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Executive Summary

The Texas Traffic Safety Program at the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) continued its mission of saving lives and preventing injuries through an extensive grants program. In Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24), there were 358 traffic safety projects in the program.

Under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) Act, TxDOT applied for and received \$30,711,217.53 in Sections 402 funds. In addition, \$23,683,214.18 in Section 405 federal funding was received beyond the base 402 program.

A total of \$184,153,501.72 was expended in FY24 which came from federal, state, and local sources as follows:

- \$50,079,136.91 in federal funds
- \$121,837,028.84 in local funds
- \$12,127,483.97 in state funds
- \$109,852.00 in program income

Achieving Performance Targets

A summary of Texas's achievement of performance targets for FY24 is provided in **Table 1: Assessment of Results in Achieving Performance Targets**. Overall, in FY24 Texas met 13 of the 23 targets (57%) with 10 of the 23 targets (43%) not met.

In addressing 23 CFR 1300.35(a)(1)(ii), the performance measure results for each individual project funded through the Texas Traffic Safety Program are provided in **Section 3 – Program Area Reports** and **Appendix A – Project Cross References**. Within those sections, each objective, target, and activity are listed as well as whether individual objectives were met by each project. These activities contribute significantly to meeting Texas's highway safety performance targets within the program area they represent by clarifying laws, rules, regulations, and safe practices; promoting collaboration; increasing engagement; fostering awareness and education; and ultimately generating new ideas related to traffic safety.

Strategy Adjustments

In addressing 23 CFR 1300.35(a)(2), a summary is provided in **Table 2: FY25 Strategy Adjustments** for each of the performance measures not met along with an explanation of how Texas plans to adjust the strategy for programming funds to achieve those performance measures.

Texas continues to work toward the TxDOT "Road to Zero" goal of reducing the number of deaths on Texas roadways by half by the year 2035 and to zero by the year 2050. This goal continues to impact how our targets are established as well as our ability to meet those targets as they are based not on performance but rather an aspirational goal.

As part of the strategy adjustment, Texas continues to require the implementation of strategic operational plans as part of the objectives of our subgrantee's projects. These strategic operational plans not only help ensure that we are directing our traffic safety resources to where our major needs are, but these plans also help to address those underserved and overrepresented communities based upon the crash and equity data. By requiring projects to establish new strategic operational plans each fiscal year, we are able to keep pace with the every-changing environment related to traffic safety. These strategic operational plans also enable us to work with the communities that are most effected by traffic crashes and help us to determine ways in which we can continue to work together as we strive to achieve our goal of zero deaths on Texas roadways.

Public Participation and Engagement

In addressing 23 CFR 1300.35(b)(2), TRF-BTS identified the following initiatives in the 3HSP to illustrate the State's Public Participation and Engagement efforts.

- Refugees in Amarillo
- El Paso drivers in court backlogged cases
- Low-income families Laredo, Texas
- Motorcycle Riders in San Angelo

Refugees in Amarillo

Overview

The TxDOT Traffic Safety Specialist (TSS) in Amarillo collaborates with local Refugee Center Staff to assist refugees on a one-to-one, in person basis, onsite, with education regarding seat belt laws and other traffic safety laws and provides the families with car seats for their children.

Description of Engagement Opportunities

As a National Certified Child Passenger Safety Seat Instructor, the TSS has been actively involved in organizing and conducting car seat safety programs and other safety programs specifically tailored for refugee families in the Texas Panhandle.

Through a collaboration with local refugee resettlement agencies, including City of Amarillo Refugee Program and Catholic Charities of the Texas Panhandle-Joseph's Project, car seat installation and safety workshops are hosted at community centers and other non-profits frequented by refugee families.

These sessions are designed to educate families on traffic safety laws and best practices, which may differ from those in their home countries. An after-event discussion with all the families is held in which feedback is obtained regarding their experience, how they will use their new skill, and if there were any issues they want clarified or need additional help with.

The initiative continues to work with the "Champion" (usually a religious leader) in the communities to keep checking the pulse on what the need is for instruction as new families come to our area. Often times, families are seen multiple times to make car seat adjustments and corrections in their vehicles. Agencies offer their translators for all the events.

The unique situation with the refugee population also provided a bonus this past year as the initiative was able to connect with and recruit among the refugee families to serve as car seat technicians. This will be extremely beneficial for our refugees. Instruction given in their own language with all the cultural nuances we know exist can establish an improved "safety mindset" in all things traffic.

This initiative also works to raise awareness on human trafficking as often as possible utilizing the BLUE Campaign from the Department of Homeland Security. The BLUE campaign is a national public awareness campaign designed to educate others in recognizing the indicators of human trafficking. The families are also provided a 'recognizing the signs of human trafficking' card in multiple languages.

Accessibility Measures in Outreach Efforts

Understanding the unique challenges faced by refugee families, we implemented several accessibility measures:

- Multilingual instructors and materials are available in English and Spanish, and translation services are available in languages predominant among the refugee community.
- Building relationships with refugee caregivers who pass on benefits to having and correctly installing car seats to others. This also helps us become more culturally competent.
- Sessions are scheduled on weekdays and some evenings to accommodate various work schedules and ensure maximum participation.
- All venues are accessible and family-friendly during workshops.

Description of Attendees and Participants

The participants primarily include refugee families resettled in the Panhandle area, often recommended by local resettlement agencies. They are typically comprised of parents and caregivers who are new to transportation laws and child safety practices. By helping these families understand and implement car safety measures, we aim to reduce the risk of transportation-related injuries among one of the most vulnerable populations.

Summary of Issues Covered

The workshops covered essential topics such as:

- Choosing the right car seat based on the child's age, weight, and height.
- Correct installation of car seats using both seat belts and LATCH systems.
- The importance of registering car seats for recall notifications.
- Understanding and complying with Texas state laws regarding child passenger safety.
- And the newest information given, "How to relate to law enforcement" if they are stopped.

Types of Comments and Views Received

Feedback from refugee families has been invaluable in enhancing our program. The direct feedback is given to each agency and shared at the quarterly update meeting among agencies working with this population.

Comments often include:

- Requests for additional sessions and resources for their children in other neighborhoods.
- Inquiries about resources for financially disadvantaged families needing car seats.
- Appreciation for the personal assistance in installing car seats correctly.
- Desire for ongoing support and refresher courses.

Incorporation of Community Comments into Decision-Making

The feedback from refugee families is taken seriously and used to adjust and improve the program.

All comments and suggestions are compiled and reviewed with all agencies to inform future planning for instance:

- The frequency of workshops in areas with higher concentrations of refugees has increased including Dallam, Potter, and Moore Counties.
- Since July, a partnership with an additional refugee service agency has been established. A workshop with translator assistance was conducted with Family Support Services.
- Additional car seat events have been planned along with additional one on one appointments as needed. Events will be inside only during our winter months because many refugee families will not attend an event from December to March as they are not acclimated to the weather in the Panhandle. Hosting events indoors helps to accommodate and encourage participation.
- Our partner, Joseph's Project, created an additional satellite office in a neighboring district. The initiative will partner with the local TSS in hosting car seat events at the satellite office on a regular basis.
- Surveys are provided immediately to all the families at the events to gather feedback on their previous and post knowledge of car seat installation.
- A cultural competence training is conducted with all of our partner agencies to discuss significant cultural practices that effect the way a tech or instructor educates and interacts with refugee families. Our goal is to remain genuinely interested, open-minded and willing to learn about different cultures. This helps engage a refugee client and shows respect and concern for them.
- Partnerships with nonprofits and local and state agencies are maintained. Our partners provide help at all events and additional car seats to those in need at the refugee centers. Our partners include Catholic Charities, City of Amarillo Maternal and Child Health, Department of State Health Services and Texas Agrilife.
- Continued engagement and interaction with community leaders within the refugee population ensures ongoing relevance and effectiveness of the program. Quarterly meetings with agencies who provide services to the refugee families help fill in the gaps.

These responses reflect the TxDOT commitment to meeting the specific needs of refugee families in the Texas Panhandle and promoting safety and compliance with state laws in a sensitive and supportive manner.

El Paso Drivers in Court Backlogged Cases

Overview

The Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace reached out to the El Paso TSS to assist low-income defendants with court-ordered defensive driving courses for ticket dismissal. The Precinct had a high volume of backlogged court cases. TxDOT does not manage a defensive driving course, however, the El Paso TSS created a program for them.

A traffic safety class was developed and taught on the top four causes of fatalities in Texas: speeding, impaired driving, distracted driving, & seatbelt use. In addition, defendants cited for an unrestrained child attended a class on the correct use of child passenger safety seats. The TSS provided car seats and conducted in-person, one-on-one car seat installation instruction for parents who completed the traffic safety class.

Description of Engagement Opportunities

The judge(s) vet their constituents during the court process to choose who to send to our TxDOT Ticket Dismissal program and traffic safety class. The courts are asked to ensure they send people who cannot afford a standard ticket dismissal program.

Accessibility Measures in Outreach Efforts

Participants are referred by the court. Courses are held in English and Spanish. Classes are held in person or virtually depending on the age of the person not wearing a seatbelt. Constituents are usually given 90 days to complete this process. The TSS schedules a course once a month and provides the constituent a few dates to choose from. Classes are conducted for any traffic element the judge deemed necessary, at their discretion.

In-person car seat appointments are made available for circumstances in which a car seat inspection is needed for a parent/guardian who had a unrestrained child under the age of 8.

A virtual option is only made available in circumstances in which the defendant was the unrestrained occupant.

Description of Attendees and Participants

Participants are within the El Paso community who vary in age and gender. The judge(s) vet their constituents during the court process to choose who to send to our traffic safety class. The courts are asked to ensure they send people who cannot afford a standard ticket dismissal program.

Summary of Issues Covered

For participants who did not have a child restrained:

- The participant and the child who was not wearing a seat belt must come in person for a one-on-one car seat inspection with the TSS.
- The class educates parent and caregivers on the proper use of child restraints and how to keep their child safe while transporting them in a vehicle.
- For participants who were not restrained:
- Information provided in the class covers the top four causes of traffic-related fatalities in Texas to include speeding, impaired driving, distracted driving, & seatbelt use.
- As part of the virtual option, the participant is asked to be engaged throughout the class. When there are connectivity issues, the constituent arrives more than 10 minutes late or they choose not to participate during the presentation, they are asked to reschedule so they are able to participate and benefit from the one-hour class.

Types of Comments and Views Received

Many participants feel the class provides great reminders and new information on safe driving habits. Parents/guardians who participate in the one-on-one car seat inspection are appreciative on the information receive. Many of them state that they learned so much from the class and are very appreciative of the information.

Quite a few participants were initially upset, being sent by the court. After participating in the class, many participants stated that they were grateful of being stopped and referred to by the court. Many of them voiced that the class changed their view on how they were driving and would make a change to become safer drivers.

Incorporation of Community Comments into Decision-Making

All comments provided thus far have been positive and in favor of the current plan for this initiative as it is meeting the needs of the participants. If additional comments and views arise that could potentially adjust the plan for this initiative, they will be addressed at that time.

Low-income Families Laredo, TX

Overview

The Traffic Safety Specialist (TSS) in Laredo works with low-income families who have been cited for seat belt and child passenger safety violations. The TSS provides Bilingual CPASS education, a new car seat, and a hands-on car seat installation. These three steps help the families cited earn consideration for a ticket dismissal by the court.

Description of Engagement Opportunities

Opportunities to help low-income families come through various channels, such as the Save with a Seat website, where numerous hits are received from parents looking for child safety seats and information, and from our local law enforcement agencies, hospitals, and local justice of the peace offices who work with us to ensure that children are properly restrained in vehicles.

Many of these families are often cited for adult seat belt and child passenger safety violations. In addition, we work with unrestrained seat belt and speeding violators, providing bi-monthly presentations to the court.

Accessibility Measures in Outreach Efforts

Accessibility measures are made available to families at outreach events which always includes child passenger safety information, a demonstration of the various car seats using training dolls always perks the interests of parent and children alike.

Other accessibility measures come from referrals from the court system and other local community resources/organizations, such the Laredo Police Department, Webb County Constables, hospitals, Women Infant and Children (WIC) clinics and Laredo Health Department.

Description of Attendees and Participants

The Laredo District child passenger safety technicians (CPST) adhere to TxDOT's child passenger safety guidelines, which require participants to be Texas residents with proof of residency, which is typically the case who are members of the affected community.

Prior to distributing car seats, the TxDOT CPST determines the caregiver's inability to purchase a car seat by either self-certifying that they cannot afford a car seat or by declaring their low-income status through their enrollment in a government assistance program such as Medicaid, Women Infant & Children, or Children's Health Insurance Program. Some referrals of low-income families come through justice of the peace and municipal courts.

Summary of Issues Covered

During the engagement opportunity, attendees and participants are first screened prior to conducting an in-person inspection and asked to complete the TxDOT Child Passenger Safety (CPS) Screening Form. Then, the parent/caregiver is provided with child passenger safety education and

hands-on car seat installation training on how to properly install the car seat in their vehicle, with the parent/caregiver being the primary installer of the car seat. They learn that a car seat must be selected based on a child's age, weight and height.

In addition, parents/caregivers are taught the importance of not having loose objects in the vehicle that can become flying projectiles that can injure children and passengers. Finally, we provide parents with combined, accurate, comprehensive information about car seat safety and where to find information to help ensure their children travel safely.

Types of Comments and Views Received

This parent/caregiver self-installation process empowers families, making them more confident and able to install the car seat in another vehicle should the need ever arise. There are so many questions that parents have that can only be answered in person (show and tell) during the car seat installation process.

After the training is complete, parents express their gratitude and appreciation for the valuable information they received. "My child is safe now.", "I had no idea the law said eight years or under four-foot-nine." The increased awareness and eye-opening experience is important to parents. Some parents are brought to tears when they realize that they have previously and unknowingly exposed their children to a potential death or serious injury.

Incorporation of Community Comments into Decision-Making

Currently, comments and views received through the engagement opportunity are annotated on the checklist under the comments section. A formal, local survey will be conducted in the Laredo District for FY2025 as a pilot program to understand the child safety needs of parents/caregivers and to gather other family demographic information to measure the impact of an initiative or identify areas for improvement. (i.e. child-caregiver relationship, number of children in the family, age of child, how they plan to implement new child safety behaviors learned, and more importantly, to raise awareness and where they get their information (i.e. mainstream news or social media, agency referrals, word of mouth, etc.) leading to CPASS resources, to name a few). The end result of this survey is to gather actionable insights. This can vary depending on the purpose of the survey, but is typically aimed at identifying trends, patterns, and education that can address safety disparities in low-income communities.

Motorcycle Riders in San Angelo

Overview

The San Angelo Motorcycle Safety Coalition members reached out to our Traffic Safety Specialist (TSS) in the San Angelo District office due to their concerns regarding Motorcycle fatalities/serious

injuries along the “Three Sisters” Route: Three Hill Country Ranch Roads 335, 336 and 337, are known throughout Texas as the Twisted Sisters, and riders come from near and far to enjoy them.

Description of Engagement Opportunities

The San Angelo Motorcycle Safety Coalition was formed in 2023 as a result of feedback received from the motorcycle community. The TSS then coordinated the initial San Angelo Motorcycle Safety Coalition meeting and has held quarterly meetings at the TxDOT San Angelo District office since the coalition was formed.

Motorcyclists in San Angelo host a “Bike Night” every Friday to discuss safety issues. A “Blessing of the Bikes” was held recently.

The TSS hosts motorcycle safety events at the district office. Twice this year, traffic safety booths were hosted to engage with riders and discuss motorcycle safety initiatives including helmet use, basic motorcycle riding courses, first aid kits, rider awareness, impaired riding and *Be Safe, Be Seen*.

Accessibility Measures in Outreach Efforts

The TSS coordinated with the motorcycle group to find a day and time that best meets their needs/per their request and placed orange cones in the parking lot to reserve parking for motorcycles only.

Description of Attendees and Participants

The attendees of the events included motorcyclists in the San Angelo district including motorcycle safety advocates.

Summary of Issues Covered

The TSS met with five motorcycle advocates from Texas to discuss options to improve traffic safety specifically along the Three Sisters roads as well as for all motorcyclists in the San Angelo District.

Types of Comments and Views Received

To summarize all the issues covered, the following comments and views were received:

- The creation of a motorcycle safety coalition.
- The need for billboards along the “Three Sisters” roads due to the high motorcycle fatality and serious injury rate in Leakey, Texas.
- More traffic safety education on how to “Share the Road” with Motorcyclists and additional basic motorcycle riding classes.
- How to address and decrease impaired driving in the motorcycle community.

- The need for traffic safety markings in the roadways with specific requests for “Slow Down” and “Sharp Curve” safety messaging along the Three Sisters roadways.

Incorporation of Community Comments into Decision-Making

As a result of their feedback, two motorcycle safety billboards were purchased, strategically placed according to the data, and were to be maintained in the Three Sisters area.

After further collaboration, it was determined that the billboards were more of a visual distraction to the motorcyclists, who requested that they be removed due to this safety concern.

The feedback received from the motorcycle riders in San Angelo was valuable and did lead the San Angelo District to create a motorcycle safety coalition as well as plan and conduct increased engagements in motorcycle safety and awareness in the “Three Sisters” roads area.

Additionally, the TxDOT District Engineer will continue to evaluate the “Three Sisters” roads to consider adding roadway markings to increase traffic safety along the highway.

While we will continue to engage with the motorcycle community in the San Angelo District, we will not pursue this as a PPE project for FY25.

Evidence-Based Enforcement Activities

In addressing 23 CFR 1300.35(b)(3), our statewide traffic safety evidence-based enforcement activities were aimed at reducing crashes caused by speeding, alcohol, and other drugs, running red lights and stop signs, distracted driving, and failure to use safety belts or child passenger safety seats.

The Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) is Texas’s evidence-based traffic safety enforcement program. Texas funded 251 STEP projects in FY24 and partnered with 144 of law enforcement agencies through these projects. The evidence-based program activities and results are described in Section Three in the corresponding program area.

BTS deploys resources based on analysis of crashes, crash fatalities, and injuries in areas of highest risk. Additionally, all enforcement agencies receiving grant funding must use a data-driven approach to identify the enforcement issues in their jurisdictions. To ensure enforcement resources were deployed effectively, law enforcement agencies were directed to implement evidence-based strategies.

As part of our ongoing efforts to engage the law enforcement community, BTS hosted a STEP Partners Meeting. The meeting was made accessible by being held both in person and virtually. An invite was extended to all past and present STEP partners. The meeting was meant to facilitate

discussions regarding the Texas STEP program where agencies were encouraged to bring their ideas, concerns and questions. Overall, there were 125 participants at the meeting representing over 50 Texas law enforcement agencies.

As part of each STEP project, public information and education are required components and include community collaboration. The community collaboration efforts included but are not limited to participating in community meetings and events; providing education and outreach including National Night Out (NNO); and promoting traffic safety awareness through community-based social media channels and news outlets. Through these efforts, law enforcement and BTS continued to engage Texas communities and collaborate with local organizations regarding traffic safety awareness.

Mobilization Participation

In addressing 23 CFR 1300.35(b)(4), TRF-BTS conducted three mobilizations: Click It or Ticket (CIOT), Impaired Driving (IDM) and Operation Slowdown (OpSlow). The participating agencies for each mobilization are listed below in the corresponding sections for each individual mobilization.

The enforcement activity for each mobilization differs but generally consists of high-visibility, overtime saturation patrols focused on reducing the number of fatal and serious injury crashes involving contributing factors commonly associated with the mobilization (occupant protection, impairment, and speed).

Texas Transportation Code Section 720.002 prohibits using traffic-offense (citation) quotas; therefore, there is no requirement, formal or informal, that a peace officer issue a specified or predetermined number of citations in pursuance of the Subgrantee's obligations. We require that in addition to the STEP enforcement activities, the subgrantee must maintain baseline non-STEP funded citation and arrest activity due to the prohibition of supplanting. As part of each officer's Daily Activity Report, if a citation is issued, the citation number must be supplied as part of the report which can then be cross-referenced during monitoring. For reporting purposes only, citation data was gathered and is provided in the corresponding sections for each individual mobilization.

In coordination with the CIOT, IDM and OpSlow mobilizations, TRF-BTS conducts paid and earned media outreach efforts as part of our statewide media campaigns. Please see "Section Three: Paid Media Reports" for further information on the respective campaigns for *Click It or Ticket*, Statewide Impaired Driving and the *Be Safe. Drive Smart. Speed Awareness* campaigns.

Click It or Ticket Mobilization

The Click It or Ticket (CIOT) Mobilization specifically focuses on reducing fatal or serious-injury crashes where vehicle occupants are unrestrained or improperly restrained, whether in seat belts or child safety seats.

The goals and strategies of this mobilization are to conduct high-visibility saturation patrols within the Enforcement Zones identified for at least four calendar days during the enforcement dates, with at least half of all enforcement hours worked on this project conducted between the hours of 6p-6a. Agencies are also required to perform pre and post enforcement earned-media campaigns for each enforcement period.

The pre-media, enforcement and post-media periods consist of a nearly month-long timeframe coinciding with the national CIOT mobilization from May 17 through June 5, 2024. Pre-media and post-media activity can include but is not limited to newspaper, radio, television and social media announcements of the upcoming increased enforcement, follow-up results of the increased enforcement and pertinent traffic safety information.

Impaired Driving Mobilization

The Impaired Driving Mobilization (IDM) consists of DWI enforcement Waves during holiday periods to increase DWI arrests and earned media activity as part of the statewide impaired driving campaign and in conjunction with the national Impaired Driving Mobilization campaign.

The goals and strategies of this mobilization are to conduct high-visibility saturation patrols within the Enforcement Zones identified at least four days between the hours of 6p-6a, Monday-Sunday during the approved enforcement periods. Subgrantee must also perform pre and post enforcement earned-media campaigns for each enforcement period.

The pre-media, enforcement and post-media periods consist of the Christmas/New Year’s Wave, Spring Break Wave, Independence Day Wave and Labor Day Wave. Pre and post enforcement media activity can include but is not limited to newspaper, radio, television and social media announcements of the upcoming increased enforcement, follow-up results of the increased enforcement and pertinent traffic safety information.

Operation Slowdown Mobilization

The Operation Slowdown (OpSlow) Mobilization aims to increase effective enforcement and adjudication of traffic safety-related laws to reduce fatal and serious injury crashes and public information and education effort during the Enforcement period.

The goals and strategies of this mobilization are to conduct high-visibility overtime enforcement activities focused on reducing the number of crashes involving contributing factors commonly

associated with speed which includes saturation patrols within the Enforcement Zones identified. Agencies must also perform pre and post enforcement earned-media campaigns for each enforcement period.

The pre-media, enforcement and post-media periods consisted of a nearly month-long timeframe between July 16 and August 7, 2024. Pre-media and post-media activity can include but is not limited to newspaper, radio, television and social media announcements of the upcoming increased enforcement, follow-up results of the increased enforcement and pertinent traffic safety information.

FY 2024 *Click It or Ticket* Public Information and Education Campaign October 1, 2023 – September 30, 2024

Even though Texas has had a seat belt law on the books since 1985, by 2002 only three of four drivers (76%) were buckling up. Traffic fatalities were topping 3,500 every year, and many of those could have been prevented if vehicle occupants had been wearing a seat belt. In 2002, TxDOT began participating in the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) national *Click It or Ticket* campaign and as of 2024, seat belt use in Texas has increased from 76% to 90.1%.

According to the NHTSA, *Click It or Ticket* campaigns in Texas are credited with saving more than 7,800 lives, preventing 139,000 serious injuries, and achieving more than \$40 billion in economic savings. While this is a cause to celebrate, too many Texans are dying or sustaining serious injuries due to a failure to buckle up. In 2023, there were 3,823 motor vehicle traffic crashes in Texas in which unrestrained occupants sustained fatal or serious injuries.

Research shows that men, passengers, those in pickup trucks (drivers and passengers), and those on the road at night are the worst when it comes to using a seat belt regularly. Buckling up saves lives and protects drivers and passengers from harm and expensive tickets. In fact, wearing a seat belt reduces the risk of a fatal injury to a person in the front seat of a passenger car by 45%. For those in pickup trucks, which are more likely to roll than passenger vehicles, the risk of fatal injury is reduced by up to 60%.

At the national level, *Click It or Ticket* aims to enforce seat belt use to help keep travelers safe. The state campaign seeks to supplement the national effort through several goals:

- Raise drivers' awareness of the increased risk of getting a ticket due to enforcement mobilization.

- Raise drivers' awareness of the increased risk of injury or death due to failure to use a seat belt.
- Reduce unbelted fatalities.
- Increase seat belt use.

Paid Media Recap

Beginning in May, TxDOT placed \$830,055 in paid media for the *Click It or Ticket* campaign, with some media partnerships continuing until the end of August. Added value achieved through negotiations with media vendors exceeded TxDOT's investment.



Bonus (free) radio spots were valued at \$202,218. Added-value amounts from out-of-home advertising totaled \$330,320 and included billboard overrides and negotiated lower monthly rates as well as gas station bonus spots. Bally Sports Southwest and Space City Home Network media buys contributed \$529,501 in added value. The total added value generated by paid media was \$1,062,039.

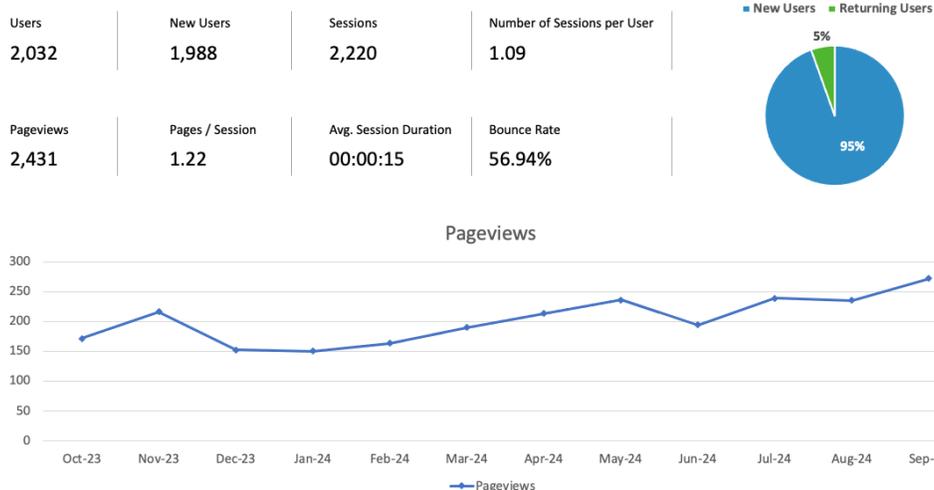

Website Overview

TexasClickItOrTicket.com had 2,032 users during the fiscal year. Most users were new visitors who came to the site during the paid media flight in May. The digital media campaign differed from previous campaigns in that its only objective was to generate video views. In past years, a segment of the effort also worked to drive traffic to the website. For this reason, website traffic did not reach the levels of previous fiscal years. The website, however, did see an uptick in traffic following the media flight, likely from users who sought out the website after seeing an ad.

Public Relations

To mark the 22nd *Click It or Ticket* campaign, press and outreach events featuring a branded, lifted pickup truck were held in 11 cities from May 15–30. Cities were selected based on a combination of unbelted fatalities and media market size and included Austin, San Antonio, Beaumont, Tyler, Fort Worth, Lubbock, Midland, El Paso, McAllen, Laredo, and Waco.

At each stop, the display was set up against a local, iconic backdrop. News media outlets and law enforcement were invited to attend. A planned event in Houston was canceled due to widespread storm damage.

TxDOT Traffic Safety Specialists (TSSs) and Public Information Officers (PIOs) helped secure a variety of local representatives to speak at the press conferences. These included a TxDOT spokesperson, a law enforcement official, a local EMS representative, and someone personally affected by an unbelted crash.

To support the events, the campaign created digital press kits customized for each market that included a press release, media advisory, and fact sheet as well as talking points for TxDOT's PIOs. In addition, b-roll and sound bites were recorded to encourage media coverage.

The media events and news releases generated 500 TV and radio news segments valued at \$2,401,516, 112 print articles valued at \$58,782, and 98 online news stories valued at \$4,446,803. Combined, the earned media produced more than 103 million impressions. The total publicity value of news media coverage of the campaign was \$6,907,101.

Partnerships

In anticipation of the campaign, several partners were recruited to help disseminate materials and messages. A digital toolkit was developed and distributed to partners including the Associated General Contractors of Texas, Texas Mutual Insurance Company, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, the Texas Municipal Police Association, AAA, and the National Safety Council.

Creative Overview

The *Click It or Ticket* campaign focuses on increasing seat belt use among drivers and passengers. The creative approach leverages an overarching strategy to reinforce the consequences of not wearing a seat belt which are economic—getting a ticket—and the emotional/physical—injury or death, loss of a loved one, and the effects on those left behind. To that end, the campaign has created numerous public service announcements for video, television, and radio; digital and social media content; billboards; and print collateral.

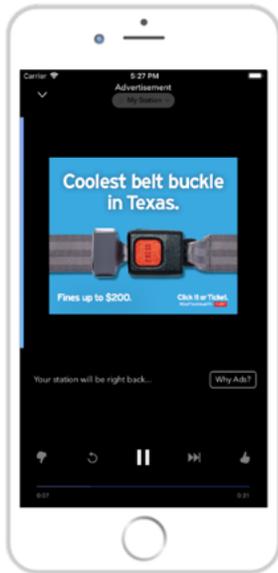

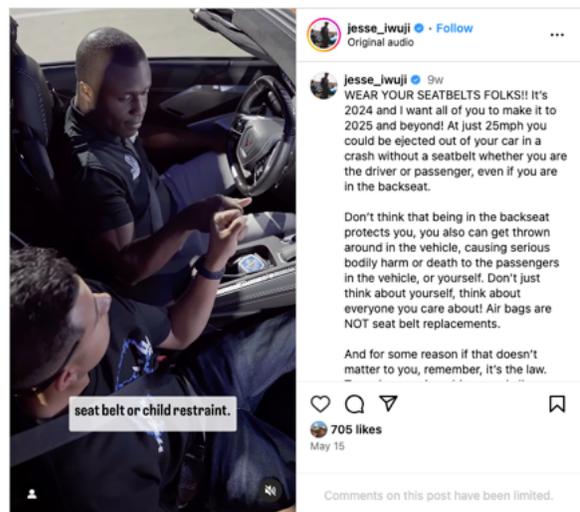


Animated organic social media posts



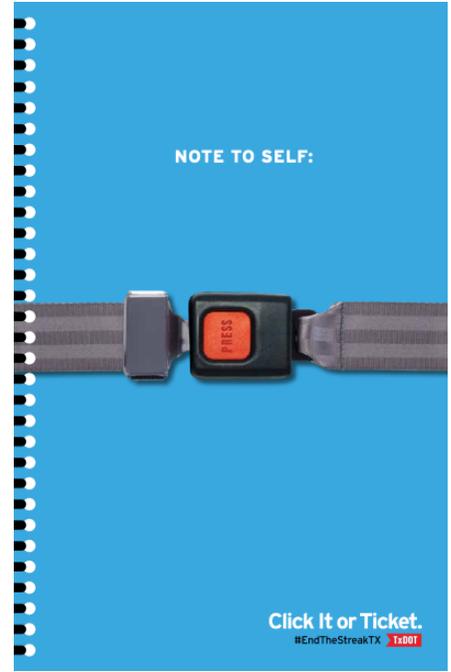

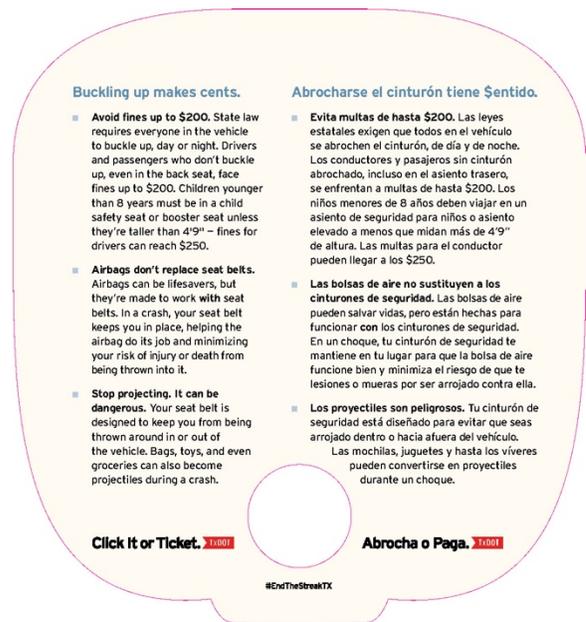

Overall Campaign Value

Earned media resulted in \$6,907,100.88 in added value and 103,347,056 impressions. Paid media match resulted in \$1,062,039.00 in added value and 179,967,472 impressions.

