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PERFORMANCE REPORT

The Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FLHSMV) is the official custodian of crash data and reporting in Florida. FLHSMV has not formally closed the 2024 calendar year at the time of this report. As a result of these delays, several components of the performance report for 2024 are not available for inclusion in the submission of this annual report for Fiscal Year 2025.

The data available for 2024 indicates that Florida is generally aligning with the projected forecasts for many of the core outcome measure categories. The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) State Safety Office believes that the projects selected for the FY2024 and FY2025 Annual Grant Applications (AGAs) have contributed to the successful achievement of these forecasts.

Core Outcome Measure B-1 was not met in 2024, though observed seat belt use has shown marked improvement. The FDOT State Safety Office is actively working to identify additional projects that could support the state in achieving this measure while also reviewing current occupant protection initiatives to ensure they remain focused on efforts that will contribute to its success.

ACTIVITY REPORT

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AND ENGAGEMENT (PP&E)

In FY2025, FDOT continued implementing the PP&E plan described in the Triennial Highway Safety Plan (3HSP).

PRIORITY ENGAGEMENT: BROWARD BOULEVARD AND CORTEZ ROAD AFFECTED COMMUNITIES

Based on the Vulnerable Road User (VRU) Safety Assessment included as an addendum to Florida's 2021-2025 Strategic Highway Safety Plan, FDOT identified 22 communities that have one-mile, high-VRU crash segments. The top two communities on the VRU crash segment list were selected for direct PP&E engagement.

In FY 2025, the first priority engagement community was Fort Lauderdale in Broward County. This community contains the number one identified segment, in addition to several other high-ranking segments in Florida's VRU Safety Assessment.

On May 2, 2025, FDOT Central Office and District 4 hosted a community engagement booth at the Sunday Jazz Brunch, a monthly city-run event. The Sunday Jazz Brunch regularly attracts hundreds of residents and visitors, and is located in Esplanade Park. This high traffic park and event is near several VRU segments along Broward Boulevard and Sunrise Boulevard.

The second priority community is Bradenton in Manatee County. This community has the second highest ranked identified segment, in addition to several other high-ranking segments in Florida's VRU Safety Assessment. On June 22, 2025, FDOT hosted a community engagement booth at the Red Barn Flea Market, a well-attended flea market located near the Cortez Road VRU segment.

During each initiative, dozens of residents spoke with FDOT staff, learned more about Target Zero safety initiatives, and responded to surveys on identifying and mitigating safety concerns along their respective VRU segment.

Key outcomes from the two VRU segment events included:

- Engaging with dozens of participants on the various traffic safety issues occurring along Broward Boulevard, such as distracted driving, pedestrian and bicyclist safety, speeding, and impaired driving.
- There was a strong desire expressed for increased enforcement of traffic laws, particularly to address speeding and texting while driving.
- The community emphasized the need for more educational initiatives to foster a culture of safe driving, walking, and bicycling.

- Participants also emphasized the need for better roadway infrastructure such as bike lanes to separate nonmotorized users and vehicles, and signage to improve ease of navigation.

OTHER PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

FDOT District Offices have sponsored a robust program of public engagement to gather input on safety planning in several additional meetings, in addition to many more local community educational safety events. Through Community Traffic Safety Teams (CTSTs), FDOT District Offices coordinate numerous traffic safety events. CTSTs are locally based, data-driven groups of highway safety advocates that are committed to a common goal of improving traffic safety in their communities. Each of Florida's 67 counties has its own CTST. Additionally, each FDOT District has a full-time CTST Coordinator who works closely with the CTSTs in their geographic area. The CTST coordinators are active participants in FDOT's Traffic Safety Coalitions. Each emphasis area focused coalition brings together multiple highway safety partners, advocates, and stakeholders to address traffic safety challenges and strives to reach the shared goal of zero fatalities and serious injuries on Florida's roadways. Both the CTSTs and traffic safety coalitions develop and distribute educational materials to spread community awareness and supports a unified culture of safety throughout the state.

PP&E OUTCOMES

PP&E input supports FDOT's ongoing investments in key areas of concern statewide, including distracted driving, pedestrian and bicyclist safety, speeding, impaired driving, and increased traffic enforcement.

With regard to the specific site in Broward County, speed management was identified as a significant challenge. Community members requested additional speed enforcement to improve traffic safety. In FY2025, FDOT is implementing a Broward County Aggressive Safety and Enforcement Project that will directly affect this roadway risk. Broward County incidentally will also benefit from investment in a seat belt safety enforcement campaign, the Teen Driver Challenge (TDC) educational program, and data-driven investment in motorcyclist safety.

FDOT is also actively increasing recruitment efforts with local law enforcement agencies to increase local participation in subgrant opportunities and increase the frequency of educational outreach and enforcement on distracted driving, pedestrian and bicycle safety, and speeding and aggressive driving activities.

FUTURE PP&E ACTIVITIES

FDOT plans to consider engaging additional communities with VRU priority segments, starting with locations in FDOT District One and District Four (in partnership with the Broward Metropolitan Planning Organization). These engagement activities will leverage existing partners, such as the Salvation Army, and align with other safety and public events that involve large groups of people in public.

FDOT is currently updating the SHSP and will be utilizing public engagement opportunities to also collect direct public on the state's highway safety program to help contribute to PP&E. FDOT currently

promotes an SHSP Public Comment Form on its website and is developing a VRU survey for online and in-person deployment.

The District CTST teams already carry out a large volume of public outreach and educational events and provide a direct conduit to local communities. FDOT plans to continue to leverage CTSTs to seek ongoing public input on 3HSP planning.

DATA-DRIVEN ENFORCEMENT, COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, AND DATA COLLECTION

Information regarding participation in mobilizations is described below.

FDOT law enforcement subrecipients have participated in many community activities to build community affinity and provide an opportunity for the public to share its feedback. This included law enforcement events held at massive sporting events and in primary and secondary schools across the state. The Florida Sheriff's Association Teen Driver Challenge offers free novice driver training to teens in 42 counties across the state, led by sheriff's deputies. More than 2,000 students participate each year.

Florida law enforcement agencies are not authorized to collect race and ethnicity data regarding traffic stops and citations.

EVIDENCE-BASED ENFORCEMENT PLAN

The State of Florida has a comprehensive, evidence-based enforcement plan that encompasses all traffic safety program areas. Selection of enforcement activity locations is based upon data that identifies high-risk areas with the greatest number of crashes, serious injuries, fatalities, and/or traffic violations (citations). The FDOT State Safety Office funds law enforcement agencies located within high-risk areas and monitors data throughout the year to assess impact. Through the Florida Law Enforcement Traffic Safety Challenge, the state's eight Law Enforcement Liaisons (LELs) work with local, county, and state law enforcement agencies to encourage participation in state mobilizations and the three NHTSA traffic safety national mobilizations and campaigns. Through the Challenge, law enforcement agencies are encouraged to conduct routine enforcement patrols to address particular program areas, as well as high visibility enforcement operations (i.e., saturation patrols, checkpoints), educational programs, and earned media activities.

DATA-DRIVEN ENFORCEMENT

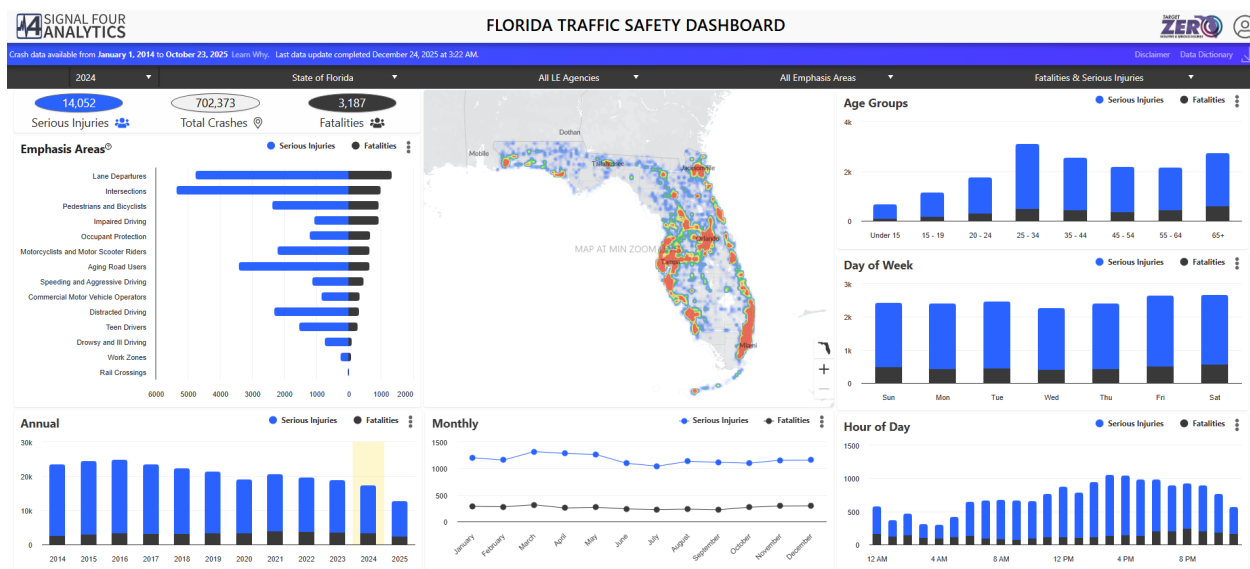
Florida's evidence-based enforcement plan uses data-driven tools to identify specific traffic safety concerns and the areas of the state that represent the highest risk for crashes, serious injuries, and fatalities. The Florida Highway Safety Matrix ranks combined serious injury and fatality data in county- and city-level matrices. The FY2025 matrix is based upon five years of data (2018-2022), these matrices provide Florida decision-makers with critical information about the status of traffic safety in counties and cities throughout the state.

County and city-level matrices are divided into three groups based upon population. The numbers in each matrix represent where a county or city ranks relative to its population group in a particular program area based on the total serious injuries and fatalities, where "1" represents the highest number of serious injuries and fatalities within a population group. For example, the "1" next to Palm Beach indicates it has the highest number of serious injuries and fatalities in speed or aggressive driving related crashes among the 25 counties in Group 1. The rankings in both matrices are based on the five-year period sum of combined serious injuries and fatalities. Inmate populations are excluded in calculations.

Signal 4 Analytics is also used in enforcement planning by law enforcement agencies because it provides actual crash counts and locations that are sortable by county, city, or local jurisdiction. Using this tool, law enforcement agencies can break down data on crash hot spots by program area to direct enforcement to high crash locations.

The FDOT State Safety Office awards funding to safety partners that undertake priority area enforcement programs and activities to improve traffic safety and reduce crashes, serious injuries, and fatalities. Funding may be awarded for addressing traffic safety challenges, expansion of an ongoing enforcement activity, or development of a new program. Entities interested in applying for NHTSA funding through FDOT's State Safety Office must submit concept papers describing their proposed efforts.

Concept papers for enforcement projects are evaluated for expected effectiveness in targeting key traffic safety issues. Project funding decisions are based upon how well the proposed effort meets the goals of the SHSP as well as local traffic safety coalitions and stakeholders, where the geographic location of the project ranks within the Florida Highway Safety Matrix, NHTSA assessment recommendations, available funding, and whether evidence of a problem is supported by state and local traffic safety and/or citation data. Law enforcement agencies that propose projects are also evaluated to determine their commitment to traffic safety enforcement. If concept papers are not received from law enforcement agencies located in high crash, fatality, and serious injury areas, the FDOT State Safety Office may directly solicit concept papers from agencies within targeted high-risk areas.



