial planning meetings are attended by VAHSO staff only to allow for the review of previous year comments on prior activities by federal, state and local partners. The VAHSO then works with and incorporates information from meetings with inter-agency groups, state and local government agencies, e.g., Virginia State Police, Virginia Department of Transportation, the Supreme Court, and community coalitions. Additionally, statistical information is gathered and analyzed to identify behavioral trends from Air, Land and Speed enforcement campaigns, Checkpoint Strikeforce, Seat Belt data (data collection from programs like Click It or Ticket) research provided by various state universities, Traffic Records Coordinating Committee (TRCC), CODES and various local and state planning meetings.

Problem Identification Process Description

Virginia's Highway Safety Office (VAHSO) conducts extensive problem identification to develop and implement the most effective and efficient plan for the distribution of federal funds. Problem identification is vital to the success of our highway safety program and ensures that the initiatives implemented address the crash, fatality, and injury problems within the Commonwealth; provides the appropriate criteria for the designation of funding priorities, and provides a benchmark for administration and evaluation of the overall highway safety plan.

- 1. The problem identification process is as follows:
 - Collection and analysis of traffic crash data The Virginia Highway Safety Office compares
 prior year HSP data with current year data. From that data, along with additional
 information, we determine which goals need to be set or remain the same.
 - The Virginia Highway Safety Office, in conjunction with the Virginia Board of Transportation Safety (TSB), utilizes specific locality data/problem identification from various partner agencies (i.e. VSP, local law enforcement, DMV, universities), to plan and implement statewide programs to address our highway safety issues including enforcement and awareness campaigns. Note: TSB was dissolved as of July 1, 2012 as part of the Governor's Government Reform; however, the Board actively participated in the 2013 grant review process.
- 2. Project/activities are selected and developed as follows:
 - Local input and solutions are processed from the local agency through the local Transportation Safety Commission, when applicable, Transportation Safety Program Managers and the affected state agency. This network of cooperation between state and local governments and non-profit organizations provides for an effective and efficient problem solution team.
 - Determination of selection and the priority ratings of individual projects requests include:


 (1) DMV Highway Safety Headquarters and Field Personnel (2) program managers with knowledge and expertise in specific problem areas (3) a specifically, appointed Allocations Committee of the Virginia Board of Transportation Safety and (4) the staff for the Virginia Board of Transportation Safety advising the DMV Commissioner and the Secretary of Transportation.
- 3. The following criteria is utilized in the selection of projects and activities:
 - Projects that identify problems by High Emphasis Communities. High Emphasis Communities are determined using the following methodology: (1) regions in Virginia are ranked in terms of their crash severity problem (2) counties/cities/towns within regions are ranked in terms of their crash severity problem, and (3) jurisdictions are stratified by type (i.e. county, city and town). The "Crash Severity Score" (CSS) is computed using crashes, vehicle miles traveled, fatalities, injuries, local licensed drivers, total licensed drivers, alcohol-related crashes, alcohol-related fatalities, alcohol-related injuries, speed-related crashes, speed-related fatalities and speed related injuries. The chart below illustrates the formula used to determine the Crash Severity Score.

- Projects that support statewide goals.
- Projects that creatively incorporate "alcohol awareness and occupant protection safety".
- Innovative projects with potential statewide applications or ability to transfer to other jurisdictions.
- Projects from state, local and nonprofit organizations that have statewide significance and address the federal program areas under the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU).
- Virginia added the top 40 counties for crashes and fatalities and unrestrained fatalities by region to its problem ID process. This is raw data not calculated using CSS formula.
- Virginia's HSP is in alignment with the current SHSP.

Description of Information Sources Used in Problem Identification


The Virginia Highway Safety Office continues to identify, analyze, recommend and implement resolutions for highway safety problems on a statewide basis. Through the state's Traffic Records Electronic Data System (TREDS), crash data can be programmatically broken down as follows: (1) local, political subdivision -- county, city and town, (2) regions and (3) statewide.

Sources of data – TREDS, Citizen Services System and the Fatality Analysis Reporting System.

