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PURPOSE OF THIS DOCUMENT

The purpose of the Texas Highway Safety Annual Report is to document and communicate the annual results of the Traffic Safety Program as defined in the corresponding Texas Highway Performance Plan (HSPP).

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

TEXAS TRAFFIC SAFETY PROGRAM

The Texas Traffic Safety Program continued its mission of saving lives and preventing injuries through an extensive grants program. In 2010, there were 352 traffic safety projects in the Texas Traffic Safety Program. The \$84,015,105.84 expended in FY 2010 came from federal, state and local sources as follows:

- \$ 36,006,099.63 in federal funds
- \$9,336,562.80 in state funds
- More than \$ 38,672,443.41 in local funds

ACCOMPLISHING THE GOALS

Education & Training

The Texas Traffic Safety Program funded a broad spectrum of education and training courses during FY 2010 including training for professionals to improve job performance.

Enforcement Efforts

Traffic safety enforcement covered the state in the effort to reduce crashes caused by speeding, alcohol and other drugs, running red lights and stop signs, and failure to use safety belts or child passenger safety seats.

Special Safety Belt and Impaired Driving Campaigns

Click It or Ticket Mobilization

Based on statewide surveys completed by the Texas Transportation Institute in June of 2010, 93.8 percent of Texans buckled up in FY 2010 compared to the 92.9 percent during FY 2009. This is a record setting achievement for safety belt usage in Texas. Before Click It or Ticket (CIOT) enforcement and public education efforts began in Texas in 2002, only 76.1 percent of Texans buckled up. The substantial increase in the belt usage rate from 2002-2009 translates into an estimated 2,800 fewer Texans killed in traffic crashes and an estimated 66,700 fewer injuries on Texas roadways.

Teen Safety Belt Demonstration Project

TxDOT continued to implement the NHTSA Region 6 Teen Safety Belt Demonstration Project with mobilizations in October 2009, February 2010, and May 2010. This involved expanding enforcement, media, community outreach, education, training, and evaluation efforts. The results were extremely positive. Survey results after the campaign indicated teen safety belt use in the 5 target counties (Dallas, Tarrant, Harris, Bexar and Hidalgo) increased 5.9 percentage points. Over 200 high schools in the targeted counties participated in the outreach effort. A strong web component was developed and implemented to support the efforts including having free music downloads as a reward for watching a new safety belt roll-over convincer video posted on the web. Adding the teen component was an excellent way to involve the media, enforcement, and outreach in the overall CIOT campaign.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Impaired Driving Mobilization for Labor Day

TxDOT conducted a successful Impaired Driving Mobilization for Labor Day that included the innovative "Choose Your Ride" campaign. A statewide press event to announce the mobilization was held in Austin and local media events were conducted in various locations around the state. A website, web banners, outdoor and alternative media materials were used as part of the campaign. The artwork for the "Choose Your Ride" campaign featured a picture of car (front half is a police car and the back half is a cab). TxDOT's alternative media/outreach efforts took place in the entertainment districts of Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio. Efforts included window clings placed on driver's side windows and street posters near bars and clubs in entertainment districts. Decals were also placed on bathroom mirrors and doors of bars, clubs and convenience stores with the help of our partners: the Texas Petroleum Marketers and Convenience Store Association and the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission. This new campaign generated increased enforcement, extra media attention, and expanded involvement with the TxDOT District Offices.

Federal Funding

TxDOT applied for and received additional federal funding beyond the base 402 program: Section 405, 408, 410, 2010, and 2011 funding (approx. \$23.5 million extra).

The Traffic Safety Section developed the most detailed Highway Safety Performance Plan TxDOT ever submitted to NHTSA during FY 2010 for FY 2011. The new format provides an excellent tool for use in managing the program.

PLANNING FUTURE IMPROVEMENTS

Continued Focus on Alcohol-Related Fatalities

From 2003 – 2007, Texas experienced a reduction in fatalities from year to year. Unfortunately, Texas experienced a slight increase in fatalities from 3,466 in 2007 to 3,476 in 2008 (2008 CRIS). Alcohol continues to be a major contributing factor in traffic crashes and fatalities. Future program efforts need to continue to include education, training, and enforcement projects to address this problem.

Share the Road

An alarming concern in the overall number of traffic fatalities is the significant increase in motorcycle fatalities. A record 524 motorcyclists (operators and passengers) died in crashes in 2008. Sixty-one percent (61%) of motorcyclists killed were not wearing helmets at the time of the crash. Motorcycle fatalities were 10% of Texas' overall fatalities two years ago. In 2008, they were over 15% of the fatalities. However, motorcycles represent only 2% of the vehicle mix. Additional attention needs to be placed on motorcycle training, being properly licensed, wearing protective equipment, impaired driving, and enhancing public information and education campaigns such as Share the Road to improve motorcycle safety.

Strategic Planning

Texas will conduct Strategic Planning for the Traffic Safety Program during FY 2011. The last formal Strategic Planning Meeting was conducted in FY 2003. At that time a Performance Plan with goals, strategies and objectives was developed that addressed FY 2004 - 2010. Now that recent crash data is available to assist with program planning, a Strategic Planning process will be conducted to review and update program goals, strategies, and objectives for FY 2012 - 2016.

Improved Crash Reporting

A new crash form (CR-3) became effective in Texas on January 1, 2010. Training was provided to more than 400 law enforcement agencies, reaching more than 2,000 officers throughout the state on the new form to help increase timely reporting and accuracy. Training also addressed the 2010

Edition of the <u>Instructions to Police for Reporting Crashes</u> (CR-100). The CR-100 has undergone significant changes in an effort to make it more user-friendly and to clarify instructions and requirements.

Law enforcement agencies can opt to have trainers come to them for individual form training or they can participate via video tele-conference sessions. TxDOT is also beginning to test the new Crash Analysis for Safer Highways (CRASH) application that is expected to be deployed during the first quarter of 2011. This application will eliminate the need for agencies to report by submitting paper forms and instead allow them to key the data directly into the state's data repository.

Special Management Review (SMR)

TxDOT underwent a Special Management Review (SMR) during FY 2010. The reason for the SMR was based on Texas' rate of alcohol-related fatalities. States were selected for a SMR after an analysis of data for fatalities in alcohol impaired driving crashes for the years 2005 through 2008. SMR's are scheduled as a result of a State's consistent performance below the national average and progress less than half of that recorded by the nation as a whole. A SMR examines management and operational practices in a specific program area to identify opportunities to improve performance.

Texas was selected for the SMR based on its **Impaired Driving Fatality Rates** (FARS)

- <u>Performance Measure</u>: Alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate per 100 million VMT (fatal crashes that involve at least one driver or a motorcycle rider (operator) with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of 0.08 grams per deciliter or higher; FARS).
- <u>Improvement Measure</u>: Percent decrease in the alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate from the year prior to the three year span until the end of the three year span. Most recent years for which data are available: 2005 (base year), 2006, 2007, and 2008.

The national Alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate decrease was 12.04% (half is 6.02%). Texas' alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate decrease from 2005 to 2008 was 3.74%, which is less than one-half of the national alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate decrease (6.02%).

Texas' alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate was greater than the national average rate for the most recent three years and our alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate decrease from 2005 to 2008 was less than one-half of the national alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate decrease. Unfortunately, because of these two factors Texas meets the criteria for selection for a SMR of its impaired driving program. NHTSA conducted the SMR during August 2010. NHTSA and TxDOT are currently jointly developing a Performance Enhancement Plan (PEP).

Program Funding

Funding is from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), a division of the U.S. Department of Transportation. Over 350 traffic safety grants are awarded annually to state, local and non-profit agencies across Texas equaling approximately 84 million dollars per year.

Grants were awarded based on the merits of the specific proposed project, relevancy to the current traffic safety issues as identified by the state, and the approval of the Texas Transportation Commission and NHTSA.