With \$7,969,139.88 in total added value, the statewide *Click It or Ticket* campaign delivered a 5:1 return on the \$1,590,769.88 investment.

YOUTH OCCUPANT PROTECTION CAMPAIGN

October 1st, 2023 – September 30, 2024

Campaign Overview

2022 crash data showed that 19% of the total number of motor vehicle crashes in Texas involved teen drivers (ages 15-20). Furthermore, in 2022 there were 1,977 serious injuries and 320 fatalities for drivers or passengers between the ages of 15-20. Of the 320 teen (ages 15-20) traffic crash fatalities, 162 were found not to be wearing their seat belts at the time of the crash, which equals 51% of the total. The *Teen Click It or Ticket* campaign is a public awareness campaign executed each year to educate teens about these staggering numbers and increase seat belt use in both teen drivers and passengers. School campuses across the state of Texas participate in the initiative each year. They receive materials to display on their campus and encourage teen drivers to buckle up. The campaign is an annual event that is traditionally held in the month of February.

For our youngest Texans, 2023 crash data showed there were 312 passenger vehicle crashes that resulted in 47 fatalities of children younger than 8 years old. Of the 47 fatalities, 14 were unrestrained at the time of the crash, which equals 30% of the total. The *Child Passenger Safety* campaign is a public awareness campaign held each year in September to coincide with National Child Passenger Safety Week. The purpose of the initiative is to educate parents and caregivers about the proper use of child safety seats. The campaign reminds drivers that Texas law requires all children less than eight years old, unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches, to be in a car seat whenever they ride in a passenger vehicle. The campaign's main call to action is to direct parents and caregivers to make an appointment for a free car seat inspection.

TxDOT's overarching Youth Occupant Protection marketing campaign consists of two campaign flights — *Teen Click It or Ticket* and *Child Passenger Safety*. The overall campaign goal is to reduce fatalities and injuries related to unrestrained or improperly restrained teens and children on Texas roads. For most occupants the act of wearing a seatbelt is the simplest habit. However, for our youth it is a learned practice or an action that involves a caregiver taking the time to ensure it is done properly.

The Youth Occupant Protection marketing campaign goals are:

1. Increase public awareness on the dangers resulting from teenagers not wearing their seat belt.
2. Educate the public on proper usage of child safety seats and how to schedule an appointment with a certified child passenger safety technician

In 2024, the Youth Occupant Protection campaign marketing strategies consisted of:

- Develop a statewide paid media plan focusing on key target audiences in primary markets for both flights of the campaign.
- Build on existing creative assets to expand campaign messaging to resonate with our key target audiences for both the *Teen Click It or Ticket* flight and the *Child Passenger Safety* flight.
- Conduct a robust public relations campaign that includes grassroots interactive events and community outreach to key target audiences.
- Foster earned media opportunities to increase the campaign's return on investment.
- Conduct qualitative research with Texas teens 15 – 20 years of age to better understand the most persuasive messages and channels for this target audience.

This year, TxDOT continued to feature the 'If You Love It, Click It' message for the *Teen Click It or Ticket* campaign, serving as a reminder that teen drivers and passengers should ensure all riders are always wearing their seat belts – Every Rider, Every Ride. Campaign representatives visited six Texas districts across the state encouraging teens to sign a pledge to wear their seat belt in exchange for the chance to win a pair of AirPods Max headphones. TxDOT continued to also use the successful slogan "Save Me With A Seat" for the *Child Passenger Safety* flight. This important message speaks directly to child caregivers regarding the importance of proper car seat installation and use. The "Are You Ready for Takeoff?" activation experience also traveled to eight markets across Texas directly targeting parents and caregivers. All *Save Me With A Seat* campaign elements drive the target audience to use the [SaveMeWithASeat.org](https://www.SaveMeWithASeat.org) website, in both English and Spanish, for safety seat inspection scheduling year-round.

CREATIVE OVERVIEW

The Youth Occupant Protection campaign includes seat belt safety for teenagers (ages 15-20) and the proper usage and installation of child car seats for children younger than 8 years of age. The creative approach identifies an overarching strategy to address our campaign needs reinforcing personal accountability of teens to wear seat belts for every ride, either as a driver or passenger, and the importance of proper use and installation of child safety seats.

Teen Click It or Ticket

In 2024, the *Teen Click It or Ticket* flight used video and radio spots both with :15 and :30, English and Spanish versions. The TV spot featured the original "If You Love It, Click It" song. 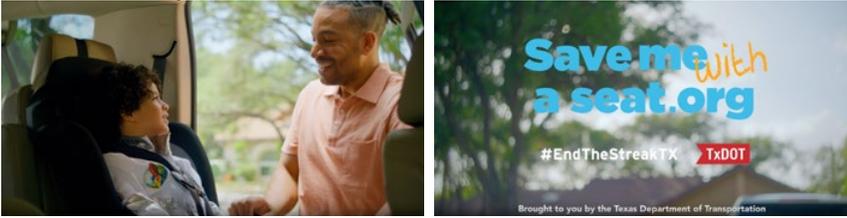

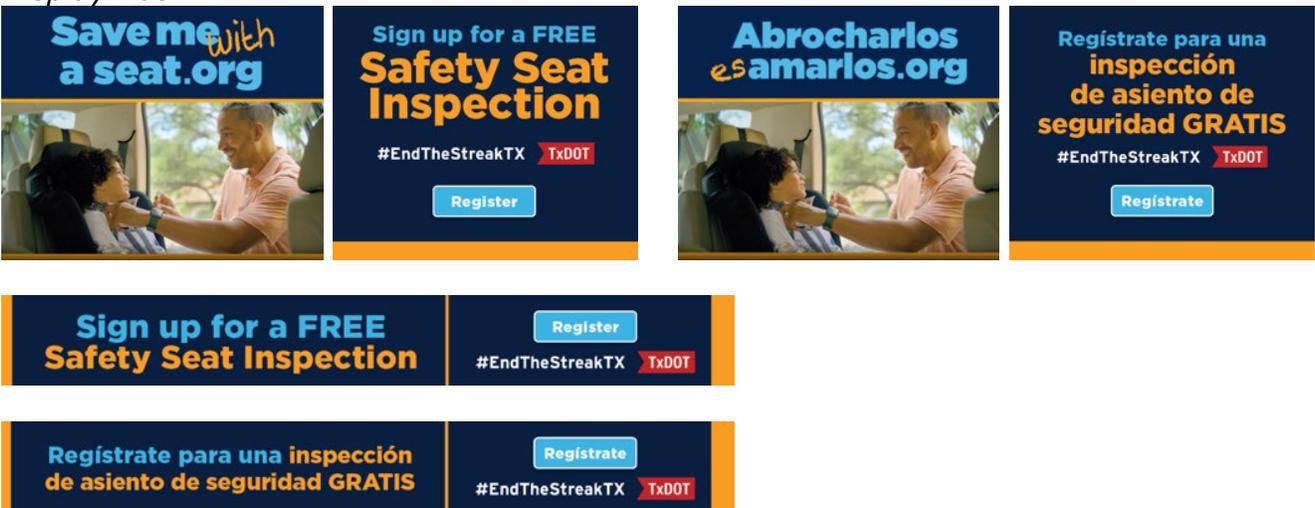

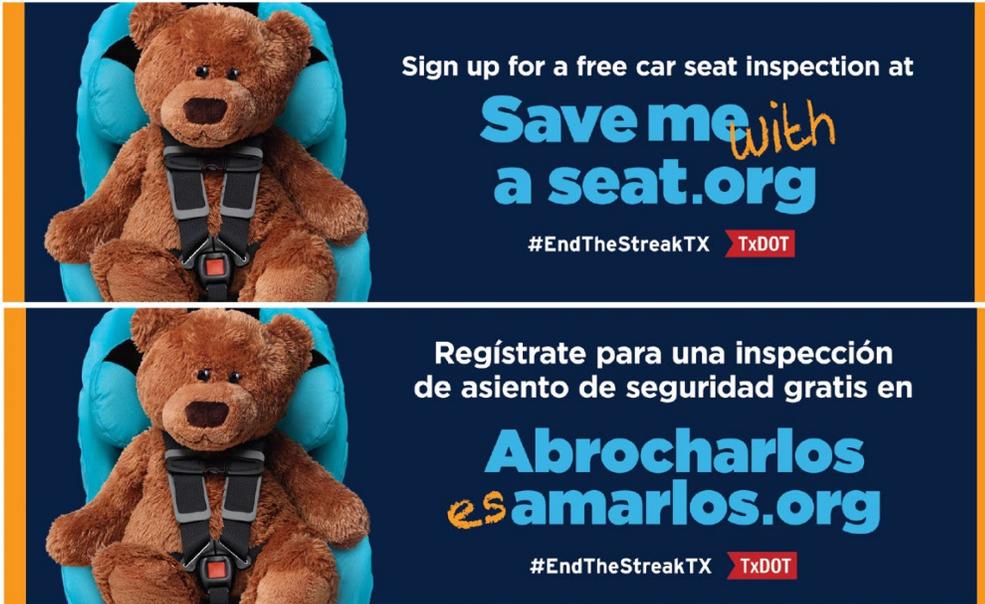

TEEN CLICK IT OR TICKET – QUALITATIVE RESEARCH OVERVIEW

The following qualitative teen research was conducted in January 2024 to learn more about this unique target audience.

Research Objectives

- Delve into the mindset and emotional attitudes that teenagers hold toward wearing a seat belt
- Determine the frequency of seat belt usage and what's driving behavior
- Explore perception of the risks/dangers associated with not wearing a seat belt
- Determine the most effective messages to use to motivate increased seat belt usage
- Evaluate awareness of seat belt law and their effectiveness
- Test seat belt messaging and campaign approaches, including, "If you love it, click it."
- Evaluate interest in taking a pledge to wear a seat belt
- Understand media consumption habits of 15- to 20-year-olds; identify effective communication channels to encourage seat belt use

Methodology

- Conducted three 90-minute online chat focus groups with teens and young adults throughout the state.
- To promote candid engagement and protect privacy, all participants were assigned aliases.
- Representation from 26 counties across Texas and a mix of urban/suburban and rural markets.
- Participants reflected diversity of Texas, with a mix of genders, races and ethnicities.

Key Outcomes

- Texas teens indicated they prefer a campaign focused on compelling facts, statistics, consequences, and narratives that are hard hitting and emotionally captivating.
- The following statistic moved the needle with all three teen audiences: *In 2022, 320 15-20-year-old Texans died in traffic crashes. 51% of them were not wearing their seat belts.*

- Teens are mostly unaware of the dangers/risks other drivers on the road pose (factors outside their control). The reality is crashes can happen to them, even if they're a good driver. It might be easier to convince teens to put on their seat belt, not because they're not good drivers, but because *others* on the road may not be.
- The "if" in "If you love it, click it" caused some confusion because the law is mandatory, not optional.
- Click It or Ticket has unaided recall.
- Getting a ticket was the third most compelling message for general market participants and most don't think the laws are enforced.
- The ability to take a seat belt-wearing pledge and the prizes leveraged to incentivize teens are attention grabbing and do increase campaign awareness.

FY 2024 *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* Campaign October 2023–September 2024

Texas hasn't seen a day without a crash fatality since November 7, 2000. Although we saw a small decrease in the number of traffic fatalities from 2022 to 2023, still an average of 12 people were killed on our state's roadways each day last year.

Crash reports tell us that motorists are driving too fast, not paying attention, driving while impaired, failing to yield the right of way, and generally disregarding the rules of the road, including in areas of the state with challenging driving conditions due to work zones and oil and gas production-related traffic.

Achieving TxDOT's goal of zero deaths will take convincing Texans that the number of traffic crashes, fatalities, and serious injuries on our roadways is unacceptable and they should take responsibility to help prevent these deaths and injuries wherever they drive.

An important part of this effort is TxDOT's annual, state-funded *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* campaign, which focuses on educating motorists about what it means to drive smart and motivating them to be safe drivers to reduce the odds of their causing or becoming one of Texas's roadway casualties.

The year-round campaign delivers practical safety messages to target audiences driving in these primary areas:

- Oil and gas exploration and production regions in West Texas, South Texas, and other shales across the state.
- Road maintenance and construction work zones along Interstate 35 and other major corridors.
- Challenging situations for motorists such as school zones, rainy or icy roadways, congested highways, and nighttime driving.

Be Safe. Drive Smart. calls on all Texas drivers to notice and respond to what's going on around them, whether it's slow-moving truck traffic; construction or emergency vehicles on the side of the road; weather conditions such as flash floods, fog, or snow;

or kids walking or biking in school zones. It also asks drivers to always be conscious of the speed they're driving and the space they leave between their vehicle and the one in front of them. They must stay alert, be extra cautious around big trucks and tankers, and avoid driving when they're drowsy.

Campaign Overview

Texas is a huge state with more than 18 million licensed drivers. It's essential to the *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* campaign's success that our communication tools reach and motivate as many people as possible, as often as possible, to accomplish the following objectives:

1. Convince drivers to match the way they drive to road conditions.
2. Make drivers aware of their unsafe habits, emphasizing the importance of paying 100% attention when behind the wheel, driving a safe speed, and following the rules of the road.
3. Convey safety messages, advice, and tips that target audiences will remember and act upon.

The FY 2024 campaign heavily relied on targeted paid media, PSA placements, and earned media for the broadest and most repetitive exposure to campaign messages. Digital strategies, outreach, and interactive events also delivered safety reminders to key audiences. Each of the three main initiatives within the campaign—Energy Sector Safety, Work Zone Safety, and General Topics—had its own set of tactics and geographic targets.

Energy Sector Safety. Texas is the national leader when it comes to energy production. In parts of Texas where fracking occurs, ranchers, farmers, and other locals share the road with an abundance of big rigs and oilfield service workers. Motorists must be aware that large trucks and tankers can limit visibility and the space they might need to maneuver in case of a road hazard. Increased truck traffic also leads to wear and tear on road surfaces, which can pose more challenges to drivers.



In 2023, more than 80,000 traffic crashes occurred in the state's five major oil and gas regions. These crashes resulted in 1,081 fatalities, accounting for one-quarter of all Texas traffic deaths. Another 3,578 people suffered serious injuries.

Energy Sector campaign activities aimed at alerting motorists to take proactive steps to drive safely in the targeted shale areas included paid media flights in the fall and summer, a media relations tour to secure earned media coverage, special events at high school football games, and the sharing of educational materials.

Work Zone Safety. Texas has as many as 1,900 active road construction and maintenance projects, and some of the largest projects are along congested I-35. Driving through work zones can be challenging because of temporary barriers, uneven or narrow lanes, slow-moving equipment, and vehicles that make sudden stops.



Road conditions like these force drivers to slow down and pay closer attention, a fact that crash statistics prove is often ignored by impatient, reckless, and distracted drivers. Texas has seen two consecutive years of declines in the number of traffic fatalities in work zones, yet 190 people died and another 803 were seriously injured in crashes in road construction and maintenance zones in 2023. The majority of those killed (77%) were drivers or their passengers.

TxDOT's efforts in 2024 to raise awareness of the importance of driving cautiously in work zones kicked off with an April press conference and statewide news release and included paid media flights in the spring and summer to deliver safety messages to locals and travelers along I-35 and other major corridors, especially in areas with active highway maintenance and construction activity.

General Topics. Regardless of where drivers find themselves and what they must contend with, their safety—and everyone else's—depends on their making smart choices. The alarming number of deaths on Texas roadways means that the *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* campaign must use multiple touchpoints throughout the year to reach a broad audience of drivers on a variety of traffic safety concerns, including those not traditionally covered by the federally funded distracted driving, occupant protection, and impaired driving initiatives.

Through public relations, PSA placements, and outreach, TxDOT's campaign is able year after year to successfully generate earned media coverage and deliver traffic safety reminders to motorists across the state. In FY 2024, TxDOT conducted statewide news media outreach, shared messages on social media, distributed educational materials, and secured free airtime for television and radio PSAs on topics ranging from safety around trucks to drowsy driving, safety in school zones, and the state's Move Over Law.



Creative Overview

Although *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* comprises separate mini-campaigns with distinct geographic targets, creative materials share the same branding and overarching messages: drive a safe speed, follow the rules of the road, and give driving the full attention it deserves. All materials produced in Spanish use the tagline *Maneja Listo. Maneja Seguro.*

Energy Sector Safety. Since 2019 TxDOT has used iconic Texas cattle to deliver key safety messages in the state's energy areas. The bilingual "Cow-versation" campaign developed in FY 2023 for paid media and outreach uses bovine puns to continue the campaign's tongue-in-cheek approach and includes TV spots, billboards, digital and social media advertising, and print collateral. The campaign's focus is on driving behaviors that are the leading causes of fatalities in these areas: driving too fast and driving distracted. The campaign also reminds drivers to give plenty of space to the heavy, large trucks so prevalent in these target markets.

Work Zone Safety. This campaign's out-of-home and digital creative materials incorporate photos of TxDOT employees in hard hats and other safety gear to add an appealing human element to the safety messages reminding drivers to slow down and put their phone away in work zones. These workers thank you for driving safe since, like you, they also want to get home safe at the end of the day. Information cards, posters, and banners also use the familiar yellow and black graphic look and feel of the campaign to support statewide outreach efforts to raise awareness of the importance of driving with care through work zones.

General Topics. TxDOT used a mix of existing, updated, and new creative assets and collateral to educate motorists about safe driving topics in FY 2024, executing the following:

- Developed and distributed a new 2024 edition of the Texas Road Tips Handbook, a 24-page easy-to-read guide to Texas traffic laws, tips, and advice on sharing the road safely. The booklet has been shared with campaign partners such as Texas Mutual Insurance, the Permian Road Safety Coalition, and the Texas Municipal Courts Education Center and distributed at campaign events, safety conferences, and sporting events.



- Created organic social media posts for TxDOT's Facebook and X pages about the Move Over/Slow Down law, safety around trucks, rural driving, drowsy driving awareness, and back-to-school safety.

- Produced back-to-school safety information cards, posters, and new hand fans for TxDOT traffic safety specialists (TSSs) to share with schools and at outreach events.

- Created new 30-second “Turn Around Don’t Drown” TV and radio PSAs in English and Spanish to educate motorists about the dangers of driving through floodwaters. The animated TV spot shows the hazards they may not see just below the water’s surface.

Paid Media

Paid broadcast, out-of-home, and digital media advertising for the *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* campaign has always been concentrated in the five high-risk oil and gas regions



and the I-35 corridor. For the past three years, outdoor and gas pumptopper placements for work zone safety messaging have been expanded to include additional highway corridors around the state. Digital media placements focused on video ads because, historically, cost-efficient video completions and engagements lead to higher campaign message recall.

In addition, the Texas Association of Broadcasters (TAB) distributed PSAs on behalf of the campaign and asked for placements from all Texas TV and radio stations, reaching every corner of the state including major and rural markets. The PSAs included English and Spanish spots addressing drowsy driving, the Move Over/Slow Down law, and back-to-school safety. TAB charges a distribution fee and guarantees a minimum 4:1 return on investment. The end result was far better. Over a total of 18 weeks, stations broadcast 44,133 spots, donating more than \$2.4 million in airtime and providing TxDOT a 16:1 return on the investment.

Public Relations Activities

The approach to public relations for the campaign is to prepare compelling and comprehensive media kits that make it easy for news directors and reporters to build their stories. The campaign also supports and coordinates with TxDOT’s district public information officers (PIOs) and TSSs to secure publicity for each safety topic in local markets. The overall goal is to reach Texas drivers frequently and through many outlets with a variety of *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* messages.

TxDOT held its annual **Work Zone Safety** press conference to recognize National Work Zone Awareness Week at the Austin District Office on April 15. The event featured speakers from the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Austin Police Department, Williamson County EMS, Associated General Contractors of Texas, and TxDOT, including a TxDOT heavy equipment operator who attested to the hazards faced by road crews in work zones. The *Austin American-Statesman* and local CBS, FOX, and Telemundo news affiliates covered the event.



The Work Zone Safety press event featured a field of 190 orange traffic delineator posts representing the number of people killed in Texas work zone traffic crashes in 2023.

The campaign also garnered substantial amounts of earned media coverage via the distribution of a media kit including a news release in English and Spanish, a B-roll package, and sound bites plus the setup of news interviews with TxDOT's PIOs. Local Work Zone Awareness Week activities conducted by district PIOs and TSSs were also promoted and resulted in news stories across the state. The April media tour generated a total of 373 news stories with a PR value of \$1,512,492.

PR activities for the **Energy Sector** campaign were concentrated in October with the distribution of a media tip sheet and B-roll footage and requests to news outlets for help in asking motorists to slow down, share the road safely with big trucks, and stay alert to prevent deadly crashes in the state's five main energy production areas. The media relations efforts resulted in 56 TV, online, and print news stories valued at \$347,286.97.

TxDOT also conducted a series of outreach events at high school football games under the Friday night lights to engage with drivers of all ages in the Permian Basin and Eagle Ford Shale, which both saw increases in the number of traffic crashes from 2022 to 2023. Events featured the *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* Road Show trailer equipped with large screens to display campaign videos, VR games, and interactive quizzes. Local media advisories were distributed ahead of the events to secure news coverage.

For **General Topics** the campaign created four safe driving news/outreach packages with media tip sheets, talking points, social media posts, video, and educational materials in English and Spanish. These packages were designed to assist TxDOT’s PIOs and TSSs throughout the year in educating Texas drivers about specific causes of crashes, tips on how to prevent them, and rules of the road. The FY 2024 topics included the Move Over/Slow Down law, drowsy driving, safety around trucks, and tips for driving in rural areas. Past packages on topics such as winter driving were also updated and available for TxDOT to use as needed. Media relations generated 142 news stories covering these topics valued at \$600,867.

To promote **back-to-school safety**, TxDOT distributed a media tip sheet, talking points, and B-roll and secured local news interviews in August to get the word out about this important safety topic. Media pitching efforts around the state’s secured 373 news hits valued at \$2,672,403.47.

Overall Campaign Value

Earned media resulted in \$5,133,050.03 in added value and 60,422,003 impressions. Paid media generated \$4,075,407.00 in added value and 457,837,361 impressions. With \$9,208,457.03 in total added value, the *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* campaign delivered a greater than 3:1 return on the \$2,609,432.19 investment during the federal FY 2024.

FY 2024 *Drive Sober. No Regrets.* Campaign October 2023 – September 2024

Campaign Overview

The *Drive Sober. No Regrets.* campaign aims to save lives and reduce crashes among Texans. It emphasizes the fact that drunk driving can have serious physical, emotional, and financial consequences that can last for years. A DWI can cost thousands and cause legal hassles, difficulty finding or keeping a job, shame and embarrassment, loss of trust from loved ones, and a lifetime of regret. The human toll of a DUI crash can devastate the lives of victims and survivors forever.

The *Drive Sober. No Regrets.* campaign shares personal accounts from real offenders and survivors that challenge any notion the audience may have that they can avoid the consequences of drinking and driving. It reinforces the importance of always finding a sober ride and the many options available.

The campaign is a key component of #EndTheStreakTX, a broader social media and word-of-mouth effort that encourages drivers to make safer choices while behind the wheel such as wearing a seat belt, driving the speed limit, never texting and driving, and never driving under the influence of alcohol or other drugs. November 7, 2000, was the last deathless day on Texas roadways. #EndTheStreakTX asks all Texans to commit to driving safely to help end the streak of daily deaths on Texas roadways.

The campaign creative changes throughout the year to match key timeframes when impaired driving messages are most critical. Five flights a year overlap with heightened law enforcement periods*.

- Flights include:
 1. Football Season (October, November, January)
 2. Christmas/New Year Holiday* (December)
 3. College and Young Adult/Spring Break* (March)
 4. Spring & Early Summer Holidays* (April/May)
 5. Faces of Drunk Driving/July 4th* (June, July)
 6. Labor Day* (August, September)

Through a combination of targeted paid media, strategic media relations, interactive special events, digital and social media strategies, proven outreach activities, and statewide partnerships, the campaign addresses the complex challenges of reducing impaired driving by meeting the target audience where they are most likely to consume and retain campaign messaging.

- Core activities:
 - Develop new testimonial videos and audio spots in English and Spanish for use in advertising and toolkits.
 - Develop organic social media and paid digital and online streaming ads.
 - Develop digital toolkits, campaign launch flyers, and print collateral, such as outdoor mesh banners, posters, info cards, greeting cards, and spiral notepads (large and small) for partner outreach.
 - Coordinate and manage all paid placements, including online OTT/CTV streaming; Learfield Sports; digital radio; other digital advertising; out-of-home advertising such as billboards, convenience store posters, mats, and clings; outreach posters, coasters, and mirror clings at bars and restaurants; and interactive ads and a mini-quiz for the digital jukeboxes at bars.
 - Engage in a statewide TV and radio PSA distribution program.
 - Conduct an online social media influencer program for peer-to-peer delivery of messages.
 - Create news releases, talking points, media advisories, soundbites, and b-roll; conduct statewide media pitching tours.
 - Enlist traffic safety specialists (TSSs), public information officers (PIOs), and other community partners and stakeholders to assist with the distribution of campaign messages and assets.
 - Conduct survey online in English and Spanish to gather target audience responses to the campaign in real time.
 - Update campaign websites including SoberRides.org and the traffic safety campaign pages of the TxDOT website, as well as the campaign YouTube channel.
 - Coordinate and conduct outreach events statewide where visitors are invited to interact with the DWI Not So Fun House trailer to watch testimonials, experience the drunk driving simulator and other onsite activities through “drunk goggles,” and learn about the real costs of drunk driving. Participants are also asked for feedback through Public Outreach Feedback Surveys (POFS) at select outreach events, and some received rideshare cards through a GHSA/Uber partnership.

Paid Media and Added Value

TxDOT invested \$1,885,221 in paid media in FY 2024, or 50% of total campaign expenditures. It garnered \$6,965,393 in added value. The campaign used traditional and digital paid media placements to reach Texas drivers ages 18 to 44 statewide and in key counties with the highest number of alcohol-related crashes and fatalities, including all of Texas’s major cities.

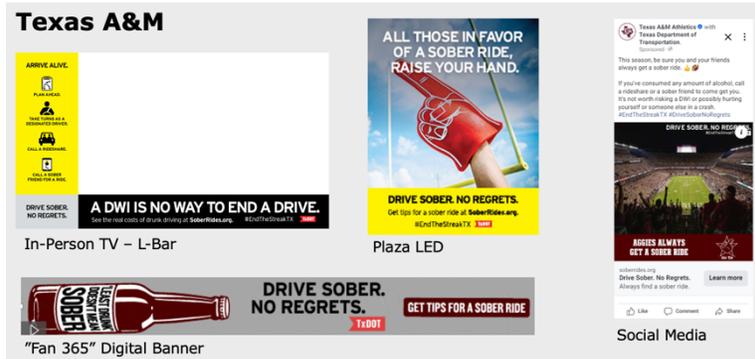
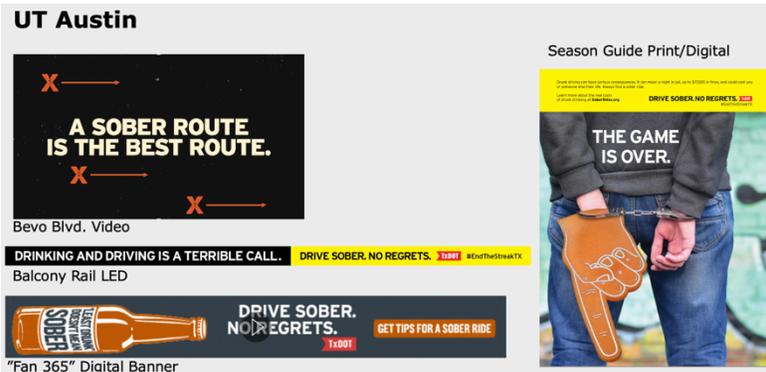
Creative Overview

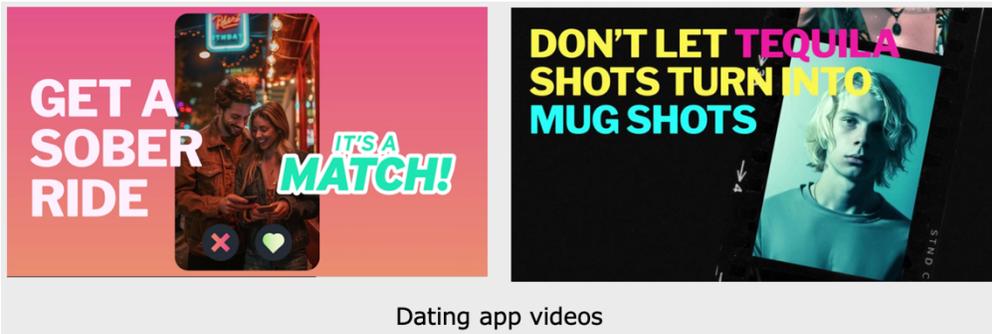

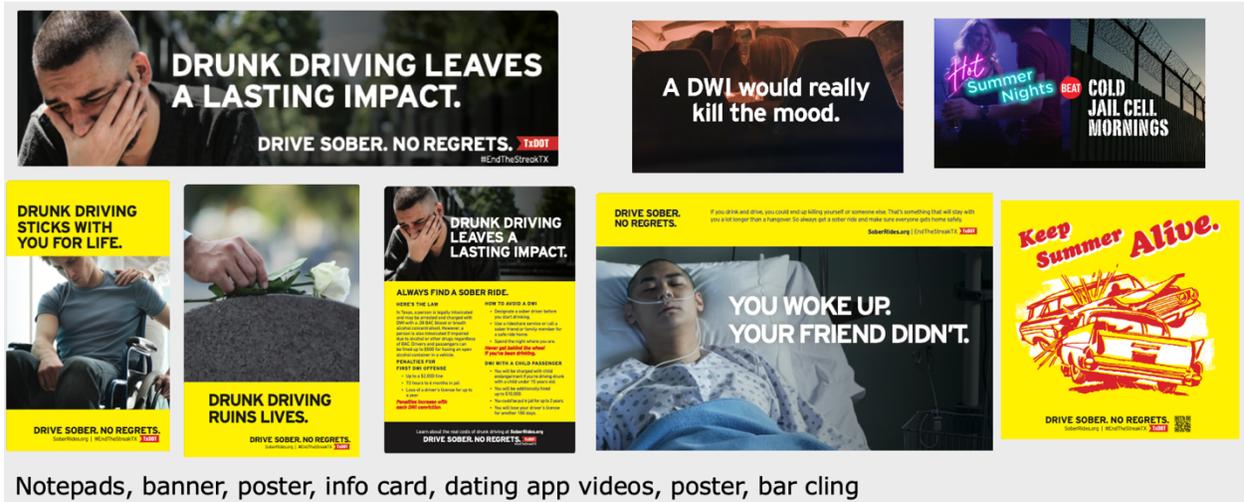

Public Relations

It's important that the campaign reaches Texas drivers frequently and through many outlets with messages about the importance of always finding a sober ride, and earned media helps do that. In FY 2024, media relations efforts included conducting press activities and outreach events, generating media stories about the consequences of impaired driving, and developing a series of press kits to promote campaign messages.

