

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## **INTRODUCTION**

The Missouri Department of Transportation's (MoDOT) mission is to provide a world-class transportation system that is safe, innovative, reliable and dedicated to a prosperous Missouri. The Highway Safety and Traffic Division (HSTD) serves as Missouri's State Highway Safety Office (SHSO) and leads the state's efforts to reduce the number of fatalities and serious injuries resulting from traffic crashes on Missouri's roadways. This effort is carried out through multiple MoDOT programs, including the Highway Safety Plan (HSP), the Commercial Vehicle Safety Plan (CVSP), and the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP). Collectively, these programs support the state's overall Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), a comprehensive plan developed by MoDOT and the Missouri Coalition for Roadway Safety (MCRS) to improve highway safety by implementing strategies across a broad spectrum, including education, public policy, enforcement, engineering, and emergency medical services. Historically, the SHSP has been updated every 4 years in order to ensure the plan is still emphasizing the most pressing needs based on recent trends and data. Consistent with this practice, a 5th SHSP was developed and officially unveiled in October 2020. The new plan, Show-Me Zero: Driving Missouri Toward Safer Roads, will serve as the state's SHSP through 2025. While Show-Me Zero has officially been adopted as the new SHSP, this annual report is specific to highway safety programs implemented in federal fiscal year FY22 in accordance with the state's HSP. Thus, this annual report supports the state's SHSP, but it does not address all of the initiatives supporting the SHSP as some are undertaken in other programs such as the CVSP and the HSIP.

In order to carry out the planned activities in the FY22 HSP, the Highway Safety and Traffic Division staff worked closely with state and local agencies to develop and implement programs which are innovative, cost efficient and, above all, effective in saving lives. This effort required action from numerous individuals and organizations. The Highway Safety and Traffic Division strives to incorporate participations from both traditional and non-traditional partners in our safety endeavors. Expanded partnerships enable us to reach a broader base of customers with the life-saving messages of highway safety. The accomplishments noted in this report would not have occurred without the dedication and foresight of staff from MoDOT's Highway Safety and Traffic Division as well as numerous partner organizations throughout the state. We would like to acknowledge their participation and support in developing and delivering a robust highway safety plan.

## MISSOURI HIGHWAY SAFETY PROGRAM

## **GUIDELINES**

In the State of Missouri the, state highway safety program is administered through MoDOT's Highway Safety and Traffic Division (HSTD). The Annual Report covers activities funded in the HSP for the period October 1, 2021, through September 30, 2022. The structure of this report follows the guidelines set forth by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA Order 960-2/7510.3A.

## PURPOSE

The National Highway Safety Act of 1966 charges each Governor with the responsibility of establishing a state highway safety program. The goal of the HSTD is to reduce both the number of fatalities and serious injuries resulting from crashes on Missouri roadways.

## DATA ANALYSIS

An annual Highway Safety Plan (HSP) is developed by the HSTD utilizing relevant data. The Missouri State Highway Patrol serves as the central repository for all traffic crash data in the state. MoDOT's HSTD analyzes data to compile statistics on fatalities and serious injuries and to identify trends, areas of improvement and potential counter-measures to implement. Three years' worth of crash statistics are compiled to provide a more representative sampling, thereby more effectively normalizing the data. Missouri uses comprehensive data sources which include: The Missouri State Highway Patrol crash repository (STARS) and MoDOT's Transportation Management System (TMS). The data presented in this report represents 2021 as 2022 data is not complete. Due to Federal (FARS) data being unavailable for this year, 2021 data was extracted from State (STARS) data source.

## STRATEGIES

Missouri's strategies to reduce fatalities have been integrated into all key planning documents that include: the Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP); the Commercial Vehicle Safety Plan (CVSP); and the Highway Safety Plan (HSP). The fatality reduction goal is also included in the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) Annual Report along with fatalities, fatality rates and serious injuries. Every effort is made to establish evidence-based strategies that guide Missouri to meet this target.

State and local governmental agencies are solicited to assist in the development of countermeasure projects to address the traffic crash issues through the Missouri Coalition for Roadway Safety and Highway Safety Grant Funding. These projects are then compiled into a comprehensive highway safety plan for the state. Federal funding to support the HSTD is channeled to the state from the Section 402 Highway Safety Program within the U.S. Department of Transportation. In addition to 402 funding, Missouri also received Section 154 AL, 154 HE, and 405b, c, d, and f funding.

## **PROBLEM ID**

Traffic crashes are, unfortunately, an everyday occurrence in our mobile society. In 2021, there were 146,749 traffic crashes in Missouri. In these crashes, 1,016 people lost their lives and 52,099 persons were injured. Based on the U.S. Department of Transportation Guidance on Treatment of the Economic Value of a Statistical Life of \$11.8 million per fatality, this resulted in an economic loss to the state of nearly \$11.9 billion. Per the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Leading Causes of Injury Deaths by Age Group in 2020, motor vehicle traffic crashes were the leading cause of death among people ages 1 to 19 years old.

## SUCCESSES/ RESULTS

Since inception of the highway safety program in 1967, Missouri has witnessed a drop in the vehicle death rate per 100 million vehicle miles traveled from 5.5 to 1.282 in 2021. However, since 2019, Missouri has experienced a significant increase in traffic fatalities with 1,016 people losing their lives in 2021 crashes. This represents a 15% increase from 2019 and was the first time Missouri exceeded 1,000 fatalities since 2006. Missouri is now seeing an increase in its three-year moving average.

## PROGRAM EVALUATION

Two types of evaluation methods are used to determine program effectiveness - administrative and impact. Administrative evaluations measure the operational efficiency of task activities relative to meeting the established goals and objectives of the project, including a Risk Assess-ment conducted prior to awarding a sub-recipient a contract. Impact evaluations determine the extent to which the project was able to impact traffic crash involvement.

Included with this Annual Report are traffic safety countermeasure programs that have demonstrated best practices. These programs satisfy most, if not all, of the following criteria:

- They use crash statistics and other data to identify problem areas;
- They target high risk groups of individuals;
- They utilize knowledge & expertise of the local community to propose workable solutions;
- They apply varied resources from numerous sources;
- They are comprehensive in design; and
- They seek to modify behavior through effective education, enforcement, EMS and engineering.

## INTERNAL ACTIVITIES

In addition to administering programs that are funded through state and local government agencies, HSTD staff members participate in activities to further highway safety within the state. These include, but aren't limited to:

- Production and distribution of highway safety materials;
- Legislative tracking and review;
- Training presentations (child passenger safety, safety belts, law enforcement grant applications, highway safety programs, legislation, youth issues, etc.);
- Exhibits (safety fairs, conferences, State Fair, employer programs, etc.)
- · Press conferences & media events; and
- Federal, state and local committees/boards with like-minded missions.

## EMPHASIS AREAS AND SPECIAL ROAD USERS

Show-Me Zero addresses four emphasis areas and three groups of special road users. The plan includes a comprehensive list of strategies expected to provide the greatest likelihood of reducing roadway-related fatalities and serious injuries. Extensive data analysis and review of current research were used as a basis for strategy selection.

The projects and activities included in the HSP are intended to support these emphasis areas and increase safety for the special road user groups. Show-Me Zero also utilizes a broad approach of affirming all Missourians have a role in improving the safety of the state's transportation system. Therefore, everyone can do something to impact change. The strategies included in Show-Me Zero are intended to provide something for everyone.

#### Show-Me Zero emphasis areas include:

*Emphasis Area I -* Occupant Protection

*Emphasis Area II* - Distracted Driving

*Emphasis Area III* - Speed and Aggressive Driving



## SNAPSHOT OF MO STATISTICS


This section gives an overall snapshot view of the fatalities occurring on Missouri roadways during the past five years for each program area. The remainder of the report uses one years' worth of crash statistics to provide a representative sampling. The data in this section is state data only.