On July 30, 2009, the Texas Transportation Commission approved funding for the *FY 2010 Texas Highway Safety Performance Plan*, which described how federal highway safety funds would be programmed consistent with the guidelines, priority areas, and other Section 402 requirements. In addition to the Section 402 program, the FY 2010 Texas Traffic Safety Program included funding from the Safe Accountable Flexible Efficient Transportation Equity Act, A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU). These included:

THE TRAFFIC SAFETY ORGANIZATION

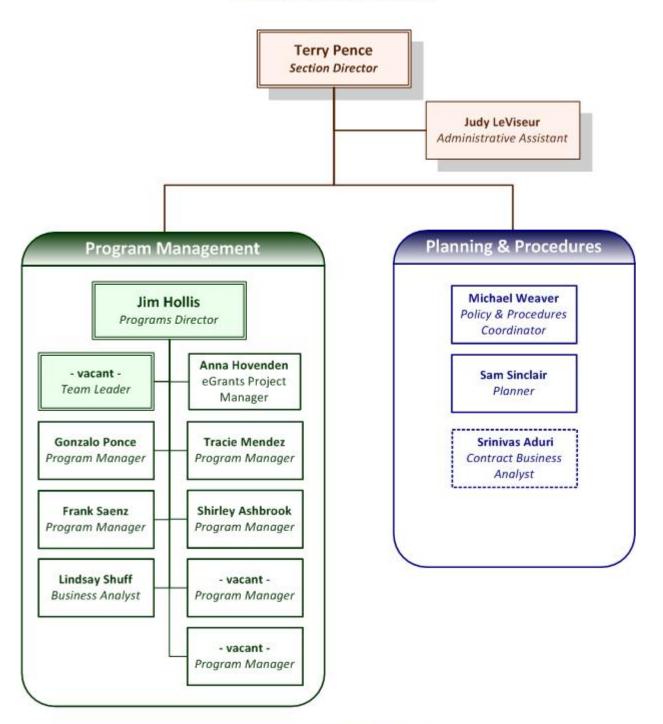
In FY 2010 the Texas Traffic Safety Program was managed by the Traffic Safety Section (TRF-TS) of TxDOT's Traffic Operations Division, and supported by Traffic Safety Specialists (TSS) in each of the 25 TxDOT Districts across the state. The following organization charts show the details of these two groups respectively.

In FY 2011 the Texas Traffic Safety Program structure will change significantly. Beginning October 1, 2010 a total of 19 full time Traffic Safety Specialists will report directly to TRF-TS. These TSS will work 100% of their time supporting the Texas Traffic Safety Program. This is a departure from the previous structure where the TSS staff held various duties other than traffic safety and reported to District Engineers. This centralization of the Texas Traffic Safety Program will result in greater efficiency and increased emphasis on traffic safety.

LEGISLATIVE ISSUES

The Texas Legislature did not convene during FY 2010. The 82nd Texas Legislature is schedule to convene in January of 2011.

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CHALLENGES

Alcohol-related Crashes

Crashes, injuries and fatalities caused by drunk drivers continue to be the major traffic safety problem in Texas. Texas' alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate was greater than the national average rate for the most recent three years and our alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate decrease from 2005 to 2008 was less than one-half of the national alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate decrease. Unfortunately, because of these two factors Texas meets the criteria for selection for a Special Management Review (SMR) of its impaired driving program. NHTSA conducted the SMR during August 2010. NHTSA and TxDOT are currently jointly developing a Performance Enhancement Plan (PEP).

Occupant Protection

Based on statewide surveys completed by the Texas Transportation Institute in June of 2010, 93.8 percent of Texans buckled up in FY 2010 compared to the 92.9 percent during FY 2009. Before Click It or Ticket (CIOT) enforcement and public education efforts began in Texas in 2002, only 76.1 percent of Texans buckled up. The substantial increase in the belt usage rate from 2002-2009 translates into an estimated 2,400 fewer Texans killed in traffic crashes and an estimated 56,300 fewer injuries on Texas roadways. The challenge for the future is this: maintain our belt usage rate while devising new strategies to impact the "hard to reach" population.

From 2001-2009, the use of safety belts in our state has saved the State of Texas and society an estimated \$10 billion in wage and productivity losses, medical expenses, administrative expenses, motor vehicle damage, employer costs, taxes, insurance premiums, travel delays and a measure of the value of lost quality of life. The economic impact was derived from using the average comprehensive costs on a per-injured-person basis from 2001 provided by the National Safety Council. These numbers were adjusted to actual fatality and injury numbers from motor vehicle crashes in Texas in 2001.

The significant improvement in safety belt use is attributed to increased enforcement, a large public information and education campaign, statewide increase in local community involvement, as well as strong campaign participation and support from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) Region 6.

PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION

The Texas Department of Transportation, Traffic Operations Division, coordinates the development and implementation of highway safety performance goals, strategies, and objectives for each program area based on the problems identified in each area. These problem areas are based on both the national issues identified by NHTSA, and the statewide issues specific to Texas. The crash data listed above is used to show the trends of these issues, and is used as a baseline to demonstrate improvement in each area.

The agencies that Texas works with to identify these problem areas, and determine how to address them, include the following: AAA-Texas, AARP, MADD-Texas, Texas Department of Public Safety (TxDPS), Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS), Texas Transportation Institute (TTI), Texas AgriLife Extension Service, Texas Engineering Extension Service (TEEX), Texas Bicycle Coalition (TBC), and the NHTSA Region 6.

GOALS

For Fiscal Year 2010, the following goals were identified:

- To reduce the number of motor vehicle crashes, injuries and fatalities
- To provide effective and efficient management of the Texas Traffic Safety Program
- To reduce the number of alcohol impaired and driving under the influence of alcohol and other drug-related crashes, fatalities and injuries
- To reduce the number of DUI-related crashes where the driver is under age 21
- To improve EMS care and support provided to motor vehicle trauma victims in rural and frontier areas of Texas
- To reduce the number of motorcyclist fatalities
- To increase occupant restraint use in all passenger vehicles and trucks
- To reduce the number of motor vehicle-related pedestrian and bicyclist fatalities
- To increase effective enforcement and adjudication of traffic safety-related laws to reduce fatal and serious injury crashes
- To reduce commercial motor vehicle crashes, injuries and fatalities involving vehicles with a Gross Vehicle Weight Rating (GVWR) of 10,000 pounds or greater
- To reduce the number of speed-related fatal and serious injury crashes

- To improve the timeliness of, quality of, availability of, and linkages of records between crash data bases
- To increase public knowledge, perception and understanding of traffic safety
- To reduce KAB crashes at railroad/highway crossings
- To reduce the number of traffic crashes, injuries, and fatalities in work zones per 100 million vehicle miles traveled
- To increase knowledge of roadway safety and current technologies among people involved in engineering, construction, and maintenance areas at both the state and local level
- To establish integrated community traffic safety programs to prevent traffic-related fatalities and injuries
- To reduce school bus-related crashes, injuries and fatalities

PERFORMANCE MEASURE DEFINITION

Defining Performance Measures

Objectives and performance measures were subsequently developed by Texas to improve safety on Texas roadways and reduce the number of crashes, injuries and fatalities. These objectives and performance measures were included in the FY 2010 Performance Plan.

Texas has included the all of the new *Traffic Safety Performance Measures for States and Federal Agencies*, defined by NHTSA and the Governors Highway Safety Association (GHSA), into the makeup of the Performance Plan.



Texas Motor Vehicle Traffic Crash Highlights Calendar Year 2008

- The Fatality Rate on Texas roadways for 2008 was 1.48 deaths per hundred million vehicle miles traveled. This is a 3.49% increase from 2007.
- Texas experienced an increase in the number of motor vehicle traffic fatalities. The 2008 death toll of 3,477 was an increase of 0.40% from the 3.463 deaths recorded in 2007.
- There were 62,296 serious injury crashes in Texas in 2008. These crashes resulted in 84,946 people sustaining a serious injury.
- The annual vehicle miles traveled in Texas during 2008 reached 234.593 billion, a decrease of 2.96% over the 241.746 billion traveled in 2007.
- Fatalities in traffic crashes in rural areas of the state accounted for 53.3% of the state's traffic fatalities. There were 1,854 deaths in rural traffic crashes.
- Single vehicle, run-off the road crashes resulted in 1,257 deaths in 2008. This was 36% of all motor vehicle traffic deaths in 2008.
- In 2008 there were 832 people killed in crashes occurring in intersections or related to an intersection.
- There were 511 people killed in head-on crashes in 2008.
- There were no deathless days on Texas roadways in 2008.
- Friday, August 8th was the deadliest day in 2008 with thirty-two (32) persons killed in traffic crashes. August and October were the deadliest months with 319 persons killed in both months.

- Based on reportable crashes in 2008:
 - 1 person was killed every 2 hours32 minutes
 - 1 person was injured every 2 minutes 10 seconds
 - 1 reportable crash occurred every72 seconds
- Of all persons killed in vehicles where restraint usage was applicable and usage was known in 2008, 47% were reported as not restrained when the fatal crash occurred.
- 243,866 persons were injured in motor vehicle traffic crashes in 2008.
- There were 531 motorcyclists (operators and passengers) killed in 2008. Fifty-five percent (55%) of motorcyclists killed were not wearing helmets at the time of the crash.
- Pedestrian fatalities totaled 443 in 2008. This is a 6% increase from 2007.
- Pedalcyclist fatalities totaled 48 in 2008. This is a 4% decrease from 2007.
- In 2008, there were 1,005 people killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes where a driver was under the influence of alcohol. This is 28.9% of the total number of people killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes.
- During 2008, more DUI Alcohol crashes were reported in the hour between 2:00 am and 2:59 am than any other hour of the day. Also, more alcohol related crashes occurred on Saturday than any other day of the week.