The *Drive Sober. No Regrets.* FY24 public relations efforts began with talking points and media advisories for the Football season campaign. News releases were also developed preceding statewide pitching over the Holiday, College/Spring Break, Faces of Drunk Driving, and Labor Day campaigns. All of the campaigns listed above, except Labor Day, also had an outreach event component. The Labor Day campaign held a press conference only, but efforts focused on law enforcement and they were invited to help produce soundbites. To support the media pitching tours, media advisories, b-roll, soundbites, and talking points for TxDOT public information officers were developed and distributed. A press template was also developed for law enforcement agencies to use for each campaign that fell over a heightened enforcement period. The public relations efforts resulted in 2,438 TV, radio, online, and print news stories valued at \$15,020,957.

Grassroots Outreach Events & POFs Collection

To motivate drivers to always find a sober ride, the FY24 campaign planned, launched, and hosted 26 events statewide over five campaigns. Twenty-seven events were planned, but one was cancelled due to dangerous weather.

At the outreach events, more than 410,000 visitors were engaged in event activities centered around the newly revamped DWI Not So Fun House (NSFH). The NSFH is a vintage-style carnival trailer with interactive games that lets participants of all ages see and experience the simulated effects of alcohol on motor skills and driving. Visitors can wear "drunk goggles" and try to play simple hand-eye coordination games such as basketball and cornhole. They can also get behind the wheel of a virtual car to experience a drunk-driving simulation. Along with the games, video testimonials relate personal stories as told by drunk-driving survivors and offenders. The events are an engaging way to educate people about the potentially deadly dangers of drinking and driving.



Outreach event setups

More than 22,500 people interacted with trained brand ambassadors at the outreach events, 993 Uber gift cards were distributed resulting in over \$13,000 worth of rideshares, and 431 visitors completed the Public Outreach Feedback Survey conducted onsite. Information gathered through the survey from participants has helped to shape campaign activities, media platforms, and target audiences moving forward.

Partnerships

Partnerships are critical to expanding the reach of the campaign. Traffic safety specialists (TSSs), public information officers (PIOs), law enforcement agencies, and other community partners such as U in the Driver Seat, Teen in the Driver Seat, Texas A&M AgriLife, The University of Texas at Austin, Texas Tech, and Texas A&M University all worked together to promote campaign messages and make the campaign a success.

With access to our digital campaign toolkit, partners were encouraged to share social media posts, attend and promote events, and download print collateral to help reach a larger audience and bring awareness to the campaign. TSSs also ordered physical print collateral such as posters, notepads, mesh banners, greeting cards, and info cards—and helped distribute materials locally.

A separate digital campaign toolkit was also created for Texas law enforcement agencies to promote each campaign during heightened enforcement periods. It included social posts, images and video, print collateral for download, and a press release template for local use.

Overall Campaign Value

Earned media resulted in \$15,020,957.00 in added value and 206,167,731 impressions. Paid media match resulted in \$6,965,393.00 in added value and 411,042,684 impressions. In total, the Statewide Impaired Driving Campaign delivered \$21,986,350.00 in added value with its \$3,764,986.99 investment.

FY 2024 Pedestrian Safety Campaign October 2023–September 2024

Traffic crashes involving pedestrians are more likely than other roadway crashes to result in serious injuries or fatalities as people on foot lack the protective equipment common to vehicles such as airbags and seat belts. Although pedestrians were involved in only 1% of crashes in Texas in 2022, they accounted for 19% of all traffic deaths.

From 2018 through 2022, pedestrian traffic fatalities in Texas increased 29.6%, mirroring an alarming rise in pedestrian deaths nationally. In 2022 alone, more than 5,700 traffic crashes in Texas involved pedestrians, and they resulted in 829 fatalities and 1,526 serious injuries.

Crash reports indicate that the most common factors in traffic incidents involving pedestrians in Texas are 1) pedestrians failing to yield the right of way and putting themselves in the path of oncoming vehicles, 2) drivers failing to yield the right of way to pedestrians, 3) driver inattention, and 4) motorists driving too fast. In addition, alcohol impairment was reported in 29% of fatal pedestrian crashes in 2022.

The *Be Safe. Drive Smart. / Be Safe. Walk Smart.* FY 2024 campaign activities were concentrated during National Pedestrian Safety Month in October 2023. Fall gives Texans a much-needed reprieve from the summer heat, but the change in seasons also brings fewer daylight hours, making it harder for drivers to see pedestrians and keep them safe. This makes it an especially relevant time of the year to remind motorists and pedestrians to pay attention and look out for each other on the road.

The campaign combined paid media with public relations and outreach components to deliver safety messages to target audiences throughout the state and included the following:

- A six-week, bilingual paid media flight in all Texas media markets with television, radio, outdoor, digital, transit, theater, and gas station TV advertising (GSTV).
- News releases in English and Spanish and media pitching to news outlets around the state to maximize earned media coverage.
- Distribution of public education materials to TxDOT district offices and campaign partners.

- Multiple street team “walking billboard” activations in 10 TxDOT districts, delivering safety messages in high traffic areas where drivers and people on foot would see them.

By educating the public about the importance of traffic behaviors that keep pedestrians safe, TxDOT intends to reduce the number of pedestrian-involved traffic crashes, fatalities, and injuries.

Creative Overview

TxDOT’s creative campaign for pedestrian safety features a character named Mr. Rhodes (Sr. Calles in Spanish) who jumps into traffic situations to ensure that people who are driving or walking are making safe choices. In TV and radio spots his sunny outlook, good humor, and enthusiastic celebrations when a driver or pedestrian does the right thing reflect the fact that the people he encounters don’t want to hurt anyone or get hurt. But they do need reminders to stay alert and follow basic rules of the road.



Mr. Rhodes/Sr. Calles can also be seen in social media posts and outreach materials urging drivers and pedestrians to watch out for one another.

Out-of-home creative for billboards and transit ads delivered specific reminders about how to be safe on the road, including stopping for pedestrians in crosswalks and waiting for walk signals before crossing the street. Spanish-language creative materials included the following taglines: *Maneja Listo. Maneja Seguro.* (for drivers) and *Camina Listo. Camina Seguro.* (for pedestrians).

Paid Media

The campaign's six-week, multiplatform paid media flight combined high-frequency TV ads to generate broad awareness with radio and out-of-home placements to reach drivers in their vehicles and pedestrians walking down the street, when the safety messages are particularly relevant. For paid digital media, emphasis was placed on video ads on online and mobile platforms and connected TV devices (CTV) to capture audience attention and engagement with the messages.

Spanish ads were distributed for most media placements to support the campaign's efforts to reach bilingual Texans and the 20% of Hispanics in the state who are Spanish-language-dominant.

The paid media campaign, with messages targeting drivers and pedestrians, launched October 2, 2023, in all Texas media markets and delivered more than 435 million impressions.

Public Relations Activities

TxDOT kicked off National Pedestrian Safety Month with a statewide news release in English and Spanish, reminding drivers that pedestrians are our most vulnerable road users and can be harder to see as days get shorter in the fall. October was a deadly month for pedestrians in 2022, with 87 pedestrians dying in traffic crashes and another 151 seriously injured.

The campaign's press kit also included a B-roll package highlighting key safety tips for drivers and pedestrians and pre-recorded soundbites featuring Misael Rico and his mother, Maria Espinoza, who were struck by a distracted driver when Misael was 6 years old. Misael's recovery story and his mother's emotional account of the crash offered a powerful, personal perspective on the long-term consequences of a pedestrian crash.

To prepare them for news interviews generated over the two-week media pitching period, TxDOT's district public information officers (PIOs) were armed with campaign talking points in English and Spanish.

Media relations efforts in October 2023 resulted in 330 TV and radio, 112 online, and 58 print news stories with a total earned media value of more than \$2.2 million.

Grassroots Outreach

Street Teams. TxDOT's pedestrian safety efforts also included a series of street team activations in the 10 TxDOT districts with the highest number of fatalities from pedestrian crashes in 2022. Four-person teams of "walking billboards" carried safety messages in English and Spanish at busy intersections and gathering areas in Austin, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, Lubbock, McAllen, Pharr, San Antonio, Tyler, and Waco.

October is National Pedestrian Safety Month

October had the highest number of pedestrian crashes in 2022, according to the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

"As we shift to fewer hours of daylight, it's up to drivers and pedestrians to adapt and help keep our roads safe," said TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams, in a statement. "Motorists need to stay alert and look for people walking, and pedestrians can take measures to be seen by



vulnerable road users. National Pedestrian Safety Month celebrates the right of everyone to walk or roll safely and reminds drivers of their responsibility to stay alert for pedestrians, cyclists and other vulnerable road users.

TxDOT's is using National Pedestrian Safety Month to continue its year-long "Be Safe. Drive Smart" statewide speeding prevention campaign and remind Texans that pedestrians are the most vulnerable road users. The cam-

TxDOT encourages drivers to stop and yield for pedestrians in crosswalks, yield the right of way to pedestrians while turning, be cautious when passing stopped buses, pay attention and put your phone away and follow the posted speed limit.

For pedestrians, TxDOT recommends crossing the street only at intersections and crosswalks, making eye contact with drivers before crossing, following all traffic and crosswalk signals, putting away all electronic devices that take your eyes and





The campaign used crash data and worked with traffic safety specialists (TSSs) in TxDOT’s district offices to identify 34 locations where pedestrian-vehicle crashes have occurred and the walking billboards would be highly visible to motorists and pedestrians, especially during morning and evening commute times.

Over a two-week period the street teams interacted with more than 10,000 people, and by distributing media advisories and inviting reporters to cover the street teams, TxDOT successfully leveraged these events to generate valuable earned media, including multiple live shots on local TV news.

The teams also conducted surveys to record the public’s feedback on the activations, collecting a total of 291 responses in English and Spanish.

Social Media. TxDOT produced organic posts for its Facebook and X feeds using the campaign’s TV spots and other creative assets. Street team images were also provided to district PIOs to use to promote the activities on district X accounts.

Print Collateral. The campaign updated its bilingual pedestrian safety information card and poster featuring spokes-character Mr. Rhodes/Sr. Calles and distributed thousands of them to TSSs across the state to support grassroots education and outreach.

FY 2024 Speeding Public Education and Awareness Campaign October 2023–September 2024

Motorists driving over the speed limit or too fast for road conditions were top contributors to sharp increases in roadway deaths in Texas during the Covid pandemic. Texas was not alone, and to tackle the national problem the NHTSA implemented a strategy that includes an annual speed limit enforcement mobilization. In 2022, TxDOT launched its new statewide campaign focused on persuading drivers to slow down to save lives. To reinforce that driving too fast can be dangerous *and* expensive, TxDOT also has partnered with law enforcement agencies across the state to help them step up their efforts to enforce speed limits in July during Operation Slowdown.

We know from observational studies and self-reporting by Texas drivers that speeding is common. According to TxDOT's 2023 Traffic Safety Awareness Survey, about half of Texans admit to driving over the speed limit at least sometimes. In addition, 12% said they drive faster than the speed limit on highways "most of the time." This is even though nearly 75% said their chances of getting a ticket if they speed are somewhat or very likely.

With too many motorists continuing to drive too fast and aggressively, speed remains the number one contributing factor in traffic crashes in our state. In 2023, one in three people killed on the road in Texas was in a crash that involved speed. There were 161,737 speed-related crashes that year, resulting in 1,456 deaths and 5,980 serious injuries.



TxDOT's multimedia speeding campaign in FY 2024 included robust levels of paid media, public relations, and outreach aimed at reminding drivers that:

- When you speed, you increase the risk of killing or injuring yourself or others in a crash.
- Speeding puts not only motor vehicle occupants at risk, but also vulnerable road users such as pedestrians, bicyclists, and roadside workers.

- Speeding can cost you an expensive fine and higher insurance premium.
- Driving a safe speed can mean more than following the posted limit. You should match your speed to road, traffic, and weather conditions.

If motorists can be convinced to always drive a safe speed, fewer people will be killed or seriously injured in crashes that could have been prevented in the first place.

Key campaign components in FY 2024 included the following:

- Statewide paid media placements: television, radio, outdoor, theater, gas station advertising (GSTV), and digital media.
- A kickoff press conference with law enforcement and other campaign partners, news releases in English and Spanish, and a statewide media tour to generate hundreds of broadcast, online, and print news stories.
- Sports marketing partnerships with racetracks and minor league baseball teams, including in-venue signage, digital ads, and event activations for one-on-one engagement with sports fans.
- Distribution of public education materials to TxDOT district offices and partners.

Paid Media

Since speeding is the top contributing factor in traffic crashes in our state, it calls for steady reminders to motorists to slow down or risk paying the consequences. More than 75% of the campaign’s budget was devoted to paid media placements that reached Texas motorists when they were watching TV, behind the wheel, online, putting gas in their vehicle, or at a movie theater or sporting event.

Although speeding is a problem among all demographic groups, the campaign put a special focus on young drivers who are overrepresented in speeding-related crashes and routinely engage in other risky behaviors when driving. In 2023, more than half of drivers in Texas who were involved in crashes where speed was a factor were under age 35 and 60% were men. We communicated with young drivers through demographically and behaviorally targeted sports marketing, streaming connected TV (CTV) placements, and video ads on YouTube and dating apps.

The campaign also partnered with three social media influencers—stunt driver/mechanic Lauryn Pritchard (@lldrifts), race car driver Jesse Iwuji (@jesse_iwuji), and car wrapping artist

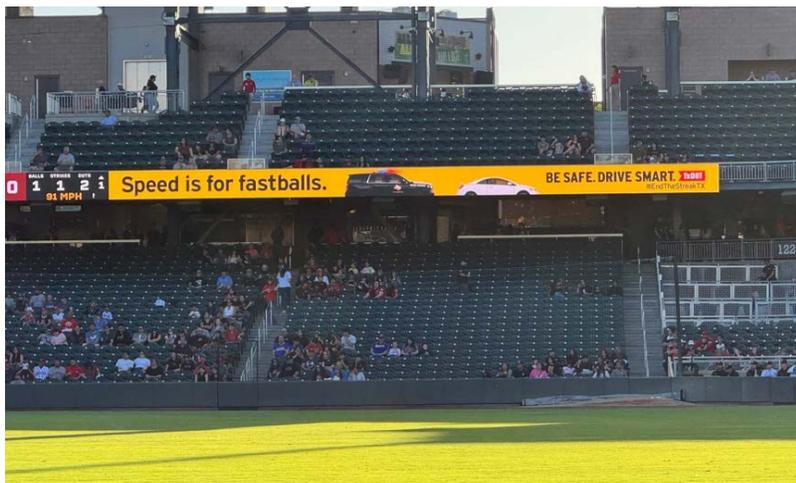


Jay the Wrap Specialist (@jaythewrapspecialist)—who posted videos of themselves on Instagram calling on their fans to slow down. Combined, their posts garnered a total of 440,773 organic and boosted views.



With a very passionate and loyal fan base, motorsports is one of the largest of spectator sports. Our media plan featured ongoing partnerships with auto racing venues in Texas, a natural spot to remind drivers that speeding is only for racetracks, not streets and highways. The program included Texas Motor Speedway (the largest sporting facility in Texas), Circuit of The Americas, Heart O' Texas Speedway, and Texas Motorplex—all located near big cities and drawing visitors from across their regions and the state.

Seven minor league baseball teams across Texas, from the Corpus Christi Hooks to the El Paso Chihuahuas, also displayed campaign signage and videos in their ballparks throughout the 2024 season.

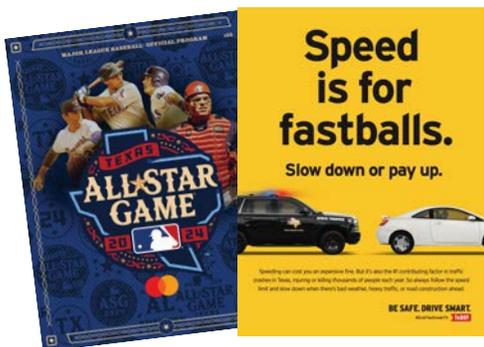

Creative Overview

Changing behaviors when it comes to traffic safety can take both raising awareness of the deadly consequences that can result from a crash and the threat of an expensive ticket. One set of TV spots for the campaign capitalizes on the double meaning of the phrase “see the light” to evoke the anxiety associated with seeing a patrol car’s flashing lights in the rearview mirror and realizing some of the negative consequences of speeding.

A second set of spots ties into the high visibility speed limit enforcement period, Operation Slowdown, and lets Texans know that officers are out in force looking for speeders. Drivers should be ready to “slow down or pay up” since they never know when someone from highway patrol may appear.



"Surprise, Surprise" TV spot

The 30- and 15-second TV spots, produced in English and Spanish, ran on broadcast TV, cable, CTV, movie theater screens, YouTube, dating apps, social media, gas pump screens, and videoboards at racetracks and ballparks in 2024.

TxDOT’s *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* umbrella branding—*Maneja Listo. Maneja Seguro.* in Spanish—was incorporated into all campaign creative, including billboards that advised drivers throughout the state to be mindful of their speed or face the consequences.

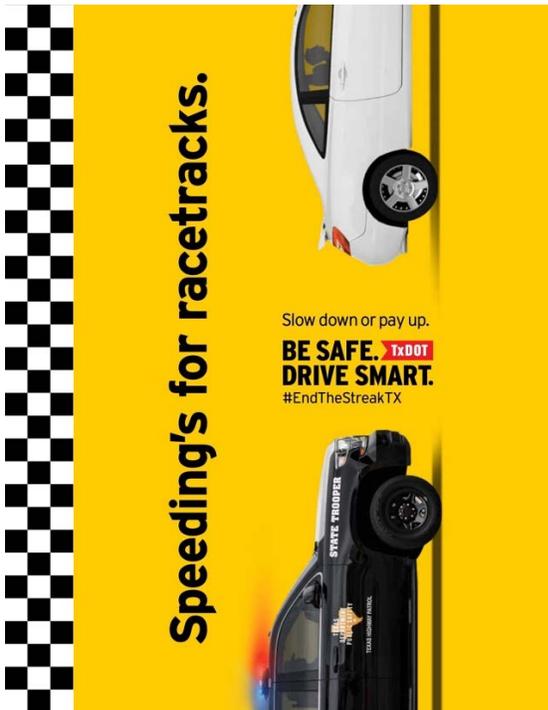

Billboards

Customized messaging for printed and LED signage at racetracks and minor league baseball parks reminded sports fans that speeding isn't for public roadways and that they shouldn't race home. Placements included billboards around the tracks/ballparks, concession area signs, marquees, program ads, parking lot exit signs, and racetrack guardwalls. The partnership with Texas Motor Speedway also included campaign-branded wraps of two pace cars, signage on parking lot trams, and asphalt markings along pit row.

Public Relations Activities

The campaign's aggressive earned media efforts encompassed the following:

- A press conference to kick off the summer campaign.
- Distribution of a news release and digital media kit to generate news stories in all Texas markets.
- Media availabilities at campaign appearances with NASCAR driver Ross Chastain.
- Media alerts to draw coverage of the campaign's outreach events at racetracks and Buc-ee's convenience store locations.

The summer statewide campaign launched with a press event in Austin on July 16. With officers from police departments in the metro area and the Texas Department of Public Safety in attendance, TxDOT announced its support for Operation Slowdown, the 17-day statewide stepped-up speeding enforcement period. The event also included an emotional personal story from a Lubbock woman whose mother was killed when her vehicle was struck by a young man driving twice the speed limit on a city street.



Following the press event, a statewide news release, supporting B-roll package, and sound bites were distributed to enlist the help of local news directors and reporters in raising awareness of Texas' speeding problem and encouraging motorists to always drive a safe speed. TxDOT's public information officers were provided with campaign talking points to prepare for news interviews, and the news release and talking points were translated for Spanish-language media and interviews.

The campaign's PR team also planned and promoted two appearances by campaign partner Ross Chastain, a NASCAR Cup Series driver, prior to his races at Circuit of The Americas and Texas Motor Speedway. At each event, Chastain drew hundreds of fans to TxDOT's activation area, spoke to them about the importance of driving a safe speed on Texas roadways so everyone gets home safely, and autographed his "hero cards" customized with campaign messaging.

Statewide and local media pitching activities in FY 2024 resulted in 338 TV, radio, online, and print news stories with a total earned media value of \$2,231,040.53.

Grassroots Outreach

Events. The *Be Safe. Drive Smart.* Road Show Trailer visited two major racetracks during NASCAR race weekends in the spring and seven Buc-ee's locations around the state in July. The campaign negotiated free placement of the trailer at Buc-ee's convenience stores, which are an efficient way to reach thousands of drivers and their passengers during the busy summer driving season. Speeding campaign messages were integrated into video displays, signage, and educational materials distributed by campaign brand ambassadors and TxDOT traffic safety specialists (TSSs). Visitors to the trailer were also invited to answer traffic safety quizzes, engage with virtual reality games, and provide feedback about the event and their speeding concerns via a public outreach survey conducted in English and Spanish. TxDOT collected 207 survey responses at the July events.

Social Media. A series of posts using the campaign’s TV spots and other video assets were developed for TxDOT’s social media profiles on Facebook and X, in addition to the videos created and shared by the social media influencers.



Digital Toolkit. Before the campaign’s summer launch, TSSs were provided with a flyer outlining paid and earned media activities and a digital toolkit of materials to use for local outreach. The kit included campaign creative, an event schedule, social media assets, and print collateral.



Overall Campaign Value

Earned media resulted in \$2,231,040.53 in added value and 22,814,411 impressions. Paid media generated \$2,174,758.00 in added value and 439,688,148 impressions. With \$4,405,798.53 in total added value, the Speeding Awareness campaign delivered more than a 1.5:1 return on the \$2,903,368.94 investment.

FY 2024 *Talk. Text. Crash.* Distracted Driving Campaign
October 1, 2023 – September 30, 2024

Campaign Overview

Like many other states, Texas has seen far too many crashes caused by distracted drivers. According to Texas Department of Transportation crash data reports, there were 94,330 crashes blamed on driver distractions in 2023. These crashes resulted in 399 deaths and 2,793 serious injuries. While serious injuries declined by almost 1% from 2022 and fatalities decreased by almost 18%, far too many Texans die in preventable crashes each year. That’s why TxDOT needs to continue conducting its annual *Talk. Text. Crash.* public education campaign to remind motorists how dangerous it is to engage in distracting activities while driving such as talking on their phone, texting, checking social media, eating, applying makeup or shaving, programming their GPS, or doing something else that takes their mind or eyes off the road.

Public Education Campaign

The *Talk. Text. Crash.* campaign for FY 2024 used a combination of paid media placements, public service announcements, grassroots outreach and partnerships, media relations, and organic social media to reach a statewide audience and motivate drivers to avoid distractions—especially cell phone use—when behind the wheel. Although the campaign’s message is relevant to all drivers, a special focus was reaching new and younger drivers ages 16 to 34, who account for a large share of distracted driving crashes.

The campaign developed new print collateral, radio, and out-of-home ads built off "Cell Phone Man" videos developed previously for the campaign.

The tagline "Eyes off me and on the road." reminds drivers they have a choice of when and how they use their cell phone.

Statewide Awareness Survey

From April 10 through April 18, 2024, Sherry Matthews Group implemented a statewide online survey among 304 Texans who drive. A minimum of 75 surveys were conducted among key segments including English-speaking Hispanics; drivers ages 18–22, 23–29, and 30–34; men and women; and those who text, email, or talk (not hands-free) regularly or sometimes. Overall, the survey showed little change in drivers' knowledge of distracted driving laws and awareness of the dangers of distracted driving as compared to the year prior.

Top survey findings:

- 62% of drivers think they are above-average drivers, but only 53% follow all traffic laws. Those who more often drive distracted are less likely to follow all traffic laws (40%). They also engage regularly in a myriad of distracting behaviors.
- 64% know that texting while driving is banned on all Texas roads, but 23% believe they will only get a warning if caught on the first occurrence.
- Almost everyone is engaging in some sort of distracted driving, and many believe there are activities they can do safely. Only 11% say none of these distractions can be done safely while driving.
- While only 11% believe they can read or send a text or email safely while driving and 77% are not comfortable with others doing so, 38% read or send texts or emails sometimes or regularly while driving.
- While most drivers agree built-in devices are distracting (78%), 80% also believe that if they were that dangerous, these technologies would be illegal.
- The good news is many report being willing to put away or silence their phone while driving or use a rewards app to stop texting and driving. Fewer are very willing to turn off their phone or use apps to block calls while driving.
- "Talk. Text. Crash." has the second-highest aided awareness levels at 56%, only behind "Text later. It can wait." at 70%.

Public Service Announcement (PSA) Distribution

To maximize limited funds and to extend the reach of the campaign, television and radio PSAs were redistributed to stations statewide to air messages for free beginning April 1

and running through the end of September. The PSAs were digitally tracked using Nielsen encoding systems that report which stations aired the messages, the audience reached, and the value of the donated airtime.

Donated media or media match achieved through PSAs totaled \$4,051,871 in FY 2024. Media vendors donated 21,609 TV ad airings and 5,927 radio ad airings. The TV PSAs aired in the following Texas markets:

Paid Media Recap

The 2024 *Talk. Text. Crash.* paid media campaign focused on drivers ages 16 to 34 statewide. Advertising was concentrated during the month of April, in coordination with the campaign’s primary grassroots activities for the year. Spanish-language ads delivered messages to bilingual and Spanish-dominant Hispanics.

TxDOT placed \$651,648 in paid media. Donated media or media match totaled \$207,404 in FY 2024 from outdoor advertising through billboard and gas station overrides.

Earned Media and Events

Earned media activities for FY 2024 began with the distribution of a statewide news release to recognize Distracted Driving Awareness Month in April. On April 2, TxDOT held a press conference and its first outreach event, followed by five more outreach events during the month. Outreach events were staged at universities and malls across Texas to engage with teens, their parents, and other drivers. Although the events were primarily intended for one-on-one interactions with the public, local news media were also invited to cover them and schedule interviews with TxDOT spokespeople. The events featured a driving simulator to give participants a real-life sense of how distractions affect driving. Campaign brand ambassadors also distributed educational materials to remind everyone to give driving their full attention.

The interactive exhibits exposed the campaign’s messaging to more than 64,700 visitors. In addition, more than 6,370 people interacted directly with our brand ambassadors or tried the driving simulator to experience firsthand the dangers of distracted driving. TxDOT promoted the April outreach tour through local media advisories and interview opportunities with its Public Information Officers.

Altogether, earned media activities in FY 2024 generated 121 broadcast news segments valued at \$566,612. They also generated 65 online news stories valued at \$834,262 and 130 print articles valued at \$98,130. The total impressions delivered exceeded 20.4 million and a news coverage publicity value of \$1,499,003.

Social Media

In FY 2024, the campaign enlisted the help of influencers to help spread messages via their social media followers. Several influencers were vetted and approved to participate in the campaign. Each influencer presented a concept and, upon its approval, produced the social media post for TxDOT’s final review. The table below shows the results of the influencer effort.

FY 2024 *Look Twice for Motorcycles* Campaign October 1, 2023 – September 30, 2024

Campaign Overview

In FY 2024, the *Look Twice for Motorcycles* campaign continued its mission to reduce crashes, injuries, and fatalities involving motorcyclists on Texas roads.

In 2023, there were 8,726 motorcycle traffic crashes in Texas, which killed 599 motorcyclists and seriously injured another 2,483 (Texas Peace Officer's Crash Report – April 4, 2024). This represents a 7% increase in fatalities over 2022. For the purposes of this report, we will refer to all classes of motorcycles and scooters as “motorcycles.”

This increase in fatalities underscores the importance of reminding motorists to pay special attention for motorcycles when driving. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), motorcyclist fatalities occurred nearly 22 times more frequently than passenger car occupant fatalities in motor vehicle crashes (Traffic Safety Facts, July 2024, NHTSA 2022 data).

Diagnosing the Problem

Intersections continue to be deadly for motorcyclists. In 2023, 37% of motorcycle fatalities occurred in an intersection or were intersection-related (Texas Peace Officer's Crash Report – April 4, 2024). In *Analysis of Motorcycle Crashes in Texas, 2010–2017*, the Texas A&M Transportation Institute (TTI) concluded that the crash type in which one vehicle turning left and one vehicle traveling straight in the opposite (oncoming) direction accounted for 39% of fatal or suspected serious injury crashes at intersections.

Public Education Campaign

For these reasons, TxDOT has made motorcycle safety a priority by continuing its public education campaign aimed at motorists. TxDOT’s *Share the Road: Look Twice for Motorcycles* campaign urges drivers to watch carefully for motorcycles. Launched in 2010, this campaign seeks to remind motorists that they must take extra precautions to “see” motorcycles on the road.

The campaign urges drivers to:

- Look twice for motorcycles, especially at intersections.
- Always assume motorcycles are closer than they appear to be, and avoid turning in front of an oncoming motorcycle.
- Use turn signals and check blind spots before changing lanes.
- Don't follow a motorcycle too closely and give motorcyclists a full lane when passing.
- Obey posted speed limits.

Since FY 2016, TxDOT has cultivated a strong, recognizable brand built on the taglines "There's a life riding on it." and "Look twice for motorcycles." The campaign uses a bold yellow/gold color that's quickly identifiable. In the past, the campaign has incorporated virtual reality (VR) elements into outreach events to engage audiences. These VR experiences were updated for the 2023 campaign season to run on the latest PICO VR operating system. A TV spot developed in 2012 continues to be popular, emphasizing the importance of taking special care to look twice for motorcycles since they're hard to see. In addition, a new TV spot was developed in 2021 to emphasize how dangerous intersections can be. Campaign components also included radio public service announcements (PSAs), billboards, online advertising, social media, and earned media activities.

The FY 2024 bilingual, multimedia campaign:

- Continued to use clear messaging and strong creative executions to reach and resonate with key target audiences.
- Included a statewide awareness and education effort focusing on key target audiences concentrated in May to capitalize on Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month.
- Used a combination of paid media and PSAs to maximize exposure of campaign messages.
- Conducted an aggressive public relations effort that included prerecorded sound bite interviews and pitches to news media statewide to maximize earned media coverage.
- Conducted five outreach events across the state to generate additional awareness of campaign messages.
- Built upon existing TxDOT relationships with public and private partners to maximize reach and distribution of collateral materials and campaign messaging.
- Exceeded the minimum requirement of \$650,000 in added value by more than \$8.8 million.

Public Service Announcement Distribution

To maximize limited funds and to extend the reach of the campaign, television and radio PSAs were tracked for the entire fiscal year but redistributed to stations statewide to increase participation as part of Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month in May. The PSAs were digitally tracked using Nielsen encoding systems that report

which stations aired the messages, the audience reached, and the value of the donated airtime.