Overall Fatalities/Serious Injuries - A substantial number of people continue to be killed and seriously injured on Missouri roadways and most of these traffic crashes are preventable.




The graph below illustrates the number of fatalities on Missouri roadways from 2017-2021.

Alcohol & Other Drugs - Of the 1,131 people killed in 2017-2021 alcohol and/or other drug-related traffic crashes, 72% were the substance-impaired driver/pedestrian/bicyclist and 28% were some other party involved.





Occupant Protection - In known cases of those occupants killed in 2017-2021 who were totally ejected from the vehicle, 98% were not restrained and of those partially ejected, 88% were not restrained. Of the occupants killed who were not ejected from their vehicles, 51% were not restrained.




Aggressive Drivers – Aggressive driving is a serious problem on Missouri's roadways and has contributed substantially to traffic crashes, especially crashes resulting in death.









Distracted Drivers – Approximately 35% of the distracted drivers involved in fatal car crashes in the last five years were between 15 and 30 years of age. The graph below illustrates all those killed in crashes involving a distracted driver.



Young Drivers – Of all 2017-2021 fatal and serious injury crashes in Missouri, 17% involved a young driver (15-20) of a motor vehicle.



Older Drivers – Of all 2017-2021 fatal and serious injury crashes in Missouri, 11% involved an older driver (65-75) of a motor vehicle.




Commercial Motor Vehicles - In 2017-2021, there were 746,158 traffic crashes in the state. In these crashes, 73,909 (10%) involved at least one commercial motor vehicle. Of the 4,381 fatal crashes, however, 637 (15%) involved at least one commercial motor vehicle.




Motorcycles - In most instances, motorcycle drivers and/or their passengers are the ones killed and seriously injured when they are involved in a traffic crash.




Crashes Involving School Buses - Of the 14 persons killed during 2017-2021 in crashes involving school buses, one was a school bus driver, two pedestrians, one bicyclist and 10 were some other person in the incident.



Vulnerable Roadway Users - Pedestrians and bicyclists alike need to understand that they have primary responsibility for their own safety; however, the motoring public also has a responsibility to share the road in a safe manner with these vulnerable road users.





## CORE OUTCOME MEASURES

This HSP focuses on 12 Core Outcome Measures.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and the Governors Highway Safety Association (GHSA) have agreed on a minimum set of performance measures to be used by States in the development and implementation of behavioral highway safety plans and programs. An expert panel from NHTSA, State Highway Safety Offices, academic and research organizations, and other key groups assisted in developing the measures.\*

The initial minimum set contains 12 measures: 11 core outcome measures and one core behavior measure. The measures cover the major areas common to State highway safety plans and use existing data systems. The following outlines the 12 performance measures which will be identified within their respective program areas. The 2021 calendar year STARS results are listed below for each goal.

Note: The 2022 fatality and serious injury goals are not based on linear reduction, instead it assumes smaller reductions in the early years followed by larger reductions towards the end of the decade when more vehicle technologies are expected to be present among the state's vehicle fleet.

#### C-1 FATALITIES - NOT MET

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average fatality target from 910.0 (2015-2019 moving average) to 920.6 (2018-2022 moving average) fatalities by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

**2021 GOAL:** 871.6 **2021 RESULT:** 947.4 (STARS 5-year Average)

#### C-3 FATALITIES/VMT - NOT MET

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average of fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles (VMT) target from 1.206 (2015-2019 moving average) to 1.205 (2018-2022 moving average) fatalities by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

#### **2021 GOAL:** 1.119 **2021 RESULT:** 1.236 (STARS 5-year Average)

### **C-2 SERIOUS INJURIES - NOT MET**

Based on our goal of 0 serious injuries by 2040, Missouri is projecting a change to our five-year average target from 4,681.6 (2015-2019 moving average) to 4,564.1 (2018-2022 moving average) serious injuries by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 5.26% annual reduction.

#### **2021 GOAL**: 4,463.9 **2021 RESULT**: 4,829.4 (STARS 5-year Average)

\*To address performance measures C-1 through C-3, Missouri has incorporated quarterly speed campaigns, Boosters to Belts to have young drivers present to elementary age children on safe driving/riding practices, and contracting up to three B.R.A.K.E.S. program events to give young drivers hands-on driving experience. In addition, Missouri has implemented additional ARIDE classes via a GHSA grant, deployed an online youth education program and a new pedestrian awareness campaign.

Missouri also contracted with the Governor's Highway Safety Association for a review of project selections and budgeting process. This review, conducted during FY23 budget/project selection meetings, provided valuable input as to whether we are targeting appropriate subrecipients and their respective areas and if our staffing levels are adequate to ensure we can deliver the best programs.

#### C-4 UNRESTRAINED PASSENGER VEHICLE OCCUPANT FATALITIES - *MET*

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for unrestrained passenger vehicle occupant fatalities from 367.6 (2015-2019 moving average) to 387.9 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

#### **2021 GOAL:** 399.3 **2021 RESULT:** 388.2 (STARS 5-year Average)

\*Missouri plans to continue the Buckle Up, Phone Down Program as well as prioritize nighttime seat belt enforcement in the FY23 HSP. We have also streamlined paid media to keep an occupant protection message extended over a longer portion of the year than just during Click It or Ticket. It should be noted Missouri's seat belt use did increase to 88.9% in 2022. In addition, the percentage of unbelted fatalities is lower than previous years.

## C-5 ALCOHOL-IMPAIRED DRIVING FATALITIES - MET

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change in the alcohol-impaired driving involved fatalities from 239.2 (2015-2019 moving average) to 222.8 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

#### 2021 GOAL: 251.5

#### 2021 RESULT: 240.6\* (STARS 5-year Average)

\*Due to FARS data not being available at the time of publication, the 2021 result for C-5 is based on the crash report attribute contributing circumstances - alcohol. Missouri's crash report does not indicate if a driver was operating a vehicle with a BAC of .08 or above.

\*Missouri plans to continue expanding our efforts related to drug impaired driving, including public awareness and enforcement. Missouri also plans to streamline the DRE training program. Missouri just completed its second year of a partnership with the American Bar Assoc. (ABA) to establish a State Judicial Outreach Liaison. The contract has been taken on, in partnership with the ABA, by the HSO utilizing NHTSA fundina beainnina in FY23. Missouri also entered a partnership in 2020 with the Missouri Safety Center (MSC) to evaluate the feasibility of a law enforcement phlebotomy program (LEPP). The research project was completed and MSC received an external grant to establish a Phlebotomy Task Force, of which the HSO has taken an active role. Missouri will be partnering with MSC again in FY23 to fund a Law Enforcement Phlebotomy Program pilot. Missouri is also in preliminary talks to host an impaired driving leadership summit through the Transportation Safety Institute sometime in the next year that we hope will bring old and new partners to the table and reinvigorate the impaired driving program.

## C-6 SPEEDING RELATED FATALITIES - NOT MET

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for speed related fatalities from 335.8 (2015-2019 moving average) to 361.0 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

> 2021 GOAL: 343.7 2021 RESULT: 368.0 (STARS 5-year Average)

\*Missouri plans to continue our recently established quarterly speed campaigns and Missouri has prioritized speed concerns in our new SHSP. In addition, Missouri has partnered with the Missouri State Highway Patrol and local law enforcement agencies to ramp up high-visibility enforcement campaigns on selected corridors and work zones experiencing the highest occurrences of severe crashes related to speed and aggressive driving. Missouri's paid media campaigns have also been streamlined to keep anti-aggressive driving messages up during longer periods of the year.