Information contained in this report represents reportable data collected from Texas Peace Officer's Crash Reports (CR-3) received and processed by the Department as of August 14, 2010.

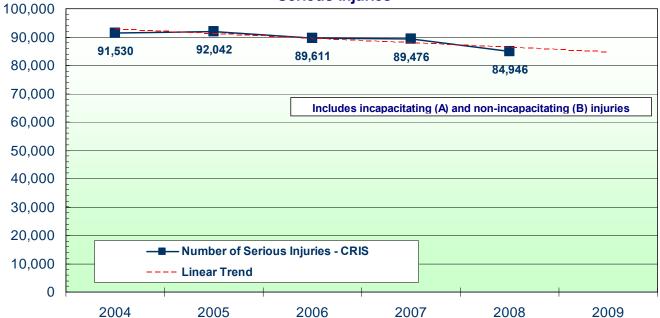

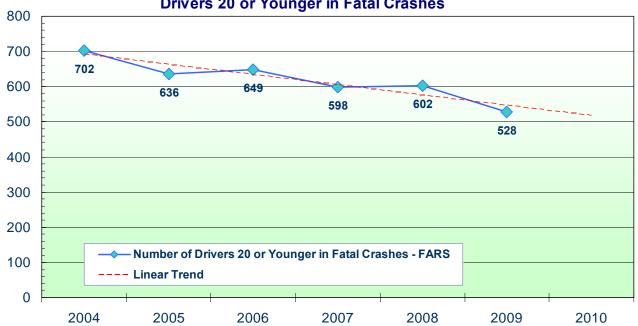
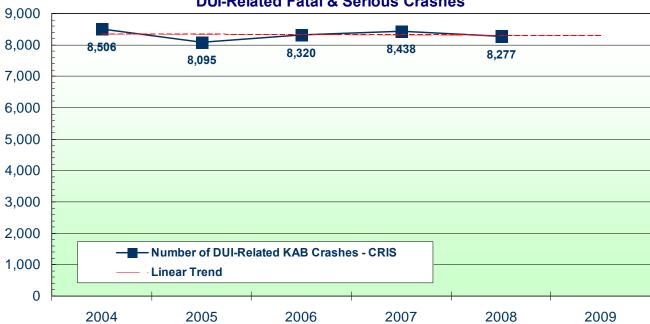


Figure 6. Performance Measure 7: DUI-Related Fatal & Serious Crashes



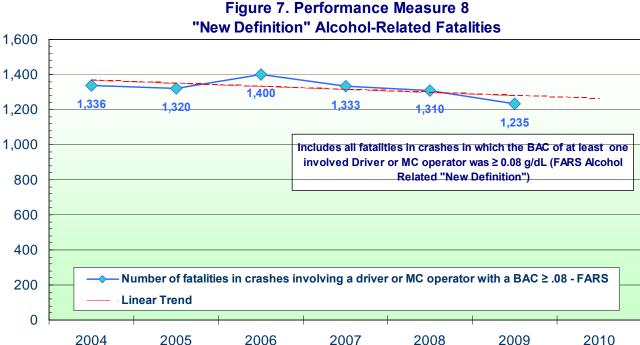
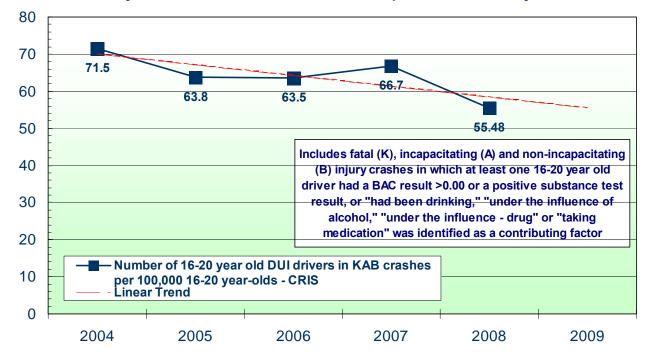


Figure 8. Performance Measure 10 Number of 16-20 year old DUI drivers in KAB crashes per 100,000 16-20 year-olds - CRIS





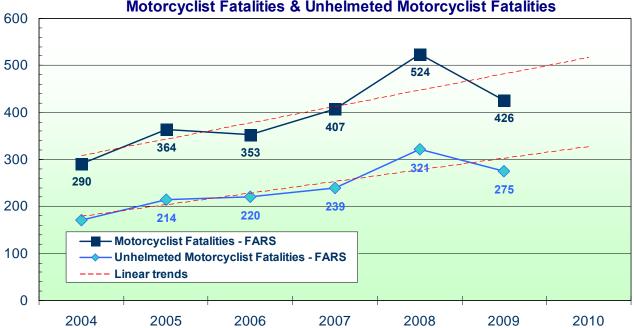
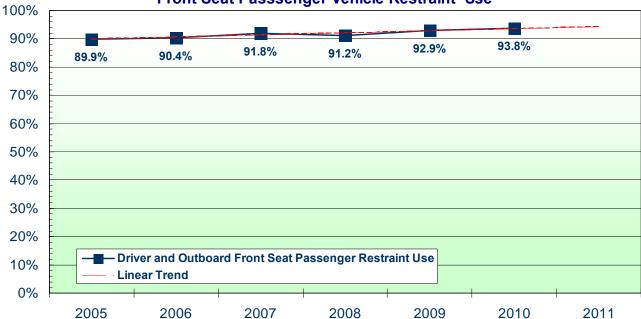