Paid Media

TxDOT’s FY 2024 paid media campaign targeted drivers ages 18–54 in both English and Spanish statewide, with emphasis in the twelve markets with the most motorcycle crashes. The campaign ran mobile banner ads, pre-roll video, Pandora digital radio, and mid-roll and pre-roll videos on YouTube. It also engaged a social

media influencer to help spread messages via their followers. In FY 2024, based on heat map motorcycle crash data, we expanded the billboard markets from 11 to 12. The digital paid media campaign ran May 1–15 with messages focused on reminding motorists to take extra precautions to look for motorcycles.

TxDOT placed \$268,953 in paid media throughout the fiscal year. The total added value achieved through negotiations with media vendors equaled \$165,307 and includes billboard overrides and negotiated lower monthly rates.

Creative Overview

The *Look Twice for Motorcycles* campaign seeks to remind motorists that they must take extra precautions to “see” motorcycles on the road. The campaign urges drivers to look twice for motorcycles, especially at intersections; always assume motorcycles are closer than they appear; avoid turning in front of an oncoming motorcycle; use turn signals and check blind spots before changing lanes; avoid

following a motorcycle too closely; give motorcyclists a full lane; and obey posted speed limits.

In FY 2024, the campaign continued running the “Invisible” and “Pictures” TV PSAs developed in English and Spanish. Radio ads and out-of-home elements were also part of the campaign. New billboards were designed to emphasize looking twice for motorcycles.

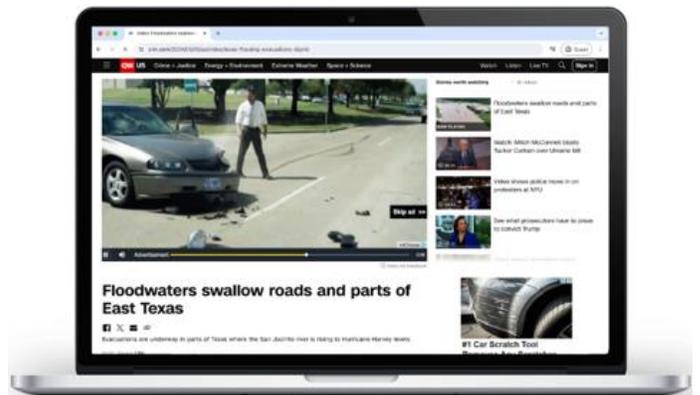

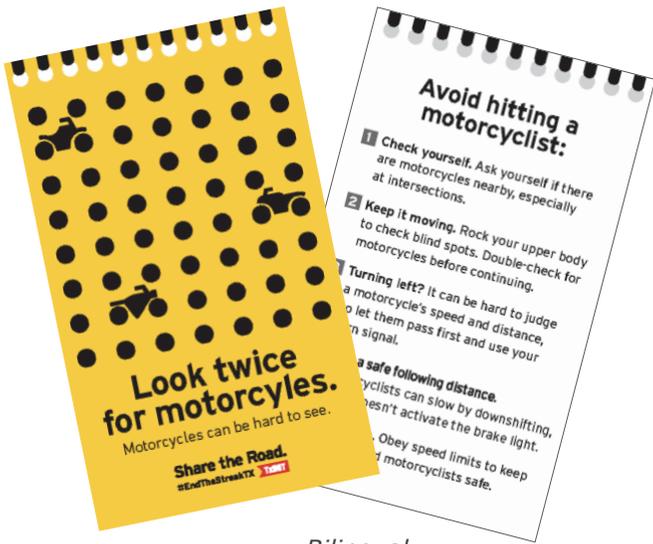

Public Relations and Outreach

In FY 2024, grassroots marketing events were held in Bastrop, Frisco, El Paso, Katy, and New Braunfels in partnership with minor league baseball teams and Buc-ee's. The events featured a newly updated virtual reality motorcycle and Camaro game and an oversized inflatable motorcycle. Combined, these events resulted in 32,232 engagements with exhibit components and 2,708 interactions with event staff. To support earned media efforts, the campaign created digital press kits with press releases and a fact sheet as well as talking points for TxDOT's public information officers.

The media events and news releases generated 158 TV and radio news segments valued at \$2,703,984, 51 print articles valued at \$1,054,621, and 59 online news stories valued at \$1,967,605. Combined, earned media in broadcast, print, and online coverage generated nearly 46 million impressions and \$5,726,209 in public relations value for the campaign.



Social Media Influencers and Partnerships

In FY 2024, the campaign enlisted the help of influencer Lauryn Pritchard to help spread messages via her social media followers after she was vetted and approved to participate in the campaign. She presented a concept and, once it was approved, created the social media post for final TxDOT approval.

Lauryn's post produced 674,000 impressions; 166 clicks; 22,577 likes; 120,111 completed views, and 186,380 involvements.*

Overall Campaign Value

Earned media resulted in \$5,726,209 in added value and 45,928,666 impressions. Paid media match resulted in \$165,307 in added value and 95,866,896 impressions. Public service announcements match resulted in \$2,971,251 in added value and 83,499,021 impressions.

The statewide *Look Twice for Motorcycles* campaign delivered \$8,862,767 in total added value on the \$650,000 investment.

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2024 TEXAS TRAFFIC SAFETY ATTITUDE and AWARENESS SURVEY

SUMMARY OF KEY FINDINGS

- Just over half of respondents surveyed (52.2 percent) had read, seen or heard a message about alcohol impaired driving enforcement by police in the preceding 30 days. Perceived likelihood of arrest for impaired driving was higher than being cited for speeding or not wearing a seat belt.
- The Click It or Ticket message remains the most highly recognized of 12 traffic safety campaign messages used in Texas, with 84 percent of respondents saying they had seen or heard it within the past year.
- Over 60 percent of respondents had read, heard, or seen a seat belt enforcement message in the past year, and 88 percent of respondents believed there is some likelihood of a citation for seat belt law non-compliance. Ninety-five percent of respondents reported they always or nearly always use seat belts.
- Perception of speed enforcement is relatively high, with 73 percent thinking the chances of being cited for speeding is very or somewhat likely. Yet, approximately 50 percent of survey respondents said they speed on local roads and highways at least sometimes, and approximately 12 percent said regularly. Sixteen percent of the sample said their tendency to speed had increased in the past year, with primary reasons given as being in a hurry more often and because others are speeding.
- Self-reported cell phone use among drivers is most common relative to other traffic safety risk behaviors. Over 28 percent (28.2 percent) of respondents said they had sometimes or regularly talked on their cell phone while driving during the past month.
- Self-reported texting while driving was reported by 18 percent of respondents who said they had sometimes or regularly read or sent a text message in the past 30 days while driving.
- Lowest reported risky driving behavior was driving through a crosswalk occupied by a pedestrian. Eighty-two percent of respondents had not done so in the past 30 days.
- Texans surveyed are most familiar with the seat belt law requirement for use in all seating positions, with 82.6 percent answering correctly. They are less familiar with the texting ban as applicable to all roads, with 70 percent answering correctly. They are less knowledgeable as well with the Texas Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) limit of .08, with 52.8 percent checking the correct answer.
- The Texas Move Over or Slow Down law is misunderstood by a substantial number of

Texans, as indicated by the high percentage who associate the law with moving over to let faster moving or emergency vehicles pass.

- Thirty percent of respondents selected a response other than the correct statement that “Drivers are required by law to stop and yield for pedestrians in crosswalks.”

2024 TEXAS TRAFFIC SAFETY ATTITUDE and AWARENESS SURVEY

INTRODUCTION

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) contracted with the Texas A&M Transportation Institute (TTI) to conduct a 2010 baseline survey and follow-up surveys in subsequent years to track driver attitudes and awareness of traffic safety programs in Texas. The Governors Highway Safety Association (GHSA) and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) recommend this type survey for measuring performance goals developed and implemented through highway safety plans. A white paper that preceded federal regulations to establish minimum performance standards states that “surveys can provide valuable information from drivers or the general public that can’t be obtained any other way.” This information can include views on the priorities of various traffic safety issues and on potential law or policy changes, knowledge of laws and penalties, perceptions of enforcement, awareness of recent enforcement and media campaigns, and self-reported behavior. Therefore, NHTSA recommends a core set of questions and guidelines for conducting these type surveys.

TTI has followed the recommendations and developed a sampling plan and questionnaire that includes the core questions recommended by NHTSA. This report describes the survey methodology and provides results for the performance measurement survey conducted in 2024. Changes from earlier years’ survey results are also discussed.

SURVEY METHOD

Surveys conducted 2010 through 2019 used a recommended pen and paper, in-person survey method to collect data from customers at 18 sites throughout Texas in Driver License (DL) offices. This approach offered the advantage of access to a reasonably representative sample of drivers and a cost-effective return relative to other surveys for this type of data collection. Also, as pointed out in the NHTSA Driver Survey white paper, DL office surveys have low refusal rates (10-30 percent or less), and the core questions plus additional questions can be asked easily on one page front and back for a quick and efficient data collection effort.

In 2020, the survey method was changed because of lack of access to DL office lobby areas and restrictions against in-person data collection due to health risks of the COVID-19 pandemic. The survey was converted to an online format for data collection in 2020 and has remained online in subsequent years. The sample was generated from a survey panel as described in the next section.

Site/Sample Selection

With the shift from one survey method to another and the aim of using the awareness survey to measure changes over time, the importance of maintaining the comparability of the results and the variables measured was considered in designing the

new survey method for 2020 onward. Four factors under consideration contributed to sampling decisions: 1) retaining the survey's anonymous response characteristic; 2) assuring representation from the four geographic regions comparable to prior years; 3) a high response rate; and 4) the ability to conduct the survey within a similarly short timeframe at approximately the same cost as prior surveys.

The sample was provided by a third-party survey sampling firm, Marketing Systems Group (MSG). The firm drew from a statewide survey panel that is generated from the universe of Texas household residences. This statewide panel was divided into four regions and panelists were invited to participate in the survey from each region to obtain a quota equivalent to regional representation in prior years' samples.

The samples of 2010-2019 obtained from the DL office survey were convenient samples of Texas residents, rather than a random representative sample, meaning the sample of respondents came from a collection of individuals in locations in which access to the target population of driver customers was provided. A random representative sample would contain all the drivers in the state as a sampling pool from which respondents would be randomly drawn and surveyed. In this way, statistical error estimates and confidence intervals could be calculated. Due to time and budget constraints, however, TTI relied on the convenient sample to generate a sample size large enough to generate meaningful data from four regions of the state, rather than a truly random sample. Similarly, the 2024 sample is a convenient sample because the respondents were from a pool of willing participants who self-select to participate in survey panels online. Recruitment into the panel is much broader than the driver license customer pool, as all Texas households are included. Although the pool is larger and more inclusive, self-selection also removes the random representation and ability to perform probability estimates.

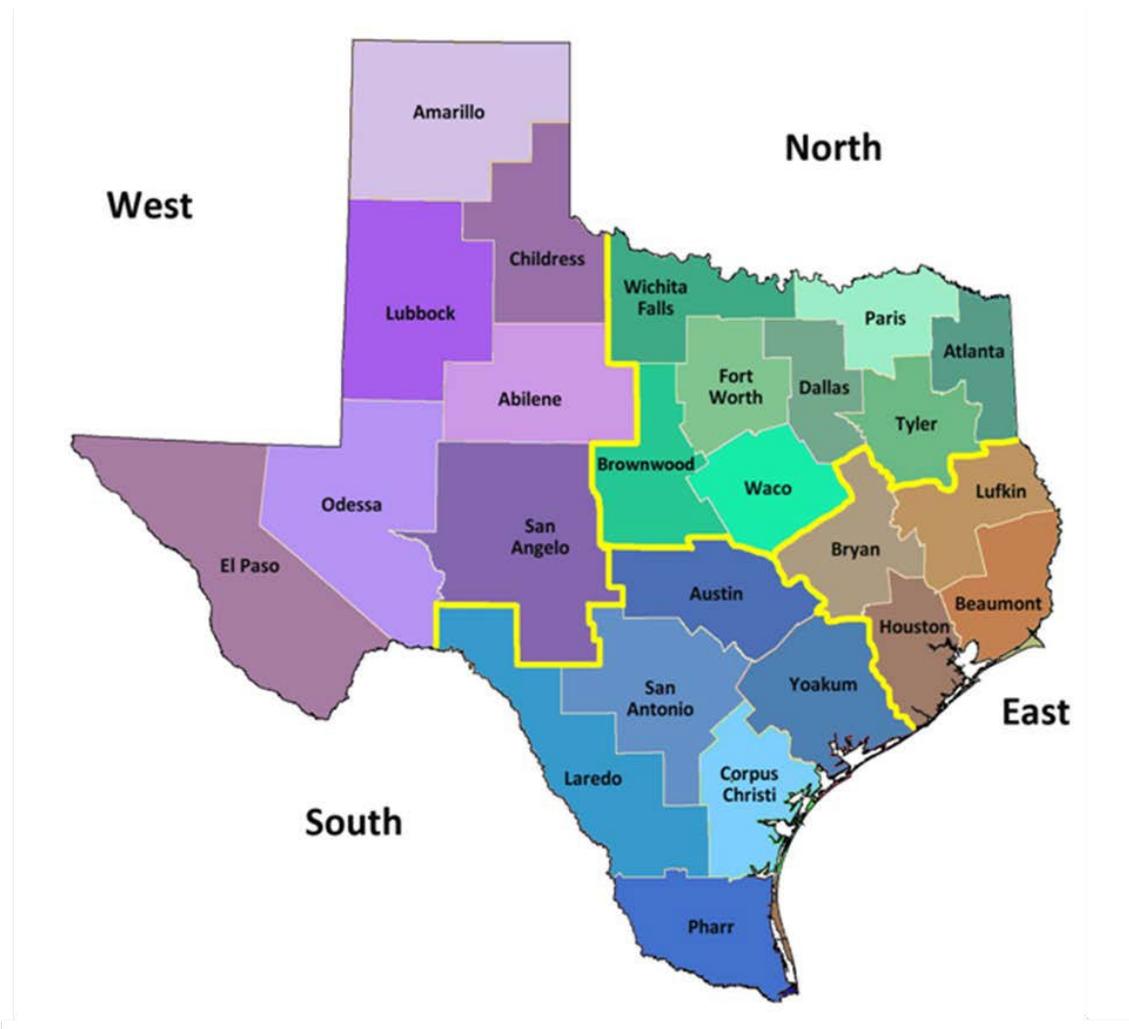


Figure 1. TxDOT Region Map

The 2010 baseline sampling plan considered that TxDOT grouped its 25 district offices into four regional areas for administrative purposes at the time. The map below (Figure 1) illustrates the four regions, which also formed the first level of the TTI survey sampling plan. Within each of the four regional areas, a target sample size of 625 was set, comparable to previous sample sizes in 2010-2023 surveys.

Questionnaire Development

The foundation of the survey instrument was the 10 core questions recommended by NHTSA, which are:

1. In the past 60 days, how many times have you driven a motor vehicle within 2 hours after drinking alcoholic beverages?
2. In the past 30 days, have you read, seen or heard anything about alcohol impaired driving (or drunk driving) enforcement by police?
3. What do you think the chances are of someone getting arrested if they drive after drinking?
4. How often do you use seat belts when you drive or ride in a car, van, SUV or pickup?
5. In the past 60 days, have you read, seen or heard anything about seat belt law enforcement by police?

6. What do you think the chances are of getting a ticket if you don't wear your seat belt?
7. On a local road with a speed limit of 30 mph, how often do you drive faster than 35 mph?
8. On a road with a speed limit of 65 mph, how often do you drive faster than 70 mph?
9. In the past 30 days, have you read, seen or heard anything about speed enforcement by police?
10. What do you think the chances are of getting a ticket if you drive over the speed limit?

Respondents were first screened for minimum age of 18 and residence in Texas for a minimum of 30 days. Texas adapted question #7 to roads in Texas, changing the reference to 70mph instead of 65mph, as rural state highways are more often 70mph. In 2014 a response choice was added to the questions with a temporal reference (questions #2, #3, and #4) to determine if respondents were aware of these activities within the past year. In addition to the core questions, seven questions for background/demographic information were included. An additional 22 questions related to traffic safety issues of specific interest to TxDOT were included on the questionnaire. A Spanish translation of the questionnaire was not available as all respondents were able to read English. The questionnaire is provided as Appendix A, along with the response percentages for each item.

Survey Administration

The survey was conducted July 19–26, 2024. This included weekdays and weekend days and the survey was accessible at all hours. Prior to survey launch, the questionnaire was previewed and pilot tested with TTI and MSG staff. A soft launch preceded full launch to assure responses were recorded properly and the survey was administered as designed.

A redirect to the end of the survey was coded into the questionnaire to limit the proportion of non-driver respondents. The filter was included inadvertently at the beginning of the survey timeframe rather than as needed when an acceptable percentage was reached. Therefore, an additional sample was acquired to include non-drivers, but their proportion in the total sample is smaller this year than in past iterations of the survey.

The protocol and questionnaire was reviewed and approved by the Institutional Review Board (IRB) at Texas A&M University. The IRB requires that an Information Sheet accompany the questionnaire for reference by the respondents as to their rights as survey research participants, and to inform them of the study intent and other details.

RESULTS

Characteristics of Survey Respondents

The total sample size goal of 2500 was achieved. Responses were checked to remove duplicates or disqualifying respondents. The resulting sample totaled 2627 respondents providing usable data. Table 1 provides the sample sizes for each region.

age and gender are from the 2020 Decennial Census and education is from the 2022 American Community Survey. The contribution to the sample of Whites and Blacks is slightly over-represented, being over seven percentage points higher than the Texas composition. Hispanics are under-represented in the sample by 11.7 percentage points. The sample includes a higher than State percentage of younger to middle-age respondents (22 to 45 years) and fewer seniors. These race/ethnicity and age characteristics may be closer to the characteristics of the Texas driving population than the general population and reflect a reasonable sample from which to draw general conclusions.

Core Question Responses

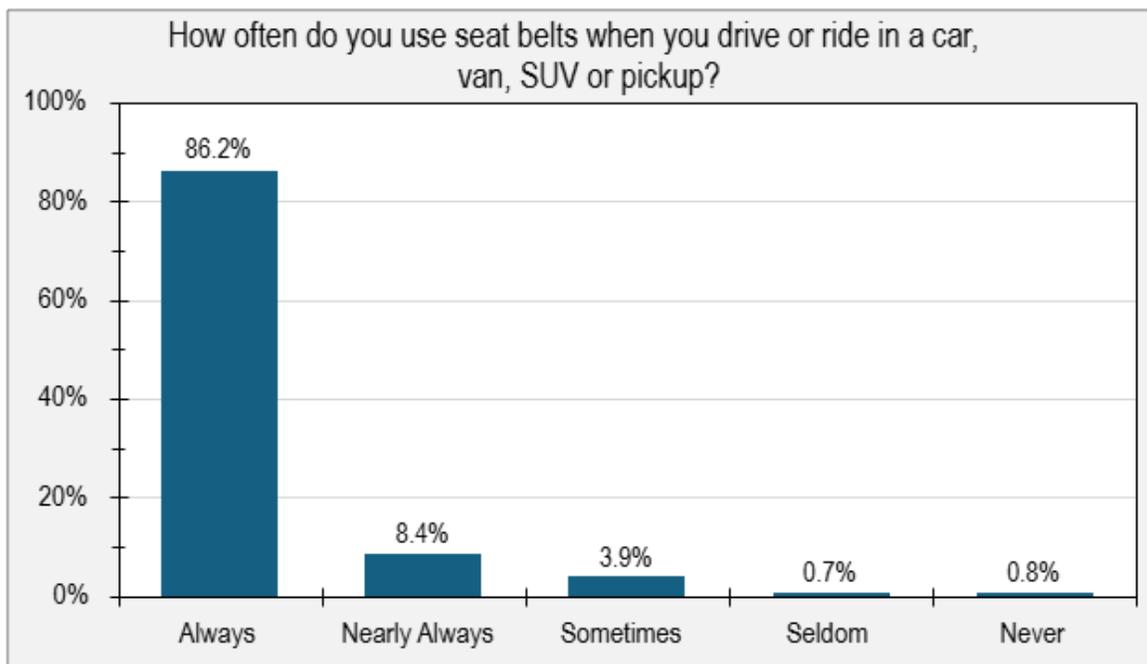


Figure 2. Frequency of Reported Seat Belt Use

As mentioned above, 10 core questions pertained to issues of interest at the federal, state, and local levels throughout the country, and performance-based criteria have been established to address the three major areas of impaired driving, safety belts, and speeding. Response percentages to the 10 core questions are displayed in Figures 2-11 and provided in Table 3.

As shown in Table 3, the 2024 response to the question, “Have you read, seen or heard anything about seat belt law enforcement in the past 60 days or recent summer months” was ‘Yes’ by 37.6 percent of respondents. This percentage of seat belt enforcement awareness marks the fourth consecutive year with an increase in awareness of increased enforcement following the Click It or Ticket mobilization. Although higher than its 2020 low of 23.4 percent, this year awareness is again below pre-COVID levels.

This year 43.0 percent of respondents said they had read, seen or heard about speed enforcement in the past 30 days. Speed enforcement awareness reached its lowest point in 2020, when the question yielded 25.9 percent, and awareness is now back to pre-COVID levels.

Enforcement efforts aimed at impaired driving within the past 30 days were recognized by the highest percentage of respondents among the three enforcement areas included in the survey. With over half of the respondents (52.2 percent) saying they had read, seen, or heard about alcohol impaired driving enforcement in recent months, the awareness increased for the fourth straight year. As shown in Table 3, an additional 26.4 percent recalled enforcement messages within the past year.

The responses show Texans think laws are more likely to be enforced for drinking and driving than for failure to wear a seat belt or speeding. The difference is most evident in the percentage of those who checked Very Likely that a citation or arrest would be made for a violation—64.7 percent checking Very Likely of arrest for drinking and driving, compared to 49.8 percent Very Likely of citation for speeding and 47.9 percent for not wearing a seat belt. The perception of a greater likelihood of being cited for impaired driving remains at the top of the list as it has for the past 14 years. This is the fifth year in a row, however, that the perception of a seat belt citation as Unlikely and Very Unlikely at 15 percent or higher.

Texans continue to self-report seat belt use at well over 90 percent who say they always or nearly always use seat belts. In 2024, as Figure 2 shows, 86.7% self-reported they always use their seat belt, and 8.4 percent said nearly always. Only 1.5 percent self-reported they seldom or never use seat belts when driving or riding in passenger vehicles.

Just over half of the respondents (50.2 percent) said they drive over the speed limit most of the time, about half the time, or sometimes on local roads (see Table 3 and Figure 8). Over 11 percent reported they exceed the speed limit on highways by 5 miles per hour most of the time, and an additional 12.6 percent said the driver over the limit half the time.

With regard to self-reported drinking and driving behavior, even though almost two-thirds of those surveyed (64.7 percent) thought the chances of someone getting arrested if they drive after drinking is very likely, 12.5 percent reported they had driven a motor vehicle within two hours of drinking alcoholic beverages.