HIGH-VISIBILITY ENFORCEMENT AND NATIONAL MOBILIZATION SUPPORT

The Florida Law Enforcement Liaison (LEL) program is funded by FDOT and NHTSA. The goal of the LEL program is to reduce traffic-related fatalities and injuries by working with law enforcement agencies across the state to increase safety belt use, reduce impaired driving, and encourage the implementation of other traffic safety initiatives. The LEL program sponsors a Florida Law Enforcement Liaison Traffic Safety Challenge to support the goal of preventing crashes and saving lives.

The Challenge is a formalized recognition program that recognizes law enforcement agencies for their traffic safety efforts and promotes and recognizes law enforcement agencies for improving traffic safety by encouraging a multi-faceted approach to safer communities. During the challenge, the participating law enforcement agencies are encouraged to increase the intensity of their enforcement efforts, upgrade traffic safety policies, educate personnel, participate in the three NHTSA traffic safety national enforcement waves (2 Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over and 1 Click It or Ticket), report activities to the LEL program, recognize outstanding officers, and enhance

enforcement activities. This challenge is designed to recognize the top traffic safety initiatives that promote safe driving in Florida communities.

Research shows that an increase in a community's traffic enforcement results in decreased motor vehicle crashes, injuries, and fatalities. In fact, no other program or strategy works as well as high visibility enforcement in making roads safer. LEL programs are a critical link between law enforcement and all traffic safety-related training and public information programs sponsored by FDOT and NHTSA.

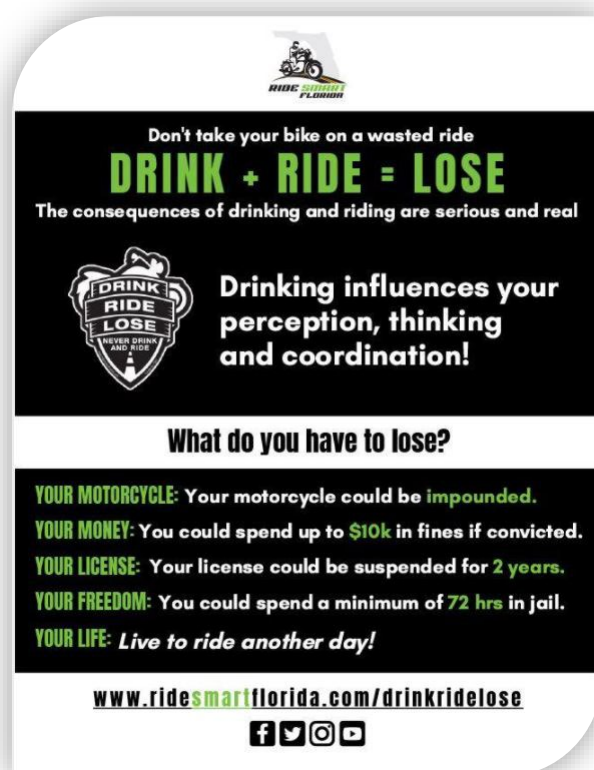
Funding is also provided for national mobilization support and is used to purchase educational materials that will be used by law enforcement agencies for public outreach.

MEDIA SUPPORT

Florida's paid media is designed to heighten traffic safety awareness and support enforcement efforts by aggressively marketing state and national traffic safety campaigns. Each media purchase is program-specific, and location and medium are selected based on number of expected impressions, geographic location of high risk, statewide exposure benefits, available funding, and in-kind match. This focused approach to media supports education and enforcement activities around the state. Effective traffic safety media efforts will contribute to the reduction of serious injuries and fatalities throughout Florida.

Florida's paid media supports the following state education and public awareness campaigns:

- ***Alert Today, Alive Tomorrow***—increases awareness of and compliance with pedestrian and bicycle laws
- ***Drink + Ride = Lose***—reminds motorcyclists of the risks, as well as physical, legal, and monetary costs associated with riding impaired.
- ***Put It Down***—educates motorists to not drive distracted.
- ***Be Rail Smart***—alerts motorists to look for trains at railroad crossings.



- ***Ride Smart***—encourages motorcyclists to not drink and ride, make themselves more visible, always wear a helmet, ride within personal and legal limits, train regularly, and obtain a motorcycle endorsement on their license.
- ***Share the Road***—reminds motorists to look for and share the road with motorcyclists.
- ***Stop Speeding Before It Stops You***—prompts motorists to slow down and not exceed speed limits.
- ***Work Zone Safety***—advises motorists to drive safely in active work zones.

National traffic safety high visibility enforcement and public awareness campaigns supported via the paid media include:

- ***Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over***—increases awareness of and compliance with impaired driving laws and the consequences of failing to do so.
- ***Click It or Ticket***—increases awareness of and compliance with safety belt use laws and the consequences of non-use.



CONTINUOUS FOLLOW-UP AND ADJUSTMENT

The FDOT State Safety Office conducts continuous monitoring of all subgrants. Funded agencies are required to submit performance reports with their invoices describing what occurred during each respective time period. The FDOT State Safety Office also asks each subrecipient to identify areas of highest risk and to direct their enforcement efforts to address that risk. Agencies continuously compare their activity reports against the latest crash data to identify successful crash reductions in targeted locations, as well as new areas of risk. FDOT State Safety Office staff regularly communicate with subrecipients about the alignment of enforcement efforts and current areas of high risk. The list of high-visibility enforcement subgrants for FY2025 can be found in each program area in the following section.

PROJECT AND SUBRECIPIENT INFORMATION

Florida's FY2025 projects are segmented into program areas by the FDOT State Safety Office to assist with the analyzing, directing, and monitoring of the highway safety countermeasure activities through the traffic safety subgrant programs. The program area categories are:

Project Description:	Florida State University's Pepper Institute will assist Florida's Safe Mobility for Life Coalition with program management, coalition meeting support, and program evaluation. This project will also oversee the implementation of Florida's Aging Road User Strategic Safety Plan and oversee CarFit training and events statewide. CarFit is a national educational program created by the American Society on Aging in collaboration with the American Automobile Association (AAA), American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), and the American Occupational Therapy Association. CarFit offers older adults the opportunity to assess how well their personal vehicles "fit" them and provides information and materials about community-specific resources and activities that enhance driver safety and increase mobility.

Project Activities:

The Pepper Institute on Aging and Public Policy at Florida State University (FSU) received a subgrant to support the Safe Mobility for Life Coalition, working in coordination with the Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) Safe Mobility for Life Program. Since its inception, the Coalition's work has been directed by Florida's Aging Road User Strategic Safety Plan, first created in 2011. In March 2017, the Coalition issued a five-year continuation plan outlining six major areas of emphasis: Aging in Place; Licensing and Enforcement; Outreach and Advocacy; Prevention and Assessment; Program Management, Data, and Evaluation; and Transitioning from Driving. The strategic plan aims to enhance safety and mobility for Florida's aging road users by reducing fatalities, serious injuries, and crashes, while also preserving independence, mobility, and community engagement. Focus groups dedicated to individual objectives monitored ongoing progress in these areas and provided updates to the plan.

In FY2025, the Coalition convened three in-person meetings of its membership in Tallahassee. Throughout the fiscal year, the Coalition delivered and supported 25 interactive workshops and presentations, surpassing its annual target and broadening educational outreach for older adults and the professionals who serve them. These efforts were strategically directed by data analysis to prioritize regions of greatest need across Florida.

The Coalition hosted nine "You Hold the Keys" workshops for older adults, two sessions for healthcare professionals and occupational therapy practitioners, and four tailored sessions for family caregivers. In addition, 10 CarFit events, including two virtual workshops, were carried out, engaging a total of 202 drivers statewide. The Coalition also provided six stakeholder-focused presentations for engineers and planners, healthcare professionals, aging-service providers, and transit agencies, along with a national presentation delivered at the Lifesavers Conference on Roadway Safety.

The Coalition also executed 11 comprehensive social media campaigns in FY2025. Each campaign was designed to highlight resources, strengthen partnerships, and promote programs aligned with the coalition's educational calendar. Campaign content was disseminated across Facebook, X, Instagram, and YouTube.

SafeMobilityFL.com experienced substantial growth in overall web traffic, with total page views increasing from 21,940 in 2023 to 53,933 in 2024, even though several key resource pages recorded a modest decline of 5–25%. Approximately 3% of site visitors arrived

via social media platforms, indicating considerable referral potential through campaign-driven links and calls to action. Although digital downloads declined, this trend likely reflects the effective use of QR codes and embedded direct links throughout high-traffic web pages, e-blasts, and social posts, which allows users to access materials immediately rather than relying on follow-up downloads.

During the fiscal year, the Coalition delivered twelve (training sessions that advanced program sustainability, increased volunteer involvement, and strengthened statewide collaboration in support of Safe Mobility for Life initiatives. These sessions consisted of seven CarFit Technician Trainings, four CarFit Event Coordinator Trainings, and one virtual Safe Walking for Life Train-the-Trainer workshop, collectively engaging nearly 190 participants across Florida. Each training session reinforced the Coalition's commitment to expanding local capacity and maintaining consistent, high-quality educational delivery.

The virtual Safe Walking for Life Train-the-Trainer session attracted 42 participants and provided them with the skills and knowledge necessary to advance pedestrian safety efforts within their communities. While participants expressed strong interest in conducting local events, many indicated that attending an in-person demonstration would further increase their confidence before independently leading workshops. The CarFit program remained a central component of volunteer training and outreach. This year's Technician trainings resulted in 115 newly credentialed Technicians, and the Event Coordinator trainings prepared an additional 30 new Event Coordinators to plan and manage events within their respective regions.

The Coalition successfully added 13 new Community Partners during the fiscal year, exceeding its annual recruitment target and further expanding the network of organizations dedicated to enhancing the safety and mobility of Florida's aging road users. These new partners represented a broad spectrum of stakeholder groups—including Older Adults, Aging Service Providers, Family Members and Caregivers, Healthcare Professionals, State and Local Government representatives, Community and Support Services, and Engineers or Planners, demonstrating the range of disciplines and viewpoints that contribute to the Coalition's statewide effectiveness.

During the fiscal year, the Coalition produced and distributed two editions of the Safe Mobility for Life Insider newsletter, Winter 2025 and Fall 2025, to inform and engage older Floridians and their

caregivers. In total, 22,178 educational resources were disseminated statewide to promote safe mobility, roadway safety, and access to transportation options.

Distribution efforts included 666 English and 1,750 Spanish copies of Florida's Guide to Safe Mobility for Life, supported by 426 stacks of postage-paid mail-in request cards. The Coalition also shared 6,202 Roadway Safety Tip Cards addressing issues such as right-turn-on-red, flashing yellow arrows, roundabouts, and wrong-way driving. To assist community outreach, 3,223 CarFit brochures were provided to encourage participation and explain the program's purpose and benefits.

Materials for families and caregivers included 2,756 English and 128 Spanish brochures, while 3,098 Transportation Options Series brochures were distributed covering bicycling, walking, golf carts, public transit, and transportation network companies. Additionally, 1,814 English and 170 Spanish Find a Ride tip cards guided individuals and caregivers to local mobility services through FindARideFlorida.org.

The Coalition also developed new outreach materials for future use, including a Florida Silver Alert brochure, a Safe Mobility for Life one-page program overview, and an updated You Hold the Keys to Your Transportation Future brochure with refreshed content and design. These new resources will be printed and distributed during the next subgrant cycle to further strengthen education and engagement statewide.

The database allows users to search for providers and connect with transportation services that match their unique mobility needs. During the FY2025 project period, project staff advanced several initiatives aimed at improving mobility, safety, and transportation

access for Florida's aging population. Work centered on enhancing the Find-A-Ride Florida Database, supporting community outreach, expanding Spanish-language resources, and contributing to statewide education efforts under the Safe Mobility for Life Program. These efforts ensured that older adults and caregivers could access accurate, reliable, and easy-to-navigate mobility information across the state.