## C-7 MOTORCYCLIST FATALITIES - NOT MET

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for motorcyclist fatalities from 116.4 (2015-2019 moving average) to 114.2 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

**2021 GOAL:** 122.3 **2021 RESULT:** 127.8 (STARS 5-year Average)

## C-8 UNHELMETED MOTORCYCLIST FATALITIES - *NOT MET*

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for unhelmeted motorcyclist fatalities from 13.2 (2015-2019 moving average) to 16.2 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

> **2021 GOAL:** 15.9 **2021 RESULT:** 30.0 (STARS 5-year Average)

\*To address performance measures, C-7 and C-8, Missouri has fortified the Missouri Safety Center's Motorcycle Safety Program and is continuing a project with the Springfield Police Dept. to increase rider training for all motorcyclists. Missouri will continue to monitor the impact of the recently repealed helmet law and will keep in contact with State legislators regarding the impacts. 2021 was the first full year after Missouri's all-rider helmet law was repealed, which caused a significant spike in unhelmeted motorcyclist fatalities, but preliminary numbers for 2022 show that number to be dropping slightly.

## C-9 DRIVERS AGE 20 OR YOUNGER INVOLVED IN FATAL CRASHES - *NOT MET*

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for drivers age 20 or younger involved in fatal crashes from 116.8 (2015-2019 moving average) to 105.6 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

#### **2021 GOAL:** 112.1 **2021 RESULT:** 115.2 (STARS 5-year Average)

\*In the FY23 HSP, Missouri has continued with the TRACTION conferences, Boosters to Belts to have young drivers present to elementary age children on safe driving/riding practices, and continued the B.R.A.K.E.S. program (expanded to three) to give young drivers hands-on driving experience with recovering from driving hazards such as running off-road, slides, and avoiding roadway obstacles. The state will also continue to partner with organization like ThinkFirst Missouri and several driver's education programs focused on increasing safety for teen drivers. Missouri has also started a new project targeting young male pickup drivers with Missouri Youth Adult Alliance to reduce risky behavior through positive community norms and addressing seat belt usage among this group.

#### C-10 PEDESTRIAN FATALITIES - MET

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for pedestrian fatalities from 100.0 (2015-2019 moving average) to 112.9 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

**2021 GOAL:** 110.5 **2021 RESULT:** 109.6 (STARS 5-year Average)

#### **C-11 BICYCLIST FATALITIES - NOT MET**

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for bicyclist fatalities from 8.6 (2015-2019 moving average) to 10.6 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

**2021 GOAL:** 3.1 **2021 RESULT:** 8.0 (STARS 5-year Average)

\*For performance measures C-9, C-10 and C11 the Missouri HSO continues to work with the Missouri Coalition for Roadway Safety in developing and strengthening the Vulnerable Roadway User Subcommittee to target strategies to address bicycle, pedestrian and motorcycle fatalities. By addressing the core behavior emphasis areas in the SHSP of speed, distraction and impairment, the HSO is addressing the key contributing factors in bicycle, pedestrian and motorcycle crashes. Missouri will also be conducting a vulnerable road user assessment in 2023 to better identify and address risk factors impacting vulnerable road users.

## **CORE BEHAVIOR MEASURE**

#### **B-1 OBSERVED BELT USAGE - NOT MET**

To increase statewide observed seat belt use of front seat outboard occupants in passenger vehicles 1 percentage point annually.


#### **2022 GOAL:** 89.0% **2022 RESULT:** 88.9%

\*Missouri is growing the Buckle Up Phone Down Program to include a BUPD Showdown which targets high schools and businesses with furthering the BUPD Challenge as well as prioritizing nighttime seat belt enforcement in the FY23 HSP. Paid media has also been streamlined in order to keep occupant protection messages up for longer time periods, and Missouri will also be conducting a special project with Accusensus in 2023 to validate data collected during the statewide safety belt survey to ensure accuracy. It should also be noted Missouri's seat belt use did increase to 88.9% in 2022.



# Highway Safety Grant Project Distribution 2022

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## PROGRAM GOALS, RESULTS & ACTIVITIES

This section outlines the programs, program goals as outlined in the Highway Safety Plan, results and activities for each highway safety program area. This is simply a summary of each area; additional activities may have been implemented across the state.

#### Evidence-Based Enforcement Program Activities

The Office of Highway Safety has three law enforcement (LE) program managers that cover specific regions of the state. These managers are responsible for the statewide coordination of the state, county, and local law enforcement projects. The evidence-based traffic safety enforcement program is focused on preventing traffic violations, crashes, and incidents. It involves an array of enforcement activities throughout the fiscal year including:

Mobilizations - The LE program managers aggressively seek participation in quarterly impaired driving and occupant protection mobilizations, as well as, the NHTSA required Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over and the Click It or Ticket mobilization. Additional mobilizations are coordinated by the Office for Youth Alcohol, Teen Seatbelt and Child Passenger Safety. Mobilization results can be viewed in the respective program sections.

Communication - A communication plan is developed with each LE mobilization. These plans vary depending on available funding but typically include press releases, paid media, social media and earned media.

DWI/Traffic Unit Activities – A key enforcement technique used is to team with a city or county law enforcement agency to financially support dedicated DWI/Traffic activities. Missouri currently has 13 units with dedicated DWI/Traffic activities:

Law Enforcement Task Forces/Councils – Multiple city/county agencies meet on a regular basis to plan and coordinate key enforcement activities. With the shortage of personnel to conduct enforcement initiatives in many agencies, the task force concept provides the opportunity to pool resources to conduct manpower intensive activities such as corridor projects. Missouri currently has 6 multi-jurisdictional task forces:

> o Southwest DWI Task Force (7 Agencies) o Jackson County Traffic Safety Task Force (11 Agencies) o Kansas City Operation Impact (42 Agencies) o Northland DWI Task Force (13 Agencies) o Central Ozarks Regional DWI Task Force (14 Agencies) o Law Enforcement Traffic Safety Advisory Council (19 Agencies)

Sobriety Checkpoints – In the past, Missouri law enforcement agencies averaged nearly 600 sobriety checkpoints each year through mobilizations and law enforcement grant contracts. In May 2017, the Missouri House of Representatives added a provision to Missouri HB4 (which gives spending authority to the Missouri Department of Transportation) limiting the spending authority of the OHS on sobriety checkpoints to \$1.00. This became effective July 1, 2017 and has been continued in subsequent legislative sessions.

Continuous follow-up and Adjustment – Program management staff reviews the results of various LE initiatives/mobilizations and share these results with city/ county LE agencies on a regular basis.



#### **Public Information & Education**

In partnership with Bucket Agency, the Highway Safety Office recently revamped the state's strategy for utilizing highly visible, memorable messaging that ties everything back to the Show-Me Zero message. Every Missourian, regardless of how they use the transportation system, can have an impact by committing to these four simple actions.

- Buckle Up
- Phone Down
- Slow Down
- Drive Sober

These messages were perpetuated through traditional media platforms (TV, radio, print) as well as through digital (streaming TV, radio) and social media avenues. In addition, the messages will be communicated using out-of-home venues such as gas station TV, digital billboards, transit stations, and the like. Missouri continues to make a greater investment in public awareness and paid media by contributing additional state funding through the Missouri Coalition for Roadway Safety. The additional funding allows the HSO to reach even more Missourians with the Show-Me Zero message by increasing the number of placements and markets. More Missourians than ever have been exposed to the simple actions they can take to help eliminate traffic fatalities.