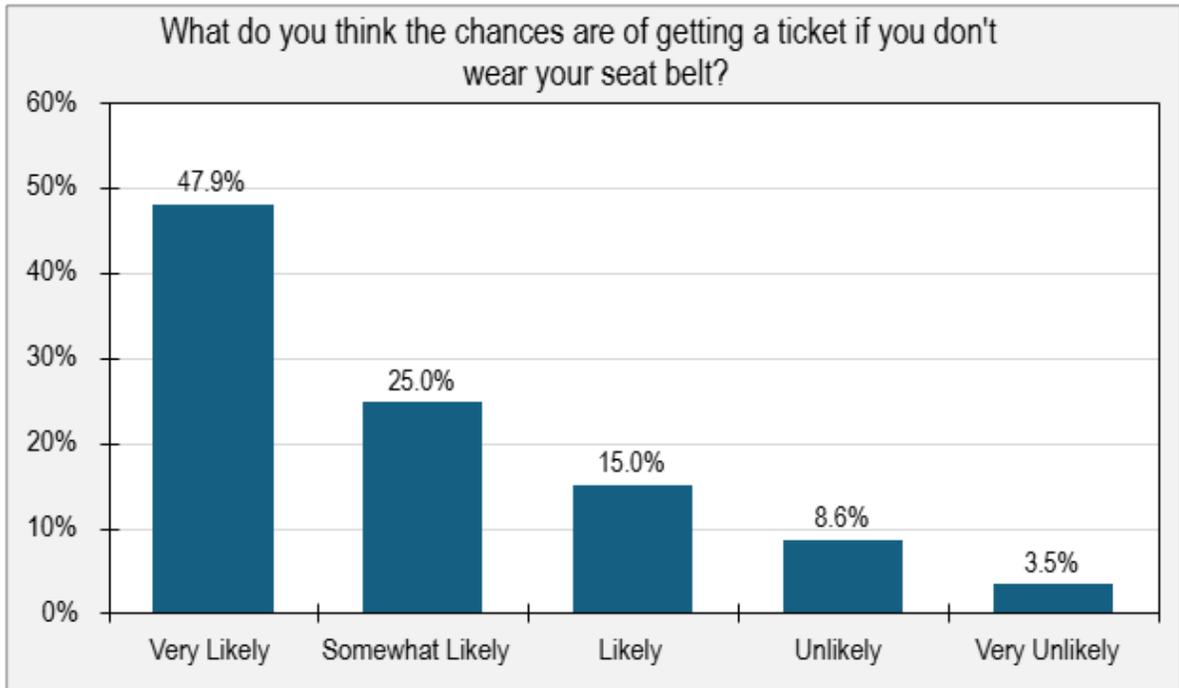


Figure 3. Perception of Seat Belt Enforcement

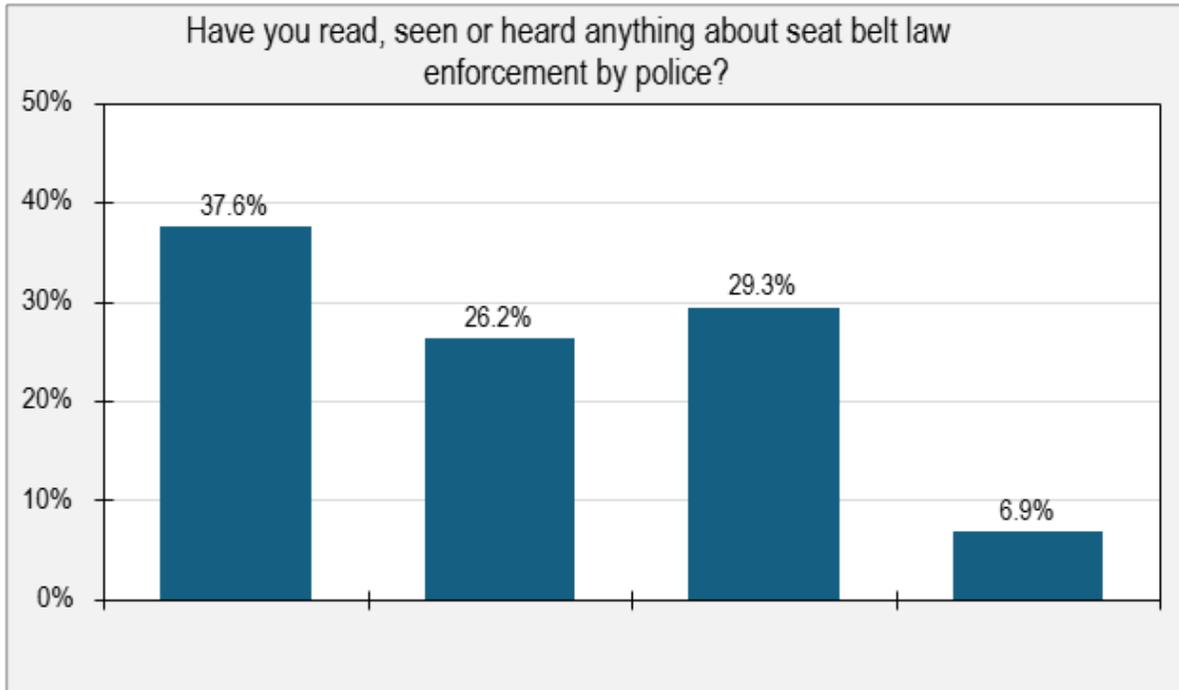


Figure 4. Awareness of Seat Belt Law Enforcement

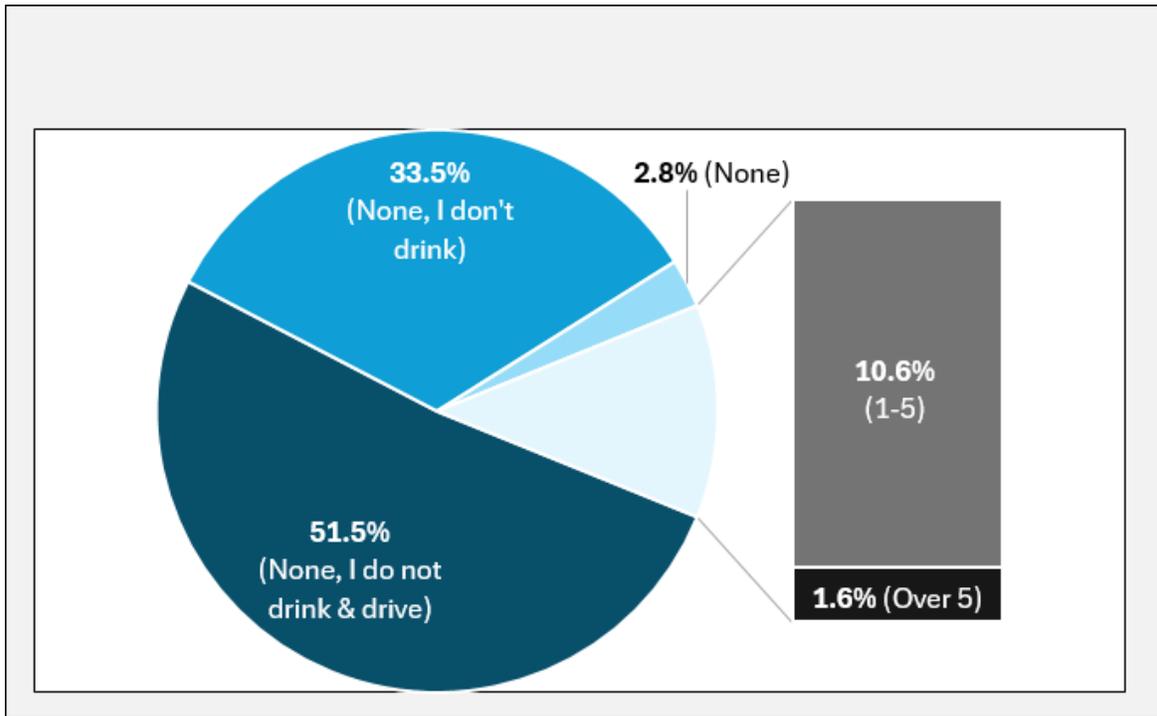


Figure 5. Self-Reported Driving After Drinking

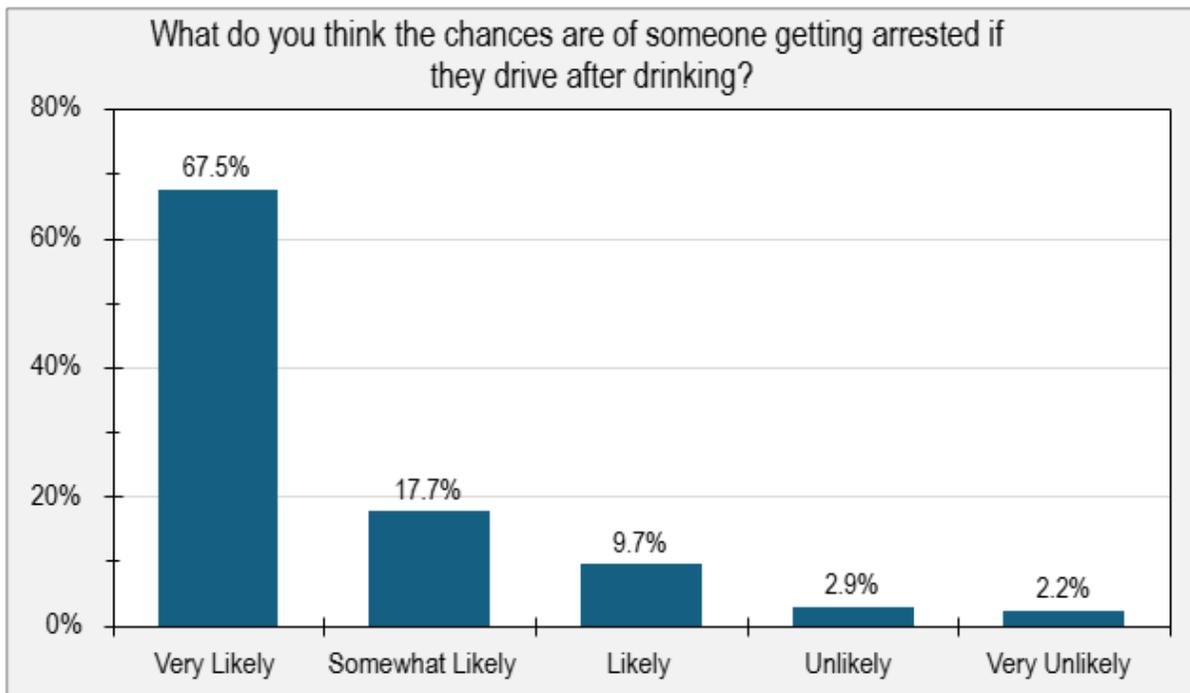


Figure 6. Likelihood of Impaired Driving Arrest

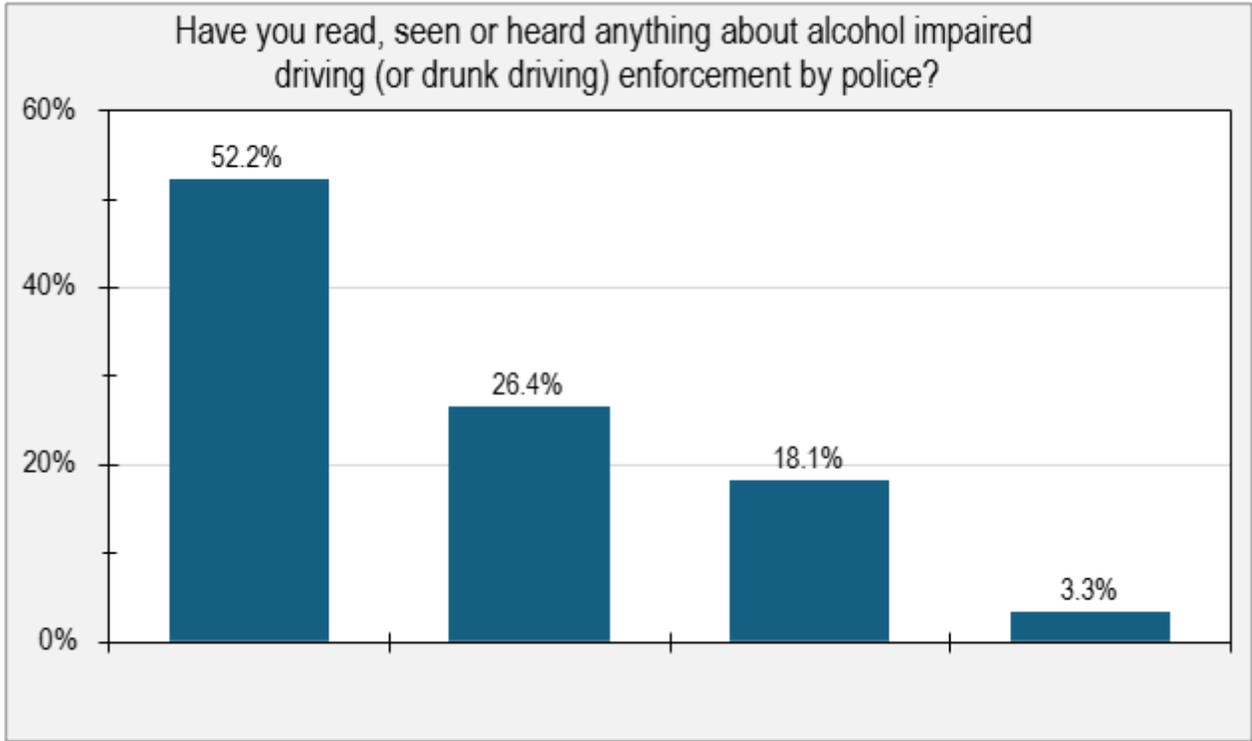


Figure 7. Awareness of Impaired Driving Enforcement

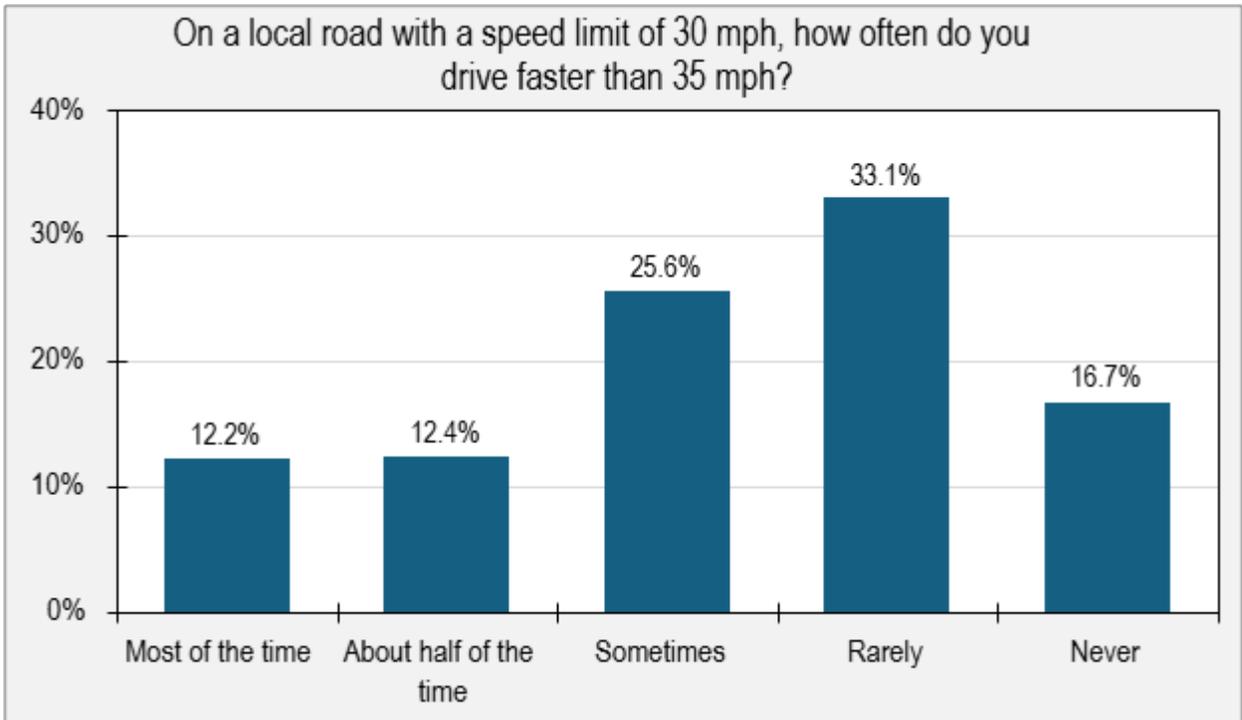


Figure 8. Exceeding Speed Limit on Local Roads

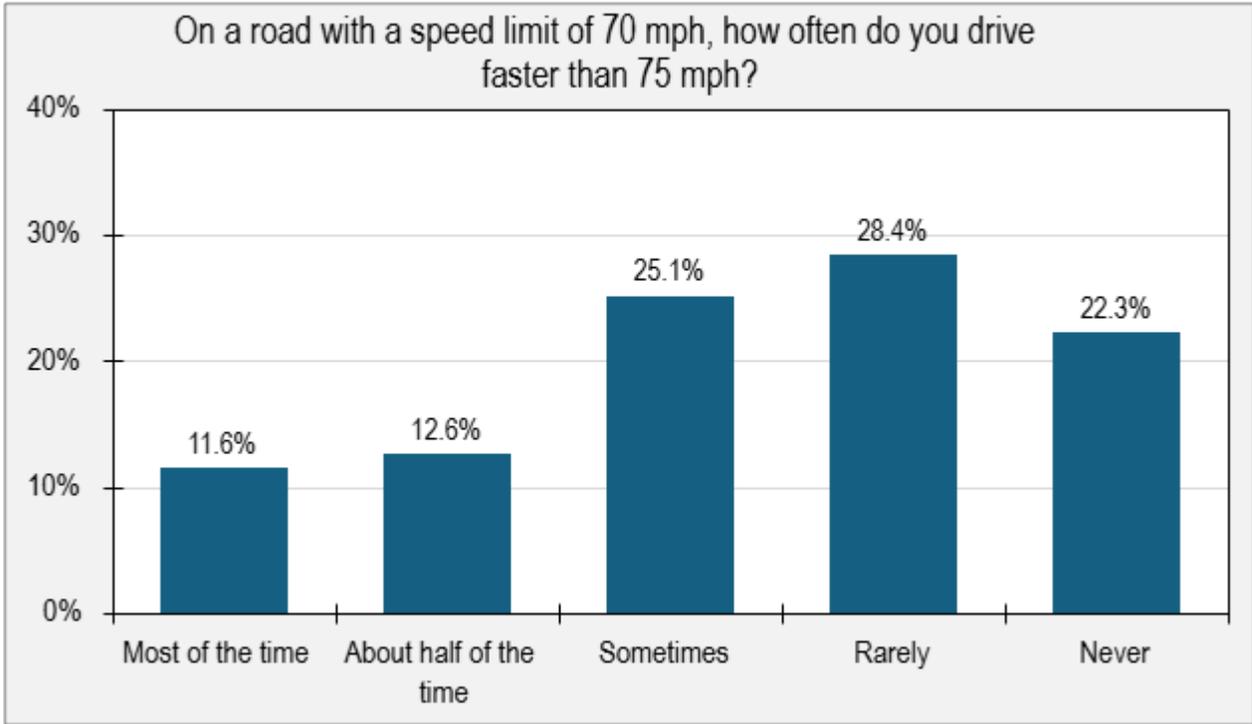


Figure 9. Exceeding Speed Limit on Highways

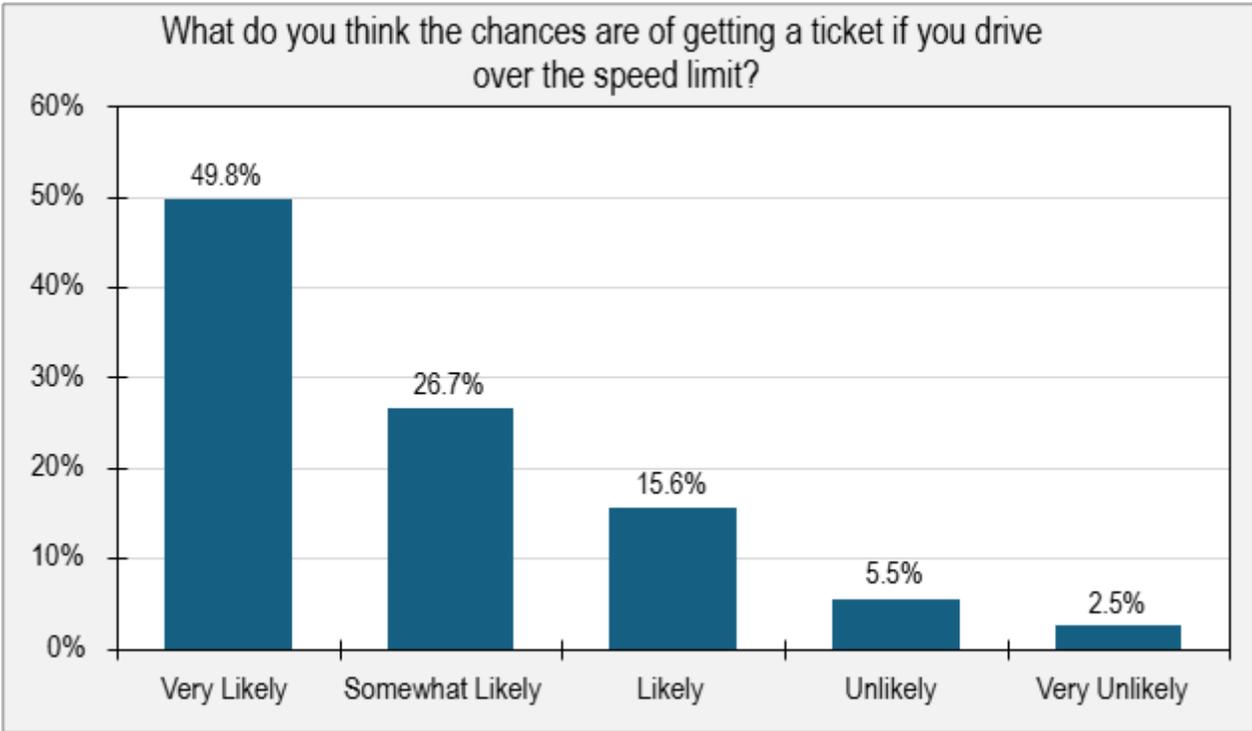


Figure 10. Likelihood of Speeding Ticket

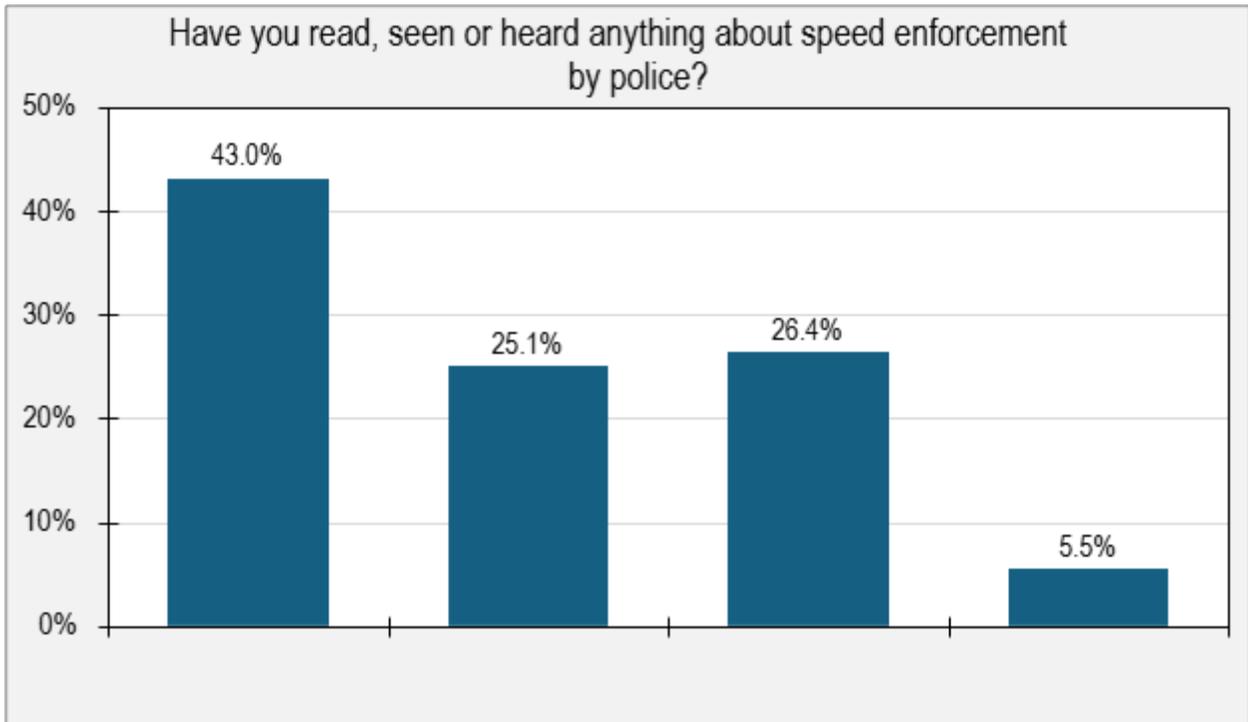


Figure 11. Awareness of Speed Enforcement

Core Question Responses by Region

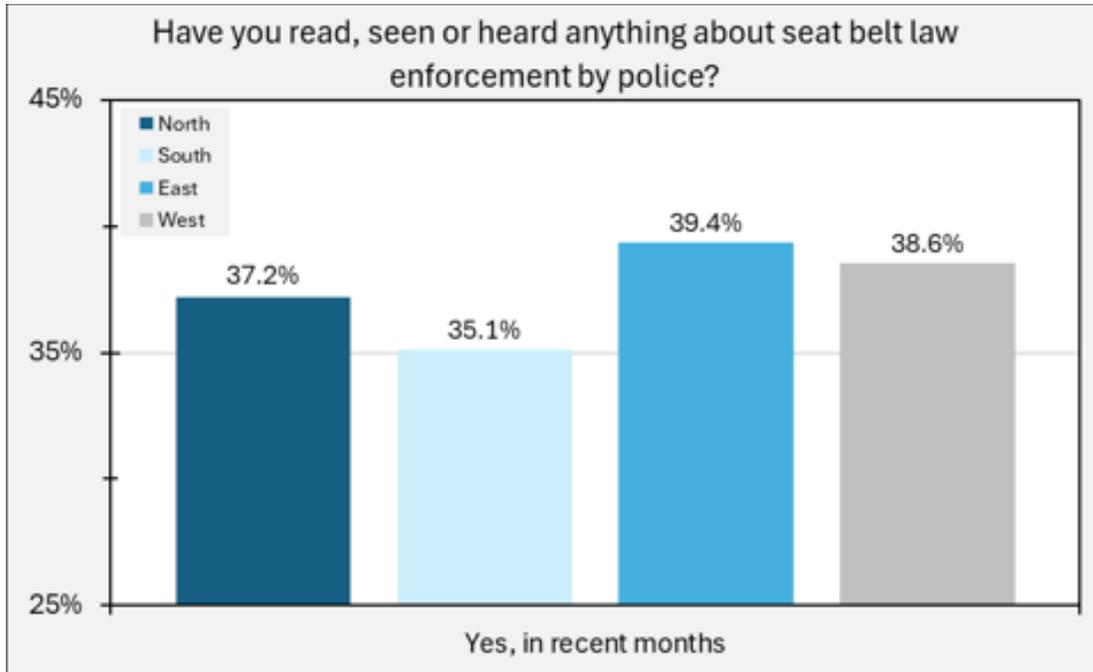


Figure 12. Seat Belt Enforcement Awareness by Region

Associations between geographic regions and the core questions have been analyzed and highlights are presented below in Figures 12-15. More information on each question is available upon request from the authors. Awareness of seat belt enforcement was highest in the East region and lowest in the South region. Self-reported speeding on local roads was lowest in the West region and highest in the East region. Self-reported speeding on highways was also lowest in the West. Awareness of impaired driving enforcement was relatively uniform in the four regions.

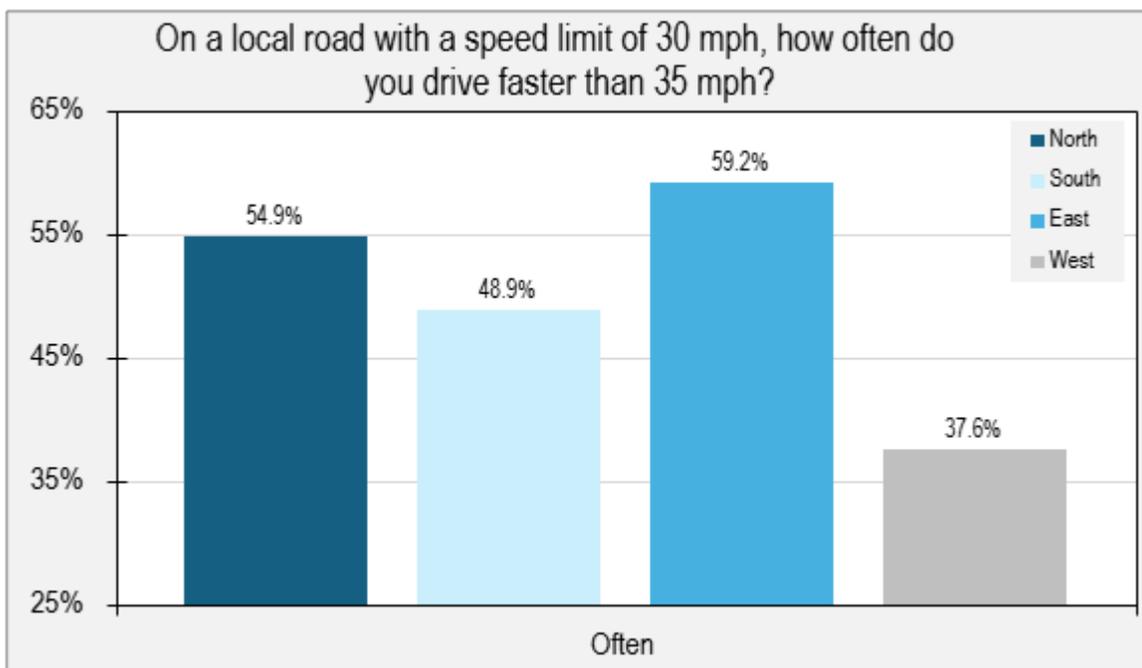


Figure 13. Exceeding Speed Limit on Local Roads by Region

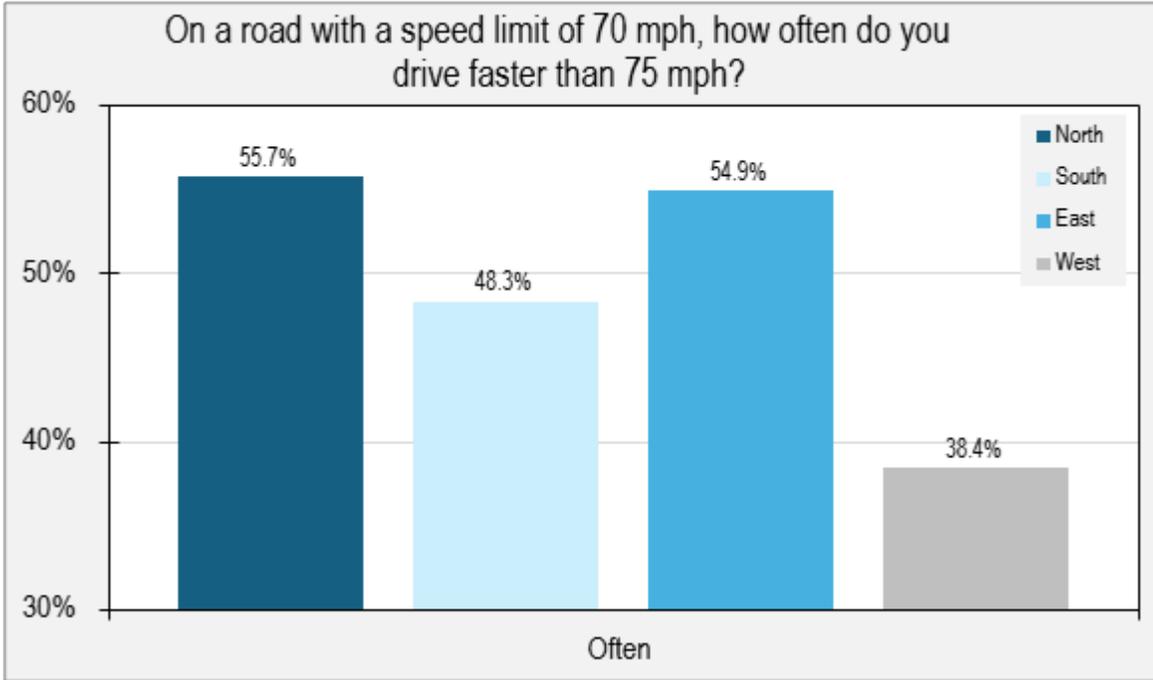


Figure 14. Exceeding Speed Limit on Highways by Region

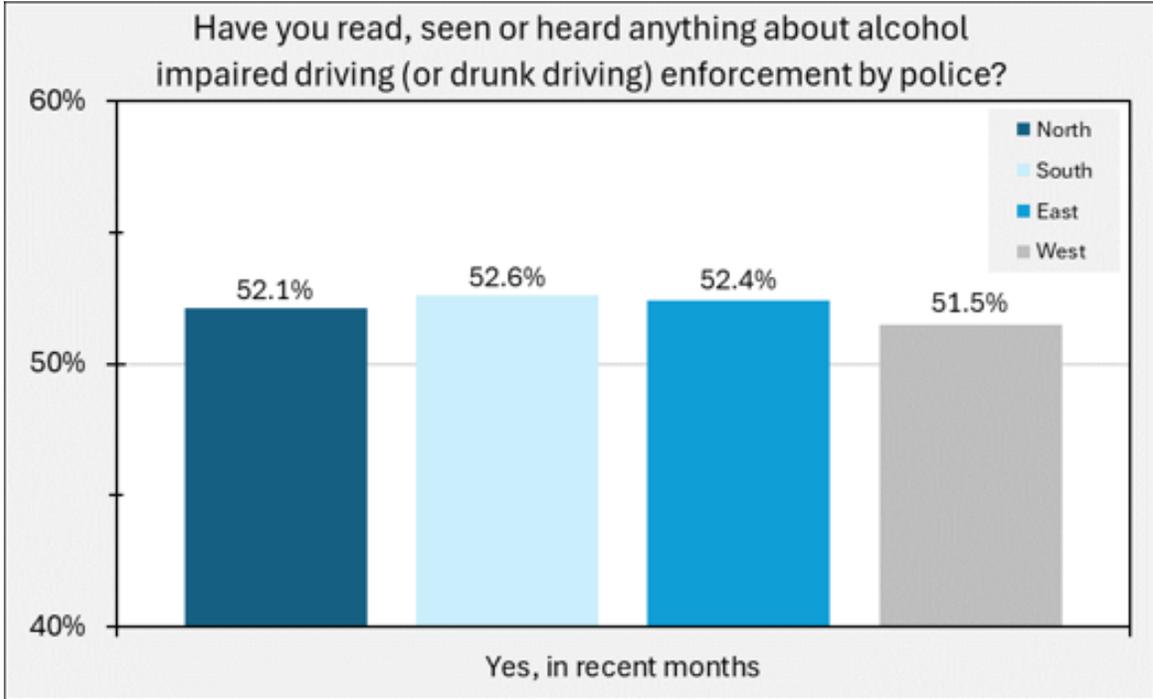


Figure 15. Awareness of Impaired Driving Enforcement by Region

Core Question Responses by Demographics

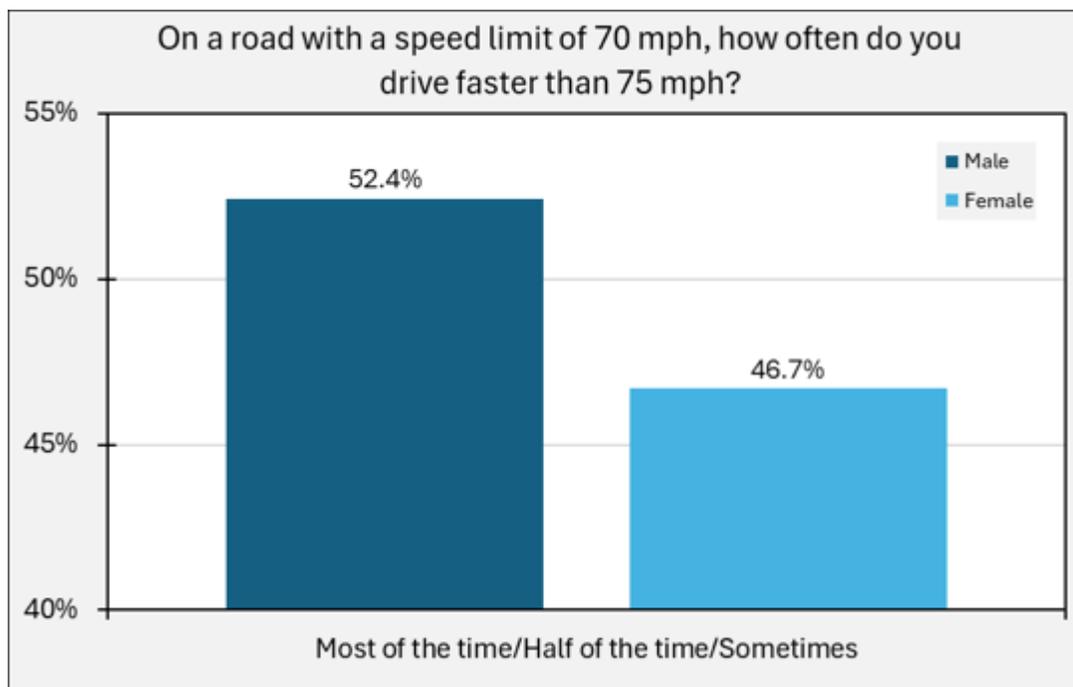


Figure 16. Exceeding Speed Limit on Highways by Gender

Additional analysis using the demographics of respondents was undertaken for each variable, and notable highlights are presented below in Figures 16-21. More information on each question is available upon request from the authors.

Females self-reported lower frequencies of highway speeding than males (Figure 16). Females also perceived the likelihood of arrest for drinking and driving as Very Likely at a higher percentage than males (Figure 17).

Age was noted as a factor for seat belt use and highway speeding. Respondents in the 22 to 30 year age category were least likely to say they always or nearly always use their seat belt. Drivers over 65 years old were least likely to report they exceed the speed limit on highways with 70 mph limits, and young drivers (18-21) were most likely to say they exceed the speed limit by at least 5mph sometimes or more.

White respondents report using seat belts at the highest rate, followed by Hispanics and Blacks (Figure 20). Speeding on local roads (21) was reported by a lower percentage of Whites compared to other race/ethnicities.