Participation in the priority ratings of individual projects requests include: (1) local priorities; (2) DMV Highway Safety Headquarters and Field Personnel; (3) program managers with knowledge and expertise in specific problem areas and (4) Virginia Board of Transportation Safety.

Local input and solutions are processed from the applicable local agency through the local Transportation Safety Commission, when applicable, Transportation Safety Program Managers and the affected state agency. This network of cooperation between state and local governments and non-profit organizations provides for an effective and efficient problem solution team.

The mission of the VAHSO is to reduce crashes, injuries, fatalities and associated cost by identifying transportation safety issues and developing and implementing effective integrated programs and activities. All grantees and monies awarded support and impact meeting this goal.

Occupant Protection Program Area

Virginia's seat belt use has remained fairly level and below the national average for several years. Virginia's 2011 use rate was 81.8 percent compared to the National average of 85 percent. Unrestrained fatalities have consistently been above the national average and above 50 percent (currently 53 percent). Virginia also has a secondary seat belt law, making it difficult to aggressively enforce. Innovative strategies, especially at night when seat belt use is lower, will help increase overall seat belt use and decrease unrestrained fatalities during the most critical times and locations. Rural and pickup truck seat belt use is also a concern that needs to be addressed.

Goal C-4: To decrease unrestrained passenger vehicle occupant fatalities in all seating positions 2 percent from the 2011 calendar base year of 300 to 294 by December 31, 2013.



Alcohol Program Area

In Virginia, one out of three fatalities (32 percent) were alcohol-related. The average age of the drinking driver killed is 41. 94 percent of the fatalities occurred on non-interstate roadways with 70 percent occurring between 6pm and 3am. Drinking drivers age 35 and below continue to represent the majority of drivers involved in fatal crashes. The top 6 localities for alcohol-related fatalities were (1) Fairfax County, (2) Chesterfield County, (3) Chesapeake City, (4) Norfolk City and (5) Richmond and (6) Hampton Cities tied. Innovative strategies to address this area should focus on non-interstate roadways; between the hours of 6pm and 3am.

Goal C-5: To decrease alcohol impaired driving fatalities 5 percent from the 2011 calendar base year of 237 to 225 by December 31, 2013.



Only 12 percent of total speed-related fatalities occurred on interstates. Portsmouth, Fairfax and Staunton regions are the top 3 regions for speed-related fatalities. To address this area, targeted enforcement efforts focused on primary/secondary roadways; specifically within the Portsmouth, Fairfax and Staunton regions will be implemented.



Motorcycle Safety Program Area

In 2011, 90 motorcyclists were killed in fatal crashes in Virginia. Most motorcycle fatal crashes (51 percent) were single vehicle crashes and related to running off the road and hitting fixed objects or speeding too fast for the road conditions. Virginia has a very high helmet use rate experiencing only one unhelmeted fatality. 49 percent of motorcycle fatalities occurred during the summer months of June, July and August. Innovative strategies to address this area should focus on an awareness campaign to encourage rider training for motorcyclists, with emphasis on posted speed limits and highway conditions.

Drivers Age 20 or Younger Involved in Fatal Crashes

90 drivers age 20 or younger were killed on Virginia roadways. The top jurisdictions where the fatalities occurred were the counties of Chesterfield, Frederick, Rockingham and Spotsylvania and the cities if Chesapeake and Virginia Beach. Most fatalities occurred on Saturday or Sunday between midnight and 3am. Failing to maintain control of the vehicle and running off the road, along with speeding accounted for 55 percent of the driver actions. 90 percent of the fatalities were on a non-interstate roadway. Innovative strategies to address this area should focus on weekends, early evening through early morning; speed and training young drivers on maintaining control of vehicle.



Pedestrian/Bicycle Safety Program Area

In Virginia, 75 pedestrians were killed in fatal crashes. 67 percent of pedestrians killed in fatal crashes were walking, standing or working in the roadway, or crossing not at an intersection. About 75 percent of pedestrians were killed during nighttime hours. 60 percent of pedestrians were killed on an urban city roadway followed by 28 percent on rural routes and then 12 percent on an interstate roadway. 93 percent of pedestrians killed were not wearing reflective clothing.