The goal of the paid media plan is to expose every Missourian to the life-saving message of Show-Me Zero. The message runs year-round in locations throughout the state. In addition, the paid media campaigns are to alert the public of enforcement efforts, educate the public on Missouri law, and, ultimately, decrease the serious injury and fatality crashes on Missouri's roadways. Videos of most of the messages communicated as part of the plan can be found at the Missouri Coalition for Roadway Safety YouTube page. All campaigns continued the use video captioning in the 30 second PSA's. Captioning aids to the hearing impaired and is found to have more total views, perhaps because that it can be viewed in its entirety with no sound.

Work also continues in the production some print and digital text materials in Spanish to reach the Hispanic population of Missouri. Missouri continues to look for new opportunities to specifically reach audiences with highway safety messaging in Spanish.

In addition to paid media, the Highway Safety Office partnered with Alliance Sport Marketing to deliver impaired driving messaging and education targeting all drivers and motorcycle riders. They also provided watch for motorcycles messaging and education. Alliance was able to accomplish this by attending 33 events/rallies in FY22.


Alliance Sport Marketing also provided education focusing on the four Show-Me Zero focus areas at 8 youth sport tournaments and 1 minor league baseball game. In addition, Alliance provided child passenger safety education displays at 140 child-care centers.







Early in 2017 MoDOT began Buckle Up Phone Down as a challenge geared toward businesses and individuals to take a pledge to buckle up every trip, every time and to put their phones down while driving. To date, nearly over 730 businesses and nearly 20,400 individuals have accepted the challenge and taken the pledge.



Missouri has a "no texting" law for drivers age 21 years and under, and no primary

seat belt law. Knowing that those two tasks alone can save thousands of lives per year, promotion began to encourage all motorists to Buckle Up Phone Down.

Organic promotion followed by paid advertisings and community support helped the campaign to kick off and excel. A web page was created for businesses and individuals to take the pledge. This page houses logos of the businesses that have made the choice to make their employees safer on Missouri's roadways. The web page is located at <u>http://www2.modot.org/BuckleUpPhoneDown/</u> and a resource page is located at <u>https://savemolives.com/Buckle-Up-Phone-Down</u> to educate and inform motorists.

Since inception, Buckle Up Phone Down has earned several state and national awards. Cities and counties across the state opted to keep their citizens and visitors safe by passing a primary seat belt ordinance. Missouri Governor Mike Parson continues to proclaim a day in October each year as Buckle Up Phone Down Day in Missouri. Promotion continues both paid and organic to keep the message out there and make Missouri's roadways safer.

Under the lead of MoDOT Director Patrick McKenna in his role as AASHTO president this past year, Buckle Up Phone Down took a prominent lead in his safety first initiative. Four other states are currently active in the BUPD movement and 12 others are expressing interest and/or using the logo. BUPD is becoming a national push for roadway safety.

#### Aggressive Drivers

Aggressive-driver related crashes are defined within Missouri's Show Me Zero - A Partnership Towards Zero Deaths as, "crashes that involved a driver who committed one or more of the following violations that contributed to the cause of a traffic crash: speed exceeded limit; too fast for conditions; following too close, improper passing, or improper lane usage/ change".

The causes of aggressive driving are complex. However, three factors in particular are linked to aggressive driving: 1) lack of responsible driving behavior; 2) insufficient levels of traffic enforcement; and 3) increased congestion and travel in our urban areas.

#### GOAL #1:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for aggressive driving related fatalities from 468.8 (2015-2019 moving average) to 501.5 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

2021 GOAL: 483.8 2021 RESULT: 509.4 (STARS 5 Year Average)

#### GOAL #2:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for speed related fatalities from 335.8 (2015-2019 moving average) to 361.0 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

2021 GOAL: 343.7 2021 RESULT: 368.0 (STARS 5 Year Average)



and educate on the dangers of aggressive driving.

#### Alcohol & Other Drugs

Twenty-two percent of all Missouri motor vehicle traffic deaths in 2020 involved one or more substance– impaired driver or motorcycle operator. There were 215 fatalities and 672 serious injuries in 2021 involving at least one substance-impaired driver. That equates to one substance-impaired driving fatality every 1 ½ days and one substance-impaired driving serious injury every ½ day.

Youth make up a significant portion of alcohol impaired drivers causing traffic crashes, even though possessing and consuming alcohol before the age of 21 is illegal.

#### GOAL #1:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change in the alcohol-impaired driving involved fatalities from 239.2 (2015-2019 moving average) to 222.8 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction. 2021 GOAL: 251.5 2021 RESULT: 240.6 (STARS 5 Year Average)

#### GOAL #2:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change in the fatalities involving alcohol-Impaired drivers under the age of 21 years from 11.4 (2015-2019 moving average) to 8.9 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

2021 GOAL: 10.7 2021 RESULT: 13.0 (STARS 5 Year Average)

Projects funded by the Office of Highway Safety in the alcohol and other drugs program area include a wide focus area. The law enforcement DWI traffic units and DWI task forces detailed in the Traffic Safety Enforcement Program section are a great deterrent for impaired drivers. Programs focused on young impaired drivers are included in the Young Driver Section.

#### **Traffic Safety Resource Prosecutor Program**

Even with issues regarding agency manpower shortages, this project still has a high number of attendees for their trainings, partly due to utilizing virtual platforms. This project pro-vides for a traffic safety resource prosecutor (TSRP) to focus on traffic safety issues, particul-arly impaired driving, and serve as a resource to other prosecutors and law enforcement officers. This position is shared between two attorneys, the Deputy Director of the Missouri Office of

Prosecution Services and a special prosecutor in the office.

The TSRP Program conducted 75 training programs which were attended by a combined total of 2,415 people. When considering all of the funded programs, other training conducted, and other training opportunities provided, the TSRP Program reached a minimum of 518 Missouri prosecutors, 1,866 Missouri law enforcement officers, and 30 other Missouri traffic safety advocates. Five editions of the Traffic Safety Newsletter were sent out in November 2021 and in January, March, May, and September 2022. Approximately 204 requests for technical assistance were received from prosecuting attorney's offices and law enforcement agencies around the state. In addition, as part of the TSRP program, numerous cases were reviewed with prosecutors to discuss appropriate charges and strategy and the TSRP served as special prosecutor in eleven cases.

#### **State Judicial Outreach Liaison Program**

The Highway Safety Office worked in partnership with the American Bar Association in 2020 and obtained external grant funds for 2 years to establish the State Judicial Outreach Liaison (SJOL) position in Missouri. The SJOL has worked to establish a peer-to-peer relationship with the judiciary of the state of Missouri in order to increase their knowledge and participation of State Highway Safety Office (SHSO) safety initiatives and increase the judiciary knowledges of challenges in adjudicating Impaired Driving cases. The SJOL addresses these challenges through establishing a partnership with the judiciary by providing education and technical assistance utilizing resources such as current science, research and data, information on evidence-based sentencing practices, DWI Courts, Ignition Interlocks, case law, and offender assessment and treatment throughout the State. In FFY23, the program has been taken on by the HSO, through partnership, with the American Bar Association via a highway safety grant utilizing NHTSA funding.

#### **DWI (Impaired) State-Wide Mobilizations**

The five Impaired Driving enforcement mobilizations conducted were:

- December 17, 2021 January 1, 2022 (Holiday DWI Enforcement Campaign)
- March 16 20, 2022 (St. Patrick's Day DWI Enforcement Campaign)
- April 29 May 8, 2022 (Youth Alcohol Enforcement Campaign)
- June 30 July 5, 2022 (July 4th DWI Enforcement Campaign)
- August 19 September 5, 2022
   (Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over DWI
   Enforcement Campaign)

Out of the five statewide mobilizations, there were on average 88 agencies involved in each mobilization that reported enforcement statistics and 10,449 total man hours worked.