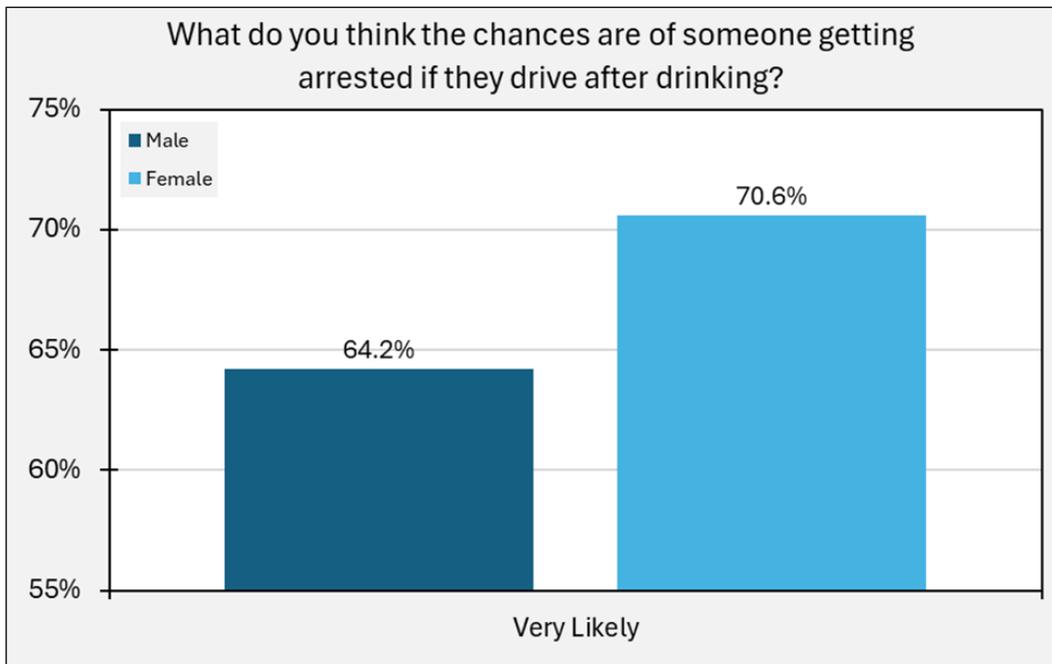


Figure 177. Likelihood of Impaired Driving Arrest by Gender

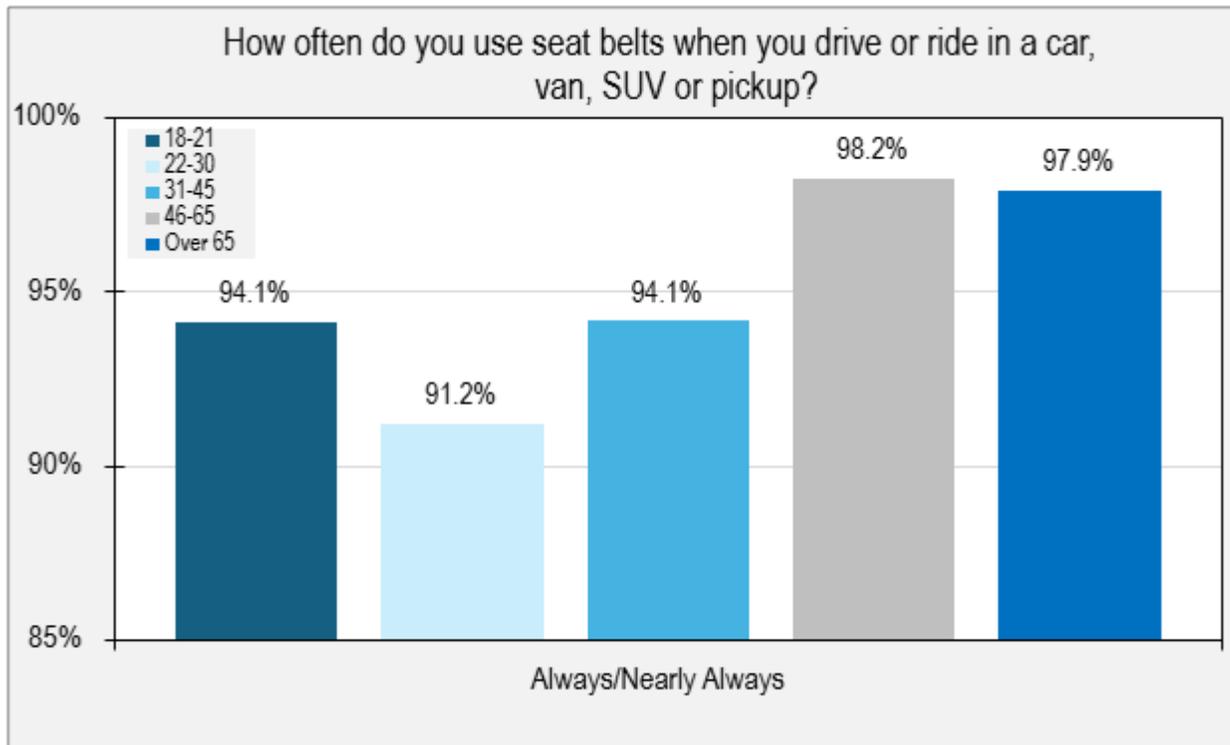


Figure 18. Frequency of Self-Reported Seat Belt Use by Age

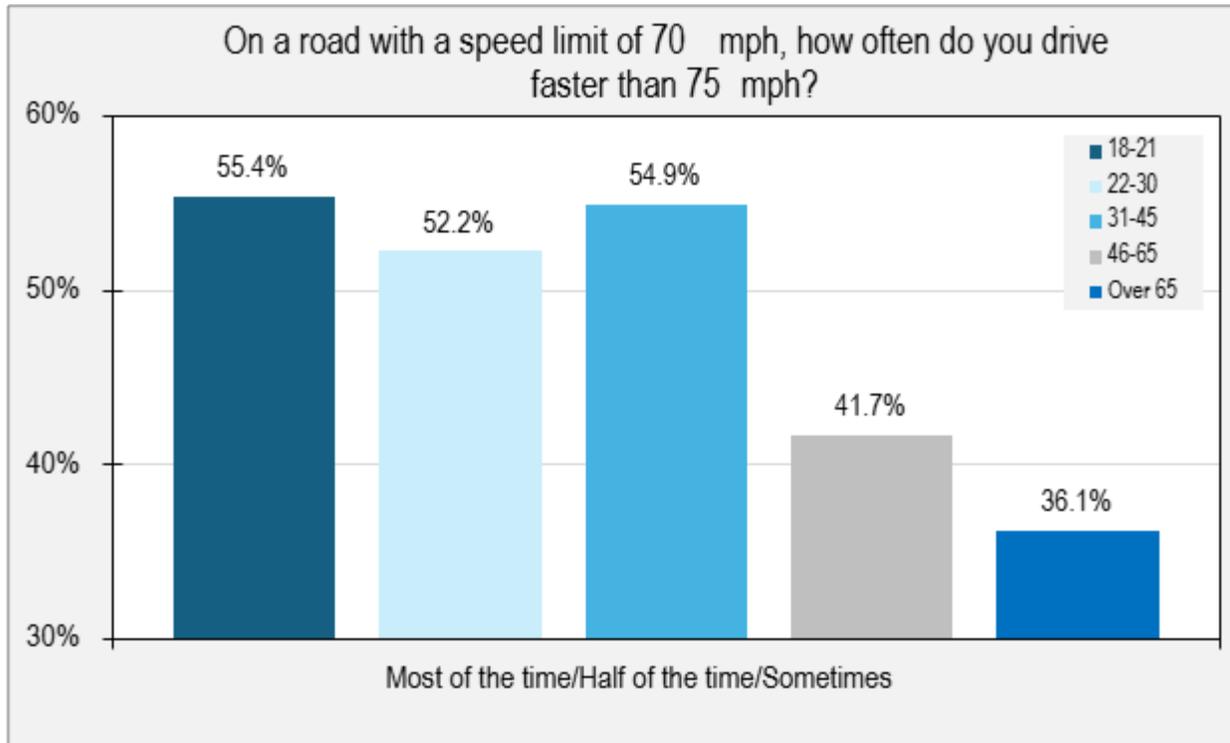


Figure 199. Exceeding Speed Limit on Highways by Age

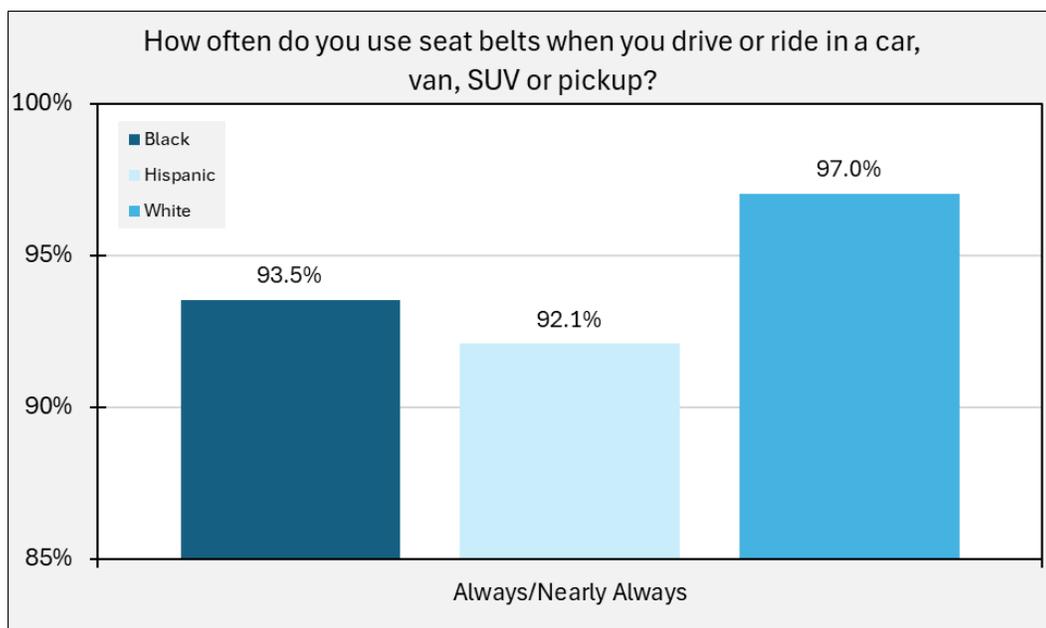


Figure 20. Frequency of Reported Belt Use by Race

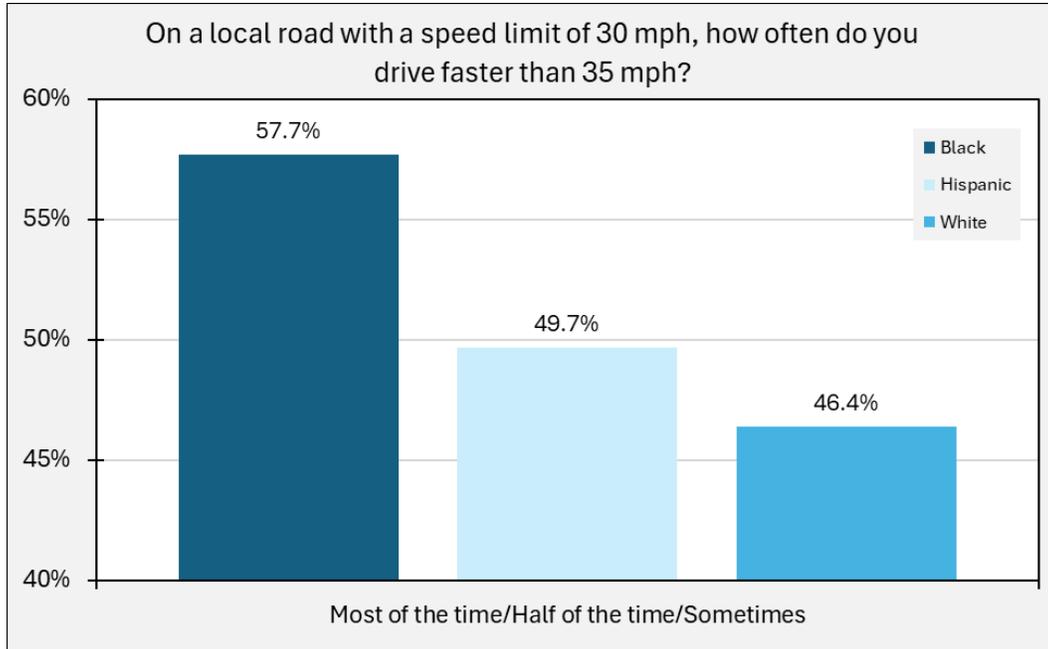


Figure 20. Exceeding Speed Limit on Local Roads by Race

Historical Trend

The results for nine of the core questions for each year are presented in Figures 22-30, providing visuals for comparing Texas trends across the 14 survey years. A table with each of the response choice percentages for 2010 through 2024 is included as Appendix B.

Figure 22 indicates a fairly steady trend in the perception of strong enforcement of impaired driving laws, with perception of arrest over 90 percent each year. Awareness of the alcohol impaired driving enforcement message peaked in 2011 with 75.1 percent of the survey respondents saying they had read, seen or heard the message within the past 30 days (Figure 23). The graph in Figure 23 also depicts responses for those who checked they had read, seen or heard something about alcohol impaired driving enforcement within the past year, which this year continued its rebound moving up to 52.2 percent from the low of 37.4 percent in 2020 and climbing from 50.7 percent in 2023.

Figure 24 shows the 15-year trend in the perception of seat belt enforcement, starting with a peak of 89.7 percent who said the chances of getting a ticket were very likely in 2010; increasing from the low of 86.2 percent in 2013; back to 89.1 percent in 2015; and decreasing by a statistically non-significant degree to 88.8 percent in 2016. The percent of respondents perceiving the likelihood of a citation for seat belt noncompliance had an increase from 84.6 last year to 87.9 percent this year. This is the third consecutive year with an increase. Self-reported belt-wearing behavior stayed the same as last year at 98.5 percent saying they always or almost always use seat belts (Figure 25). Awareness of increased seat belt enforcement continued to trend upwards, as those who answered yes they have seen or heard something in recent months increased four percentage points from 33.6 percent last year to 37.6 percent this year.

Figures 27 and 28 each illustrate the percentages of drivers who say they often exceed the speed limit by at least five miles per hour. Self-reported local road speeding reverted to 2022 levels at approximately 50 percent saying they often exceed the speed limit on local roads. Almost half said they speed on higher speed roads, consistent with self-reports of 2023. The perceived likelihood of receiving a ticket, which was in the low 90 percent range in the first nine of the 10 survey years, fell to under 90 percent in 2020 and 2021. However, this perception rebounded in 2022 and remained above the 2021 low at 92 percent in 2024 (see Figure 29).

Awareness of speed enforcement efforts in most of the 15-year survey period has been lower than other traffic safety enforcement efforts (Figure 30). Of note is the relatively large percentage of respondents who this year said they heard of speed enforcement efforts. At 43.0 percent, this level is the highest it has been since 2018.

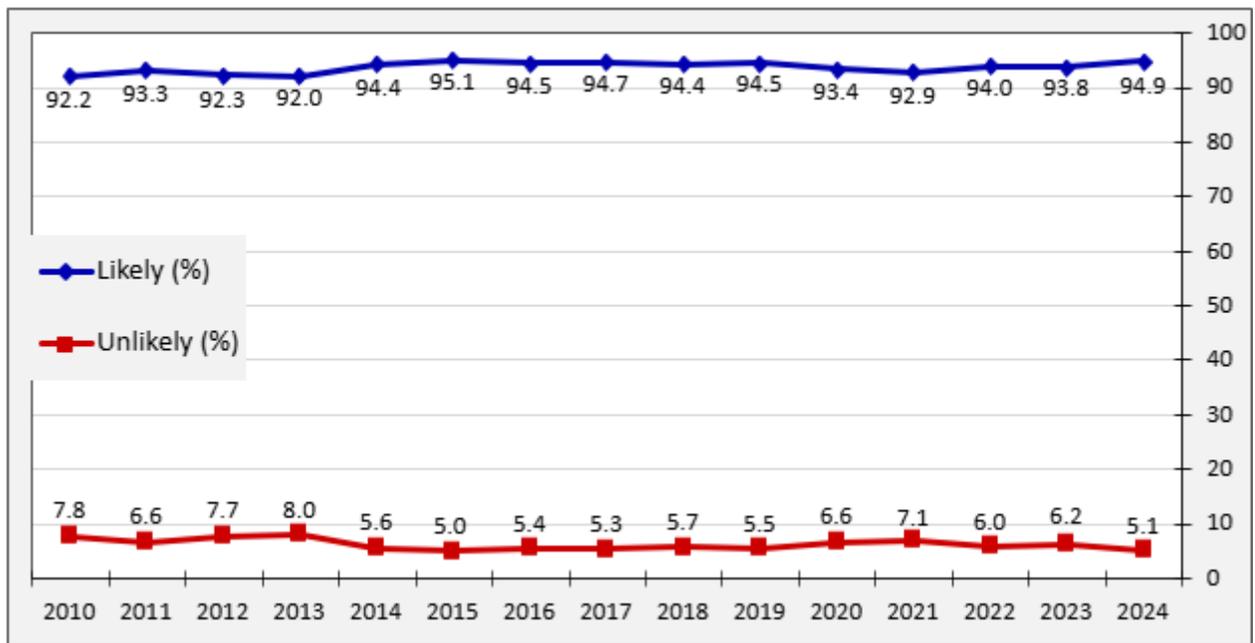


Figure 21. What do you think the chances are of someone getting arrested if they drive after drinking?

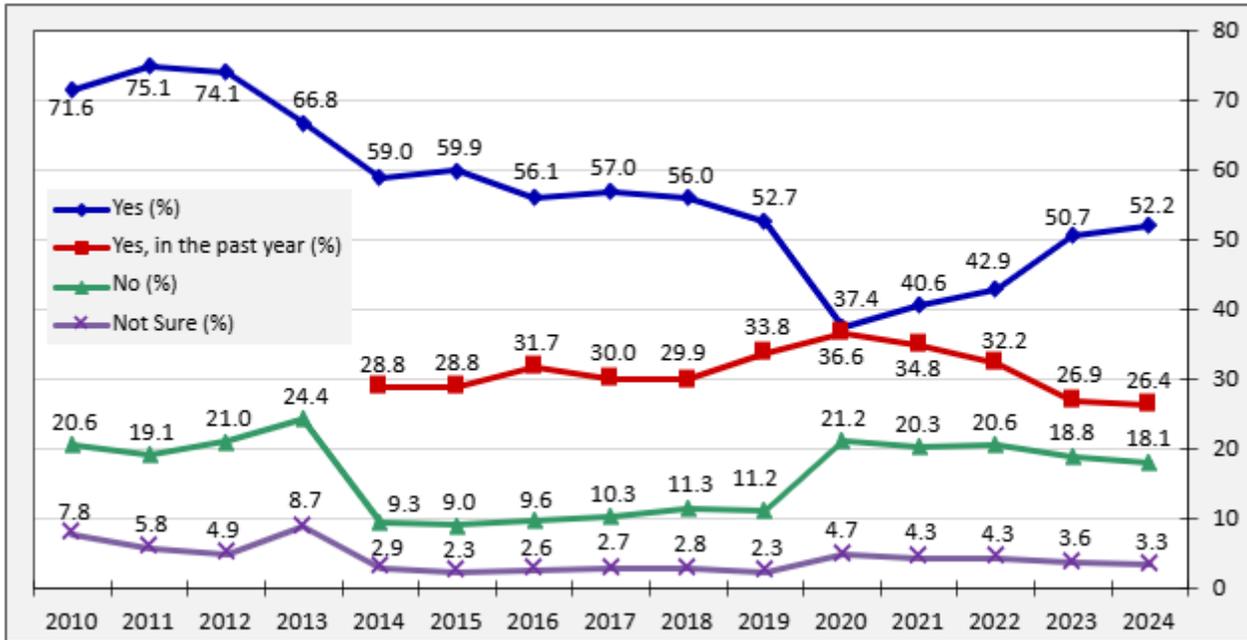


Figure 22. In recent months, have you read, seen or heard anything about alcohol impaired driving enforcement by police?

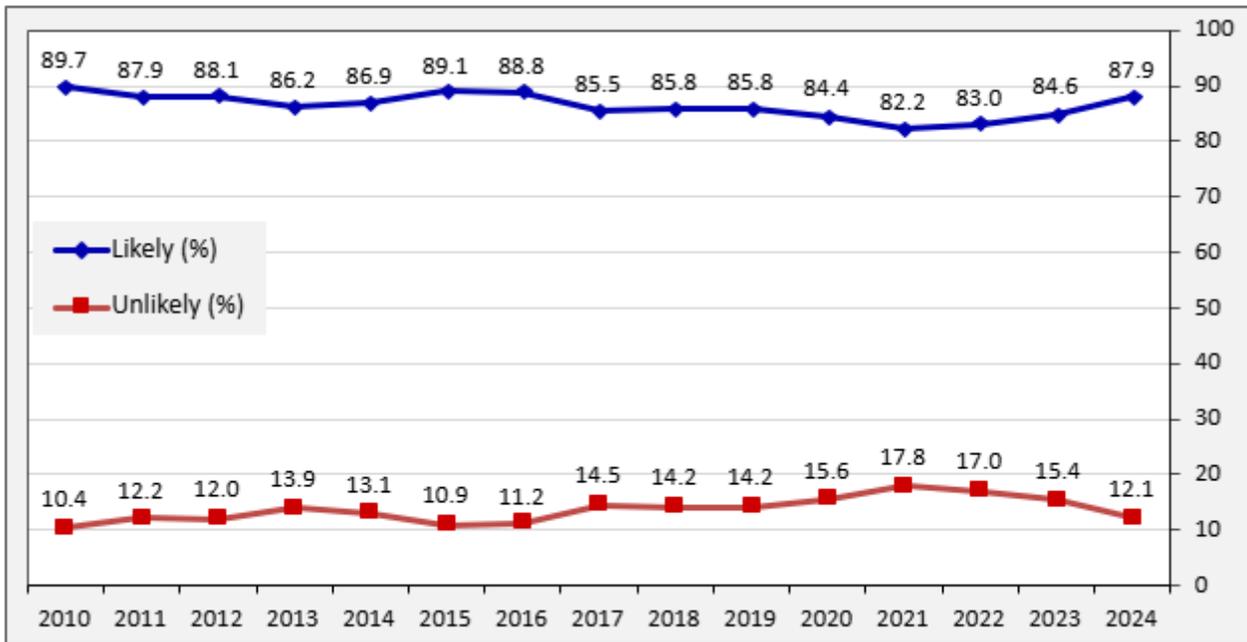


Figure 23. What do you think the chances are of getting a ticket if you don't wear your seat belt?

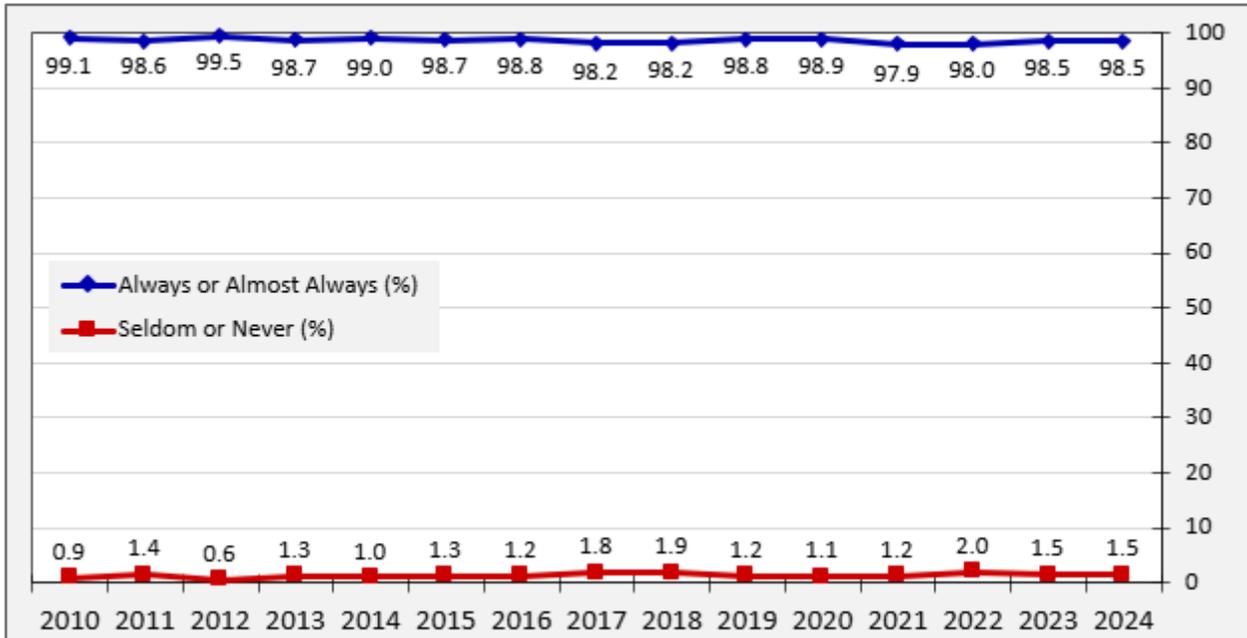


Figure 245. How often do you use seat belts when you drive or ride in a car, van, SUV or pickup?

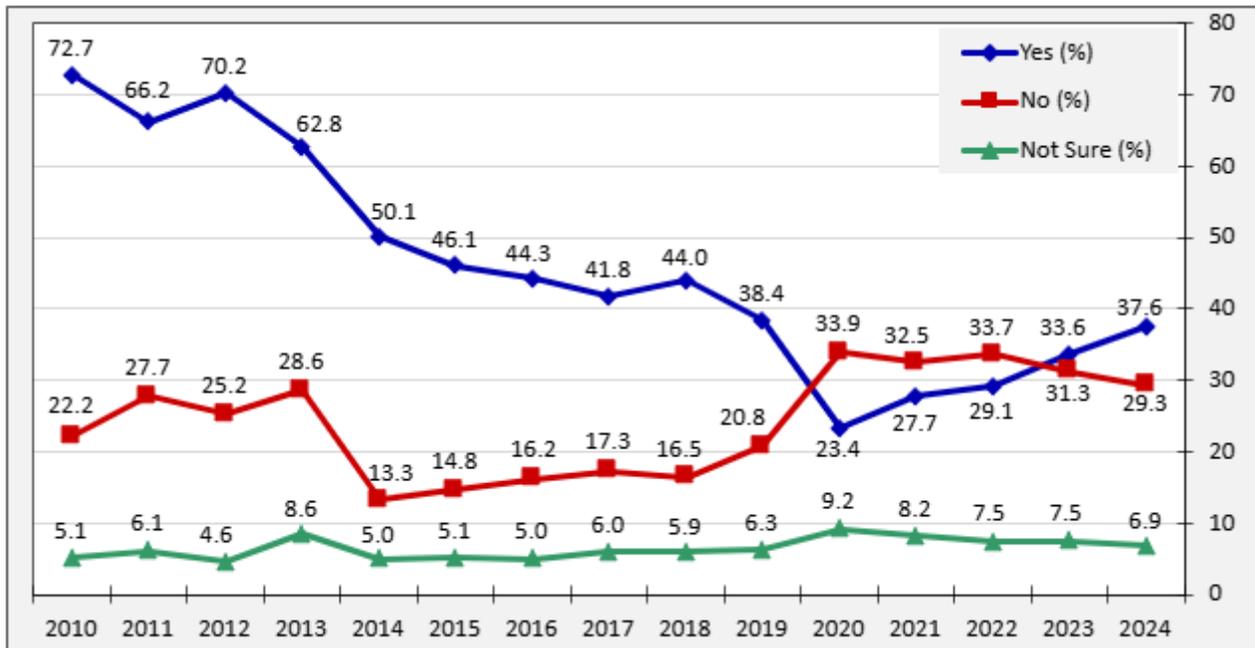


Figure 25. In recent months, have you read, seen or heard anything about seat belt law enforcement by police?

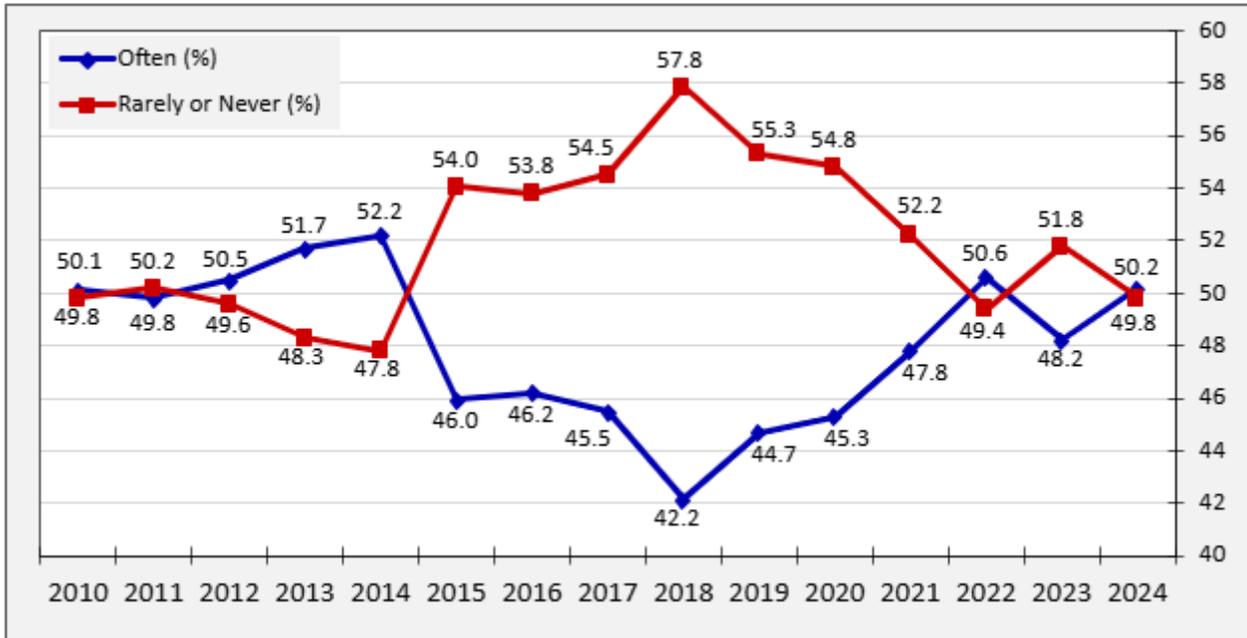


Figure 26. On a local road with a speed limit of 30 mph, how often do you drive faster than 35 mph?

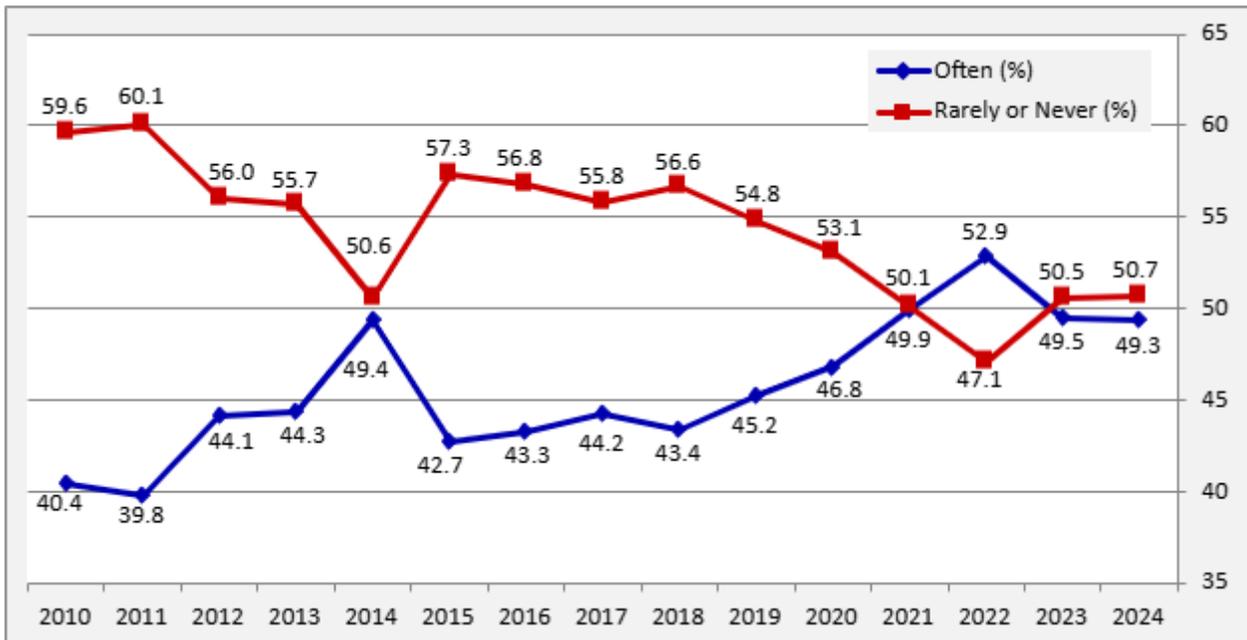


Figure 27. On a road with a speed limit of 70 mph, how often do you drive faster than 75 mph?