Figure 10. Performance Measure 14
Front Seat Passsenger Vehicle Restraint Use





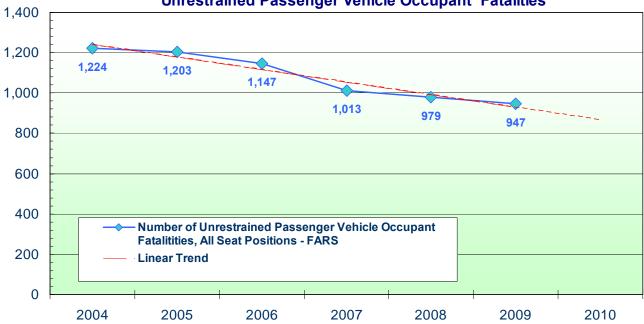


Figure 12. Performance Measure 19
Pedestrian Fatalities

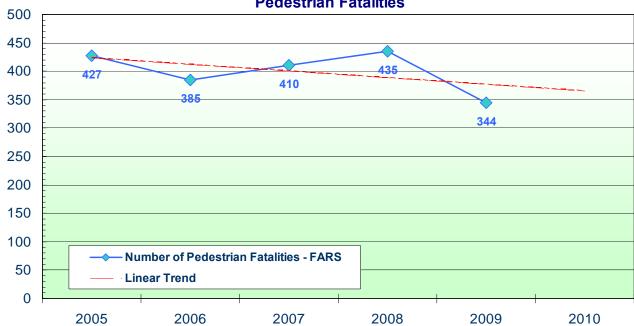


Figure 13. Performance Measures 20: Number of Bicyclist Fatalities

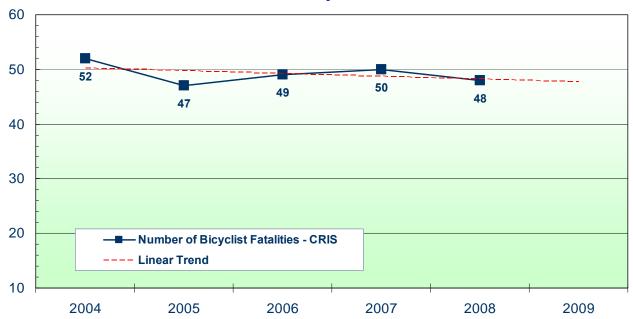
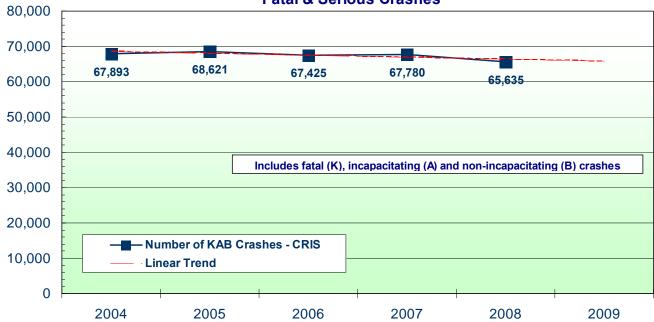
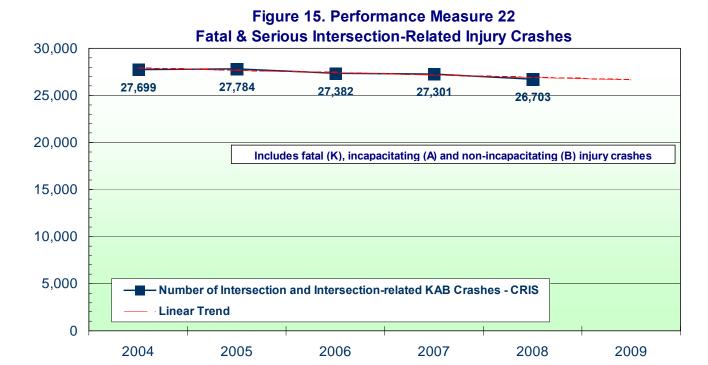
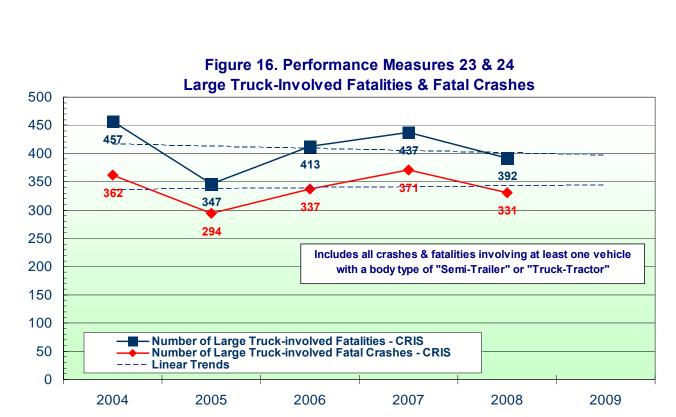
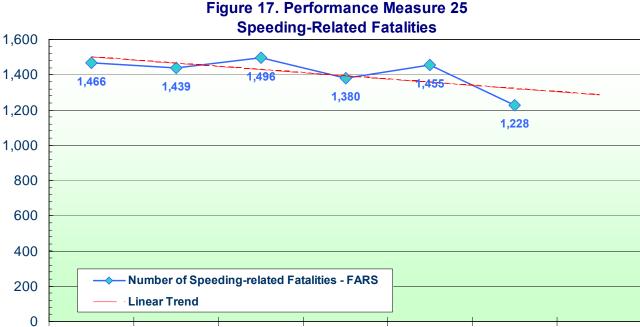


Figure 14. Performance Measure 21 Fatal & Serious Crashes

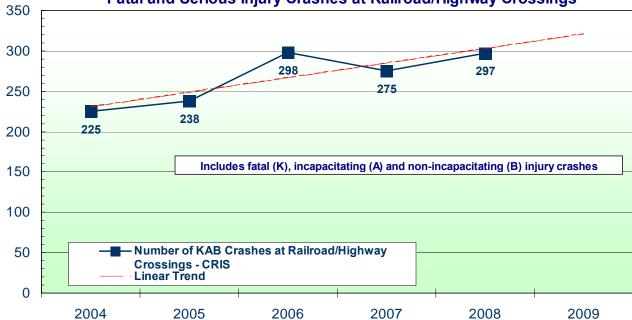












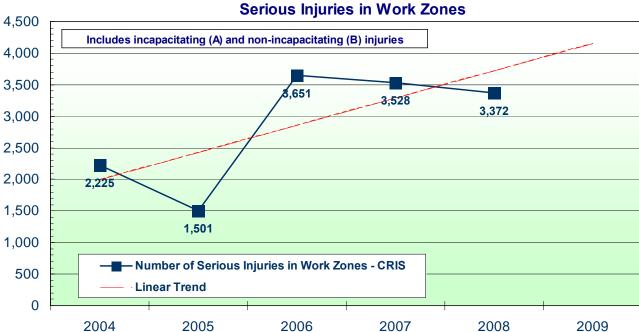


Figure 19. Performance Measure 32 Serious Injuries in Work Zones





DATA SOURCES & GLOSSARY FOR PERFORMANCE MEASURES

Performance Measure Data Sources	
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All crash and casualty data in this document originate from Texas police crash reports as coded in two record systems: the Fatality Analysis and Reporting System and the Texas Crash Record Information System. Differences in coding, the variables coded and definitions of those variables render direct comparisons among the data in the systems problematic. Although in most cases differences among the data in the systems are negligible and practically insignificant, for several variables, the differences are notable. This is especially true for crashes (and the casualties sustained in those crashes) that involve alcohol and/or other drugs and to a lesser extent for crashes involving specific vehicle types. The definitions offered in the glossary are provided both to assist in clarifying those differences and to improve the precision of statements about the crash and casualty experience in Texas.

FY10 FALL IMPAIRED DRIVING PREVENTION CAMPAIGN FEATURING

In 1999, Jacqueline Saburido was trapped and burned over 60 percent of her body after a 19-year-old drunk driver slammed into the car in which she was riding. Her gripping story is the centerpiece of a comprehensive campaign to reach underage drinkers, college students, and young adults with drunk driving prevention messages. The campaign, which was first launched in 2002, has won more than a dozen national and international awards, includes television and radio commercials in English and Spanish, posters and print ads, an educational package for high school students, documentary-style videos and two websites (TexasDWI.org and HelpJacqui.com). The extensive range of components sparked widespread interest in the campaign for its universal appeal and led to a flood of calls from media outlets and reporters from around the world.

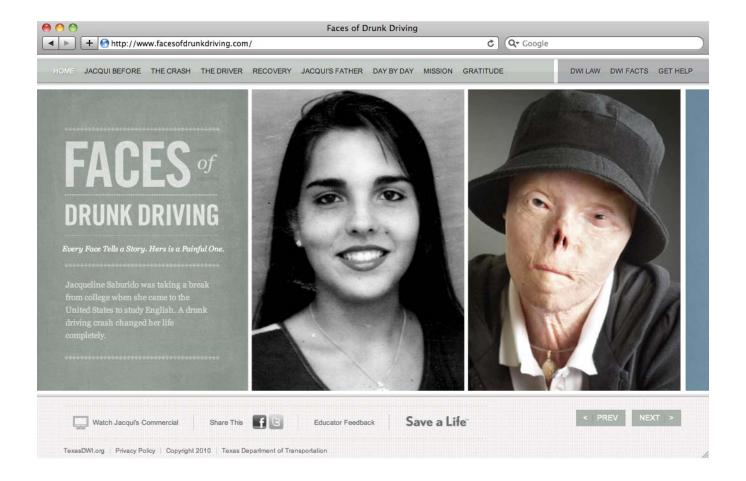
Thanks to TxDOT's willingness to develop and distribute a no-holds-barred campaign and the widespread media coverage it has generated, TxDOT has emerged as an international leader in the field of drunk driving prevention. Best of all, in 2004, officials at the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration credited the Before and After campaign in part with the first decline in alcohol-related traffic fatalities in Texas since 1999.

Building on this success, TxDOT launched the next evolution of the campaign in 2010 with the development and distribution of a new video outreach program entitled Regret. This video was supported with a paid media campaign and a new campaign website highlighting Jacqui's story, as well as a new educational kit. Though materials were produced in FY10, FY11 funds will be used for the paid media portion of the campaign.

INTERACTIVE

In FY10, TxDOT launched a new website called FacesofDrunkDriving.com. The site was designed to call attention to the tragedy of drunk driving from the victim's point of view. Over time, the site will be filled with the stories of those whose lives were forever changed by an impaired driver. In the initial phase, the site tells the story of Jacqui Saburido, a woman who was burned beyond recognition when a

drunk driver, Reggie Stephey, slammed into the car she was riding in, igniting it in flames. Visitors can also watch interviews with Jacqui and Reggie, hear audio of the 911 call after the crash, and learn facts and consequences of drunk driving. The site also gives visitors the opportunity to share Jacqui's story and her message not to drink and drive via Facebook and Twitter.

PAID MEDIA

Paid media to drive visitors to the site included a refreshed version of Jacqui's TV PSA as well as online advertisements. Paid media will run in October 2010, using FY11 funds.

EDUCATIONAL KIT

As part of the campaign, TxDOT created educational packages that include:

- A three-part, 28-minute, documentary-style DVD titled Jacqui's Story featuring candid interviews with Jacqui Saburido and Reggie Stephey over a seven-year period;
- Posters (in English and Spanish);
- Discussion guides and lesson plan suggestions; and
- Information about DWI laws in Texas.

A total of 14,342 kits were distributed to Texas middle schools, DWI courts, driver's education schools, and military bases.