Highlights from the five (5) mobilizations are as follows:

- 35 MIP (Minor In Possession)
- 10 Open Container violations
- 959 DWI/DUI Arrests
- 20,898 Traffic Stops
- 19,993 Total Violations

#### **Missouri Legislation**

In May 2017, the Missouri House of Representatives added a provision to Missouri HB4 (which gives spending authority to the Missouri Department of Transportation) limiting the spend-ing authority of the OHS on sobriety checkpoints to \$1.00. This became effective July 1, 2017 and has been continued in subsequent legislative sessions.

Also, in December 2018, Amendment 2 became effective, which allows for the cultivation, sale and use of marijuana for medical purposes. Amendment 2, permits state-licensed physicians to recommend marijuana for medical purposes to patients with serious illnesses and medical conditions. Nothing in this amendment permits a person to operate or be in actual physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of marijuana or to consume marijuana for medical use in a public place. Then in November 2022, Missourians voted to legalize recreational marijuana; however, again there is nothing within the amendment to the state Constitution that would permit a person to operate or be in control of a motor vehicle while under the influence.

#### Breath Alcohol Instrument Placement Program and Technical Assistance

Due to agency staffing shortages, there have been issues with maintaining full classes for trainings under this contract. The Missouri Safety Center (MSC) provides breath alcohol instrument placement, maintenance and service across the State. In addition, MSC provides technical training to law enforcement officers and others in the criminal justice system in the area of breath alcohol testing, standardized field sobriety testing, drug evaluation and classification, and breath alcohol ignition interlock. Calls for service, repairs or calibrations of breath instruments were provided to local law enforcement agencies. The Center provided 24 new breath alcohol testing instruments and 150 preliminary breath test units (PBTs) to law enforcement agencies and trained 398 officers on breath alcohol instruments and trained 298 officers in SFST Training. The staff conducted calibration checks and verified proper operation on 98 simulators and replaced 7 simulators. The Safety Center staff responded to 1,271 calls regarding ignition interlock for an average of 106 calls per month. Twenty new Drug Recognition Officers (DRE) were trained, 1 DRE instructor, and 45 DREs were re-certified during the fiscal year. There were also 12 new SFST instructors certified during this contract period. The center also provided prosecution guidance and advice as requested and complied with numerous subpoenas for court appearances.

#### **Drug Recognition Expert System**

The Missouri Department of Transportation contracted with the REJIS Commission to create an automated system to facilitate data collection, data sharing, tracking of certification, and overall administration of the Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) program. The State Coordinator works with a group of technical experts across the state to administer the DRE program. This system allows for automatic transmission of drug evaluations to the regional coordinator, state coordinator and the federal database. The system also allows for email notification of DREs, regional coordinators and the state coordinator. DRE Candidates are trained on the new system as part of their DRE training, conducting their field certifications using the system. The program is proving to be a great administrative tool and will add to the state's ability to track drug involvement in traffic stops. While the system has been up and running since March 1, 2016, and has received excellent feedback from DREs in the field, we continue to make enhancements to the system as needed.

The OHS, in cooperation with MADD, sponsored the annual Saturation Saturday DWI campaign on August 27, 2022. Saturation Saturday started in 2017 as a grassroots effort sponsored by St. Louis County Police Department. The campaign has grown in epic proportions which includes several other states this year. For 2022, there were 76 agencies in Missouri that participated with 308 total officers involved. The final numbers for the campaign were as follows:

#### **Occupant Protection**

Traffic crashes are one of the leading causes of death in the United States. It is well recognized that one of the best means of defense in a crash is to be protected by a safety belt or a child safety seat. Increasing safety belt and child safety seat use has tremendous potential for saving lives, preventing injuries, and reducing the economic costs associated with traffic crashes. Safety belt use dramatically reduces a person's chance of being killed or seriously injured in a traffic crash. Of the drivers involved in 2019-2021 crashes, 1 in 2 was injured when they failed to wear their safety belt, however, when they were wearing a safety belt, their chances of being injured in the crash were 1 in 7. When examining driver deaths, the differences are much more significant. Drivers had a 1 in 26 chance of being killed if they were not wearing a safety belt; but that chance dropped dramatically to only 1 in 1,236 if the driver was wearing a safety belt.

#### GOAL #1:

To increase statewide observed seat belt use of front seat outboard occupants in passenger vehicles 1 percentage point annually from the 2020 calendar base year rate of 86% to 88% by December 31, 2022.

2021 GOAL: 90% 2021 RESULT: 88% 2022 RESULT: 89%

#### GOAL #2:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for unrestrained passenger vehicle occupant fatalities from 367.6 (2015-2019 moving average) to 387.9 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

2021 GOAL: 399.3 2021 RESULT: 388.2 (STARS 5 Year Average)

#### GOAL #3:

Increase teen safety belt usage by 1% annually from 75.5 percent in 2020 to 77.5 percent in 2022.

2020 RESULT: 75.5% 2021 RESULT: N/A (Missouri only conducts a teen safety belt survey every other year.)



The OHS coordinated three mobilizations in the area of Occupant Protection during FY2022. The Click It or Ticket It Campaign, Youth Seat Belt Campaign and the CPS focused enforcement campaign.

The Click it or Ticket enforcement was conducted May 23 -June 5, 2022. This campaign involved 73 law enforcement agencies with a total of 1,340 hours of work completed. This campaign also included a media campaign outlined in the Public Information & Education section.

The 2022 Statewide Safety Belt Survey was conducted as scheduled between June 6 and June 19th, 2022. There were 122,607 vehicle occupants observed with a statewide seat belt use rate on Missouri roadways of 88.9%.

Law enforcement mobilizations also help law enforcement obtain offenders of other dangerous crimes. Some results from the 3 enforcement activities are as follows:

- 1,032 DWI Alcohol/Drug arrests
- 6,379 Seat Belt citations
- 56 Child Restraint Violations
- 335 Felony Arrests
- 198 Fugitive Arrest

#### Occupant Protection

**Child Passenger Safety** 

Attention is also given to the youngest passengers through the Child Passenger Safety Program. The FY2022 program focused on the use of booster seats until the child met the height and weight requirements required by law, even if the child is 8 years old. Ensuring a proper seat belt fit is vital to surviving a car crash with minimal injuries.

The State of Missouri has 1,090 Certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians, 31 Child Passenger Safety Instructors and over 200 Inspection Stations with at least one Certified Technician. Child passenger safety seats were provided to low income families through the inspection stations across the state. The HSO distributed 3,066 seats total, 1,868 convertible seats and 1,198 high back boosters.

#### **Smart Riders**

Smart Riders is an interactive, on-line program designed to educate elementary students and parents on ways to make our roads safer and prevent crashes. The program is comprised of chapters and each chapter explains a different aspect of roadway safety such as booster and seat belt safety, smart walking, not driving distracted and smart bicycling. Teachers or the school administration can send the Smart Rider information home and students can complete the modules along side a parent or caregiver. The student will receive a certificate after completing each chapter. Teachers can decide how to reward students for completing the chapters and how the achievement is celebrated. The CPS enforcement campaign continued again this year with the media message focusing on booster seats. During the campaign, 70 law enforcement agencies contracted with the HSO. A total of 921 hours of enforcement resulted in 1,639 traffic stops, including 124 safety belt citations and 16 child restraint citations written.