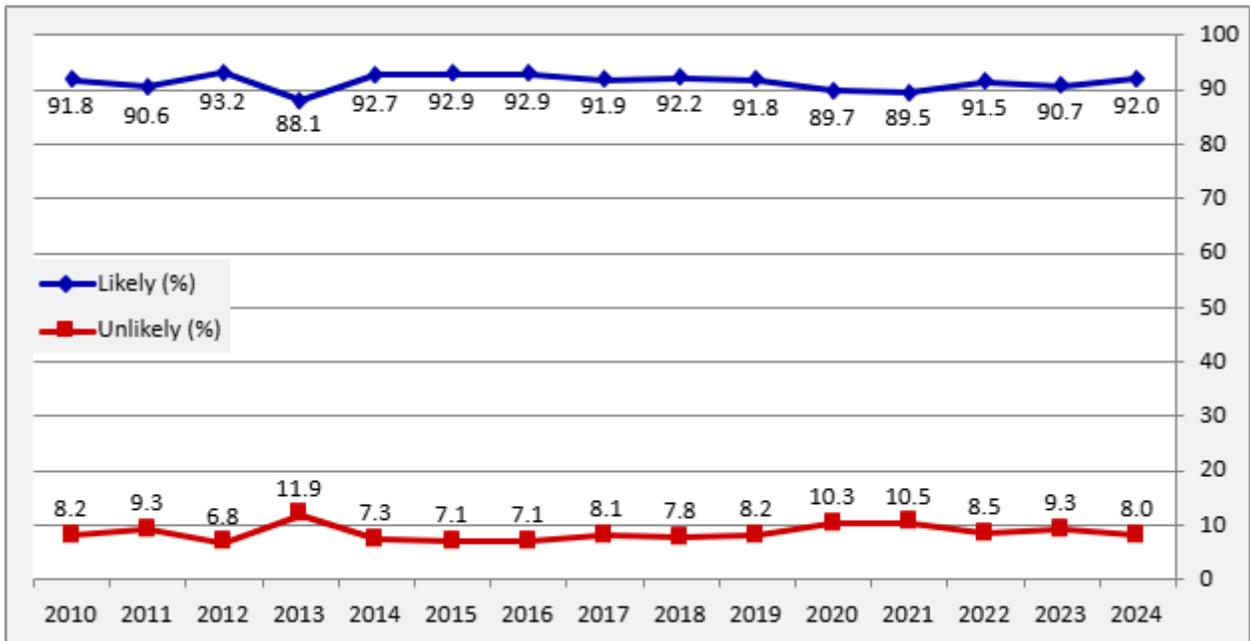


Figure 28. What do you think the chances are of getting a ticket if you drive over the speed limit?

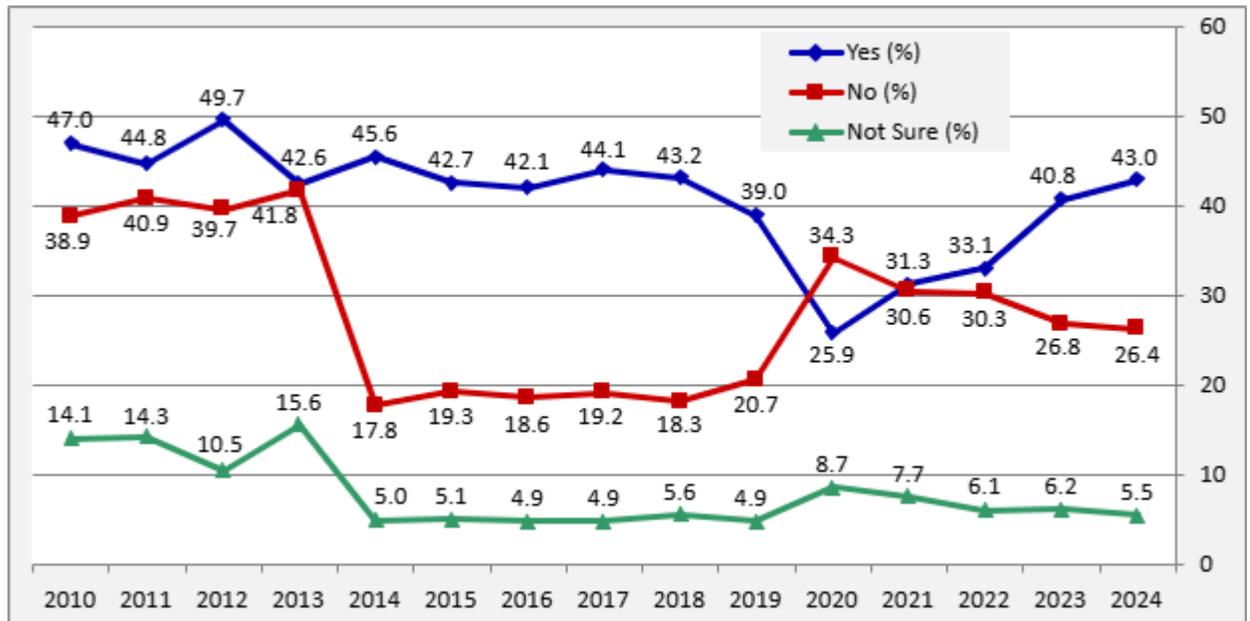


Figure 29. In the past 30 days, have you read, seen or heard anything about speed enforcement by police?

Texas-Specific Questions

The 2024 survey included three questions designed to gather additional data related to drinking and driving behavior and knowledge. Respondents were asked if they drive after drinking more than they should. This was based on their own assessment of what ‘more than they should’ would be.

Over half (57.3 percent) of the respondents said they had not driven after drinking too much, 19.1 percent said they do not drink, and an additional 13.7 percent said they very rarely drove after drinking (see Figure 31). This means that 250 of the 2,526 respondents answering this question reported they sometimes (n=156), frequently (n=53), or very frequently (n=41) drive after having too much to drink, a total of 9.9 percent of respondents.

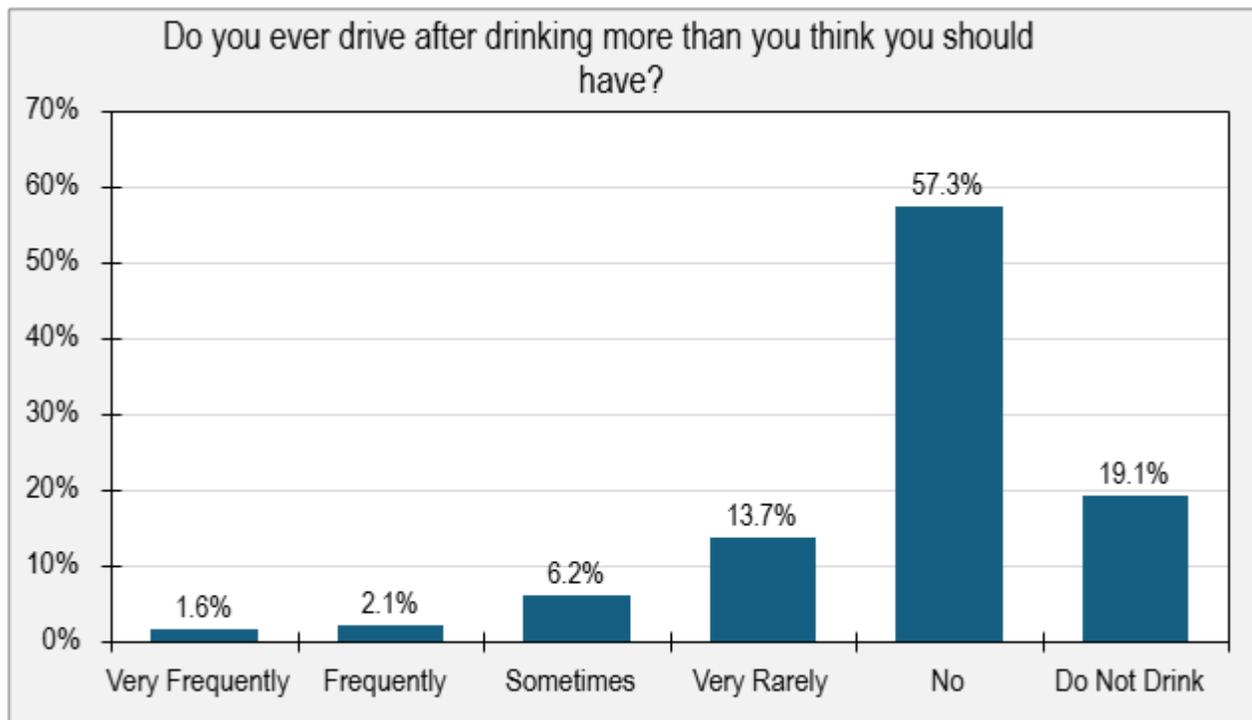


Figure 30. Self-Reported Impaired Driving

In Texas the legal limit for intoxication is .08 blood alcohol content (BAC). In 2024, 52.8 percent of the Texans surveyed selected the correct response choice for the legal intoxication question. Figure 32 shows that 18.9 percent of the Texans surveyed were not sure of the legal BAC limit and 7.6 percent over-estimated the BAC limit.

Respondents were asked if they favor or oppose sobriety checkpoints in Texas. Sobriety checkpoints are commonly conducted in other states but are not allowed Texas. The survey results revealed that 59.3 percent were in favor of sobriety checkpoints, with 36.4 percent strongly in favor. As shown in Figure 33, 7.4 percent were strongly opposed to sobriety checkpoints.

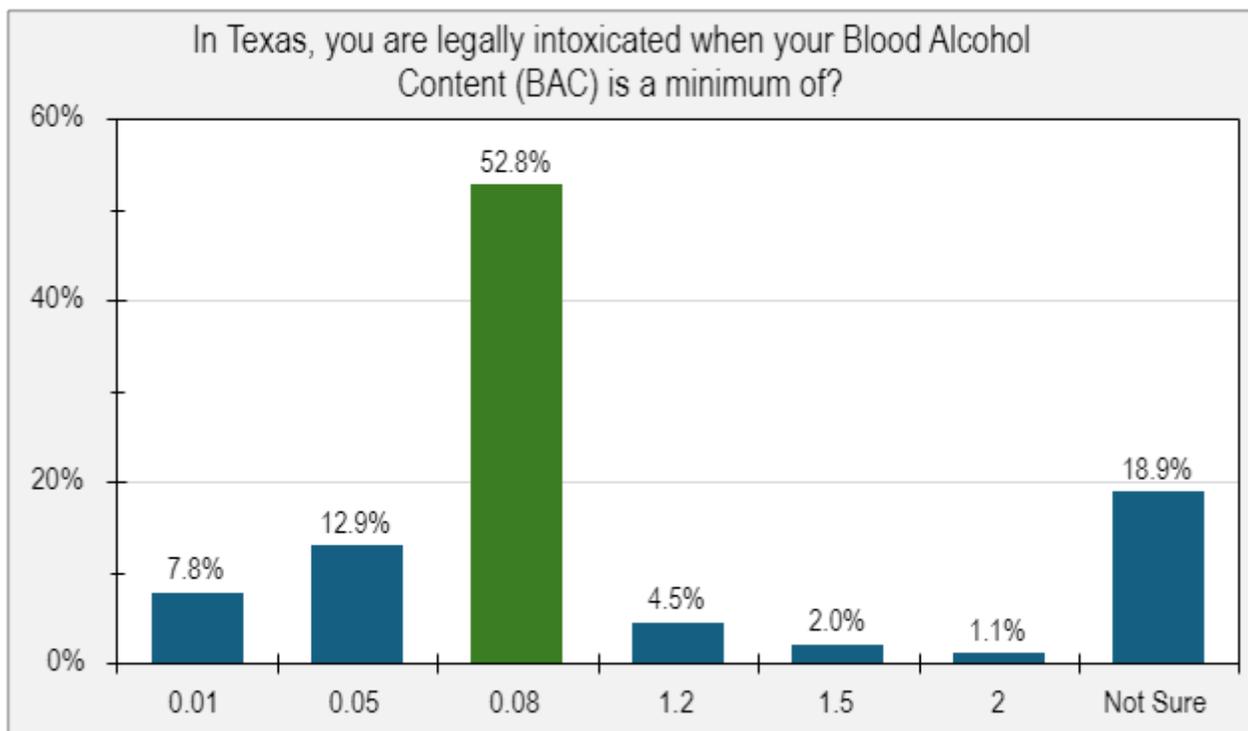


Figure 31. Knowledge of BAC Intoxication Limit in Texas

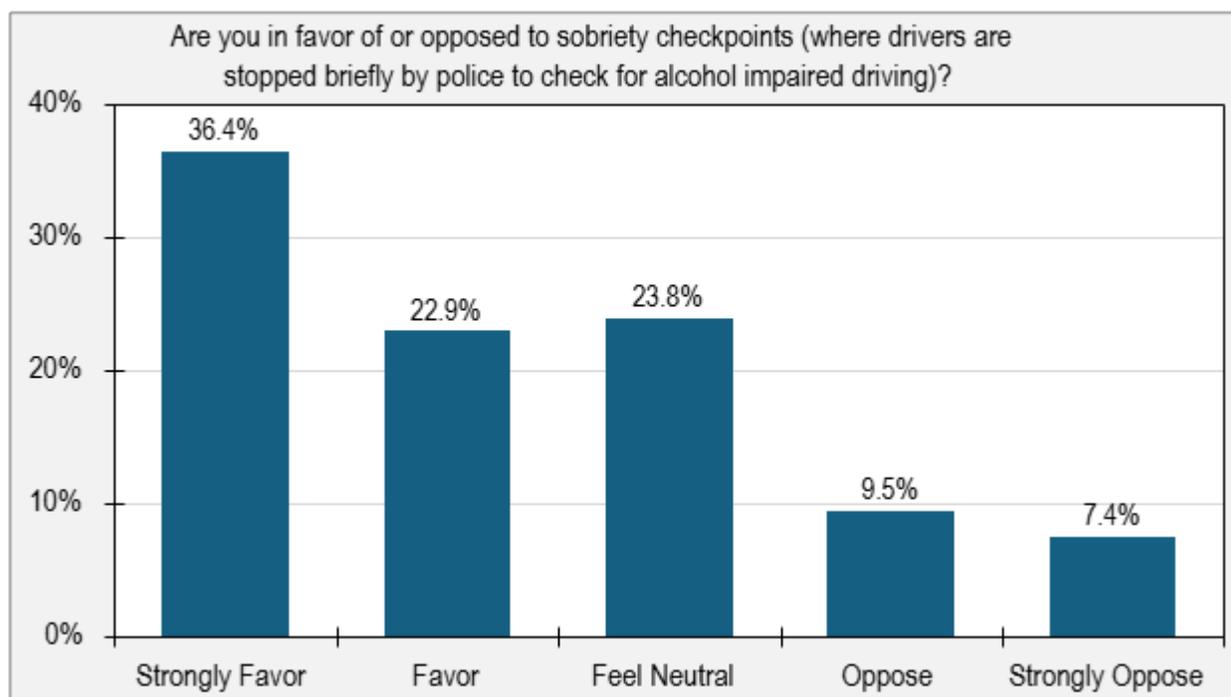


Figure 32. Sobriety Checkpoints

The survey included three questions to measure Texans' knowledge on specifics of the texting ban, the seat belt law, and Texas' Move Over or Slow Down law. This year a new question was added to measure knowledge regarding pedestrian crosswalks. For questions on the particulars of the texting ban, the seat belt law, and the pedestrian crosswalk law, one response was considered most correct. Figure 34 indicates almost 70 percent (69.6 percent) of respondents knew that there is a texting ban in Texas on all roads. Eight percent thought the laws applied only in cities with local ordinances and 13.7 percent indicated they were not sure what the current law is.

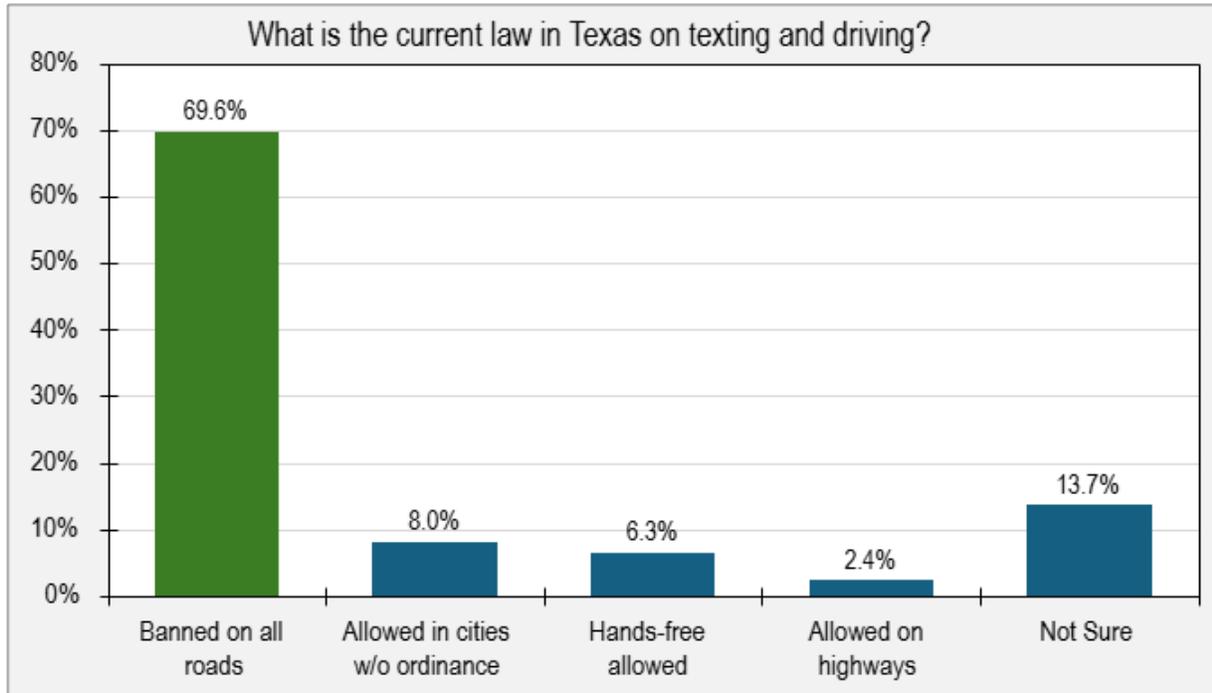


Figure 33. Texting Ban

Figure 35 shows the percentages for responses to the question on the Texas seat belt law. The Texas mandatory seat belt law was amended in September 2009 to include all occupants in all seating positions. Survey results indicate the public is highly aware of the current requirements, as evidenced by the correct response by 82.6 percent of respondents and a Not Sure response by only 3.8 percent of those surveyed. Seventeen people thought seat belts are only encouraged, not required. However, almost ten percent of respondents thought they are required only for front seat occupants in Texas.

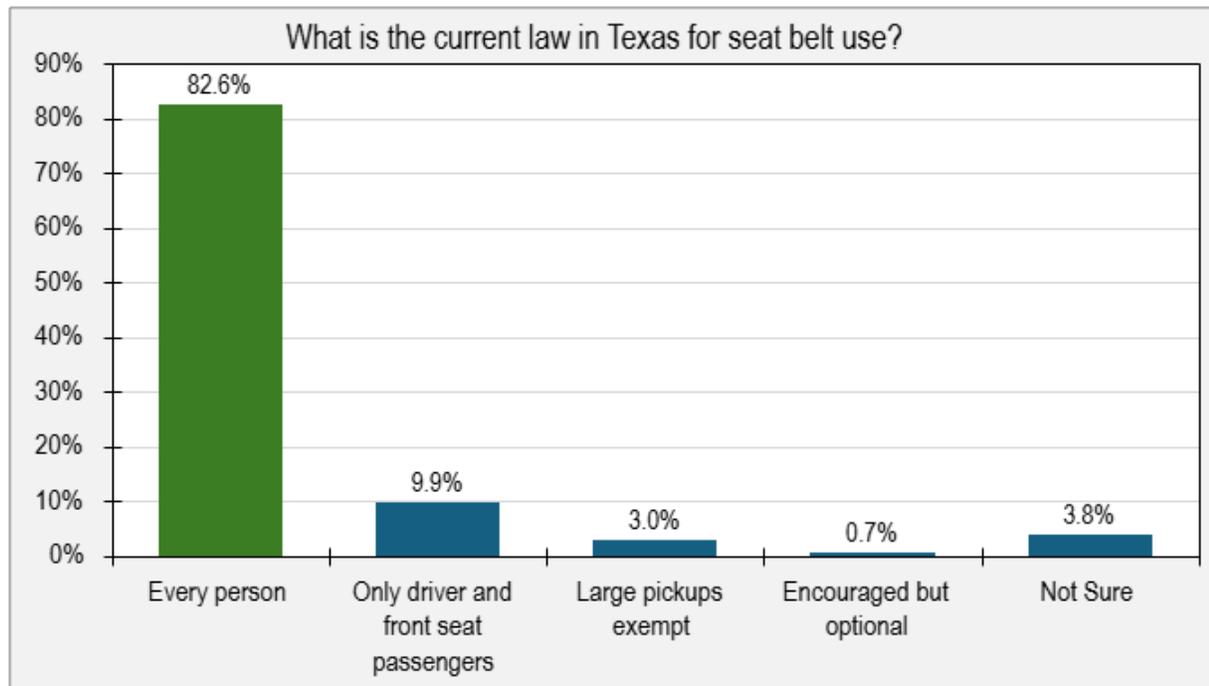


Figure 34. Texas Seat Belt Law

In 2019, Texas upgraded its Move Over or Slow Down law, adding service vehicles to the requirement for giving space to emergency vehicles on the side of the road. In 2021 several questions were added to the survey to gauge public knowledge and understanding of this law. For the first question gauging knowledge, multiple responses were allowed. The purpose was to provide options that might be incorrect interpretations of the law, rather than one obvious correct answer. Respondents were to select all statements that were true. There were four responses that are true regarding the Move Over law and three that did not apply. Table 4 presents the response choices and the percent of respondents selecting each choice. The bold responses are correct answers. Because more than one response was allowed, the column percentages add to more than 100.

While 42.5 percent of respondents knew the law pertains to emergency vehicles, a much smaller percentage had knowledge of the other requirements, with 21.5 percent recognizing the need to move over for TxDOT vehicles, 21.2 percent for tow trucks, and 22.5 percent for utility service vehicles with lights flashing. The most frequently checked response was an incorrect one - drivers going slower than others should move into the right-hand lane (48.9 percent). This question had a relatively large number of Not Sure responses of 14 percent.

A follow-up question was included to gauge knowledge of what actions are required in response to the Move Over or Slow Down law. Again, multiple responses were allowed in an attempt to discern if respondents have more than one interpretation of the law’s message. Of the seven choices, three are correct interpretations of the requirements. As seen in Table 5, the choice most often selected by respondents was not one of the three correct responses, but was to move into the right-hand lane if going 5mph or slower than other traffic on the road, selected by 30.2 percent of respondents. The second highest incorrect statement selected was to move over for oncoming or when approaching emergency vehicles. This question required knowing that a reduction in speed of 20mph below the speed limit is required if moving over is not an option, and responses indicate the majority of Texas drivers are unfamiliar with the required action. This question also had the highest Not Sure response of any of the survey questions (23.4 percent).

In 2021 Texas law was clarified through the Lisa Torrey Smith Act to specify drivers are required to both stop and yield to pedestrians or other vulnerable road users using a crosswalk. This year TTI was asked to include a question on the Statewide Attitude and Awareness Survey to measure awareness of what is required by pedestrians and drivers via crosswalk and rights-of-way. Table 6 reveals a correct response by 69.5 percent of the survey respondents. Note that over 22 percent thought pedestrians must stop and yield to drivers was the correct requirement and over 10 percent thought drivers must yield but not necessarily stop for pedestrians in the crosswalk. This question was much more likely to be answered correctly by 65 and older aged respondents

The 2024 survey included a question to measure the awareness of campaigns used recently to promote traffic safety in the State. Respondents were asked to check all the messages they had seen or heard. Figure 36 indicates that “Click It or Ticket”, as in past surveys, was the most recognized message, selected by 84.0 percent of the respondents, followed by “Be Safe. Drive Smart” selected by 73.6 percent of the respondents. The least recognized messages were “Save Me With a Seat” and End the Streak, selected by 28.6 and 28.5 percent of the respondents, respectively. The “Save Me With a Seat” message was recognized by 21.7 percent more respondents than in 2023.

Further analysis of Click It or Ticket recognition was conducted to get a more in-depth look at who in Texas is getting the message. As mentioned earlier, Click It or Ticket has been the most recognized traffic safety message in the State, according to this survey since its inception. Figure 37 below shows a breakdown by region for those who answered ‘Yes’ to seeing or hearing of the campaign in the past year. The West region had the highest recognition at 87.8 percent. The lowest was the East at 79.3 percent.

Click It or Ticket recognition was also analyzed by county. The 10 most populous counties in Texas were selected, each with over 800,000 in population, to show the range in recognition at the county level. As shown in Figure 38, Lubbock, Hidalgo, and Travis County each measured over 90 percent recognition, while Tarrant and Harris were below 85 percent awareness of the Click It or Ticket message within the past year. Additionally, analysis showed Click It or Ticket recognition is highest among older age groups (46 and older) and lower with the younger age groups, particularly 18-21 year-olds.

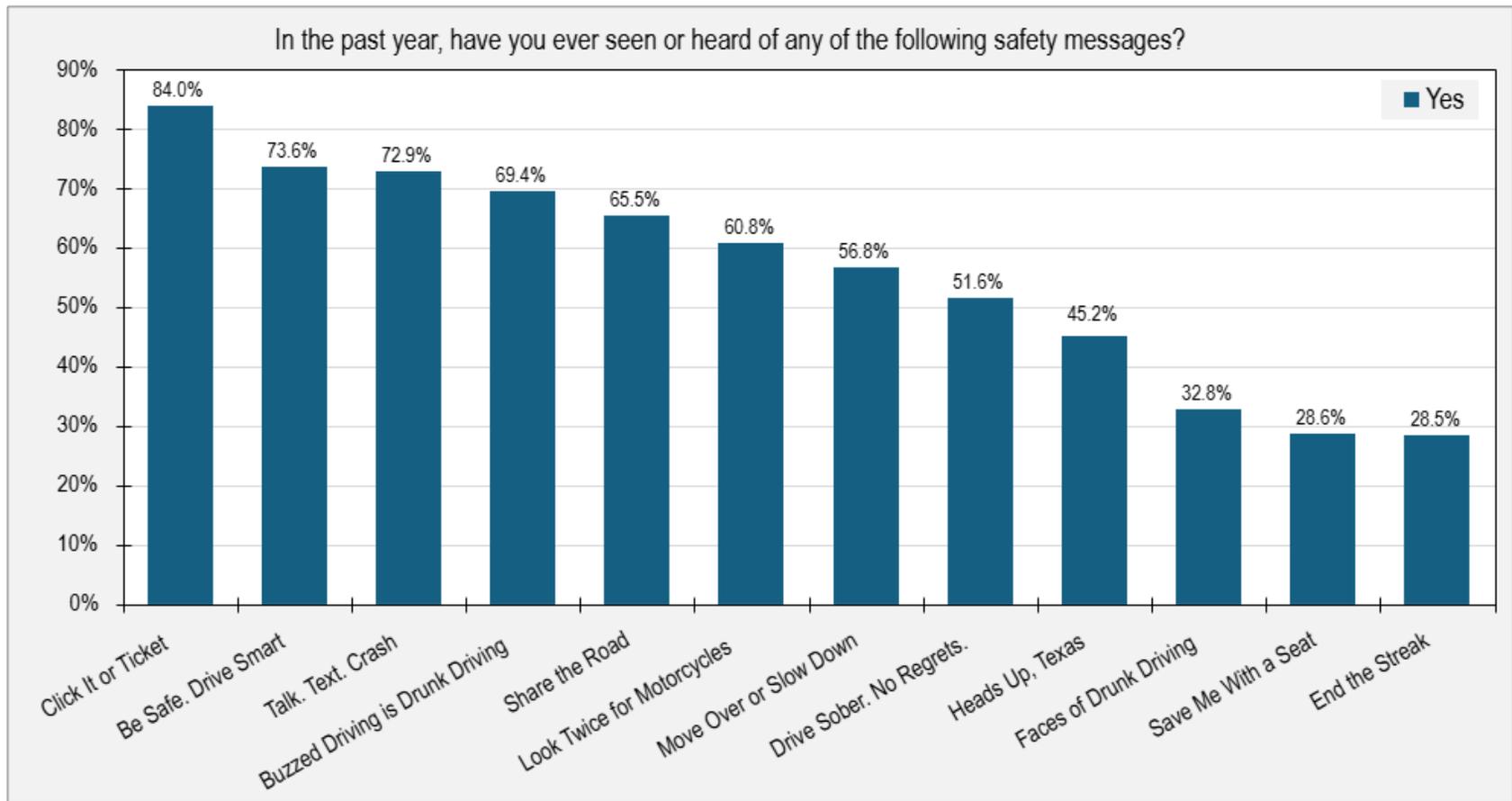


Figure 35. Traffic Safety Campaign Message Recognition

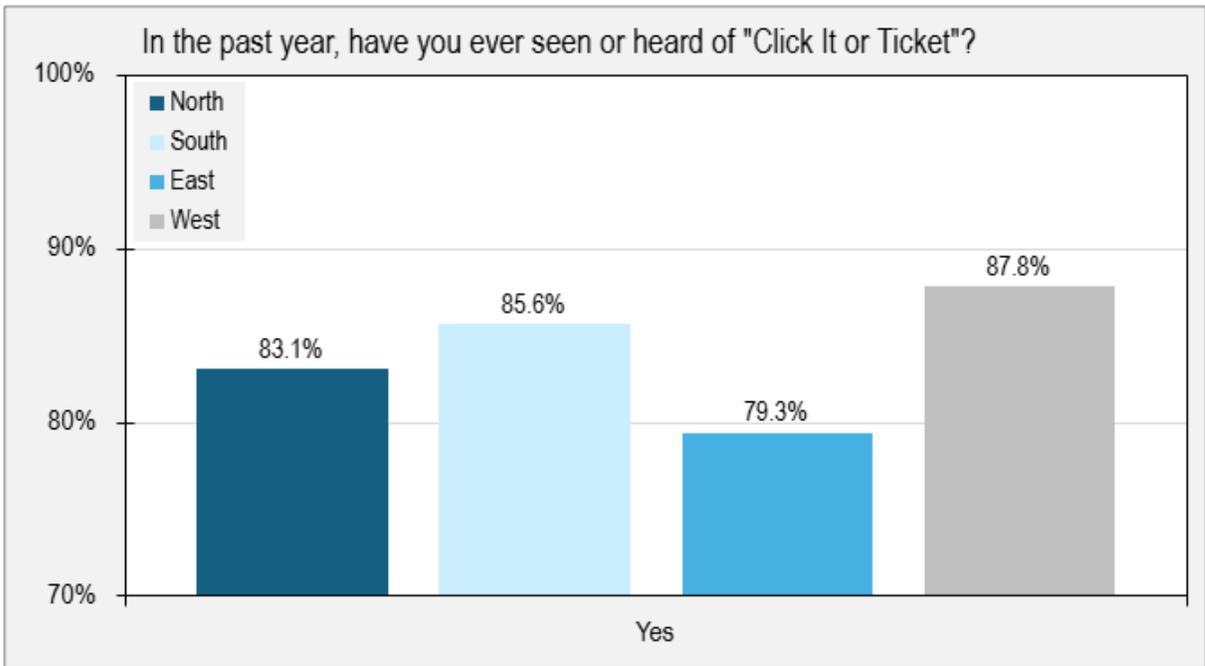


Figure 36. Click It or Ticket Recognition by Region

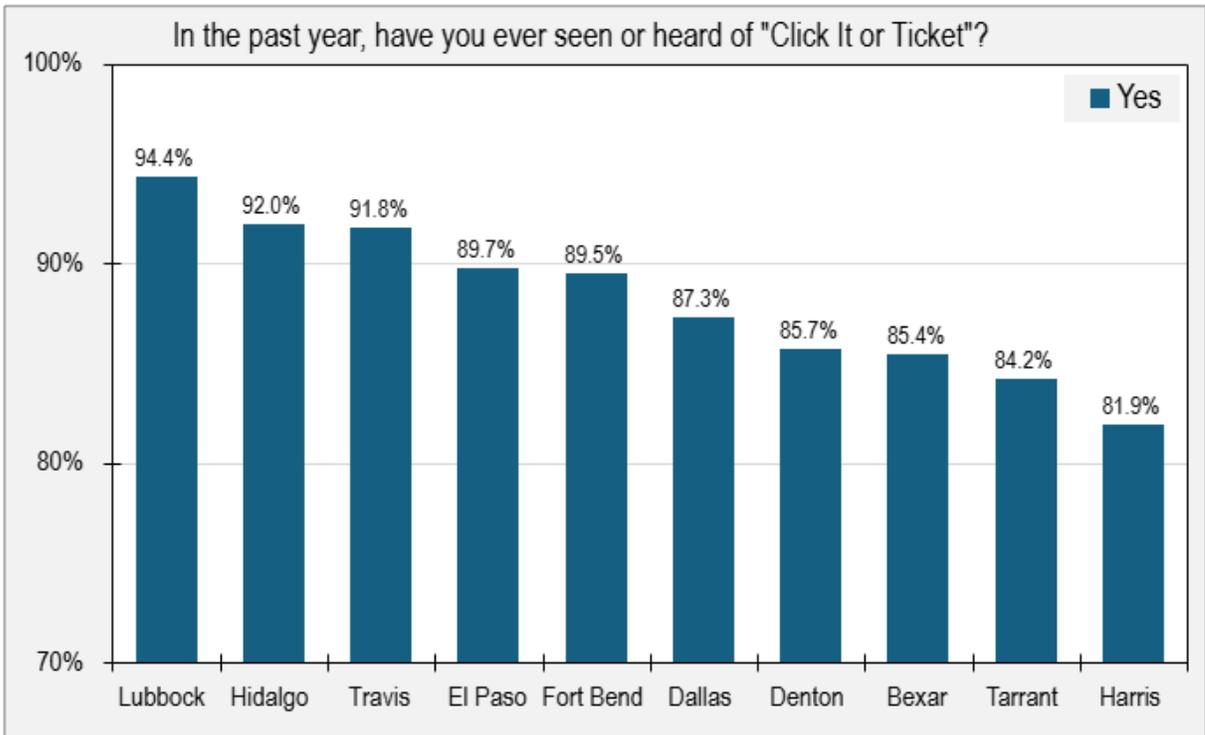


Figure 37. Click It or Ticket Recognition by County

Self-Reported Driving Behaviors

Respondents were asked how often they had done a variety of behaviors related to traffic safety. Table 7 provides the percentages for each of the responses. Considering these responses, the most unacceptable self-reported behavior among the list was driving over a crosswalk with a pedestrian in it, as 82.1 percent said they had never done so.