Project staff participated in statewide and national meetings, including Safe Mobility for Life Coalition sessions and professional conferences. These engagements facilitated collaboration with partners, informed program development, and helped identify emerging transportation and mobility needs among older adults.

Program personnel delivered presentations and demonstrations at these meetings to promote the Find-A-Ride website to help older adults maintain safe and independent mobility. These presentations strengthened relationships with transportation providers, local governments, aging-service networks, and traffic safety organizations.

The project also supported website improvements and accessibility enhancements, including updates to navigation features, content revisions, and improved translation options. These technical refinements increased usability for both community members seeking mobility solutions and organizations offering transportation assistance.

By the end of the grant year, the project had met its primary objectives, expanded public engagement, increased access to mobility resources, and reinforced the statewide infrastructure supporting older Floridians. The accomplishments achieved through this cycle position the program for continued progress and broader service delivery in the coming years.

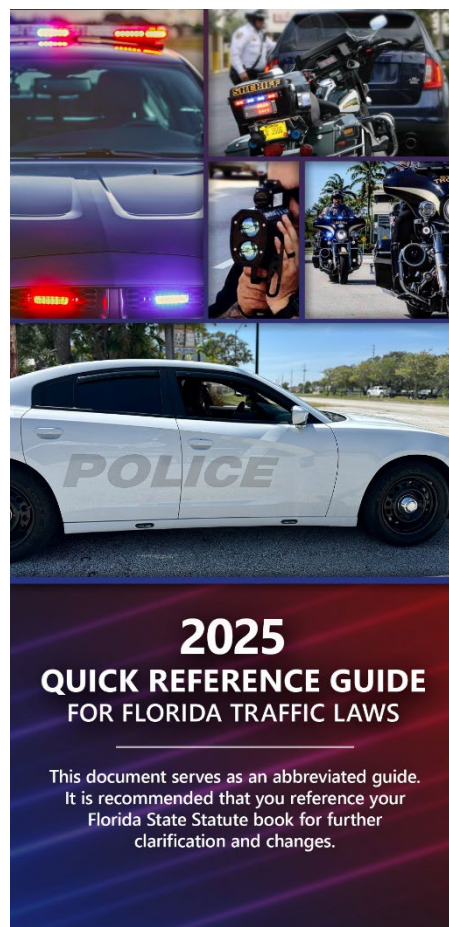

What Can You Do?

Never leave a child alone in a vehicle!

No one believes it can happen to them...

Pediatric heatstroke deaths often occur when a caring, loving parent or responsible caregiver fails to remember a child is in the vehicle. In other cases, out of curiosity or while playing, a child enters the vehicle without anyone's knowledge and becomes trapped. Here are a few ways you can help prevent a tragic pediatric heatstroke death or injury:

- Create a routine that will remind you a child is in the vehicle.
- Never answer the phone while driving. It's a distraction. Distractions, as well as change of routines, have led to many pediatric heatstroke deaths.
- Talk to your child throughout the ride. Tell them what you're doing as a driver and where you are going, even if the child is an infant.
- Keep vehicles locked at all times and the keys/fobs out of reach of children.
- Teach children (even toddlers) how to honk the vehicle horn if they become trapped.
- If a child goes missing, check all vehicles in the area including trunks and storage areas.

- ☐ Ask your babysitter or child care provider to call you if your child hasn't arrived as scheduled.
- ☐ Keep a stuffed animal in the child's car seat. Place it on the front passenger seat as a reminder when the child is in the back seat.
- ☐ Set an alarm as a reminder to drop your child off at child care. Remember to make the alarm sound different from all other alert sounds on your device.
- ☐ If you have a **change in routine**, make sure you and the other person communicate to confirm the drop-off was made.
- ☐ Consider technology that alerts drivers to check the back seat. (Vehicle and child restraint manufacturers have been working on various evolving alert systems and some technologies are available now.)

Project Description: The University of Florida's Transportation Technology Transfer (T2) Center will develop and implement an online one-stop shop website for the new Florida Traffic Safety Resource Center (FTSRC). Staff also worked to locate and acquire new materials for distribution and added a total of 976,322 inventory items and maintains a current inventory of 2,307,136 items.

Project Description:	The University of South Florida (USF)’s Center for Urban Transportation Research (CUTR) received FY25 funding to conduct educational campaigns and outreach events throughout the Tampa Bay area. As part of these efforts, CUTR incorporated Fatal Vision Distracted Driving Goggles to demonstrate the effects of distraction-related impairment. Prior to the initial event, staff were trained in the proper setup and use of goggles, which feature two simulation modes. The “Distracted Dial” mode replicates the risks associated with briefly looking away from the road to dial a phone, causing the lenses to black out for three seconds at regular three-second intervals. The “Distracted Text” mode simulates the visual and cognitive distraction caused by reading or responding to a text message, blacking out the lenses for 4.6 seconds to mirror the time a driver’s eyes and attention are diverted from the roadway.

Project Activities:

Throughout the reporting period, the Distracted Driving Awareness Program undertook extensive planning, outreach, training, and evaluation activities across the Tampa Bay region. Early efforts focused on program development, including a kickoff meeting, creation of pledge cards and surveys, design of safety materials, testing of distracted driving goggles, and researching potential outreach locations. Staff recruitment began, and preparations were made for a hybrid training session, alongside development of a pre- and post-knowledge questionnaire. Program activities included hosting the training, onboarding a new outreach coordinator, continuing survey development, and creating training certificates and pledge card designs.

The program expanded its partnerships, particularly with Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD), attended regional safety meetings, collaborated with Tampa General Hospital, and developed promotional and outreach materials. Multiple outreach events were held, including tabling activities, distribution of social media flyers, coordination with university organizations, and participation in several Community Traffic Safety Team meetings.

Additional efforts involved updating internal data tracking, exploring new community locations, distributing promotional materials, preparing training presentations for school partners, scheduling future engagements, and coordinating with entities such as the USF St. Petersburg Police Department. Teacher training presentations were delivered, new outreach staff were trained, and pledge cards were distributed to Driver's Education programs. By the end of the reporting period, all 15 planned outreach events had been completed, all 250 pledges were secured, and 100 additional participants were reached through major tabling events.

Program evaluation showed notable improvements in participant knowledge, including a 63% increase in identifying types of distracted driving, a 7% increase in understanding hands-free laws in school and work zones, and an 89% increase in awareness of Distracted Driving Awareness Month.

Project Description: Tallahassee State College (TSC) will receive funding to provide training and technical support to prosecutors and law enforcement on impaired driving issues. Two Traffic Safety Resource Prosecutor (TSRP) positions will be funded to train prosecutors and law enforcement officers in the areas of Driving Under the Influence (DUI) investigation and prosecution, case law, trial tactics, and combatting defense challenges. The TSRP Program will also train officers and experienced DUI and felony prosecutors in advanced legal, scientific, and tactical aspects of DUI prosecution. Speakers for the training sessions will come primarily from Florida organizations and include assistant state attorneys, Florida Department of Law Enforcement Alcohol Testing Program and laboratory analyst personnel, toxicologists, law enforcement officers, and traffic crash reconstructionists.

Project Activities:

Tallahassee State College was awarded a subgrant to support the facilitation of the Traffic Safety Resource Prosecutor (TSRP) Program which addresses the complexity of DUI prosecution faced by both law enforcement officers and prosecutors. The assistance included training and providing technical support to prosecutors and law enforcement officers.

During FY2025, the program provided a total of 261 hours of training to 6,463 individuals, including 4,973 law enforcement officers (including LEO/State Toxicologists) and 1,490 prosecutors. The program was also tasked with coordinating statewide Prosecutor and Law Enforcement training, both virtually and in-person. It also continued the weekly “Webinar Wednesday” training series which continues to be well-received.

The National Association of Prosecutor Coordinators (NAPC) also asked the program to help coordinate the “Traffic Tuesday” Webinar Series. During the project period, a total of 12 National “Traffic Tuesday” webinars were held wherein 4,727 participants attended live or viewed recordings.

Lastly, the program provided technical assistance to Law Enforcement and Prosecutors a total of 4,805 times; this included responses to 2,996 requests from Law Enforcement and 1,861 requests from Prosecutors, showing strong demand for assistance. The FDOT State Safety Office is still looking to fill a second TSRP position and plans to increase efforts during the next project period.

The 2025 DUI Media Survey was a mixed mode survey incorporating both telephone and online surveys. A total of 1,559 completed surveys were collected, with 1,005 administered via telephone and 554 completed online. The telephone survey was conducted from March 24 to April 4, 2025, and the online survey was conducted on March 28, 2025, and was distributed by Cint, a commercial online panel provider. Upon completion of the response collection, below is a summary of the key findings:

- Respondents were asked, on average, how often they consume two or more alcoholic beverages in one sitting. The results were 65%.
- 10% of respondents stated that they had driven a motor vehicle within two hours of drinking within the past year, a decline from 14% to 11% in 2025. Driving after drinking at the respondent's home increased in 2025 from 11% to 16%.
- The percentage of respondents who said DUI laws in their community are enforced very strictly is lower among those who reported drinking and driving (35%), than those who did not (33%).
- The percentage of respondents who reported having seen or heard the *Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over* message, broken down by whether or not they reported going through a police checkpoint resulted in 69% for those going through a checkpoint, in comparison to 48% of those who did not go through a checkpoint.

The Office of Research and Sponsored Programs (ORSP) completed and submitted the public opinion survey to the FDOT State Safety Office and was approved on February 23, 2025.

The purchase of these much-needed instruments helped to further the goals of the FDOT and the Florida Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP) in three areas:

- Improving prosecution and adjudication of impaired driving cases.
- Improving prevention, public education, and training.
- Improving data collection and analysis.

Florida Motorcycle Safety Coalition meeting facilitation: The subgrant cycle began in October 2024, with preparations for the first Florida Motorcycle Safety Coalition meeting in November, including coordinating the agenda, developing presentations, and managing logistics.

Motorcycle Safety Strategic Plan (MSSP) Business Plan updates: The MSSP Business Plan was revised and reorganized to address feedback received during the NHTSA Motorcycle Safety Program Assessment in February 2024. Coalition Members were instructed to identify existing tasks to keep or remove for the new MSSP. All recommended edits to the MSSP Business Plan were implemented in the FY2025 subgrant cycle by the CUTR team.

Establishment of new RideSMART Florida branding: The CUTR team also updated the RideSMART Florida logo. The effort included designing, selecting, and implementing a new logo and revised brand guidelines. The logo update sought to modernize the overall look of the RideSMART Florida design and enhance consistency between materials. The brand guide, developed in the previous subgrant cycle, was revised to include the updated assets. The CUTR team also finalized and updated the RSF brand guide to include a revised RSF logo.

Executing RideSMART Florida's social media outreach campaigns: The CUTR team also planned and implemented an annual social media campaign calendar for the FY2025 subgrant cycle. RSF used three main social media platforms: Facebook, Instagram, and X to promote motorcycle safety. The campaign's intended audience included Florida motorcyclists, motorcycle passengers, and all road users. RideSMART Florida continues to seek to establish itself as a member of the motorcycle safety community rather than an authority figure, aiming to encourage a culture of safety among riders and drivers. The annual social media campaign calendar served as an outline for the remainder of the subgrant cycle.

Conducting a motorcycle safety photo shoot: RideSMART Florida organized a motorcycle safety photo and video shoot at the University of South Florida campus in Tampa. Ten volunteers from across Florida were recruited, representing a wide range of ages,

backgrounds, and motorcycle types. Each participant was outfitted in bright, protective riding gear to model safe choices on the road. Images were utilized for developing new materials and social media posts.

Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month "Watch for Motorcycles" yard sign activation: In preparation for Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month in May. These efforts included, (1) developing a campaign and a new logo for Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month, (2) drafting materials to promote the "human under the helmet," and (3) intensifying its campaign to distribute "Watch for Motorcycles" yard signs, specifically targeting fatal crash sites in Tampa Bay. The CUTR team identified fatal crash locations and created routes for the strategic deployment of WFM signs. The effort was shared on social media and gained notable attention.

Developing a new helmet initiative - *Feel the Freedom*: Updated the helmet web page to list partners offering helmet discounts. By the end of the subgrant cycle, the initiative had distributed helmet materials to every BRC provider, established a network of participating retailers, and received strong validation from both sponsors and riders.

Educational outreach at major motorcycle events: Outreach efforts during the subgrant cycle, Arcadia Bike Fest, Gator Bike Rally, Tampa Monster Energy Supercross event, and Daytona Bike Week. Outreach staff collected a record-breaking 1,512 RSF Challenge surveys. In Daytona, the team also co-hosted a press conference with law enforcement and health professionals, establishing a secondary outreach tent at a local hospital.

Law Enforcement trainings to promote motorcycle safety: Outreach to law enforcement and judicial to promote motorcycle safety from an enforcement perspective. CUTR was invited to present motorcycle safety challenges in front of an audience of Hearing Officers in Duval County. Expanded its outreach to law enforcement by conducting specialized training with both active officers and new recruits. These sessions were designed to build greater awareness of motorcycle safety concepts, Florida statutes, and enforcement best practices. Instructed to over 120 recruits and officers.

SMART Course support: CUTR offered ongoing promotional support for all active SMART Course programs in the state. This effort included regular promotion of SMART Courses on RSF's social media channels to increase public visibility and encourage enrollment. The CUTR team also promoted SMART Courses at all motorcycle outreach

events, sharing information with RSF tent visitors on course availability and how to enroll in upcoming training opportunities. Furthermore, RSF's website (ridesmartflorida.com) was maintained as a central hub for potential participants, hosting direct links to individual law enforcement agencies' SMART Course pages.

Engineering Clearinghouse and Florida Design Manual Updates: In support of the goals of the Florida Motorcycle Safety Coalition's Engineering Emphasis Area, CUTR lead an effort to update the motorcycle safety engineering clearinghouse during this subgrant cycle. A preliminary website structure was drafted and approved by the Engineering Emphasis Area. Draft webpages were made based on finalized content. Ongoing efforts are focused on making final content revisions and identifying the key website design elements that will shape the new user experience.

Project Description:	CUTR will receive funding to continue to conduct behavioral and statistical studies of motorcyclists and crashes to determine how to be more effective in reducing motorcycle crashes, injuries, and fatalities. CUTR will also conduct a survey of riders to determine the effectiveness of the comprehensive motorcycle safety program and will survey newly endorsed riders to determine the effectiveness of Florida's rider training program.

Project Activities:	During the subgrant cycle, the CUTR team provided ongoing data collection/analysis support for the Florida Motorcycle Safety Program and Motorcycle Safety Coalition. The team provided crash data updates to coalition members and updated county-level crash infographics (available on the RideSMART Florida website). The CUTR team also compiled all survey data collected during the subgrant cycle, including Coalition member feedback survey results, SMART course participant survey results, and FRTP Sponsor/Student survey data. The team prepared final reports for each survey to send to FDOT.

To gain further insight into the observed crash data, a push-to-web mixed mode approach was adopted to conduct the 2025 Florida Motorcyclist Survey. The survey website (mcsafety.org) was updated, and an invitation postcard was sent to 30,000 addresses that were chosen through address-based sampling (ABS). It was expected that selected households would have a potential respondent who held a Florida driver license with a motorcycle endorsement and who owned at least one registered motorcycle in Florida. A survey advertisement was created using a variation of the survey invitation postcard, with a clear call to action to click “Learn More” and participate in the survey. The advertisement generated 4,197 link clicks in ten days. No financial incentive was offered for responding, and a total of 1,494 survey responses were collected and analyzed. Of the surveys collected, 941 were from the postcard invitation and 553 were from Facebook/Instagram.

This year, CUTR also hosted the Florida Rider Training Program (FRTTP) Graduate Feedback Survey and SMART Course student survey. Survey findings were continuously monitored by the research team and shared with stakeholders as requested. Finally, considerable effort was spent on reviewing and revising the FRTTP Graduate Feedback Survey to implement in the next subgrant cycle. CUTR aims to make the survey more concise and incorporate questions that could potentially be used for more rigorous scientific analysis.

Project Description: The University of Miami (UM) will receive funding to continue the Central/South Florida trauma initiative to conduct injury prevention and education programs in at least 2 Florida trauma centers. These programs will offer safety-related educational programs for multidisciplinary teams of Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and other pre-hospital personnel, trauma surgeons, emergency medical physicians, consulting physicians, nurses, and ancillary staff who will assist in providing safety information directly to motorcycle crash

victims and their families. Injury and prevention education for medical personnel will be concentrated in, but not limited to, the 5 counties with the greatest number of motorcycle fatalities: Broward, Hillsborough, Miami-Dade, Orange, and Pinellas. By implementing more effective first responder and medical personnel protocols and educating motorcyclists involved in crashes on the methods of reducing risks on the roadways, this project expects to reduce motorcycle-involved fatalities and serious injuries. The program will also study motorcyclists' alcohol, drug and medication use patterns from crash victims to develop informational material to help reduce recidivism by providing this information to crash victims as a preventative measure.

Budget: **\$311,000**

Project Activities: UM's *Survive the Ride* program conducted injury prevention and education programs in level 1 and level 2 Trauma Centers. These programs offered educational programs for multidisciplinary teams of paramedics and other pre-hospital personnel, trauma surgeons, emergency medical physicians, consulting physicians, nurses, and auxiliary staff to better identify trauma injuries in motorcycle crash victims so they might better treat them and prevent fatalities. During the FY2025 subgrant cycle the program completed *Survive the Ride* training resulting in a total of 27 pre-hospital staff trained. The program was provided through in-person and interactive computer-based training with a pre-and post-survey. The program modified the training of first responders resulting in an additional 60 first responders and 150 educators trained from multiple hot spot counties.

This year, an online survey was developed for distribution to police agencies to assess statewide training needs for airway management and *Stop the Bleed* programs. Agency training gap analyses are in process. The results will be presented at the Coalition meeting when completed. In May, the First Responder Training Toolkit Manual was distributed to approved trainers in Broward, Palm Beach, Manatee, and Orange Counties to assist trainers in effectively organizing and delivering the course. Additionally, follow-up contact in Biscayne Park, Coral Gables, and Doral was made with agencies that previously expressed interest in First responder training.

UM also reached out to EMS agencies to schedule training for the fall and to continue work on obtaining methodology for EMS providers to obtain state CEUs for the training. Improvement of crash victim patient entry is expected during the new grant year through the use of

translated content in Spanish and English. With the support of both volunteer and staff onboarding UM expects to have successful EMS pre-hospital and training courses, as well as continuous crash victim education. Recent IRB toxicology approval will help in their understanding of the impact of toxicology levels on crash types and injuries, and propose interventions to address these issues.

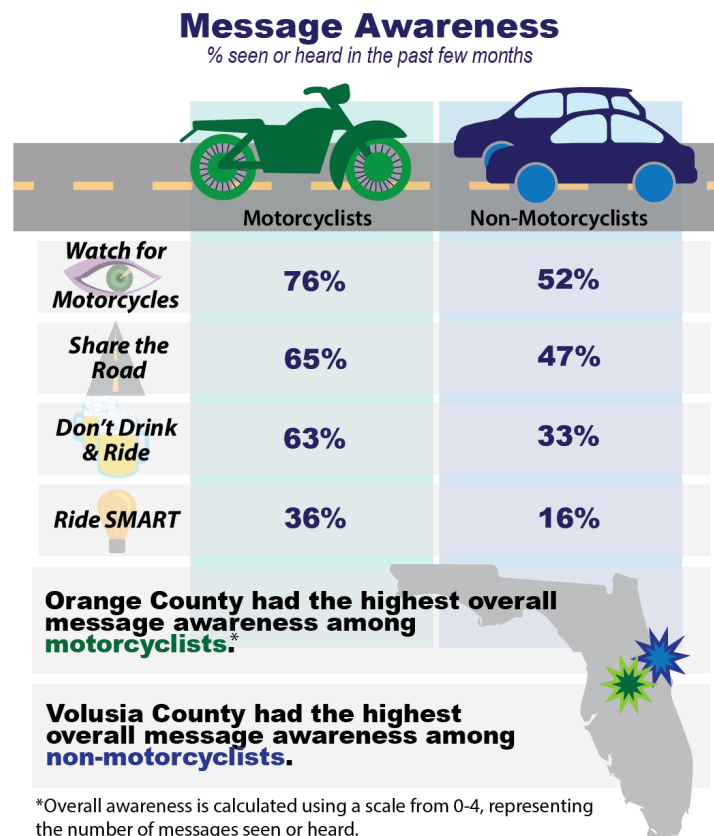

Project Activities: The University North Florida's Institute of Police Technology & Management conducted a motorcycle safety message paid media survey. The survey took place from April 10, 2025, through May 28, 2025, and focused on the top 10 counties in Florida for motorcyclist fatalities: Brevard, Broward, Duval, Hillsborough, Miami-Dade, Orange, Palm Beach, Pasco, Pinellas, and Volusia. There were 1,881 complete survey responses collected including 951 motorcyclists and 930 non-motorcyclists. The survey found that motorcyclists (76%) were more likely to have heard of the *Watch for Motorcycles* safety message than non-motorcyclists (52%). Among both motorcyclists and non-motorcyclists, awareness has seen an overall decline of 14% since 2017, although both saw year-over-year increases in 2025. When asked about the Ride SMART message, 65% recall seeing or hearing the message on internet videos, 19% heard the message on FM radio, and 31% saw it on social media.

Project Activities:

MEPER aims to decrease motorcyclist injuries and fatalities in Florida by offering continuing education opportunities that promote safe riding related behaviors, including the use of FDOT-compliant helmets. This year, the primary focus was on developing a new module for Law Enforcement, updating existing modules based on user feedback, and delivering the existing modules of the online MEPER program. The program continued to host and offer its full suite of self-paced modules, ensuring that these comprehensive courses remained accessible to all road users including motorcycle riders throughout Florida.

CUTR successfully completed the transition of the course content to a new, streamlined hosting platform, Reach360. Content development also saw significant progress with a new module dedicated to motorcycle safety for law enforcement officers. This specialized course was pilot tested with police officers on multiple occasions to ensure its real-world effectiveness. CUTR also collaborated with the University of South Florida to film video segments for *What to Expect in the Basic Rider Course (BRC)*, enhancing the visual quality and relevance of the instruction.

Targeted outreach was also conducted at in-person outreach events and in partnership with Driver Education Licensing Assistance Program (DELAP) teachers. The classroom sessions emphasized the importance of sharing them and effectively watching for motorcycles to reduce injuries and fatalities from motorcycle-involved crashes for novice drivers. In addition, DELAP teachers were encouraged to order motorcycle safety materials for their classes and share MEPER's online modules to promote safety among current and future motorcyclists, as well as to raise awareness among new drivers. DELAP schools are located in counties with the highest motorcycle crash rates, including Hillsborough, Pasco, Miami-Dade, Volusia, Broward, Pinellas, Palm Beach, Brevard, Lee, Manatee, and Polk.

The University of Florida was awarded a traffic safety subgrant and began the new grant cycle on October 1, 2024. At the start of the year, project staff reviewed the results of a survey launched at the end of the previous fiscal year to support the objective of developing and implementing a feedback mechanism for key stakeholder groups. A three-tiered plan was established to guide website marketing and ongoing survey deployment. Early in the cycle, staff also reviewed initial findings for refining the database, mapping system, and website, and began preparing updates based on emerging FDOT feedback. Outreach materials were tailored for stakeholder groups, and the project's new promotional tip card was completed.