FY10 KNOW WHEN TO PASS DESIGNATED DRIVER CAMPAIGN



CAMPAIGN OVERVIEW

Watching football is a national pastime, especially in Texas where two professional teams and 33 college teams drive Texans "football crazy". Unfortunately, research conducted for this initiative in November and December of 2009 confirms that the sport of watching the sport is often accompanied by excessive alcohol consumption. This 594-person telephone survey revealed that most people watch football at home or at a friend's house and 51% of those watching at a friend's house have 3 or more drinks, (14% have 6 drinks or more) and 45% report driving home. When attending a game, 42% of those interviewed reported having 3 or more drinks, (12% have 6 drinks or more) and 73% report driving home. These statistics are bolstered by TxDOT's crash statistics that indicate that 6% of all DUI¹ crashes and 5% of all fatal DUI¹ crashes occurred on football game days when a Texas team was playing.

Year one of this three year campaign, launched at the start of the 2010 football season and uses paid media to target football fans while they are watching the game at a friend's house or in the stadium, reminding them that if they've been drinking, to pass their keys. Media began in mid-August with the NFL pre-season games, covering college and professional football matches throughout the season. Three thirty-second televisions spots and two versions of sixty and thirty-second radio spots were produced in English and Spanish specifically targeting football fans while they are participating in football watching parties.

Paid Media

Paid media efforts included spot television, spot radio, DJ endorsements on sports talk radio, and interactive advertising in the following markets: Austin, Bryan/College Station, Dallas/ Fort Worth, El Paso, Houston, Lubbock, RGV, and San Antonio. Sports sponsorship packages were also secured with 5 major football teams in Texas: the Dallas Cowboys, Houston Texans, Texas Longhorns, Texas A&M Aggies and Texas Tech Red Raiders.



Television advertising aired during NCAA and NFL football games, as well as during recap shows such as ESPN's College Gameday. Radio advertising focused on sports talk stations in each market, with DJ endorsements running in addition to traditional :30 and :60 spots. Internet banner ads and video were placed on football-themed websites such as fantasy football leagues, interactive chat rooms (ie. www.hornsfans.com), and sports-related sites (ie. www.ESPN.com). The sports sponsorships included prominent in-stadium signage, banner ads on teams' websites and display space on game day.

Added Value

Added value elements negotiated as part of the media buy included bonus spots, DJ endorsements, and online banner ads. The total added value reported for FY 2010 is \$454,233.

Earned Media

A statewide press release was sent out in September 2010 to broadcast and print outlets to raise awareness of the issue of game day drinking and driving and TxDOT's efforts to address the issue. Work began on the interactive mobile display that traveled during September 2010 and will continue through the rest of the football season in FY 2011.

Overall Campaign Value and Results

Paid media generated over 11,345,022 impressions and achieved \$454,233 in added value placements. Public relations and earned media efforts resulted in over \$1,137,799 of added value with partnership added value and contributions totaling \$1,509. Total added value received for the campaign in FY 2010 totaled \$455,742. With the majority of the football season falling in FY'11, earned media efforts hit their stride in during the October 2010 timeframe and will be reported on in the FY 2011 recap.

FY10 Annual Holiday *Designate A Driver* Campaign



With all the parties to attend and presents to buy, wrap, and deliver, traffic on Texas roadways sees a marked increase during the Christmas season. Unfortunately, an increase in alcohol consumption plus more cars on the road can turn this festive time into a dangerous one.

For the 12th consecutive year, TxDOT sponsored a holiday-themed public education campaign to remind Texans not to drive if they've been drinking. Campaign components included paid media, earned media, interactive marketing, and point-of-sale and outreach efforts and was directed to English- and Spanish-speaking Texans between 25 and 54.

To refresh the campaign this year, TxDOT introduced new creative elements featuring a trio of party-going reindeer and the message, "Don't drive if you're tipsy, buzzed or Blitzen. Call a cab or get a sober ride home."

PAID MEDIA

TxDOT placed \$671,678 in paid media from December 7, 2009 to January 3, 2010. The campaign consisted of festive, friendly reminders that used humor to deliver the serious message not to drink and drive in the following outlets:

ADDED VALUE

Paid media value-add services in the form of bonus spot rotations, on-air interviews featuring TxDOT spokespeople, live liners, combined with posters and decals for alternative media, bonus billboards, plus added-value clicks and impressions online was an estimated \$708,646.



INTERACTIVE

In addition to traditional paid media, public relations, and outreach efforts, TxDOT developed an innovative interactive strategy extending the equity of the holiday campaign to engage Texans online. Interactive media included social media, web banners, online video, and digital out-of-home. Total digital efforts garnered more than 44 million impressions.

Social Media. TxDOT's lovable "Santa" character connected with Texans online via social media profiles on both Facebook and MySpace. The profiles featured interactive content in the form of photos, videos, "North Polls" and letters (blogs) from Santa, all emphasizing the importance of driving sober. Users could also download digital assets, such as campaign-themed desktop backgrounds, cell phone ringtones, holiday MySpace "skins," and a countdown to Christmas clock. TxDOT also launched a "Which Reindeer Are You?" Facebook quiz application to engage users with entertaining, seasonal content while presenting DWI-prevention messages throughout the experience. Users could post personalized results to their own profile walls, allowing TxDOT to virally spread DWI-prevention messages in a fun, non-threatening way.

Santa's social media efforts achieved unprecedented success. Fans and friend requests topped more than 8,000 users. Combined MySpace and Facebook holiday efforts garnered nearly 300,000 user interactions, including profile views, poll responses, downloads, watched videos, blog views, comments, and messages. More than 40,000 impressions came from "word-of-mouse" efforts where visitors passed the message on to their own friends online.

Web Banners. TxDOT placed DWI-prevention messaging on local entertainment guides, such as Austin360.com, GuideLive.com, and Yelp.com to reach users when they were looking for bars, clubs, holiday events, and planning to go out with friends. TxDOT also placed banners on Evite.com, to reach users when they were planning or RSVPing to holiday parties. Animated web banners reminded users to plan a sober ride before taking part in the season's merriment.

Online Video. Seven out of every ten people watch TV or other video content on the web, and that ratio is even higher in this young target demographic. To extend the reach of the "Reindeer Barn" PSA, we placed online video ads and companion banners on Hulu.com and the BBE's network of website properties.

Digital Jukeboxes. TxDOT placed holiday-themed ads on the Ecast network of touch-screen digital jukeboxes, reaching Texans when they were out drinking alcohol at bars and clubs. Bar goers were able to click through to a localized cab finder application and could send taxi numbers right to their cell phones. The microsite also featured a "reindeer game" which reminded users to never drive if they are "tipsy, buzzed or Blitzen." Ecast served 12.1 million impressions and nearly 71,000 users touched through to the cab microsite.

Earned Media

Broadcast. TxDOT distributed b-roll footage to Texas media outlets highlighting the expanded alternative media tactics used in this year's campaign including posters, decals, and antler graphics placed in bars and restaurants across Texas. The story was picked up by major news affiliates in Austin, Dallas/Ft. Worth, El Paso, Houston, San Antonio, and elsewhere across the state, reaching an audience of 743,500 viewers and garnering an estimated \$77,508.50 in earned media value.

Print. TxDOT distributed English and Spanish news releases to more than 500 newspapers throughout

Texas and to a major wire service for targeted distribution. The news releases highlighted the campaign's alternative media tactics and strong partnership network. More than 50 papers ran news stories that reached an estimated 751,400 readers, generating an estimated \$69,897 in earned media value.

Online. TxDOT's "designate a driver" message was picked up by several websites, including Reuters.com and Forbes.com. Coverage by online news sites generated an estimated earned media value of \$175,864 and reached more than 261,000 readers.

Earned Media Summary. Earned media efforts generated \$323,270 in public relations value for the "Designate a Driver" message, reaching Texas news consumers 1.76 million times.

EMPLOYER-BASED OUTREACH

TxDOT partnered with the National Safety Council to provide Safe Office Party Toolkits comprised of an introductory mailer and an online ordering system, offering:

- Decals for mirrors, windows, and doors;
- Breakroom posters;
- Animated and static web banners for the employer's website or Intranet site;
- Digital ePosters employers could email to staff;
- Fact sheets about drinking and driving, laws and consequences;

The direct mail piece was sent to 4,200 employers in the National Safety Council's employer database and received a 9% response rate. Nearly 17,800 "Get a sober ride home" decals and 9,000 posters were distributed.

Point-of-Sale Messaging

For the 12th consecutive year, TxDOT collaborated with retailers to display campaign materials where alcohol is sold. Valero Energy Corporation and members of the Texas Package Store Association, the Texas Petroleum Marketers and Convenience Store Association, and the Texas Restaurant Association donated their time and retail space for messaging during the winter holidays. TABC and TMPA distributed materials, as did TxDOT Traffic Safety Specialists (TSSs). Nearly 45,000 decals were posted on cooler doors and mirrors, and 1.2 million coasters made their way onto bars and tables across Texas. The estimated value of this retail effort totaled \$553,275.