Talking on a cell phone while driving was the most reported behavior to do “regularly” or “sometimes” at 28.2 percent, followed by 20.4 percent who regularly or sometimes drive 15mph over the speed limit on a freeway or highway. Eighteen percent of respondents said they regularly or sometimes text while driving.

In the three years since 2022, a set of questions has been included in the Attitude and Awareness Survey to examine reasons for changes in traffic safety behavior. These questions asked if, compared to last year, had their seat belt use, texting while driving, speeding, and drinking and driving increased or decreased. Based on their response, a multiple-choice question followed asking the main reason for the change. Results are displayed in four pie charts below.

Seat belt use was reported as having increased over last year by a third of the respondents. Within this group, respondents checked the reason most often for increasing use was to avoid a ticket (see Figure 39).

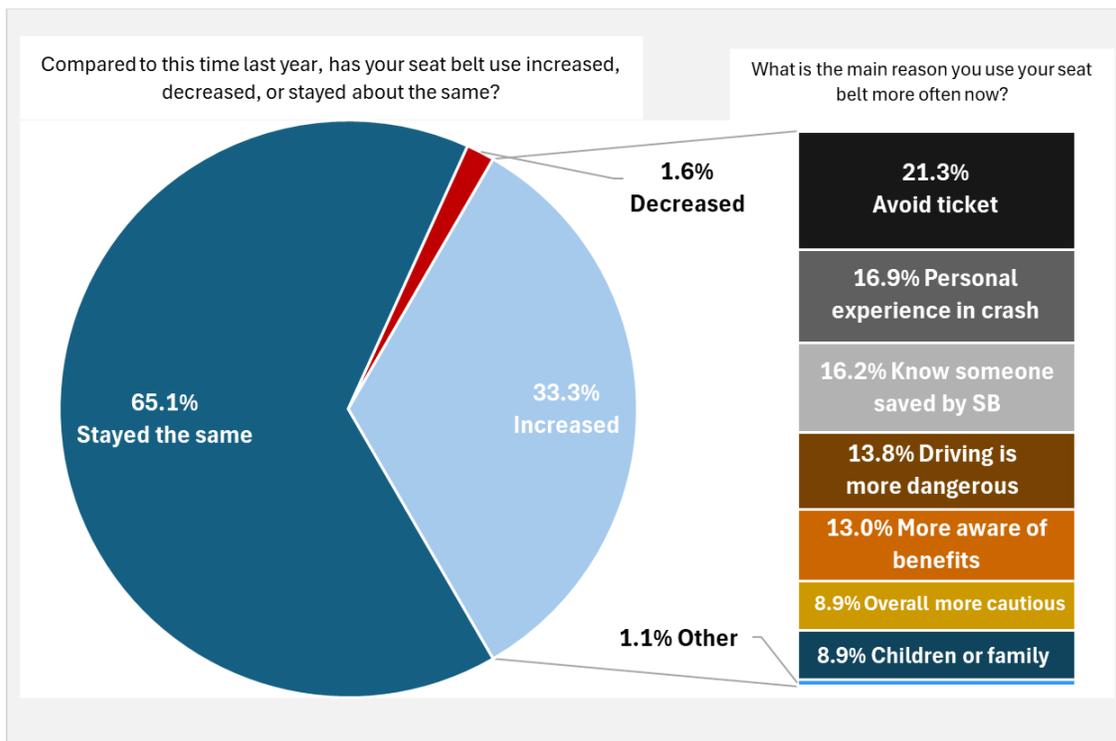


Figure 38. Change in Self-Reported Seat Belt Use

The largest percentage of self-reported behavior change reported was texting while driving, with 45.1 percent of the survey respondents saying they text less often than they did a year ago. The multiple-choice response checked most often among the 45.1 percent was simply “being more careful now (see Figure 40).”

Over 16 percent of the sample said their tendency to drive over the speed limit has increased over the past year, whereas almost 26 percent reported a decrease and 57.9 percent said their tendency to speed had stayed the same. The main reason for speeding less was “being more cautious now.” The main reason for speeding more was “In a hurry more often” (26.2 percent), followed closely by “Other drivers are speeding” (24.9 percent).

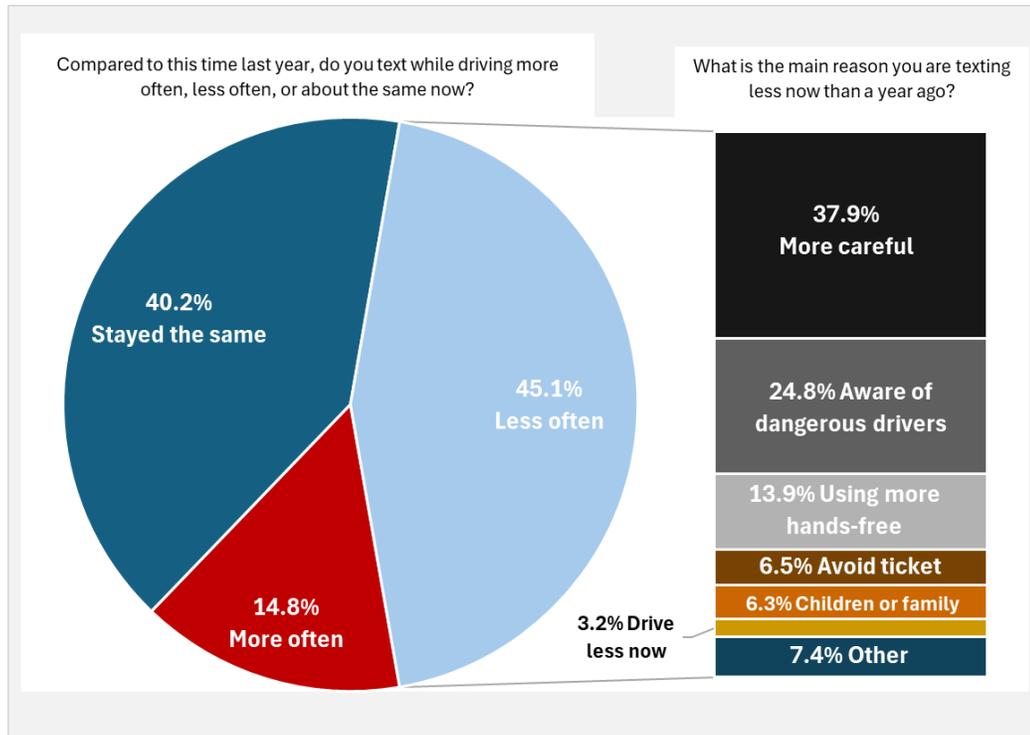


Figure 39. Change in Self-Reported Texting and Driving

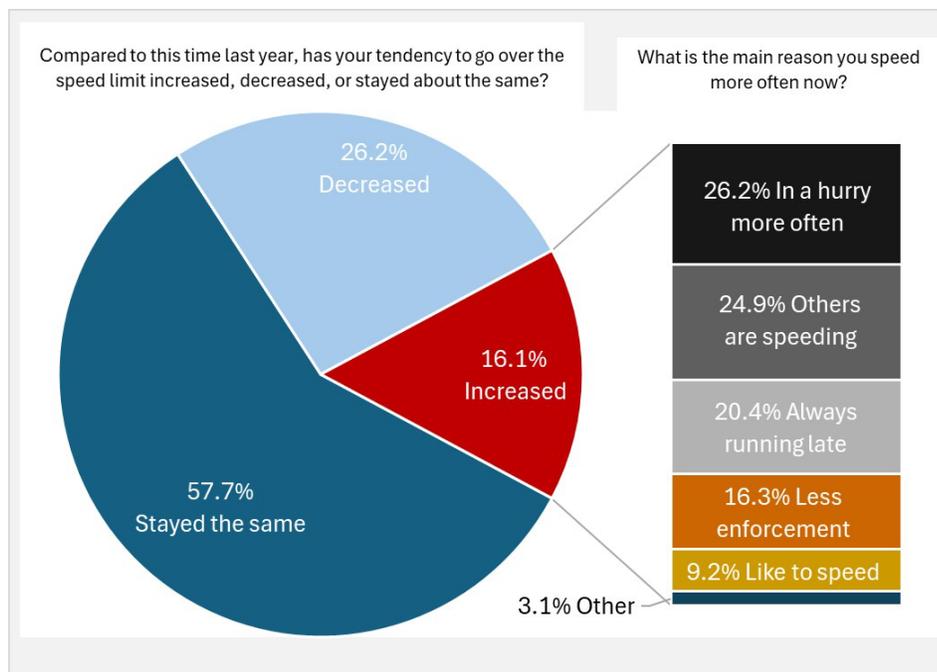


Figure 40. Change in Self-Reported Speeding

About 40 percent of the respondents said they drink and drive less often now than a year ago. The reason checked most often was the tendency not to drink as much, checked by 27.6 percent of those who said they are drinking and driving less often than they did a year ago.

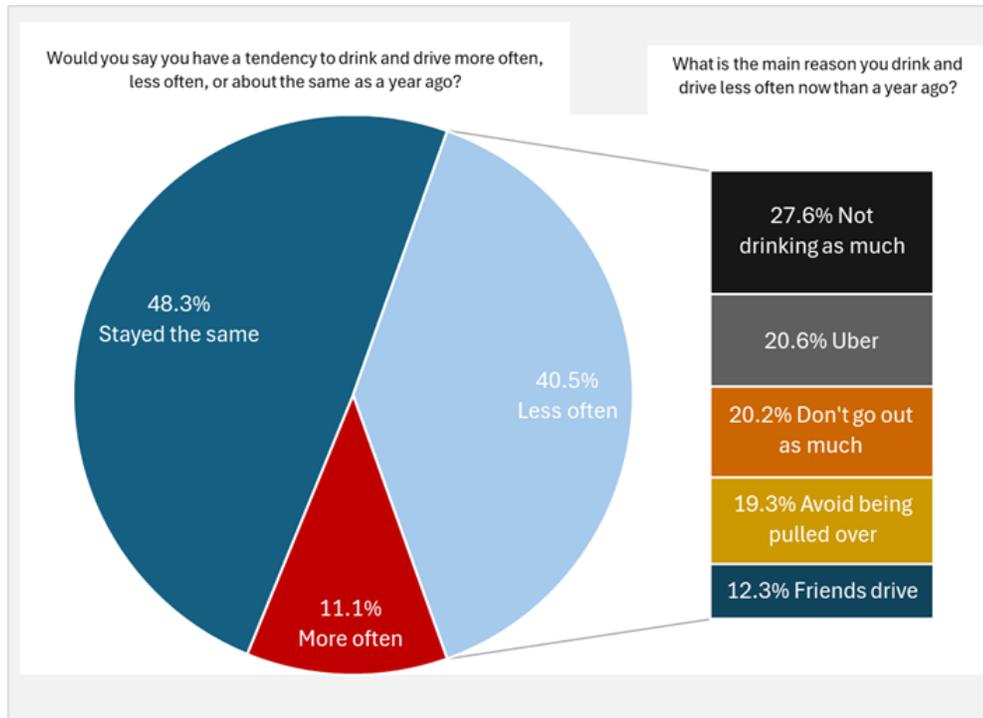


Figure 41. Change in Self-Reported Drinking and Driving

A final question on the survey was a multiple-choice question asked to determine the main influencing factors for less cell phone use and less drinking and driving behavior. About 25 percent (24.8 percent) said they did not use a cell phone while driving, and 6.0 percent of respondents checked they had not been influenced to use cell phones less while driving. For those who said they had been influenced to use a cell phone less while driving, 44.6 percent checked “fear of injury to self or others” as the reason. The least often cited influencer (8.7 percent) was employee policy (Figure 43).

Of the 2,526 people who responded to the question regarding reasons for not drinking and driving or for stopping drinking and driving, 6.0 percent said they had not been influenced to drink and drive less. Figure 44 shows that for those who had stopped or do not drink and drive, the most prevalent reason was the same as for reducing cell phone use – “fear of injury to self or others” (29.3 percent). The least often cited influencer was also employee policy (6.5 percent). Over half of the sample (50.2 percent) said they do not drink and drive.

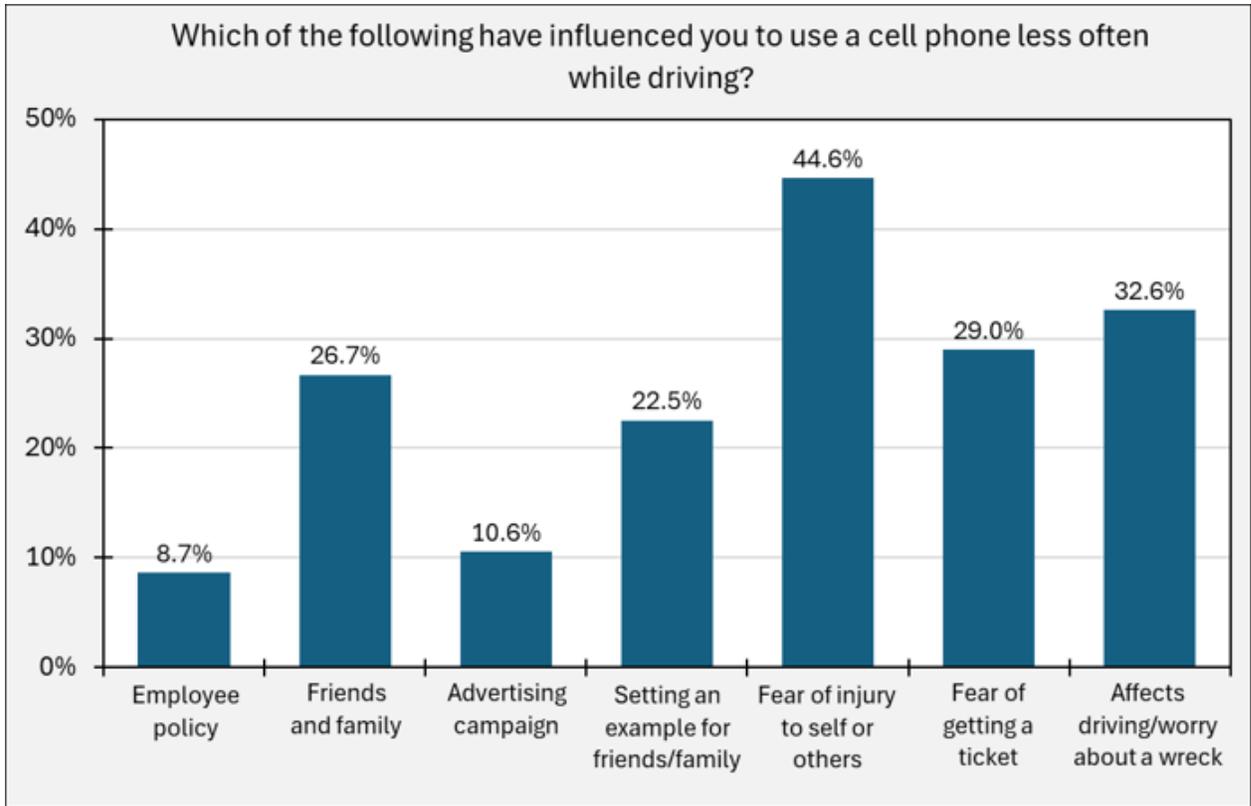


Figure 442. Reasons for Using Cell Phones Less

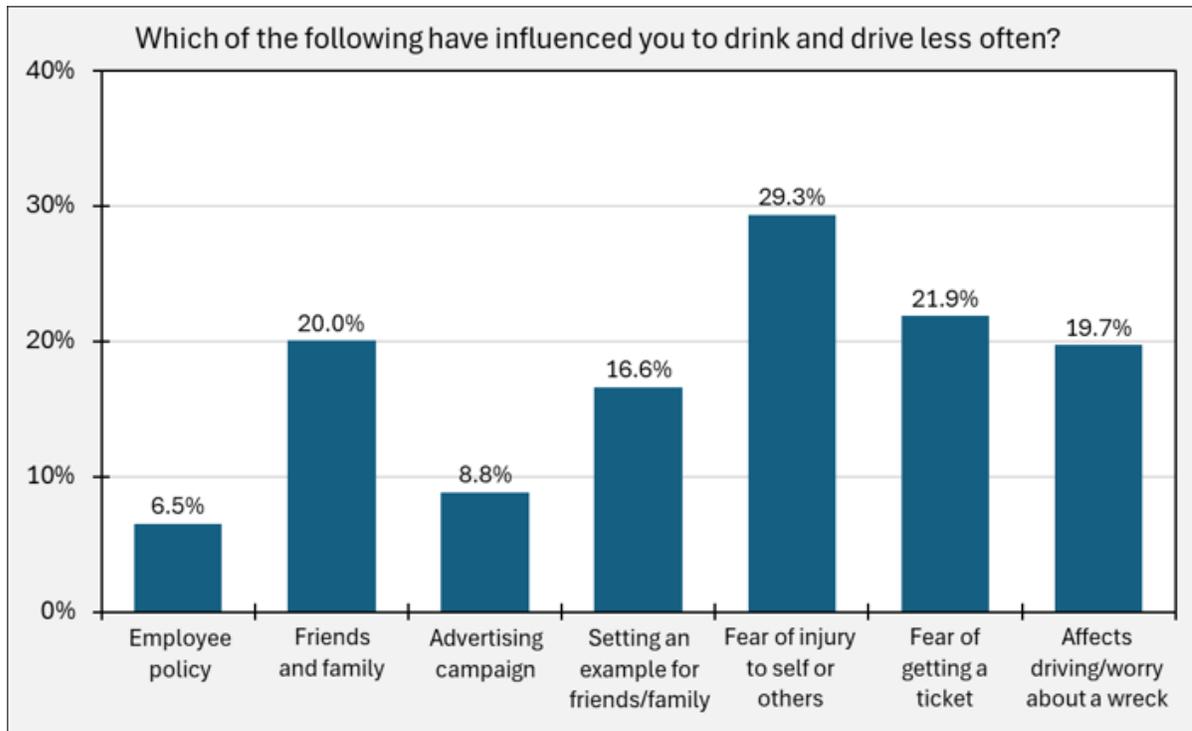


Figure 43. Reasons for Drinking and Driving Less

SUMMARY OF KEY FINDINGS

- Just over half of respondents surveyed (52.2 percent) had read, seen or heard a message about alcohol impaired driving enforcement by police in the preceding 30 days. Perceived likelihood of arrest for impaired driving was higher than being cited for speeding or not wearing a seat belt.
- The Click It or Ticket message remains the most highly recognized of 12 traffic safety campaign messages used in Texas, with 84 percent of respondents saying they had seen or heard it within the past year.
- Over 60 percent of respondents had read, heard, or seen a seat belt enforcement message in the past year, and 88 percent of respondents believed there is some likelihood of a citation for seat belt law non-compliance. Ninety-five percent of respondents reported they always or nearly always use seat belts.
- Perception of speed enforcement is relatively high, with 73 percent thinking the chances of being cited for speeding is very or somewhat likely. Yet, approximately 50 percent of survey respondents said they speed on local roads and highways at least sometimes, and approximately 12 percent said regularly. Sixteen percent of the sample said their tendency to speed had increased in the past year, with primary reasons given as being in a hurry more often and because others are speeding.
- Self-reported cell phone use among drivers is most common relative to other traffic safety risk behaviors. Over 28 percent (28.2 percent) of respondents said they had sometimes or regularly talked on their cell phone while driving during the past month.
- Self-reported texting while driving was reported by 18 percent of respondents who said they had sometimes or regularly read or sent a text message in the past 30 days while driving.
- Lowest reported risky driving behavior was driving through a crosswalk occupied by a pedestrian. Eighty-two percent of respondents had not done so in the past 30 days.
- Texans surveyed are most familiar with the seat belt law requirement for use in all seating positions, with 82.6 percent answering correctly. They are less familiar with the texting ban as applicable to all roads, with 70 percent answering correctly. They are less knowledgeable as well with the Texas Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) limit of .08, with 52.8 percent checking the correct answer.
- The Texas Move Over or Slow Down law is misunderstood by a substantial number of Texans, as indicated by the high percentage who associate the law with moving over to let faster moving or emergency vehicles pass.
- Thirty percent of respondents selected a response other than the correct statement that “Drivers are required by law to stop and yield for pedestrians in crosswalks.”

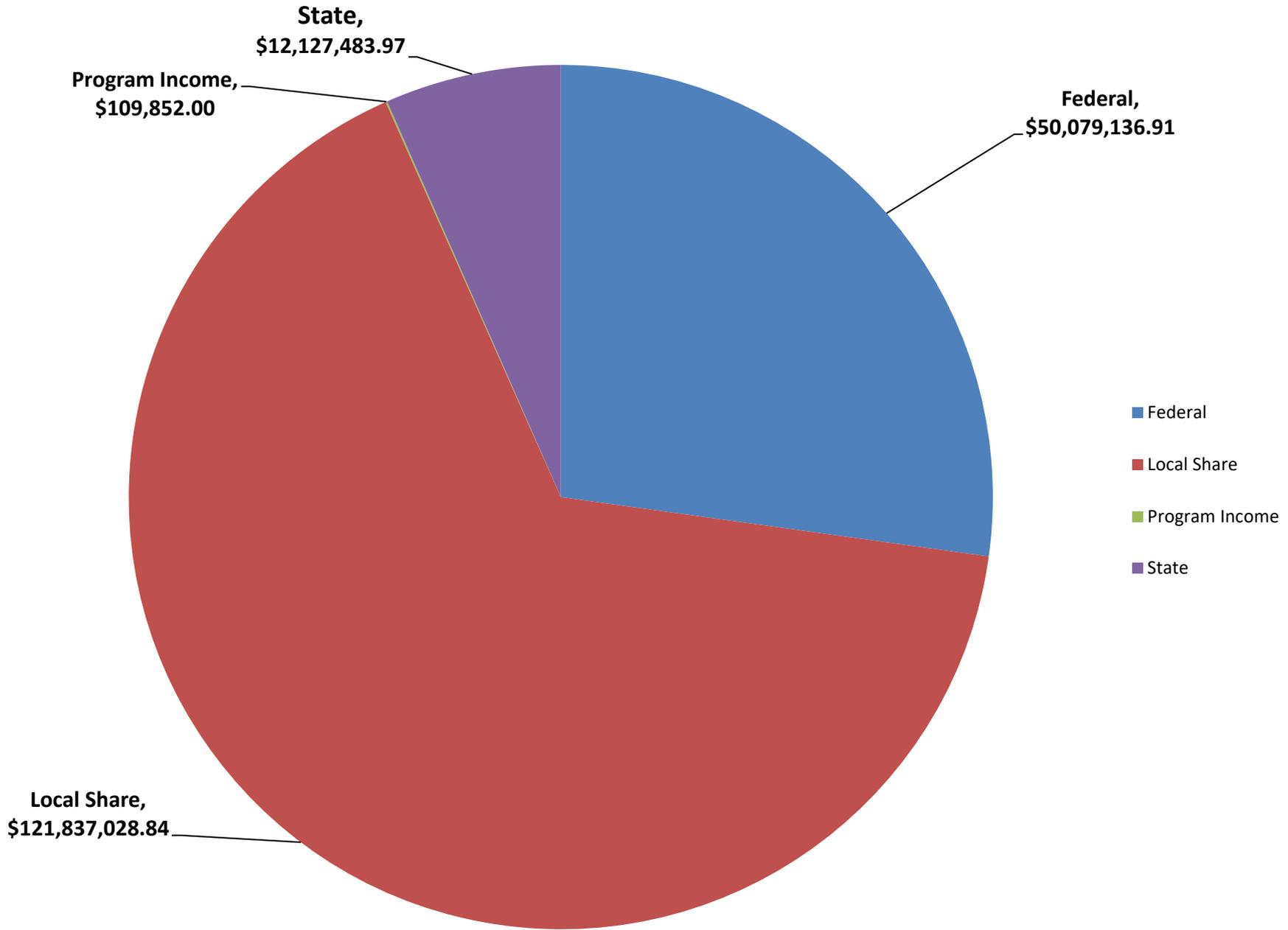

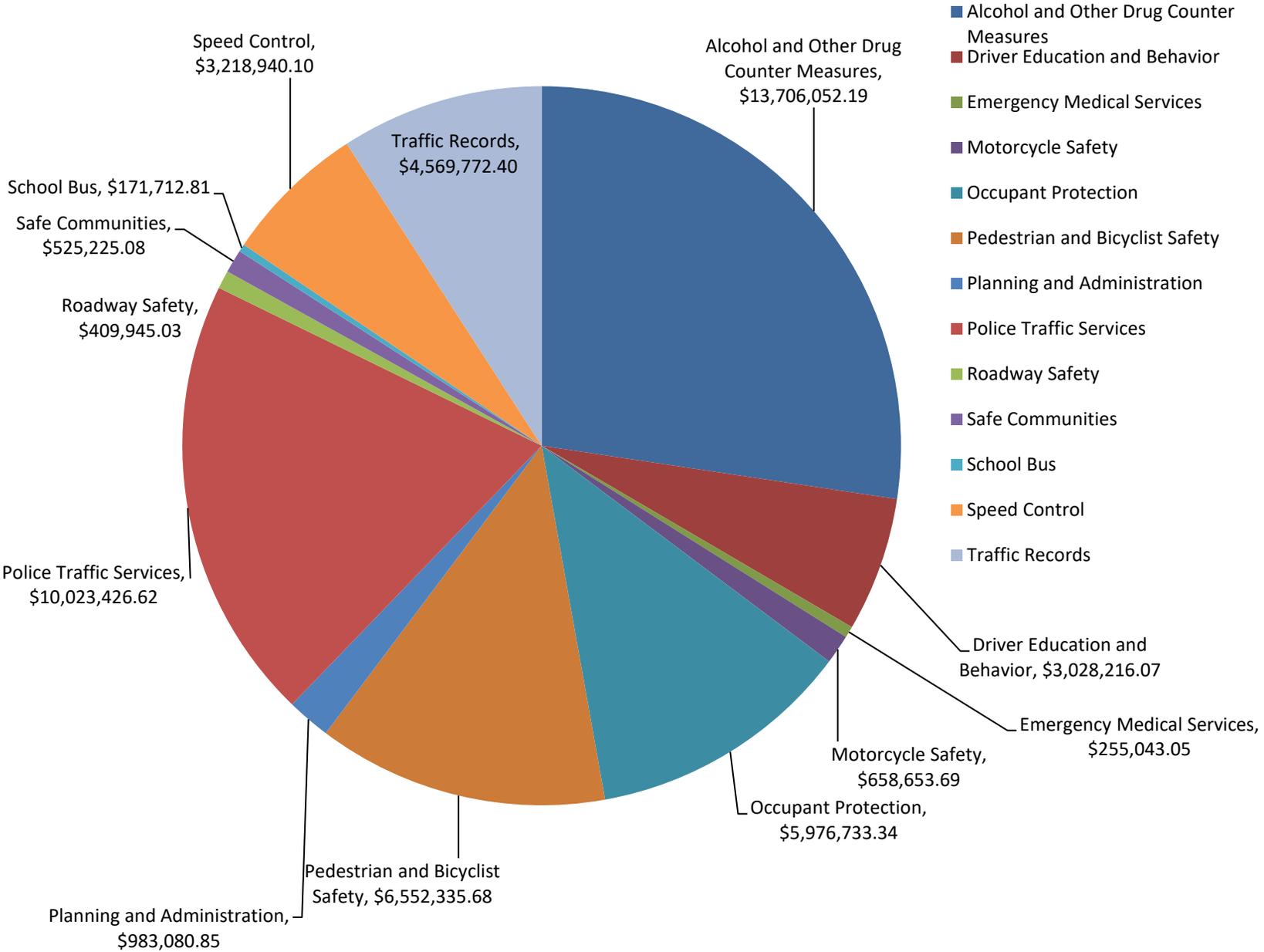