Throughout the year, project staff held monthly meetings to track progress and advance all program objectives. Team members monitored website performance, analyzed survey responses housed in the University of Florida's secure Qualtrics system, and continued routine maintenance and updates to the website and data management system. The promotional tip card was introduced at statewide meetings, and efforts continued to support stakeholder engagement and increase contributions—such as photo submissions—for the database.

By mid-year, more than 160 provider stations were listed on the website. Project staff collaborated with FDOT leadership on planning for the upcoming fiscal year and participated in statewide traffic safety meetings to align the system with broader mobility initiatives. Project staff continue to refine the system, maintain and improve the database, and support outreach.

The coalition continued to advance the recommendations of the 2021 Florida Occupant Protection Program Assessment and implement Florida's 2022–2026 Occupant Protection Coalition Strategic Plan. Throughout the year, the project team ensured coordinated statewide engagement, data-driven planning, and effective communication among members and partners. At the beginning of the subgrant period, project staff completed essential administrative setup, including preparing project documentation, establishing purchase orders, organizing files, and supporting the execution of the subcontract with Cambridge

Systematics (CS). The subcontract enabled CS to lead meeting planning and facilitation, maintain the Strategic Action Plan, provide analytical support, and prepare all quarterly meeting materials.

Throughout the year, project staff coordinated and supported four in-person quarterly FOPC meetings held in Gainesville. These responsibilities included arranging meeting logistics, assembling and distributing materials, maintaining accurate membership lists, supporting subcommittee work, and managing ongoing communication. Travel coordination was a major component of this effort: project staff arranged pre-travel authorizations, reservations, and reimbursement processing for approximately 16–20 traveling members per meeting, utilizing UFGO for final reimbursement submissions.

Seven new members were onboarded during the year, bringing total coalition membership to 42 (excluding staff). Quarterly meetings in November 2024, February 2025, May 2025, and July 2025 provided opportunities for members to review occupant protection data, refine Strategic Action Plan activities, and receive updates from statewide partners. Meeting agendas included presentations on survey findings, CPS diversion programs, OP subgrant updates, the High Five Program, golf cart safety messaging, legislative model language, and updates to occupant protection fact sheets and CPS materials.

Project staff supported CS in maintaining the FOPC website, ensuring timely posting of meeting agendas, minutes, and the Strategic Action Plan. The project team also provided updated membership lists and research materials to CS for public posting. Updates to ClickItFla.com were completed to ensure current occupant protection research and data were available to coalition members and the public.

By the conclusion of the subgrant period, project staff had successfully delivered all required administrative support activities, including meeting coordination, documentation management, communication functions, membership support, and travel processing. These efforts strengthened statewide collaboration, maintained momentum on strategic priorities, and contributed to meaningful progress toward Florida’s occupant protection goals during the FY2025 cycle.

During the FY2025 subgrant period, project staff at the University of Florida's Transportation Technology Transfer (T2) Center advanced statewide child passenger safety efforts through coordinated training, resource distribution, and technical support for child passenger safety technicians and instructors. The year began with core administrative tasks, including updating the Occupant Protection Resource Center (OPRC) website, processing agreements, establishing purchase orders for car seats and scholarships, and ensuring all materials aligned with current program requirements.

Throughout the year, the project team served as the central hub for technical assistance. Staff responded to inquiries from technicians, instructors, partner agencies, and the public; maintained the OPRC mailbox; provided guidance on car seat reporting and scholarship processes; and supported CPS training through updated curriculum materials and instructor preparation resources. The team also reviewed and processed instructor stipends and more than 350 scholarship applications, over half from FDOT priority counties.

Project personnel supported statewide outreach by distributing 112,820 printed educational materials—more than doubling last year's total—and fulfilling 85 car seat orders totaling more than 1,200 seats. Just over half of these orders were sent to priority counties. An additional 133 seats were distributed through the FLHSMV "\$2 Difference" program, with project staff verifying reporting and processing 204 eligibility submissions documenting 991 distributed seats.

A major component of the project involved coordination of Florida's CPS Fitting Station network. Staff conducted monthly audits, communicated with stations, and verified technician certifications. Over the year, 20 new stations were added, 112 updated, and 13 removed due to lapsed certification or closure.

Professional development efforts were expanded through monthly CPS orientation meetings launched in April, totaling five sessions with 79 attendees. A new quarterly CPS e-newsletter was distributed to more than 1,600 recipients, and staff developed two statewide surveys: a National Digital Check Form Feedback Survey and a CPS Retention Survey, which was later presented to the Florida Occupant Protection Coalition.

Project staff strengthened partnerships by supporting multiple statewide meetings and events, including Safe Kids coalitions, the Florida Vehicular Heatstroke Task Force, the National Safety Council curriculum webinar, and regional seat check events where staff completed more than 55 checks. Licensing and instructional preparation were coordinated for two Safe Travel for All Children (STAC) courses held in March and June.

By the end of the subgrant year, the project team had supported 42 CPS certification courses, two renewal courses, and helped certify 366 new technicians. The statewide network remained strong with 97 certified instructors and more than 1,400 technicians. Overall, project staff delivered a successful year of program administration, training support, resource distribution, and statewide engagement—strengthening Florida’s child passenger safety system and supporting CPS professionals serving families across the state.

A consultant will be hired to conduct a statewide observational safety belt usage survey and a child passenger restraint usage survey. Funds will also be used to conduct statewide awareness and opinion surveys about occupant protection. The surveys will be shared with partners across the state to assist with program development and educational opportunities.

Project Activities:	The University of North Florida’s Institute of Police Technology and Management (IPTM) received a subgrant on October 25, 2024, to administer three statewide traffic safety studies: the Click It or Ticket (CIOT) Public Opinion Survey, the Seat Belt Observational Survey, and the Child Passenger Restraint Use Observational Survey. To conduct the CIOT public opinion survey, IPTM partnered with the University of North Florida Public Opinion Research Lab (PORK) through a subcontract approved on November 8 and executed on November 14, 2024. The survey was administered immediately following the Memorial Day CIOT Mobilization using both telephone and online data collection. The telephone survey ran from June 2–24, 2025,

producing 951 responses, and the online survey, administered through Qualtrics from June 10–30, produced 706, for a total of 1,656 responses. Florida was stratified by its 10 Designated Market Areas (DMAs), with Miami-Dade treated as a separate stratum. Surveys were offered in English and Spanish.

Overall CIOT awareness in 2025 was 73%, six percentage points lower than in 2024. Awareness has fluctuated over time, peaking at 86% in 2017 and reaching a low of 68% in 2022. In 2025, awareness patterns varied across media markets, with some regions showing higher retention of the message than others. Awareness increased consistently with driving frequency, ranging from 47% among individuals who never drive to 80% among those who drive more than ten hours per week. White respondents reported the highest awareness at 79%, followed by Black or African American respondents at 76%. Respondents of Hispanic or Latino origin reported the lowest awareness at 63%, down from 77% in 2024. Adults aged 35–54 had the highest awareness at 77%, while those aged 18–34 reported the lowest at 66%, continuing a recent trend in which younger respondents show reduced recall despite historically higher awareness in earlier years.

Among those who recalled seeing CIOT messaging, traditional roadside billboards remained the most frequently cited source at 48%, followed by electronic billboards and cable television at 32% each. Less commonly cited sources included X/Twitter (3%), Snapchat (4%), brochures (4%), and police officers (6%). Exposure patterns differed across demographic groups, with Black respondents more frequently reporting exposure via FM radio, streaming television, and social media, while Hispanic respondents more often reported exposure through billboards and portable electronic signs.

Self-reported seat belt use remained steady statewide, with 89% of respondents indicating they always wear a seat belt. While usage levels varied among individual DMAs, overall compliance remained high across the state. Three percent of respondents reported rarely or never wearing a seat belt. Lower usage persisted among respondents aged 18–24, who reported 84% usage, and among pickup truck drivers, who reported 80%.

Perceptions of enforcement shifted notably from 2024 to 2025. This year, 35% of respondents believed they were somewhat or very unlikely to receive a ticket for not wearing a seat belt, a substantial decrease from 55% in 2024. At the same time, 63% believed that seat belt laws are enforced very or somewhat strictly, both statewide

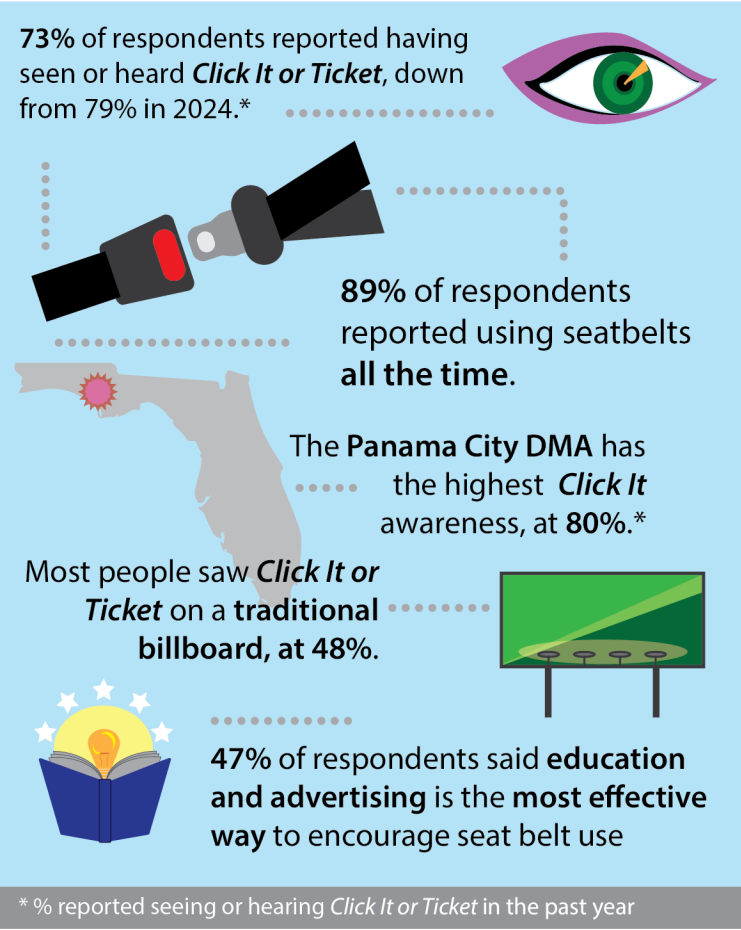
and within their local counties. Respondents who consistently wore seat belts were more likely to view enforcement as strict, though “somewhat strictly” remained the most common response overall. When asked about the most effective ways to increase seat belt use, 47% identified education, advertising, and graphic imagery, followed by stricter enforcement or harsher penalties at 24%, and personal responsibility at 10%. Safety-related devices and monetary incentives each received three percent of responses. Support for policy measures remained strong: 90% favored requiring manufacturers to install seat belt warning systems for front and rear seats, and 91% supported a law requiring all occupants to be buckled.