The cities of Richmond, Virginia Beach and Newport News and the counties of Henrico, Chesterfield, Fairfax, and Arlington have the highest proportions of pedestrian fatalities. Innovative strategies to address this area should focus on enforcement, education and awareness specifically during nighttime hours.

Media Plan:

Media will be purchased in the course of executing a series of high profile enforcement activities. This can include but is not limited to TV, cable TV, radio and social media. Media will also be purchased to support a variety of information and education efforts such as child passenger safety, older driver issues and motorcycle safety.

Click It or Ticket-May Mobilization

Media will be purchased statewide to support the high visibility enforcement to increase seat belt usage in Virginia.

Media plan will follow current NHTSA guidelines for media and will largely be in the form of TV/cable TV, radio and social sites though may also include movie theatre and other forms of media in low use areas to support additional enforcement.

The purpose of the media will be to alert the public-particularly the 18-34 year old males -which research shows are the highest risk population –that law enforcement will be out strictly enforcing all traffic laws but most particularly seat belt/child safety seat laws.

PROJECTED FUNDING: \$350,000

Click It or Ticket-November Mini-mobilization:

Like the May Click It or Ticket mobilization, media will be purchased statewide to support high visibility enforcement of seat belt/child safety seat usage. This "mini-mobilization" will be for one week in November in advance of the heavily traveled Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

Media plan will again follow NHTSA guidelines and will include, TV, cable TV, radio among other forms of communication.

The purpose will be to remind the public that law enforcement will be patrolling to make sure that all vehicle occupants are buckled up and obeying all traffic laws. The focused audience will remain 18-34 year old males.

PROJECTED FUNDING: \$150,000.00

Night Time Unrestrained Fatality Reduction:

A multi-wave enforcement campaign with highly targeted enforcement and media has been developed as a "demonstration project" with the City of Chesapeake and NHTSA. This program takes a data driven approach to lowering the incident of unrestrained fatalities at night as the result of speed/DUI.

Media plan will follow NHTSA guidance and will include: TV, cable TV, movie theatres, and social networks, but may include other forms of media to assist with this effort.

PROJECTED FUNDING: \$40,000.00

Child Passenger Safety:

Media will be used to communicate to parents and caregivers the importance of having their child safety seats properly installed and used correctly. Communication will focus on where parents/caregivers can go to obtain assistance and instruction from certified child passenger safety technicians.

Media plan will target women 18-34 primarily but will also include adults of other ages. Media purchased may be TV/cable and radio and may include some Spanish speaking stations.

PROJECTED FUNDING: \$36,000.00

Checkpoint Strikeforce/Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over:

This DUI prevention media campaign will be an aggressive statewide media buy that will be used to educate citizens that there will be high visibility enforcement in the form of DUI checkpoints and saturation patrols.

Media plan will focus on 21-34 year old men but will also include slightly older men, adults and some Spanish speaking individuals.

Media purchased will be TV/cable, radio and will include some social media as well as other "new media" if substantiated by data.

PROJECTED FUNDING: \$1,132,310.00

Motorcycle Safety:

Motorcyclists will be the target of this media campaign and may encompass focused areas such as speed, DUI and motorcycle safety training opportunities.

Media plan will focus on males 18-35 and 35-54 (Sport and Cruiser bikers)

Media purchased may be a combination of TV/cable, radio, movie theatre and social media.

PROJECTED FUNDING: 2010=\$80,000.00 402=\$80,000.00

Speed Campaign:

This statewide media effort will target the area of speeding and promote enforcement efforts to reduce speeding in the state.

Media plan will focus on adults 18+

DUI Prevention:

Media plan will focus on TV, Cable TV, radio and will include some social media as well as other "new media" if substantiated by data.