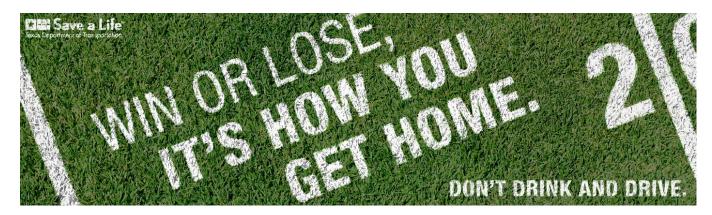
ADDITIONAL EFFORTS

TxDOT distributed promotional and educational items during November and December to TxDOT's Traffic Safety Specialists (TSSs) and subgrantees for their outreach efforts and local press events surrounding the winter holidays. Materials included decals, coasters, and posters featuring Santa, "kissing reindeers," and the new "Tipsy, buzzed or Blitzen" trio creative.

OVERALL CAMPAIGN VALUE

Combining the \$708,646 added value from media vendors, \$323,270 earned media value from public relations activities and \$553,275 in-kind contributions of retail partnerships, the Holiday "Get a sober ride home" campaign generated a total of \$1.6 million in value.

FY10 Annual Super Bowl Don't Drink and Drive Campaign



The Super Bowl has become a holiday in its own right with people getting together to celebrate together at bars, restaurants and watching parties with friends and family. Like many sporting events, alcohol figures strongly into Super Weekend celebrations bringing with it an increase in alcohol-related incidents on Texas roads and highways.

This year, TxDOT sponsored a football-themed public education campaign to remind Texans to plan a safe and sober ride home during the weeks leading up to the big game. Using a combination of traditional, interactive, and alternative media, the campaign aims to remind Texans that no matter whether your team wins or loses, how you get home is the most important play of the day.

Campaign components included paid media, earned media, interactive marketing, and alternative media efforts targeted at Texans between 21 and 54, skewing male.

PAID MEDIA

TxDOT placed \$263,740 on paid media from January 25 – February 7, 2010. The campaign consisted of engaging and friendly reminders using humor to deliver the serious message not to drink and drive in the following outlets:

Paid media was concentrated in the two weeks leading up to the Super Bowl with flights primarily airing on sports cable networks and sports programming on targeted broadcast and cable networks. TV PSAs were aired prior to and during the actual Super Bowl game where available to achieve maximum reach during the campaign.

ADDED VALUE

Paid media value-add services consisted of bonus spot rotations in TV, radio, and digital out-of-home networks. Total added value was \$36,742 during the very high-profile Super Bowl period.

INTERACTIVE

TxDOT placed DWI-prevention messaging on Evite.com, to reach users when they were planning or RSVPing to Super Bowl watching parties. Animated web banners featured football-themed creative and clicked through to TexasDWI.org. Additional online placements included pre-roll video and companion banners on BBE's network of sports-related websites. Web banners and online video garnered 2.6 million impressions and 6,800 click-throughs.

TxDOT also placed football-themed ads on the Ecast network of touch-screen digital jukeboxes, reaching Texans when they were out drinking. Bar and restaurant patrons were able to click through to find local cabs and could send taxi company phone numbers right to their cell phones. The microsite also featured the "Pigskin Challenge" which reminded players that winners always find a sober ride. ECast served over 6 million impressions and 35,510 users touched through to the cab finder microsite.

EARNED MEDIA

TxDOT distributed English and Spanish news releases along with the new TV, radio, and out-of-home PSAs to hundreds of news outlets throughout Texas and to a major wire service for targeted distribution. The news release led with, "Really Bad Cheerleaders Have a Message for Sports Fans" putting the spotlight on the humorous new TV PSA launching the campaign. Major news affiliates and newspapers in Austin, Dallas/Ft. Worth, Houston, San Antonio, and El Paso picked up the story garnering \$297,874 earned media value.

OVERALL CAMPAIGN VALUE

Combining the \$36,000 added value from media vendors and \$297,874 earned media value from public relations activities, the Super Bowl Don't Drink and Drive campaign garnered more than \$334,616 in match funds.

FY10 COLLEGE WHO'S DRIVING TONIGHT? CAMPAIGN



College-age adults continue to be among the worst offenders when it comes to drinking and driving. Whether it's during Spring Break at South Padre Island, tailgating before a football game, or just a night

on the town, entertainment and events for many in this demographic often include consumption of alcohol en masse.

The *Who's Driving Tonight?* public education campaign uses peer-to-peer outreach and online tactics to reach young adults between 18 and 24 to promote the importance of designating a sober driver. Below is the summary of efforts during the 2010 fiscal year.

OUTREACH EVENTS

Lenny, the campaign "spokesdeer," and a team of young staffers hit the road to share DWI-prevention messages with college students at seven events across the state:

- University of Texas El Paso vs. Southern Methodist University at Gerald J. Ford Stadium, Dallas (11/14/2009)
- ESPNU Road to the Championship at AT&T Center, San Antonio (11/17/2009)
- Sam Houston State vs. Texas State in San Marcos, Austin (11/21/2009)
- Rice University vs. University of Texas El Paso at Don Haskins Center, El Paso (2/27/2010)
- Saint Patrick's Day/Spring Break at JP Luby Beach, Corpus Christi (3/17/10)
- Spring Break at South Padre Island, Pharr (3/19/2010)
- Spring Break at South Padre Island, Pharr (3/20/10)

The primary goal of the activity was to engage students with the brand by allowing them to record their own DWI-prevention video. Students got their 15MB of fame and a chance to win an HD Flip Video Camcorder in exchange for recording a DWI-prevention video at a touch-screen video kiosk.

Once user-generated videos were reviewed, tagged with an animated camera card, and uploaded to the *Who's Driving Tonight?* YouTube Channel, students received an email with a link to their video. Other outreach goals achieved were:

- Invited students to sign the *Who's Driving Tonight?* Texas-sized pledge board that read, "Who's Driving Tonight? If I've been drinking, it's not me."
- Enabled students to find a sober ride by distributing local taxi cab phone numbers and promoting local sober ride programs.
- Allowed students to take the brand back with them in the form of "spirit bandana" promotional giveaways and pictures from the exhibit on their own cell phones and cameras.
- Drove students to the Who's Driving Tonight? YouTube Channel and encouraged them to pass their DWI-prevention video along to their friends.

Paid media value-add services in the form of paid versus rate and override on billboards and pumptoppers exceeded \$61,200.

INTERACTIVE MARKETING

The *Who's Driving Tonight?* YouTube Channel gives TxDOT the opportunity to connect and create sustained relationships with college students online—in their own world. The newly produced headlining video, titled "Happy Hour FAIL," highlights the consequences of a DWI. The story is illustrated through social media and other digital tools that young adults use every day. The viewer is positioned as the protagonist, allowing them to truly get a feel for how a DWI could unravel their life. The user-generated videos featured on the *Who's Driving Tonight?* channel star students who recorded their own brand of DWI prevention at the video kiosk at the college events.

To date, *Who's Driving Tonight?* online efforts have produced:

- 399 student-generated videos
- More than 52,000 channel views
- More than 61,000 video views
- More than 5,000 video views through shares on Facebook and through hundreds of tweets
- 22 mentions of the "Happy Hour FAIL" video on online news sites and blogs from all over the world including Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Spain, France, and Iceland.

UNIVERSITY OUTREACH

TxDOT cultivated partnerships with Student Life programs at several Texas universities in order to distribute peer-to-peer outreach kits for on-campus student leaders. On-campus Resident Assistants (RAs) are trained student leaders who supervise college students living in residence halls. Arguably the most responsible students on campus, RAs are usually tasked with planning and implementing educational programs in the residence halls and are often required to update bulletin boards in the dorms.

The peer-to-peer educational kits included a booklet with instructions and DWI facts, posters, decals, designated driver signup sheets, and sober ride program flyers. TxDOT established partnerships for the distribution of 1,500 kits at the following schools:

ADDITIONAL EFFORTS

TxDOT distributed more than 130,000 promotional and educational items during March to TxDOT's Traffic Safety Specialist (TSSs) and subgrantees for their college DWI-prevention outreach efforts surrounding Spring Break in their districts. Materials included note pads, drawstring backpacks, pencils, and traffic safety guides.

FY10 WORLD CUP DON'T DRINK AND DRIVE CAMPAIGN



The World Cup is the largest sporting event on the globe and is watched by billions of people over a four-week period. Soccer's popularity is on the rise in the United States and with each event more and more Americans are watching the matches at home and at social events. The World Cup is a time for celebration and often involves drinking among the fans and supporters.

The World Cup's international draw represented a unique opportunity for TxDOT to deliver an impaired driving message to the large Spanish-language dominant audience in Texas. Through soccer-themed messaging TxDOT is able to remind all Texans to designate a driver or find a sober ride home if they plan on drinking during the month-long festivities.

PAID MEDIA

TxDOT spent \$493,652 in paid media from June 28 – July 25, 2010. The campaign consisted of placement on Spanish-language media skewing towards young males with an affinity for sports.