To complete the 2025 Seat Belt Observational Survey, IPTM contracted with Preusser Research Group, Inc. (PRG) through a subcontract approved on November 8 and executed on November 19, 2024. Observations were conducted from May 30 to June 5, 2025, immediately after the CIOT Mobilization, and included 31,545 vehicle occupants at 165 sites in 15 counties. Statewide observed seat belt use reached 90.8%, up 0.8 percentage points from the 2024 rate and the highest ever recorded in Florida. Usage continued to vary by roadway type, with higher compliance on interstate highways (92%) than on local roads (88.5%). Sport utility vehicles (SUVs) again showed the highest usage (93.6%), while pickup trucks had the lowest (84.3%). Female occupants buckled up more frequently than male occupants, at 93.4% and 88.8% respectively. Occupants under age 16 had the highest usage rate at 96.8%, while those aged 16–34 reported the lowest rate at 89.2%. Differences across racial and ethnic groups followed established patterns, with Black occupants reporting the lowest usage (84.9%) and Asian and “other” occupants the highest. The final report was submitted on August 13, 2025, approved on September 3, and forwarded to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration through the Florida Seat Belt Use Survey Reporting Form. The subcontract with PRG was then closed.

IPTM also partnered with PRG to conduct the 2025 Child Passenger Restraint Use Observational Survey. The subcontract was approved on November 8 and executed on November 20, 2024. Observations took place from March 8 to April 17, 2025, at 200 sites in 20 counties, with data collected on 4,949 children in 4,413 vehicles. Child restraint use in 2025 was 83%, an increase from 82% in 2024, with the highest historical rate recorded in 2017 at 86%. By age, 94% of children ages 0–3 were restrained, compared with 73% of children ages 4–5 and 78% of children ages 6–12. Driver seat belt use was observed at 93%.

A strong association between driver and child nonuse persisted. When drivers were unbelted, 35% of children ages 0–3, 58% of children ages 4–5, and 79% of children ages 6–12 were also unrestrained. Restraint use varied across DMAs, with some regions displaying consistently higher compliance depending on age group. The final report was submitted on May 23, 2025, revised following an FDOT request on June 21, and resubmitted with printed copies. The subcontract with PRG was then closed.

Project Description:	The National Safety Council (NSC) will develop and demonstrate a child restraint diversion program in Orange County Florida as a case study for a statewide program. A program of this sort will provide an opportunity for the judicial system to promote child restraint usage for traffic safety violators in situations where financial penalties are not enforced. The NSC will contract with Preusser Research Group to assess the success of the program in increasing usage rates among program participants.
Budget:	\$170,000

Project Activities:

During the FY2025 subgrant cycle, NSC advanced the development of a model Child Restraint Offender Program (CROP) in Florida, using Orange County as the demonstration site. Monthly classes were held from late February through early September to provide corrective education for caregivers cited for child passenger safety violations, with an average attendance of five participants. The Florida Safety Council managed registration and certification, while the Orange County Sheriff's Office delivered instruction. Awareness activities within the Sheriff's Office—including briefings, internal communications, and social media—supported program visibility.

To guide the model's design, NSC conducted statewide and national research on existing child restraint diversion programs, including outreach to agencies in Alabama, Connecticut, and Indiana, as well as a review of Florida programs identified by the FOPC. A program in Fort Pierce emerged as a strong candidate for alignment with the new model. Research confirmed the need for a standardized, accessible diversion option grounded in best-practice child passenger safety education.

A major accomplishment was the development and refinement of a model diversion curriculum. After observing CROP operations and assessing implementation needs, NSC selected Car Seat Basics—aligned with NHTSA guidance—as the curriculum foundation. Provisional approval was obtained for use in the Ninth Judicial Circuit. The curriculum was updated in 2025, submitted for state review, and prepared for both online and in-person delivery, with Spanish-language versions anticipated by the end of 2025. These steps position the program for broader accessibility and statewide scaling.

NSC also developed new promotional materials to support awareness, including an editable rack card describing the diversion option. FDOT communications approved the design on September 30, 2025, and 5,000 copies were ordered for statewide distribution to Law Enforcement Liaisons, Community Traffic Safety Teams, and local agencies. Customizable versions will be available as additional counties adopt the model.

Project work included extensive stakeholder engagement. NSC collaborated with FDOT, PRG, the Orange County Sheriff's Office FLHSMV training program, the Law Enforcement Liaison network, and FOPC. NSC provided updates at three FOPC meetings, sharing research findings, program design elements, and promotional materials to support future expansion.

Project data reinforced the value of a diversion model. Florida issues more than 8,000 child restraint citations annually, and nearly half result in dismissed or withheld adjudications—representing missed opportunities for education. NSC identified key steps for scaling the program, including judicial engagement, standardized referral processes, and enhanced law enforcement awareness. The Car Seat Basics for Law Enforcement training, already approved in multiple states, was identified as a tool to support stronger referral pathways.

Barrier analysis highlighted challenges such as caregiver awareness, cost and access issues, and inconsistent referral practices. Mitigation strategies included expanding online training, providing multilingual materials, strengthening community partnerships, and standardizing administrative processes. The Orange County demonstration, combined with statewide research and stakeholder coordination, confirmed the feasibility of a consistent, high-quality diversion program that can reduce child passenger restraint misuse statewide.

Through curriculum development, stakeholder engagement, and strategic planning, the National Safety Council established a strong foundation for a statewide child restraint diversion model. The work completed this year positions Florida to expand an evidence-based approach that enhances caregiver education and promotes safer travel for the state's youngest road users.

The LEL Program improves the connection and cooperation between law enforcement agencies, FDOT, and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). The LELs function as both a line of connection between these groups as well as marketers of FDOT's and NHTSA's campaigns and initiatives.

The Law Enforcement Liaison (LEL) Program promoted statewide highway traffic safety initiatives promoted by the FDOT State Safety Office. The LEL Program, through its Law Enforcement Liaisons, partnered with law enforcement agencies to promote and increase participation in the three NHTSA traffic safety national enforcement waves and the annual Florida Law Enforcement Traffic Safety Challenge to increase awareness and participation in traffic safety-related efforts.

The LELs provided coordination and education to law enforcement agencies within their respective geographical regions. Within each LEL region, local area networks (LANs) were established and maintained in an effort to ensure that information was disseminated effectively and efficiently. Region-specific information on the number and severity of traffic crashes and other highway safety related issues were provided to law enforcement. Additionally, the LELs provided information regarding FDOT's programs and initiatives such as Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over, Click It or Ticket, Operation Southern Slow Down, and subgrant funded law enforcement training opportunities available through the Florida Public Safety Institute (FPSI) and the Institute of Police Technology Management (IPTM). The LELs conducted a total of 48 LAN meetings during the year and provided 60 traffic safety related training courses. The LEL team also participated in an additional 224 Community Traffic Safety Team meetings around the state and all of the Traffic Safety Coalition meetings. In addition, the team had 36,898 individual communications with law enforcement agencies around Florida and conducted many onsite agency visits with law enforcement agencies.

The decreased reach was primarily attributed to staffing vacancies. In addition, the agency participated in several large outreach events throughout Florida. Events included the Tallahassee Winter Festival, Springtime Tallahassee, Take Your Kids to Work Day, the Alachua County Tax Collector Teen Event, and Children's Day at the Capital. Over 10,000 teen safe driving materials were distributed through outreach activities, and 9 traffic safety press releases were published during the subgrant period. From October 1, 2024, to June 30, 2025, teen driver-involved crashes decreased by 2.95%, teen driver fatalities decreased by 18.06%, and teen driver serious injuries decreased by 14.03% when compared to the same time the previous year.

Project Description: Tallahassee State College (TSC) will continue to support a full-time coordinator and two program specialists who will administer and oversee teen traffic safety-related activities and the statewide Florida Teen Safe Driving Coalition (FTSDC). The coordinator will continue to plan and execute the coalition's quarterly meetings, during which time members with specific knowledge, expertise, and commitment to teen traffic safety generate and support strategically developed initiatives driven by data and community needs. Community outreach and education will also be facilitated through *Weeks of Awareness* during which time a traffic safety presentation will be presented to students at approximately 50 high schools across Florida. Speaker topics and stories can range from distracted driving, impaired driving, occupant protection, peer pressure in a vehicle, speeding and aggressive driving, and how to speak up when you feel unsafe in a car as a passenger.

Budget: \$1,600,000

Project Activities: The Tallahassee State College (TSC) was awarded a subgrant to conduct statewide teen traffic safety-related activities and support the FTSDC. FTSDC is made up of public and private groups working together on teen traffic safety, including Graduation Driver Licensing (GDL) awareness education. The coalition focuses on increasing

traffic safety awareness amongst teens and adults through the creation and dissemination of peer-focused educational materials.

During the subgrant year, FTSDC held four quarterly in-person coalition meetings with an average number of 38 official members. During these meetings, strategic plan objectives, performance, and evaluations were discussed and updated. The coalition created unique teen traffic safety educational materials on different traffic-related topics. The FTSDC website was utilized to provide up-to-date teen driver traffic-related resources. There was a substantial surge in website traffic because of informational posts regarding Florida Senate Bill 994, Amendment to Section 322.1615, Florida Statutes, New Driver Education requirements, and the release of the Battle of the Belts campaign kit for 2024-2025. During the project period, there was a 41.1% increase in unique page views from the prior year.

There was a total of 60 presentations given during the project period, reaching approximately 29,000 students. These presentations were focused on locations that were listed in the Top 40% of the FDOT Highway Safety Matrix for Teen Drivers. A substantial volume of educational and outreach materials was distributed to partner agencies, schools, and community organizations statewide. In total, 1,471 users of the FTSDC website downloaded 2,295 digital resource materials.

All project objectives established under this subgrant were successfully achieved during the reporting period. The Florida Teen Safe Driving Coalition demonstrated measurable progress in advancing traffic safety awareness among teens and caregivers through increased digital engagement, active coalition participation, expanded educational outreach, and strengthened community partnerships. Quantitative metrics indicate significant growth in website traffic, social media following, and the distribution of educational materials statewide. Qualitative outcomes further reflect enhanced collaboration with member agencies, increased public awareness of Florida's GDL laws, and improved alignment with the FDOT Strategic Highway Safety Plan emphasis areas. Overall, project activities met or exceeded anticipated outcomes and effectively supported the mission of reducing teen crashes, fatalities, and serious injuries on Florida's roadways.

Project Description:	The Health Information and Policy Analysis Section operates the Emergency Medical Services Tracking and Reporting System (EMSTARS) program. Currently, that program and data repository is administered using an existing commercial off-the-shelf solution known as EMSTARS-CDX. The NEMSIS program is the foundation for national EMS data collection and reporting standards and creates an environment for data sharing between local, state, and national databases. This system collects EMS incident level data in compliance with the NEMSIS Version 3 (V3) standard and the Florida Data Dictionaries Version 3.4 (V3.4) and Version 3.5 (V3.5) standards.

The implementation of the NEMSIS V3 data standard improves the compatibility and interoperability of data between state and local systems and the national data system. The NEMSIS V3 standard is inclusive of NEMSIS Version 3.4 and NEMSIS Version 3.5. The NEMSIS V3 standard creates an environment where data can be easily shared or moved between agencies, states, and national data repositories with the implementation of standard methods for

transporting data between systems, documented file structure and data definitions for information exchange between local, state, and national databases. The NEMSIS V3 standard and its framework is necessary to enable greater integration between related databases at the local, state, and national level, as well as enable NEMSIS to achieve an HL7 certification. Florida adopted the national standards from NEMSIS and is currently transitioning all participating state EMS agencies to the NEMSIS V3.5 and V3.5.1 data standards beginning 2023.

Contractual services are required to continue the transition of developing and maintaining complete, accurate, uniform, and timely EMS data as a major component of the Traffic Records Information System (TRIS). These resources will concentrate on the improvement of the completeness of Florida's EMS system data by 1) continuing to increase the number of EMS provider agency runs being submitted to the state repository in compliance with the current National EMS Information System and 2) continuing with agency transitions to the new V3.5 standards. Both objectives further the implementation of the EMS Prehospital Data Collection and Reporting System and enable greater usage of the EMS data for linkages and integration with other data sets. The subgrant will fund a Project Manager, Technical Business Analyst, Data Modeler/Migration Specialist and Business Intelligence Analyst/Developer, along with data hosting services, required vendor change orders, and travel expenses to educate local EMS agencies on data collection standards and to attend conferences for implementation planning.