#### 2022 Missouri occupant restraint usage rates:

- Statewide 88.9%
- Teens 75.5% (2020)
- Child Passenger Safety 91.1% of children under age 4 were restrained (FY2021) The next CPS survey will be conducted in FY2025

#### **Booster To Belts**

Booster to Belts is a 20-minute, fun, interactive way for teens to teach children (Kindergarten through 3rd grade) the importance of buckling up and using a booster seat. The mascot, Booster Rooster, motivates children to use booster seats, ride in the backseat and to always buckle up. A participating school will be sent a packet of information that will include the PowerPoint and speaker notes, additional handouts and a paint sheet for each student. High school student leaders can present this program to the elementary schools in their community and this peer-to-peer interaction results in a more personalized and engaging message and will assist in building awareness and cultivating change centered around the importance of buckling up. 12 Schools completed the program in FY2022, reaching a total of 1,914 students across 10 counties.



#### **Distracted Drivers**

Distracted driving is a voluntary diversion of the driver's attention from activities critical to safe driving. There are four types of driver distraction; visual, auditory, manual, and cognitive. There is a growing body of evidence which suggests driver distractions, both inside the vehicle and the road environment, becoming increasingly large contributors to road trauma. It is estimated that drivers engage in a secondary task between one-quarter and one-half of the time they drive.

#### GOAL #1:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for distracted driving involved fatalities from 85.6 (2015-2019 moving average) to 76.0 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction. 2021 GOAL: 78.0 2021 RESULT: 76.4 (STARS 5 Year Average)

#### GOAL #2:

Based on our goal of 0 serious injuries by 2040, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for distracted driving serious injuries from 580.4 (2015-2019 moving average) to 502.7 (2018-2022 moving average). This is a 5.00% and 5.26% annual reduction.

2021 GOAL: 526.0 2021 RESULT: 561.8 (STARS 5 Year Average)

The OHS encourages law enforcement to find innovative ways to address the distracted driving issue. Missouri currently has a no-texting law for individuals 21 years old and under, however, it is very difficult to enforce. Statistics show us that it is not only this younger population engaging in texting while driving, it includes all age groups and to compound the issue, texting is only one of many distractions that are encountered while driving.

Presentations and educational materials continue to be implemented at schools, businesses and community organizations statewide.

Legislative bills have been proposed each of the last several years to strengthen the distracted driving law, unfortunately the bills have not yet passed. Similar bills have been pre-filed for the upcoming 2023 legislative session.

#### Young Drivers

Young drivers are categorized as those ages 15 through 20 years. These young drivers are substantially over-involved in Missouri traffic crashes. In 2021, 12% of all fatal crashes involved a young driver of a motor vehicle; this is particularly significant since young drivers comprised only 8% of the licensed driver population in Missouri.

The top 5 contributing circumstances attributable to young drivers of motor vehicles involved in 2019-2021 fatal and seri-ous injury crashes were:

- 1. Driving Too Fast for Conditions
- 2. Failed to Yield
- 3. Improper Lane Usage / Change
- 4. Speed Exceeded Limit
- 5. Distracted / Inattentive



#### GOAL #1:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for drivers age 20 or younger involved in fatal crashes from 116.8 (2015-2019 moving average) to 105.6 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction. 2021 GOAL: 112.1 2021 RESULT: 115.2 (STARS 5 Year Average)

#### GOAL #2:

Based on our goal of 0 serious injuries by 2040, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for drivers age 20 or younger involved in serious injury crashes from 744.6 (2015-2019 moving average) to 671.8 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 5.26% annual reduction. 2021 GOAL:685.5 2021 RESULT: 727.8 (STARS 5 Year Average)

Young driver programs focusing on seat belt use, underage drinking and distracted driving continue to be supported. Each of the following programs reached hundreds of teens, who in turn, spread the message to other teens.



#### ThinkFirst MO

An award-winning school assembly program for teens. Highimpact injury prevention presentations are made to Missouri schools free of charge by personal testimony from people who have sustained a brain or spinal cord injury, usually due to a motor vehicle crash. A total of 13,658 Missouri students received traffic safety education from the ThinkFirst traffic safety assembly program (Columbia and Kansas City Region) delivered via 160 presentations. A total of 12 Missouri Corporations received traffic safety education from the ThinkFirst Corporate/Community Traffic Safety Program. In addition, ThinkFirst Missouri delivered Traffic Offender Program classes reaching high-risk Missouri drivers.

ThinkFirst MO also coordinates the First Impact program. First Impact is a traffic safety parent program targeted to parents and/or guardians of teen drivers in the pre-permit, permit or intermediate stage of licensure. The goal of First Impact is to increase parental awareness and enforcement of Missouri's graduated driver license law. During this fiscal year, a total of 44 First Impact presentations were delivered, reaching 443 parents & teens.

#### SMART/CHEERS

The University of Missouri houses two programs aimed at alcohol use on college campuses. The SMART program is a web-based program that educates bar and restaurant owners on the sale of alcohol to minors and how to avoid over serving those already intoxicated. During the fiscal year there were 11,794 total users of SMART and 4 SMART live trainings were completed.

CHEERS to the Designated Driver is a program for bars and restaurants to celebrate the designated driver by serving them free non-alcoholic drinks. During the fiscal year, 4 new CHEERS establishments was added to the program, totaling to 268 establishments utilizing the CHEERS program.



#### TyREDD

TyREDD, (Tyler Raising Education for Drowsy Driving), is an organization that was founded in 2011 after the Warne family lost their oldest son Tyler in a drowsy driving crash. Tyler's mother Kerrie, the founder of TyREDD, has partnered with the COO for Clayton Sleep Institute, Matthew Uhles, and together they have developed a presentation that educates high school teens, businesses, organizations and parents. In this fiscal year, Kerrie and Matt delivered 71 drowsy driving presentations.

Young driver materials were assessed to determine the best and most cost-effective way to reach the largest number of parents and teens, and are distributed to the public through an online ordering system at:

https://www6.modot.mo.gov/OrderSystem/pub/displayOrder. do.

The Graduated Driver License Law information continues to be included in campaign and web materials to educate teens and adults on the importance of and purpose for the law. This information is also included in the RoadWise Guide: Parent/Teen Safe Driving Guide.

Two law enforcement campaigns were again supported, youth seat belt and underage drinking. Participation from 109 law enforcement agencies during the youth seat belt campaign resulted in 3,699 seat belt citations issued. In addition, 75 agencies participated in the youth alcohol campaign resulting in 15 minor in possession citations, and 116 driving while impaired arrests.

Both campaigns are promoted through paid, earned and social media outlets. The youth seat belt message "Make the Difference" was the theme of this year's campaign featuring teens making the difference to buckle up to show up.

The youth alcohol message, "If you feel different you drive different", focused on how much there is to lose by making a poor choice to drive impaired.



#### TRACTION

Teens Taking Action to Prevent Traffic Crashes, is a youth traffic safety leadership training program designed to empower youth to take an active role in promoting safe driving habits. High school students and advisors are invited to attend one training program as a school team. As a team they will not only receive educational training on highway safety topics but will also develop individualized team action-plans to be implemented within their own schools upon their return. During this fiscal year two TRACTION trainings were held reaching 193 people from 18 high schools throughout the state.

#### B.R.A.K.E.S

B.R.A.K.E.S, Be Responsible and Keep Everyone Safe, is a hands-on defensive driving program designed to prevent injuries and save lives by training and educating teenage drivers and their parents about the importance of safe and responsible driving. B.R.A.K.E.S consists of a one hour classroom session followed by five hands-on driving exercises (Car control and skid avoidance, panic stop exercise, distraction exercise, crash avoidance and off road recovery). B.R.A.K.E.S completed two teen driving schools reaching 339 teens and 309 parents.