Paid media value-add services consisted of bonus spot rotations in TV, radio, and digital out-of-home networks. Total added value secured was \$268,705.

INTERACTIVE EFFORTS

TxDOT placed online ads on the Batanga Sports Network, a popular source for World Cup coverage online. DWI-prevention messaging was incorporated into banners with scrolling RSS feeds showing real-time World Cup game scores. Additional placements included in-banner video, pre-roll video, and companion banners. Online paid media efforts totaled more than 4.4 million impressions and more than 7,000 click-throughs.

TxDOT distributed English and Spanish news releases along with the new TV, radio, and out-of-home PSAs to hundreds of news outlets throughout Texas and to a major wire service for targeted distribution. The news release led with, "Really Bad Cheerleaders Have a Message for Sports Fans" putting the spotlight on the humorous new TV PSA launching the campaign. Major news affiliates and newspapers in Austin, Dallas/Ft. Worth, Houston, San Antonio, and El Paso picked up the story garnering \$208,552 in earned media value.

Combining the \$268,705 in added value from media vendors and \$208,552 in earned media value from public relations activities, the World Cup Don't Drink and Drive campaign garnered \$477,257 in match funds.

FY10 CLICK IT OR TICKET SAFETY BELT ENFORCEMENT CAMPAIGN

Since the Click It or Ticket campaign began in Texas a decade ago, the safety belt usage rate has increased by nearly 18 percentage points. Though more Texans buckled up in 2009 than ever before, we still need to reach the roughly 1.75 million Texans who don't regularly wear their safety belt. In 2010, we had the additional task of educating the public about a new law aimed to protect more Texans—backseat passengers must be buckled up, regardless of their age.

On the enforcement end, officers around the state worked overtime from May 24 through June 6, ticketing Texans who weren't buckled up. Some of the most populated metropolitan areas participated in the effort: Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, the Rio Grande Valley, and San Antonio. The Texas Department of Public Safety also took part in the mobilization, along with other law enforcement agencies. In all, officers handed out more than 34,000 safety belt citations during the two-week enforcement period.

PAID MEDIA

The paid media campaign, which ran from May 17 to June 6, was directed toward those who don't consistently use safety belts: men between 18 and 34, with special emphasis on pickup drivers. It also focused on informing drivers and passengers about the new requirement in Texas that all riders in a vehicle must be buckled up.

During 2010, TxDOT placed \$1,705,501 in paid media for the statewide Click It or Ticket campaign in the following outlets:

INTERACTIVE

To reach the target audience of young males, we positioned Click It or Ticket messaging where they are spending a large portion of their time—online. Total paid digital efforts boasted 13 million impressions and more than 31,000 click-throughs.

Online Video. Seven out of every ten people watch TV or other video content on the web, and that ratio is even higher in our target demographic. To extend the reach of the newly produced "Busted" PSA, we placed online video ads and companion banners on Hulu.com to build awareness about the new backseat law, particularly with males 18–34 in the target audience.

Map Reminders. We created colorful new animated banner ads to be displayed on popular mapping sites like Mapquest.com, Yahoo! Maps, and Yelp.com. These banner ads reached users as they were finding directions and planning to drive, likely just before they got in their cars. Static banner ads also printed out with some maps, meaning many Texans brought the Click It or Ticket message into their car or truck as they traveled to their destination.

Mobile. Nearly 85% of cell phone owners do not leave home without their cell phone. Recent developments in the digital landscape allowed us to incorporate cutting-edge mobile marketing tactics, giving us the opportunity to reach Texans on the go. We placed Click It or Ticket banner ad alerts on targeted mobile websites and location-based smart phone applications, such as Traffic.com, Accuweather, GasBag gas station finder, and Garmin GPS navigation devices. We also created a mobile-enabled site specifically for this effort: TexasClickItorTicket.mobi. Here users could learn the new occupant protection laws, tweet about law changes, and alert their friends via email directly from the mobile site. The mobile ads reached Texans roughly 1.5 million times, and resulted in 11,520 additional interactions on the mobile site and in-application messaging.

This year, TexasClickOrTicket.com expanded into a one-stop destination for occupant protection content online. With a fresh new design, the website featured information about safety belt laws in Texas and highlighted what can happen if you're not buckled up in a crash. The website also incorporated a section where parents and other caregivers can find out which child safety seat is right based on their child's size and age. Last year's "Buckle Up" blog was transformed into the "What's New" section, featuring new crash stories, updates about the campaign, and more.

ADDED VALUE

We rely heavily on added value as part of our commitment to obtain best value for TxDOT's media dollars and to help meet federally mandated match fund requirements. For Click It or Ticket, the added value opportunities in 2010 were bonus spots, links and ads on vendor websites, TV news "billboards," traffic sponsorships, community affairs show interviews and inclusion in community calendars, reduced pricing, material distribution at station remotes, banner placement at station events, live reads, free billboards and additional time on purchased boards, inclusion in theater lobby entertainment networks, spot placement during baseball games, arena signage plus first pitch and giveaway opportunities.

In all, added value opportunities resulted in \$1,921,359 in free media for the campaign.

EARNED MEDIA

Click It or Ticket has been highly successful in convincing Texans to buckle their safety belts, and media coverage of the campaign has played a major role in that success. This year's public relations efforts focused on changes to the law—the new backseat safety belt requirement and the new booster seat requirement for children younger than 8.

We supplemented the "hard news" angle of the changes in Texas law with the softer approach of this year's larger-than-life spokesman, Big Tex. By combining these two angles, we hoped to make even more Texans aware of the statewide safety belt enforcement effort in order to meet TxDOT's goal of 93.2 percent usage.

Multiple "Big Tex" Press Events

As one of the state's "biggest" celebrities, Big Tex was the perfect icon to deliver the Click It or Ticket message. We even got the official voice of Big Tex to record some "buckle up" messages to play at our press conferences. The statewide press launch took place at the Long Center for the Performing Arts in Austin on May 3, and a print news release was distributed on the wire in English and Spanish accompanied by color photos of the event and b-roll video footage. After the launch event in Austin, Big Tex traveled to eight additional cities located in large media markets or areas with low safety belt usage. Big Tex's visits helped create earned media opportunities locally in each of the cities he visited, and customized news releases and media advisories were pitched to media at each stop along the way.

Additional press events took place in McAllen and at Six Flags, Arlington. TxDOT also provided media advisory, news release, press event agenda, talking point and op-ed templates to assist TSSs with local press events and other efforts to alert their communities of the Click It or Ticket campaign.

Booster Seat Law Announcement

We generated a second round of media attention with a statewide press release announcing enforcement of the new booster seat requirement for children up to age 8. The announcement resulted in a second wave of media coverage surrounding the Click It or Ticket campaign and the new safety belt laws.

Earned Media Results

The changes in Texas safety belt laws and the appeal of Big Tex put TxDOT on the pages of many newspapers and in many news broadcasts all around the state. This year's campaign generated 1,468 news stories (493 print, 621 broadcast, and 354 online) and reached Texas news consumers more than 30 million times, garnering a public relations value of \$3,983,396. (Some items could not be valued, including several radio news stories.)

Overall Campaign Value

Thanks to a highly successful earned media campaign and a generous amount of in-kind donations from paid media vendors, TxDOT was able to achieve one of its most valuable campaigns to date. Combining the \$1,921,359 in added value and the public relations value of \$3,983,396, the 2010 Click It or Ticket campaign garnered \$5,904,755 in value for TxDOT's \$2,200,000 investment. TxDOT received a value of more than \$2.60 for every \$1 it spent.

Life-Saving Results

The dollar amount generated by the 2010 Click It or Ticket campaign is impressive, but the real value lies in the number of lives saved and injuries prevented thanks to safety belt usage. Texas should be proud—in 2010 the state achieved a record safety belt usage rate. Texas far surpassed its goal of 93.2 percent safety belt usage and last year's all-time high of 92.94 percent. According to statewide surveys performed by the Texas Transportation Institute this summer, safety belt use in Texas rose from 92.94 percent to 93.84 percent—almost a full percentage point.

We know from NHTSA that for every percentage point safety belt use increases in Texas, an estimated 25 fewer people will die and 586 fewer will be injured in traffic crashes. The current safety belt rate means an estimated 24 fewer Texas motorists were killed in traffic crashes and an estimated 551 fewer were injured on Texas roadways in the past year. Of course the emotional costs of deaths and injuries are incalculable, but they also result in financial costs to the State of Texas and its citizens—wage and productivity losses, medical expenses, administrative expenses, motor vehicle and property damage, employer costs, taxes, insurance premiums, travel delays, and a measure of the value of lost quality of life. Taking those costs into account, the 2010 Click It or Ticket campaign saved Texas \$99.4 million.