Budget: **\$528,000**

Project Activities: During the subgrant year, the Health Information and Policy Analysis Section of the Florida Department of Health oversaw the Emergency Medical Services Tracking and Reporting System (EMSTARS) program. The Department maintained its contractual service agreements with KLC for the Project Manager, Data Modeler/Data Migration, and Business Intelligence Analyst positions, and with ACE Staffing and Consulting, Inc. for the Business Analyst position. These contracted staff were responsible for leading and supporting EMSTARS' activities to ensure continued compliance with NEMSIS requirements.

EMSTARS program staff actively participated in three EMS Advisory Council Data Committee meetings during the reporting period. These meetings supported ongoing review of EMSTARS program performance, guided planning for the transition to NEMSIS Versions

3.4 and 3.5, and facilitated updates to the Florida Data Dictionary, business rules, reporting processes, and system integration with the Florida Health Information Exchange (HIE). As a result of this work, the full Florida Emergency Management Advisory Council approved the final publication of the Florida Data Dictionary and associated business rules for NEMSIS V3.5 in June 2023.

In addition to Advisory Council engagement, program staff conducted regular conference calls and virtual meetings with EMS data vendors and EMS Data Managers to support statewide improvements in NEMSIS Version 3 prehospital data collection and reporting. These efforts produced significant measurable outcomes. By the end of the subgrant period, the percentage of EMS agencies submitting to the state's incident-level repository increased from 81% to 99%, with 100% of EMS runs successfully submitted. All Florida EMS agencies achieved full compliance with NEMSIS V3.5 standards, and 84% of all runs were received by the state within ten hours.

Project Description: The Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FLHSMV) serves as the official custodian of Florida's driver, motor vehicle, crash, and citation/adjudication datasets, which are four of the six traffic records data systems. NHTSA has identified these systems as being critical to improving traffic safety and reducing the number of fatalities and serious injuries on Florida's roadways. Improving the data quality attributes of the crash and UTC datasets supports the FLHSMV's Strategic Plan to improve traffic records information systems. An improvement in these strategic objectives further enhances the State's data-driven approach to developing traffic safety initiatives and law enforcement countermeasures. This project directly affects Florida's Citation/Adjudication and Crash traffic data systems, by using the established performance measures to implement actionable strategies to improve the accuracy, completeness, and uniformity of these two key parts of the Traffic Records Information System.

Without quality, accessible, and uniform data, traffic safety problems cannot be adequately identified, which in turn reduces the effectiveness of countermeasures and evaluations that federal, state, and local stakeholders use for improving traffic safety. These stakeholders who utilize the crash data include: the FDOT for mapping the crash on the Florida roadway network to identify

roadway issues and take measures to prevent, or lessen the severity of future crashes; the Florida Department of Health to evaluate Emergency Medical Services responses to crashes in order to improve patient outcomes when injured in traffic crashes; the NHTSA which uses crash data to evaluate vehicle safety features, such as restraint system use and effectiveness; and the Florida Department of Education for evaluating and improving bus safety.

To assist in the timely identification and resolution of these potential duplicates, both during implementation and beyond, additional human resources are needed to specifically address these records. FLHSMV will further use these record resolutions to improve the citation dataset by identifying, where applicable, common reasons why duplicates may be occurring and to provide training, etc., to aid in the reduction of duplicate creation moving forward. This serves Florida as well as the rest of the country.

Other Personnel Services (OPS) Record Technicians staff will be used to assist in the evaluation of current driver history data to identify and resolve potential duplicates, as well as other data quality issues (deceased drivers, etc.), that may hinder effective participation. Further, these resources would be used for data quality to quickly resolve the go-live duplicates identified as other states join State to State (S2S). These efforts will reduce the risk of increased cost due to migrating unnecessary records into the new system (for which Florida is charged a per record fee). They will also help increase the accessibility, accuracy, and uniformity of the driver history record system.

An OPS Management Analyst will be responsible for communicating technical database needs and requirements to improve the crash database and records. Due to limited Information Systems Administration resources, the Department is requesting contractual services to hire a Senior Developer to work alongside the OPS Management Analyst. This resource will be fully dedicated to the crash objectives of this project, focusing on crafting efficient and scalable code, and providing problem solving and technical skills. They could refactor code to improve performance, enhancing the user experience, provide expertise in database design, software development, stored procedure, programming, as well as contributing their insights into strategic decision-making.

Budget: **\$673,000**

Project Activities:

During the subgrant period, the Department maintained active efforts with OPS staff, including a Management Analyst and Record Technicians, to address both Uniform Traffic Citation (UTC) and crash reporting objectives. A primary focus was the Accessibility, Completeness, and Timeliness (ACT) Report, where the team conducted a detailed analysis of data tables, report generation processes, and performance measures. The Management Analyst documented the report's code, data flows, and temporary tables, which facilitated the development of a comprehensive work plan aimed at improving data accuracy, completeness, visualization, security, and automation. A Business Analyst was engaged to review existing documentation, analyze data across Oracle and SQL databases, examine formulas used in ACT measures, cross-validate data elements, and capture As-Is requirements to support the redesign of the report. Together, the team developed disaggregated queries to measure individual crash reports, created new driver and vehicle performance metrics, and integrated external datasets such as motor vehicle registration and driver license data to ensure consistency across systems.

Significant progress was made in redesigning the ACT Report's workflow, including mock-ups of new SQL tables, a proposed SSRS version of the report, and an evaluation of Tableau dashboards. The team implemented a Weekly Error Report dashboard to provide e-crash vendors with detailed insights into data validation issues, allowing vendors to correct errors before data entered the state repository.

For UTC objectives, OPS staff identified and resolved duplicate credentials, enhancing the uniformity and reliability of driver history data. The team coordinated with multiple states to maintain consistent system-to-system processes, while managing staffing adjustments to ensure operational continuity. Throughout the grant period, the team documented workflows, finalized a detailed Business Relationship Document outlining current and proposed report methodologies, and incorporated visual flow diagrams and integration measures to clarify data system relationships. The project successfully implemented new performance metrics that assess the accuracy and integration of crash, citation, driver license, and motor vehicle data, resulting in improved reporting, greater data quality, and a streamlined process for distributing ACT reports to law enforcement agencies and e-crash vendors.

Project Description:	The Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FLHSMV) serves as the official custodian of Florida’s driver, motor vehicle, crash, and citation/adjudication datasets, which are four of the six traffic records data systems. The National Traffic Highway Safety Administration (NHTSA) has identified these systems as being critical to improving traffic safety and reducing the number of fatalities and serious injuries on Florida’s roadways. In November of 2020, the NHTSA concluded their Traffic Records Assessment to provide their recommendations for improving Florida’s six traffic records systems. These recommendations will improve the data quality attributes of the driver and vehicle datasets and will also support the FLHSMV’s Strategic Plan to improve the Traffic Records Information System (TRIS). An improvement in these strategic objectives further enhances the State’s data-driven approach in developing traffic safety initiatives and law enforcement countermeasures. With over 95 million records in the FLHSMV driver and vehicle records systems, ensuring accurate and complete data is paramount for decision-making. Vulnerability to data quality issues is not only due to the high volume of data but also due to this data being utilized by many external sources and added to the FLHSMV records systems. This project directly affects Florida’s driver and vehicle traffic data

systems and aims to improve and establish performance measures to implement actionable strategies to improve the accessibility, accuracy, completeness, integration, timeliness, and uniformity of the Traffic Records Information System.

As the third most populated state in the nation and with more than 95,000,000 records in the FLHSMV driver and vehicle records systems, the FLHSMV team will be tasked with improving its data quality control program and performance monitoring efforts for its driver and vehicle datasets. In 2022-2023, FLHSMV offices, third-party vendors, and county tax collectors' offices conducted over 36,000,000 transactions to pull data from external sources and add data to the FLHSMV records systems. Reliance on this data is evident as there were 1,200 sharing agreements and response to 56,000 public records requests for driver and vehicle data received by the Bureau of Records Public Records Unit in 2023.

To improve these data sets, the NHTSA 2020 Traffic Records Assessment recommended Florida improve its data quality control program and performance monitoring efforts by capturing baseline data and developing numeric goals to provide internal and external stakeholders with high-quality data for research and decision-making. A Project Analyst will be hired with professional experience in process improvement, project management, data analysis and reporting, data security, and systems evaluation. This position will be responsible for creating, monitoring, and updating a plan for implementing the project activities; gathering feedback and collaborating with data managers and users; providing a narrative of the current situation, rationale and methodology used; reporting findings and recommending processes for sustained ongoing monitoring and data quality management; evaluating and summarizing the overall effort. Additionally, the Project Analyst will create and maintain a report with performance measurements and metrics, report data measurements, provide recommendations to internal and external stakeholders, develop and conduct presentations, and handle administrative duties for subgrant reporting.

Overall, this project will continue building the foundation for a comprehensive data quality control program with performance measures for all six data quality attributes of timeliness, accuracy, completeness, uniformity, accessibility, and integration as recommended in the 2020 Traffic Records Assessment.

Project Activities:

The subgrant funding provided to the Florida Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FLHSMV) for FY2025 supported comprehensive efforts to improve the quality and reliability of driver and vehicle records data. The project successfully met all subgrant objectives, including developing a detailed project plan, establishing performance measures and baseline metrics, and providing recommendations for ongoing data quality monitoring and evaluation. During the initial phase, the Project Analyst conducted an in-depth review of FLHSMV data systems, focusing on key areas such as vehicle data uniformity, vehicle body and fuel type accuracy, vehicle owner match to registration, Driver History Record (DHR) completeness and accuracy, and ignition interlock device (IID) enforcement accuracy.

Analyses revealed discrepancies in vehicle and driver data, often linked to process issues or manual entry errors, and highlighted the importance of adhering to national standards such as the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators (AAMVA) data element guidelines. Subsequent efforts concentrated on refining data accuracy in specific areas, including motorcycle registration, surrendered license transfers, and incorrect driver suspensions, with solutions developed through collaboration with multiple FLHSMV bureaus. Following the transition to a newly hired Project Analyst in the fourth quarter, attention shifted to address data uniformity, a critical factor affecting jurisdictional reporting, mail delivery, and public safety communications. Baseline assessments revealed that approximately 87% of city names in active driver and vehicle records conformed to USPS standards, identifying over 1.5 million records requiring correction.

Recommendations were developed to address these issues, including enforcing standardized address validation through the Smarty API, adjusting character limits for address fields to prevent verification bypasses, conducting targeted data cleanups, and implementing ongoing audits supported by Tableau reporting tools. Collectively, these efforts established a foundation for systematic data quality improvements, enabling FLHSMV to enhance the accuracy and reliability of driver and vehicle information, support regulatory compliance, and strengthen public safety outcomes across Florida's transportation network.

Project Description:	The Florida State University's ELVIS Team will continue to maintain and upgrade a data tool that provides access to the Florida Crime Information Center (FCIC) and National Crime Information Center (NCIC) data. This web-based service tool is provided without charge to local law enforcement agencies and is currently being utilized by 34,627 users and 279 various governmental agencies around the state. The ELVIS System will provide all Florida law enforcement agencies with the ability to run queries including driver license and vehicle tag information, which is often repeated on crash, citation, and other traffic and criminal forms, or even more than once on the same form. Automating these responses helps criminal justice professionals prepare more accurate crash reports and citations, clear crashes more quickly, apprehend fugitives, and in general, assist law enforcement officers in performing their official duties more safely and provide them with information necessary to aid the public. The primary objective of this project is to improve the accuracy, uniformity, and timeliness of traffic records data collected within local agencies and submitted to the state level, by providing software for performing FCIC/NCIC queries and integrating the information returned into an agency's existing traffic records software.