Seat Belt Use Rate – Observed Seat Belt Use Survey

The most recent survey of occupant protection usage indicated that 21.7 percent of Virginians (1.8 million) were not wearing safety restraints. Of occupants killed in crashes 54 percent were not wearing safety restraints. The age group between 21 and 35 accounted for 32 percent of the unrestrained fatalities. 55 percent of unrestrained fatalities occurred between the hours of 6pm and 3am. Innovative strategies to address this area will include enforcement and educational efforts that will focus on high risk age groups between the hours of 6pm and 3am.

Goal B-1: To increase statewide observed seat belt use of front seat outboard occupants in passenger vehicles 4 percent from the 2012 calendar base year of 78.3 percent to 81.8 percent by December 31, 2013.

 - 1. Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination.
 - 2. Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, State, or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency.
- g. Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), and (f) above.

BUY AMERICA ACT

The State will comply with the provisions of the Buy America Act (49 U.S.C. 5323(j)) which contains the following requirements:

Only steel, iron and manufactured products produced in the United States may be purchased with Federal funds unless the Secretary of Transportation determines that such domestic purchases would be inconsistent with the public interest; that such materials are not reasonably available and of a satisfactory quality; or that inclusion of domestic materials will increase the cost of the overall project contract by more than 25 percent. Clear justification for the purchase of non-domestic items must be in the form of a waiver request submitted to and approved by the Secretary of Transportation.

POLITICAL ACTIVITY (HATCH ACT).

The State will comply, as applicable, with provisions of the Hatch Act (5 U.S.C. §§1501-1508 and 7324-7328) which limit the political activities of employees whose principal employment activities are funded in whole or in part with Federal funds.

Certification for Contracts, Grants, Loans, and Cooperative Agreements

The undersigned certifies, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, that:

- 1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
- 2. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.
- 3. The undersigned shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all sub-award at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grant, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by section 1352, title 31, U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

RESTRICTION ON STATE LOBBYING

None of the funds under this program will be used for any activity specifically designed to urge or influence a State or local legislator to favor or oppose the adoption of any specific legislative proposal pending before any State or local legislative body. Such activities include both direct and indirect (e.g., "grassroots") lobbying activities, with one exception. We have reviewed Virginia's fiscal year 2013 Performance Plan, Highway Safety Plan (HSP), Certification Statement, and Cost Summary (HS Form 217), recently submitted to this office. Based on these submissions, we find your State's highway safety program to be in compliance with the requirements of the Section 402 Program.

This determination does not constitute an obligation of Federal funds for the fiscal year identified above or an authorization to incur costs against those funds. The obligation of Section 402 program funds will be effected in writing by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) Administrator at the commencement of the fiscal year identified above. However, Federal funds reprogrammed from the prior-year Highway Safety Program (carry-forward funds) are available for immediate use by the State on October 1. Reimbursement will be contingent upon the submission of an updated HS Form 217 (or its electronic equivalent), consistent with the requirements of 23 CFR 1200.14(d), within 30 days after either the beginning of the fiscal year identified above or the date of this letter, whichever is later.

Virginia has developed a solid plan based on a strong problem identification process. The Crash Severity Scores, using the TREDS data, are very useful for directing speed, seat belt and alcohol enforcement efforts. The plan is an excellent marketing tool and provides the needed guidance for the program's enforcement activity. As outlined in the September 21, 2012 email, we requested a revision to the HSP to include: 1) a detailed problem statement in each of the program areas; 2) a description of your planning process; 3) a seat belt goal for FY2013; and, (4 the State match for each grant program. We will work with you to add this information to the plan.



We commend the Virginia Highway Safety Office for qualifying as a Section 410 low fatality state and for its impaired driving program efforts throughout last year, especially during the *Checkpoint Strikeforce* campaign. The CIOT program is implementing the Technical Assistance Team strategic plan and, along with the new grant conditions instituted on nighttime seat belt enforcement, we are confident these changes will lead to future progress. Operationalizing these changes will be essential to meeting the goals set forth in the HSP. We look forward to helping you develop the most effective strategies for your *Click It or Ticket* and *Checkpoint Strikeforce* programs.

As always, our staff will work closely with you to implement your plan and achieve your impaired driving, occupant protection and other highway safety goals.