#### Youth Impaired Law Enforcement Training Sessions

Each year the Highway Safety Office sponsors two, 6-hour post certified youth impaired law enforcement trainings across the state. The trainings consist of three workshops focused on law enforcement's role in reducing youth impairment and the crashes that follow. Approximately 31 officers were trained during this fiscal year.





Arrive Alive reduces traffic safety problems related to distracted and impaired driving through a state-of-the-art virtual reality simulator within high schools across the state. The simulator is installed on an actual vehicle and allows participants to experience, in a controlled environment, the potential



consequences, legal and otherwise, of driving while distracted or impaired. Each event runs up to 6 hours and averages 20-25 students/hours in the driver's seat. For students not in the vehicle, high-definition monitors display a "passenger eye view" of the current simulation, as well as a high-impact awareness video featuring facts, statistics, and figures related to distracted and impaired driving. Each participant will then take the pledge to drive SAFE (Sober and Free of Electronics). This was Unite Corporation's first year in Missouri schools and 6 programs were completed successfully.

#### **Older Drivers**

Our population is aging and older adult drivers are increasing their exposure (miles driven/year) on the highways. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Missouri ranked 19th nationally in 2020 with 18% of the population age 65 or older. By the year 2030 it is estimated that over 20% of the population in Missouri will be age 65 or older. That means approximately one in five people will be 65 or older.

Being able to go where we want and when we want is important to our quality of life. Personal mobility is often inextricably linked to the ability to drive a car. However, as we age our ability to drive a motor vehicle may be compromised by changes in vision, attention, perception, memory, decisionmaking, reaction time and aspects of physical fitness and performance.

#### GOAL #1:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the older driver involved fatalities from 194.4 (2015-2019 moving average) to 178.6 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction. 2021 GOAL: 214.9 2021 RESULT: 190.6 (STARS 5 Year Average)



#### GOAL #2:

Based on our goal of 0 serious injuries by 2040, Missouri is projecting a change to the older driver involved serious injuries from 752.8 (2015-2019 moving average) to 717.2 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 5.26% annual reduction. 2021 GOAL: 828.2

2021 RESULT: 766.6 (STARS 5 Year Average)

The OHS continues to work with safety partners and universities to produce and implement countermeasures that reduce crashes involving older drivers. Some of these measures will enable older drivers to check their own driving abilities, assist local driver license offices in recognizing medically unfit drivers and develop a package of office-based screening tools to be used by healthcare providers. In addition, 52 presentations were offered at senior/retirement centers throughout the state and 11 facilitator trainings during this contract period. The total participants reached during all the courses was 705.

The paid media campaign for Aging Road Users was held December 6 -10 with new creative and a tagline of "Safety at Every Mile in Life". For this audience aged 65+, preliminary numbers indicate that impressions were high, and the campaign performed well.



#### **Commercial Motor Vehicles**

Large trucks and buses (commercial motor vehicles or CMVs) have blind spots, identified as No Zones, around the front, back and sides of the vehicle. The blind spots make it difficult for the driver to see. It is critically important that other drivers stay out of the No Zone of a commercial motor vehicle. Since CMVs are large transport devices that are much heavier than passenger vehicles, they have longer stopping distances and cause greater amounts of personal injury and severity to the occupants of vehicles in crashes. When analyzing the types of persons killed or injured in CMV crashes, the majority were not the occupants of the commercial motor vehicle.

The Highway Safety and Traffic Division administers the Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program (MCSAP), awarded to Missouri by the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA). FMCSA's mission is to reduce crashes, injuries and fatalities involving large trucks and buses. Goals, benchmarks and strategies are outlined within the annual Commercial Vehicle Safety Plan (CVSP). Having the MCSAP grant housed in the OHS provides a unique opportunity for coordinating safety efforts between the FMCSA and NHTSA programs.

The following depicts the results of fiscal year 2021 MCSAP funding:

Missouri conducted a total of 60,438 driver/vehicle inspections on commercial motor vehicle. Missouri currently has a low number of passenger vehicle crashes. To ensure Missouri keeps that number low, the CMV inspectors conducted 816 passenger carrier inspections. Furthermore, MoDOT Motor Carrier Services conducted a total of 313 compliance investigations on CMV companies and 927 safety audits on CMV companies for the new entrant program. The Missouri State Highway Patrol, Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division and Field Operations Bureau conducted 7 Truck Saturation events working a total of 552 hours. The Truck Saturations resulted in 351 inspections. As a result, 549 violations were recorded and 88 citations/arrests were issued.

The Missouri State Highway Patrol, Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division and Field Operations Bureau conducted 73 Traffic Enforcement (SAFETE) Operations working a total of 1,114.75 hours. The SAFETE Operations resulted in 836 CMVs stopped with 897 CMV inspections. As a result, 69 drivers and 113 vehicles were placed out-of-service (OOS). In addition, 1,691 warnings were issued and the following arrests/citations were issued: 25 Speeding, 34 Seat Belt, 1 Following too Close, 82 CVE, 24 CVE Hazardous Moving, 2 Other HMV, 34 Non-Moving, 4 No Drivers License, 2 Driving while Suspended/ Revoked, 1 Signal Light, 1 Misdemeanor Drug, 5 Misdemeanor Warrant, and 1 Other Misdemeanor.

The Missouri State Highway Patrol, Field Operations Bureau, conducted 12 CMV Drug Interdiction Operations working a total of 1,251.5 hours. The CMV Drug Interdiction Operations resulted in 1,100 vehicles stopped (686 CMVs and 414 non-CMVs) with 623 CMV inspections. As a result, 81 drivers and 62 vehicles were placed out-of-service (OOS). In addition, 1,494 warnings were issued and the following arrests/citations were issued: 47 Speeding, 2 C&I, 1 Failed to Yield, 25 Seat Belt, 1 Following Too Close, 63 CVE, 3 CVE Hazardous Moving, 1 Other HMV, 23 Non-Moving, 19 No Drivers License, 9 Driving while Suspended/Revoked, 4 Uninsured Motorist, 26 Misdemeanor Drug, 7 Misdemeanor Warrant, 2 Other Misdemeanor, 8 Felony Drug, 9 Other Felony, and 3 Felony Warrant.

According to a survey conducted in 2016, Missouri's commercial motor vehicle safety belt use rate was 82.8%. A new survey was conducted in October 2021, and the results indicate a 4.9% increase to 87.7%. Missouri has taken a zero tolerance approach to safety belt enforcement on CMVs. Missouri's CMV enforcement officers issued 337 safety belt violations and MoDOT Motor Carrier Services issued 2,582 letters to motor carriers informing them of their driver's noncompliance with the safety belt law. During calendar year 2021, a total of 28 CMV drivers were killed in CMV crashes, of which 10 were unbelted.

Missouri's public education efforts on commercial motor vehicle safety included a statewide media campaign, which resulted in a preliminary total of 39,330,787 impressions. This indicates that the CMV message reached an engaged audience. In addition, Missouri provided 82 public education and awareness presentations across the state on a variety of traffic safety issues related to CMVs and non-CMVs that operate around large trucks and buses, with an estimated 3,724 people in attendance.

#### **Motorcycles**

A responsible motorcyclist must think about the consequences of their riding behavior in traffic and accept personal responsibility for the results of their decisions and actions, as well as develop good skills and judgment. The motorcyclist must consider their personal margin of safety or margin for error – how much extra time and space they need given their skill level.

Likewise, the general motoring public must be aware of their surroundings while driving and share the road with motorcyclists. A significant number of motorcycle crashes involve another vehicle.