The ELVIS project successfully achieved all performance objectives for FY25, demonstrating its continued value as a critical law enforcement data tool. The system supported a large number of agencies and users, providing secure access to a wide array of driver, vehicle, and other criminal justice data from all U.S. states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and multiple Canadian provinces. ELVIS maintained consistently high system availability, ensuring reliable service for all users, while accurately parsing and exporting millions of driver and vehicle records to external systems through automated API processes.

Throughout the year, the project expanded its API functionality, enabling integration with a variety of vendors and software platforms, and further developing interfaces to enhance usability and data accessibility. Analytical tools were refined and expanded to assist agencies in monitoring security threats, detecting unauthorized access, and identifying potential misuse of the system, thereby strengthening oversight and accountability.

ELVIS also emphasized accessibility and support for participating agencies by facilitating new agency onboarding, delivering comprehensive training and software demonstrations, and hosting a user forum that provided agencies an opportunity to share feedback, discuss program enhancements, and collaborate on best practices. The project maintained strict compliance with all FBI and FDLE security policies, including the Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS) Security Policy and Florida-specific addendums, ensuring that all agency agreements, network infrastructure, and software operations adhered to regulatory standards.

Overall, the ELVIS project demonstrated its continued effectiveness in providing accurate, secure, and accessible data services to law enforcement agencies. Its efforts in integration, system reliability, security, and user engagement reinforced the program's role as a vital resource for improving public safety and supporting efficient law enforcement operations across the state.

Project Description: The Florida State University's TraCS Team will continue development and enhancements to the TraCS National Model software to include updates to meet state and federal guidelines. Currently, TraCS Florida has approximately 29,000 users across 212 LEAs and is responsible for about 57% of statewide electronic crash report submittals. The TraCS staff will support current users, future officers, and IT staff at user agencies with technical support and training. Efforts will focus on rewriting external interfaces for case and form management, Florida Crime Information Center, and National Crime Information Center imports through various vendors and Signal Four Analytics' geo-location tool to work on both physical and web-based platforms.

TraCS also reduces the amount of time it takes for accurate crash and citation data to move from the crash scene to the state. TraCS reports typically load into the statewide repository at a 99.99% error free rate. Case data is more accurate thanks to built-in validation checks, integration of an electronic location tool, and the ability for supervisors to review and approve crashes before submitting them to the state. TraCS integrates with Signal Four's GeoLocation tool. To date, there are 198 agencies which use the TraCS crash report, all of which are required to use the location tool to submit crash reports to the state. During FY 2025, TraCS will continue to work with Signal

Four to improve the accuracy of the location data transmitted and accessibility of the location tool website. TraCS has begun to test mandating the location tool for citations as well, and there are currently 20 agencies and 3,115 users that are required to use the tool to submit citations to their local clerk. TraCS plans to continue to allow the location tool to be used on citations on a volunteer basis. There are 126 agencies using the Signal Four Diagram Tool. Using the Signal Four Diagram Tool ensures the diagram and the roadway information match, which improves accuracy. TraCS is participating in an electronic citation pilot and has begun transmitting citation data to the statewide repository instead of individual clerks' offices. There are currently 29 agencies submitting to the statewide repository across 12 counties. TraCS plans to increase this number during FY 2025 to help the state reach its 5-year goal of 100% citation submission to the statewide repository.

Budget: **\$1,386,000**

Project Activities: The TraCS team made substantial progress in enhancing Florida’s traffic records systems by supporting law enforcement agencies with electronic crash and citation reporting, onboarding new agencies, and transitioning users from alternative software systems. Their efforts were underpinned by meticulous documentation, training, and technical support, which collectively facilitated consistent and accurate use of the TraCS platform across the state. Critical infrastructure improvements included secure server management, IP whitelisting, system resource upgrades, and a major migration from the Thrive data center to the Northwest Regional Data Center (NWRDC).

TraCS actively engaged with key stakeholders, including law enforcement agencies, RMS vendors, and state entities, through meetings, symposiums, and the TraCS National Steering Committee, fostering collaboration that strengthened data sharing, system integration, and regulatory compliance. Performance objectives were consistently met, with electronic crash reports submitted on average within 7.33 days, a 99.99% accuracy rate, and 43.5% of statewide crash reports submitted electronically via TraCS. The platform was delivered uniformly to over 31,000 users across 222 agencies, promoting standardization and alignment with Florida State Statutes.

Project Description:	The University of Florida's Signal Four Analytics team will continue to provide a statewide crash and citation analytical system to approximately 5,500 users across 1,100 agencies and vendors. Signal Four Analytics allows users at local, regional, and state agencies the ability to analyze and create maps and statistical reports of crash and citation data in a consistent, uniform, and timely fashion. Signal Four Analytics is an operational system that helps advance 4 of 5 goals of Florida's Traffic Information Systems. Over 5,500 end-users across over 1,100 agencies and vendors in law enforcement, transportation planning, traffic engineering, research institutions at the state, regional and local levels, rely on Signal Four Analytics for timely access to about 7 million crash records and over 30 million citations to perform their duties for improving traffic safety in the State. In the last 12 months from February 1, 2023, through January 31, 2024, Signal Four Analytics experienced over 102,000 dashboard views, over 220,000 queried issues, and over 1.3 million crash reports retrieved for viewing or downloading. With such a heavy user base, the interruption of this resource will lead to a major disruption of productivity and will severely limit crash and citations data accessibility and utilization for numerous government agencies in their efforts to prevent traffic injuries and fatalities and ultimately to save lives.

Resources will contribute to personnel services to maintain and enhance Signal Four Analytics, travel for marketing and training, travel expenses and server and network support.

Budget: **\$882,000**

Project Activities: During the period of October 1, 2024, through September 30, 2025, the Signal4 Analytics project advanced the accessibility, utilization, and integration of statewide crash, roadway, and citation data. The system enables local, regional, and state agencies to analyze, map, and report on crashes and citations consistently and efficiently. Key activities included maintaining the Traffic Safety Dashboard to support the Florida Strategic Highway Safety Plan, integrating citation data with enhanced querying and filtering capabilities, and performing ongoing data quality analyses in collaboration with the Florida Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FLHSMV).

Database updates continued with crash, citation, and GIS layers, alongside monitoring nightly data loads, batch geocoding, and daily crash coordinate exports. System monitoring ensured servers, storage, and networks remained secure and operational, while user support, training, and marketing efforts facilitated widespread adoption. Collaboration with the TRCC guided data element inclusion and dashboard requirements, and coordination with FLHSMV improved database synchronization.

Overall, Signal4 Analytics added 856 new users and 61 new agencies/vendors, recorded 52,049 unique logins, and issued 247,459 queries. Users retrieved or downloaded over 1.19 million crash reports. As of September 30, 2025, the system housed over 48 million citations, 9 million crash reports, and supported 6,489 active users across 1,227 agencies and vendors.

Project Description:	FDOT's current crash location system has several limitations that are preventing FDOT staff from mapping crashes in a timely fashion. The system is antiquated, requires extensive training, and can only handle on-system crashes (i.e., crashes only on state-maintained roads). The FDOT uses a second system to locate off-road system crashes which operates differently from the on-system and as such requires different training and different data management practices. There are about 110 unique data elements (and over 330 on a typical report) on each long form crash report. Of those data elements, location fields exhibit the highest error rate at over 58% when geolocated on a street map. Consequently, only about 42% of crashes can be automatically geolocated using computer software. This is a major shortcoming that is frequently not addressed in our crash data systems. The location data elements of citations are even more problematic because the citation form has a less structured field breakdown of the location data elements which makes computer mapping of citations much more challenging. The error rate of geocoding citations is over 80%. Florida reports over 700,000 crash reports submitted by law enforcement agencies (LEAs) each year. Over 500,000 crash reports include a crash diagram based on Florida's crash data requirements and federal recommendations provided in the Model Minimum

Uniform Crash Criteria Guidelines. This crash diagram is also needed by the FDOT staff to accurately locate crashes. At this time, many Florida LEAs do not have a diagramming tool on a geolocation platform which would eliminate the discrepancies between the crash address information and the depiction of the same location on the crash diagram. Current crash diagrams present the following problems:

- The crash diagrams are filled out by law enforcement officers independently of the geolocation. This creates discrepancies in the crash data between the crash address information and the depiction of the same location on the crash diagram. Such discrepancies get highlighted more in the crash narratives which make inconsistent references to the crash location that sometimes do not match the diagram.

- At present the diagramming tools in use by some electronic crash (e-crash) systems are time-consuming and not-user friendly. This limits the quality of the final diagrams and requires too much effort by officers to complete, which can affect the final completion of the entire crash report and reduce the accuracy, timeliness, and utilization of the crash data.

Currently the geolocation tool is being used by law enforcement agencies (LEA) who utilize the Traffic and Criminal Software (TraCS) supported by the Traffic Records Coordinating Committee (TRCC). Almost all TraCS agencies are mandating the use of the tool for crash reporting while the use for citation reporting steadily rises due to TraCS incorporating the tool on their e-citations system as an optional choice. SmartCOP has also implemented the tool and so far, the tool has been in use by Jacksonville Sheriff's Office for over 28 months. Other SmartCOP agencies are expected to follow in the next few months once SmartCOP updates to version 3.0 of the tool. More efforts are needed to expand the use of the tool by other vendors including Sungard/OSSI and Leytek/LexisNexis. Additionally, we will continue to work with TraCS and SmartCOP to continue to support them with deployment and training.

This project with the University of Florida (UF) will continue efforts to reduce the three systems to a single unified geo-location system for the State of Florida, by enhancing the Signal Four geo-location tool to be utilized by the FDOT crash mapping staff to verify crash locations for FDOT analysts and other traffic improvement stakeholders. The UF team will also complete the development of the web-based diagram tool to work in compatibility with Signal Four's geo-location tool to improve location accuracy, reduce the time for an officer to complete

the crash diagram in the field thus improving timeliness of the data, and to increase the utilization of the crash data. Resources will contribute to personnel services to finalize the development of the tools, travel for marketing and training, travel expenses and server and network support.

Budget: **\$600,000**

Project Activities: The Geolocation and Crash Diagramming to Improve Crash Data Location, Timeliness, and Quality project advanced statewide consistency and accuracy in crash and citation mapping during the reporting period. A major focus was the expansion and refinement of the geolocation tool used by law enforcement agencies. By September 2025, 209 agencies were supported, with 100% of agencies and users being required to use the tool for crash mapping and 11% for citation mapping.

The team provided continuous 24/7 service availability; supported adoption by additional TraCS and SmartCOP agencies; and delivered ongoing training, communication, and technical assistance to promote full and effective implementation. Over the period, the tool geo-located 344,523 crash reports and 519,449 citations across hundreds of participating agencies.

Complementing law enforcement use, the FDOT geolocation tool continued to mature through five major releases. Enhancements included expanded user-type support, improved user-management capabilities, optimized querying, expanded statistics displays, added time-tracking and session-recovery features, and strengthened review workflows. These improvements helped unify crash-location methods across state and local systems, supporting more timely and accurate crash data availability statewide.

In addition, the project also advanced the crash diagramming tool, which automatically generates diagram backdrops from crash-report data to align spatial and narrative crash information. Since its release to TraCS agencies in December 2022, the tool continued to be refined through user feedback, continuous testing, and the creation of improved training materials and monitoring capabilities. The project team delivered webinars for SmartCOP agencies, supported adoption by seven agencies, and closely monitored implementation quality. Since October 2024, over 194,000 crash reports from more than 200 agencies have used the Signal4 Diagram tool, demonstrating wide and growing statewide penetration.