#### GOAL #1:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for motorcyclist fatalities from 116.4 (2015-2019 moving average) to 114.2 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction. 2021 GOAL: 122.3

2021 RESULT: 127.8 (STARS 5 Year Average)

#### GOAL #2:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for unhelmeted motorcyclist fatalities from 13.2 (2015-2019 moving average) to 16.2
(2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.
2021 GOAL: 15.9
2021 RESULT: 30.0 (STARS 5 Year Average)

#### GOAL #3:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for fatalities involving unlicensed/improperly licensed motorcycle operators from 51.4 (2015-2019 moving average) to 57.2 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction. 2021 GOAL: 64.0 2021 RESULT: 66.2 (STARS 5 Year Average)

The Motorcycle Safety Trust Fund is used for training motorcyclists and promotes public awareness of motorcyclists. From January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022, the Missouri Motorcycle Safety Program (MMSP) has trained 4,225 beginning students and 118 non-beginning students. The MMSP and the Office of Highway Safety's goal is to promote awareness of motorcycles on the roadways, obtaining proper licensing and instructions and promoting proper riding gear but, most of all reducing motorcycle crashes and fatalities through the aforementioned process.

The funding received for the program was used for media targeting rider safety for males ages 45-60 and motorist awareness for all drivers. The motorcycle awareness media campaign starts in late April through May to early September and includes late summer holidays and special motorcycle events throughout the riding season.

Rider awareness is a year-round process starting at the dealerships throughout Missouri with dealer placement hang tags on motorcycles and displays, along with free motorcycle training courses at participating dealerships. Motorcycle safety pamphlets are also distributed to license offices and dealerships. In 2022, the OHS distributed approximately 8,700 "Watch for Motorcycles" yard signs, and 2,200 Motorcycle Safety brochures.

#### **Missouri Legislation**

In August 2020 Missouri House Bill 1963 became effective regarding the motorcycle helmet law, which states the following: "Every person under twenty-six years of age who is operating or riding as a passenger on any motorcycle or motor-tricycle, as defined in section 301.010, upon any highway of this state shall wear protective headgear at all times the vehicle is in motion; except that, any person twentysix years of age or older operating any motorcycle or motortricycle who has been issued an instruction permit shall wear protective headgear at all times the vehicle is in motion. The protective headgear shall meet reasonable standards and specifications established by the director. No political subdivision of this state shall impose a protective headgear requirement on the operator or passenger of a motorcycle or motor-tricycle. No person shall be stopped, inspected, or detained solely to determine compliance."

# WATCH FOR MOTORCYCLES

#### Crashes Involving School Buses

Although school buses provide one of the safest modes of transportation, there are still school bus related injuries and, unfortunately, some fatalities every year. Some of these are due to crashes with other vehicles while others are due to the school bus striking a pedestrian or bicyclist.



#### GOAL #1:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for school bus/school bus signal involved fatalities from 3.0 (2015-2019 moving average) to 1.6 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

2021 GOAL: 3.9 2021 RESULT: 2.8 (STARS 5 Year Average)

#### GOAL #2:

Based on our goal of 0 serious injuries by 2040, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for school bus/school bus signal involved serious injuries from 17.8 (2015-2019 moving average) to 14.9 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 5.26% annual reduction.

2021 GOAL: 18.3 2021 RESULT: 13.4 (STARS 5 Year Average)

OHS staff continues to serve on the School Bus Safety Task Force and distributes materials to address safety in and around school buses and sharing the road with school buses.

#### Vulnerable Roadway Users

Many Missourians rely on non-motorized means of transportation such as walking and bicycling. Both of these modes have the ability to provide physical and health benefits, but they also have the potential for serious or fatal injuries in the event of a crash. Crashes involving pedestrians and bicyclists do not occur in extremely large numbers (1.0% and .32% of all crashes, respectively) but when a pedestrian or bicyclist is involved in a traffic crash, the potential for harm is much greater.

Springfield Public Works and the Public Information Office developed the regional expansion of the SGF Yields program, called "SafeAcross". The webpage is www.safeacross.com. It introduces the problem of pedestrian crashes, gives safety tips to pedestrians and drivers, lays out how SafeAcross works and offers a contact form. The website includes a log-in portal (user: nixamo, password: testThis) for participating communities where the Program Implementation Guide is found. Interested communities can implement this program in their communities to help address the pedestrian crashes in their area.

#### GOAL #1:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for pedestrian fatalities from 100.0 (2015-2019 moving average) to 112.9 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction. 2021 GOAL: 110.5 2021 RESULT: 109.6 (STARS 5 Year Average)

#### GOAL #2:

Based on our goal of 0 fatalities by 2030, Missouri is projecting a change to the five-year average for bicyclist fatalities from 8.6 (2015-2019 moving average) to 10.6 (2018-2022 moving average) by December 31, 2022. This is a 5.00% and 6.43% annual reduction.

2021 GOAL: 3.1 2021 RESULT: 8.0 (STARS 5 Year Average)



#### Roadway Safety / Traffic Engineering

Traffic engineering is a vital component of the traffic safety countermeasure picture. The techniques engineers use to design roads certainly affect the safety of motorists. Engineering approaches offer two basic types of countermeasures against drivers committing hazardous moving violations: highway design and traffic engineering. With highway design, the roads can be redesigned to add capacity or accommodate increased traffic. Highway design can also mitigate the injury consequences for motorists who come into contact with aggressive, impaired, or distracted drivers. Effective traffic engineering offers a way to accommodate increased traffic flow, or at least get it under control, without building new roads. Consulting services were provided for traffic engineering projects around the state. Funding was focused on correcting operational problems on city and county streets, and highways.

A total of eight consultant projects were funded through the grant this fiscal year. Those consultant services were provided on projects located in the City of St. Louis, City of Lake St. Louis, City of Ashland, City of Kirksville, City of Cameron, City of Marshfield, and two for City of Cape Girardeau.

The FY2022 Traffic Engineering Assistance Program (TEAP) projects, which utilized Highway Safety Funds, included corridor studies, intersection improvements, operational analysis, sign inventories, pedestrian/bike route analysis and parking studies.

The engineering safety projects MoDOT continues to implement relate to roadway departure and intersections. These improvements include installation of several hundred miles of rumble strips on improved shoulders, several thousand curve related signs (chevrons) and more intersection improvement projects like j-turns.

#### **Traffic Records**

The TRCC plays a role in the creation, approval and evaluation of the data improvement projects. The TRCC consists of developing initial project proposals as well as discusses the proposals openly in the TRCC bi-monthly meetings. The TRCC, through discussion of the proposed projects, prioritize the projects and determine the funding sources, and also work with the custodial agencies to develop and maintain the data quality reporting function.

The Missouri Traffic Records System works towards a formal data quality program with performance indicators for each of the six core system areas. Projects are selected based on recommendations from the most current assessments and their ability to meet six characteristics: timeliness, accuracy, integration, uniformity, accessibility and completeness.

In August of 2019, the Statewide Traffic Accident Records System (S.T.A.R.S) Committee and contracted consultant began the discussion of the MMUCC 5th Edition and changes to the Missouri Uniform Crash Report and STARS. Since the last crash report update in 2012, many fields are being discussed to be added, modified or deleted. The new crash report is projected to be deployed January 1, 2024.

Missouri TRCC partnered with the NHTSA sponsored GO Team to begin a Data Inventory project in order to obtain data elements from our Missouri partners for future data linkage. The initial project created a Data Dictionary with the Missouri State Highway Patrol Crash Report and is continuing with the Department of Health and Senior Services EMS Data. Missouri is looking forward to the possible linkage of crash and EMS data.