Over the 10 years since the Click It or Ticket campaign began in Texas, the use of safety belts in our state has saved the State of Texas and society an estimated \$11.84 billion. Even more importantly, safety belts have saved an estimated 2,846 lives and prevented 66,716 injuries over the decade since Texas began the Click It or Ticket campaign.

FY10 TEEN SAFETY BELT DEMONSTRATION PROJECT



CAMPAIGN OVERVIEW

In April 2009, the Texas Department of Transportation and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, in conjunction with local law enforcement launched an effort to increase teen safety belt use in five Texas counties. The campaign was undertaken because teens, historically, are less likely to wear safety belts and have a higher incidence of unbuckled deaths. The five counties of Bexar, Dallas, Tarrant, Harris and Hidalgo accounted for 26% of unbuckled teen fatalities. The objective for this campaign test was to increase seat belt use among teen drivers and passengers.

The program targeted teens and their influencers through high school and community college partnerships, community organization partnerships, local press coverage, paid media, and an interactive website. For Fiscal Year 2010 the program consisted of three waves, October 2009, February 2010, and May 2010.

PARTNERSHIPS

ThinkStreet contacted 211 high schools in the five-county demonstration area. These schools represented almost 375,000 students. Schools were sent materials to display on campus. Each school received an implementation kit that included 10-foot parking lot banners, lawn signs, window decals, business card handouts, and posters. A CD with digital materials was also included. Campuses displayed materials for one month during the program waves. In May 2010, outreach was extended to include 42 local community colleges, representing over 300,000 students.

The campaign reached over 375,000 high school students for thirty days during each of the campaign's three waves. Conservatively, this generated 33,000,000 high school on-campus impressions with another 9,000,000 impressions on college campuses.





In October, 2009, the Texas State Fair provided space within the Auto Pavilion, at no cost, to display the remains of a Ford truck that was involved in rollover crash. Two teens from Bell county were involved in the crash and walked away uninjured because they were wearing their safety belts; the truck, however, suffered irreparable damage and was used throughout the campaign as a visual reminder of the importance of safety belts. Over 2 million people visited the State Fair Auto Pavilion in 2009 and the exhibit director reported that it was one of the most visited displays.



Whataburger, a Texas-based fast-food chain, provided over 150,000 coupons for schools to use as peer incentives for holding parking lot seat belt checks or seat belt pledge drives. Other sponsors including, State Farm and Gibson Guitars, donated prizes for online incentives.

Texas PTA and the Texas Education Agency supported the program with material distribution and including program details in their monthly communications to parents.

LANDING PAGE

All campus materials encouraged students to visit the web site, www.seatbeltsrock.com. Each wave of the program had a different theme and teens were offered an incentive for visiting the site and learning about seat belt safety. The landing page received over 27,000 visits during FY 2010.

In October 2009, the site was updated to include an interactive quiz narrated by an animated mouse and teens who completed the quiz were automatically entered into a contest to win a Gibson donated Les Paul guitar, an IPOD Touch donated by State Farm, or a \$250 gift card donated by the Buckle.

In February 2009, the site included a Valentine's Day theme and an interactive valentine. Teens were encouraged to send the valentine to five friends for a chance to win an IPOD touch.

In May 2010, the site was updated with a "paparazzi/ caught-on-tape" theme and included a "personalized"



flash video that teens can send to their friends (a "personalized" video allows the viewer to see his/her name actually embedded into various frames of the video).

ENFORCEMENT

Law enforcement agencies participated with increased enforcement for one week during the program waves. Efforts were concentrated around areas where teens were known to frequent, such as malls, movie theatres, and around high schools.

PAID MEDIA

Paid media efforts included outdoor (concentrated around high teen traffic areas), radio, DJ endorsements, Channel One TV, and Internet advertising in the following markets:

Dallas – Fort Worth, Houston, San Antonio, and the Rio Grande Valley. These budgets represent three campaign waves in the 2010 FY year.

ADDED VALUE

Added value elements negotiated as part of the media buy included bonus spots, DJ endorsements, online banner ads, overrun on outdoor boards, and additional Channel One spots. The total added value reported for October 2009, February 2010, and May 2010 totaled \$600,397.

EARNED MEDIA

During each wave of the program, an earned media campaign was launched to target teen influencers. Press events and desk-side briefings were utilized to garner earned media coverage. Earned media value for the campaign totaled \$ 1,137,799.

In October, 2009, a press event was held at the Texas State Fair wrecked truck display. Dallas Mayor

Pro Tem Dwain Caraway, NHTSA's Georgia Chakiris, Dallas PD Deputy Chief Julian Bernal, Fort Worth PD Deputy Chief William Read, and TxDOT's Michelle Releford spoke at the event to remind teens and parents about the new safety belt law and to encourage teen drivers to buckle up.





In February 2010, the campaign utilized a new tact for reaching out to media affiliates and implemented a desk-side briefing approach. Local TxDOT and law enforcement representatives visited local TV and radio stations to talk with reporters about the campaign efforts and to demonstrate the virtual valentine.

In May, 2010, a press event was held at Six Flags Over Texas on Memorial Day to highlight the importance of safety, especially during the summer months when teens are more care-free. Speakers included: Georgia Chakiris, NHTSA, Tracie Mendez, TxDOT, Captain Brian Rippee, Texas Department of Public Safety, Deputy Chief Julian Bernal, Dallas Police Department and Rose Rutledge, AmazingRhianna Foundation.

The Memorial Day event included a speaker segment from Rose Rutledge, the mother of Rhianna Rutledge who died in a car crash while not wearing her seatbelt. Her story provided another dimension in appealing to teens and their parents by offering a real-life example of the dangers of failing to buckle up.





Earned media efforts resulted in 527 news mentions (82 broadcast news stories, 437 online mentions, and 8 print mentions including an article mention in USA Today).

OVERALL CAMPAIGN VALUE AND RESULTS

Paid media generated over 355,000,000 impressions and achieved \$600,397 in added value placements. Public relations and earned media efforts resulted in over \$1,137,799 of added value with

partnership added value and contributions totaling \$613,954. Total added value received for the campaign totaled \$2,352,150. But, most importantly, observational surveys from the Texas Transportation Institute indicated that teen driver and passenger seat belt use increased by 6.2 percent in the five county program areas.

CAMPAIGN OVERVIEW

In Texas in 2009, 52% of children under 8 years old fatally injured in a crash were unrestrained (where restraint use was known). TTI's 2009 Child Restraint Use Survey noted that the markets with the most child restraint violations included Amarillo, Brownsville, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, and Lubbock. Restraint use is not the only issue concerning child safety in Texas; TTI's survey also revealed that 28% of children observed in child safety seats were incorrectly restrained in an unsafe manner. NHTSA believes that this number is closer to 75% stating that 3 out 4 child safety seats are incorrectly installed and Child Safety Seat Technicians in some areas report that this number is as high as 90%.

In an effort to increase awareness of child restraint use and the proper use of child safety seats, a new statewide, multi-faceted campaign was launched in September 2010 with increased efforts in areas where child restraint use is the lowest (Amarillo, Brownsville, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, and Lubbock). Campaign messages were designed to communicate two things: (1) A new Texas law requires that children 7 years of age or younger must be buckled in an appropriate car seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches and (2) many Texans, no matter how well meaning, do not buckle up their children correctly, which can result in serious injury in a crash.

The campaign theme, Buckle 'em up. Buckle 'em right. (In Spanish: Abróchalos y abróchalos bien.), in addition to being short and easily remembered, takes a step beyond the well-known "buckle up" message to plant a seed of doubt in the listener/viewer. "Buckle 'em right" sets off a tiny alarm that, maybe, possibly, they might be doing something wrong that ultimately could result in their child getting hurt. At the very least, it engenders curiosity in the parent/guardian about what it is they should be doing. New :30 televisions spots in English and Spanish were produced and humorously show the lengths to which parents go to ensure their child's safety—ending with the web site address where more comprehensive information is housed. Radio was produced in both :30 and :60 second lengths in both English and Spanish and mirrored the television creative—again, with the call to action as the web site address for comprehensive information.







A simple but graphic outdoor message was developed in both English and Spanish and was placed throughout the state. Both bulletins and posters were placed in high-traffic locations and again reminded Texans to "Buckle 'em up. Buckle 'em right." and featured the web site url prominently.

LANDING PAGE

In the "Buckle 'em up. Buckle 'em right." campaign, each radio and TV spot, and outdoor placement — English and Spanish — was designed to state the problem and direct Texans to www.bucklethemright.org —a link that directed individuals to TxDOT's Click It or Ticket Child Passenger Safety web site that was updated to include additional child passenger safety information and a child safety seat inspection locator. In 2010, www.bucklethemright.org garnered over 1,300 visits and guided Texas parents to over 185 safety seat inspection sites throughout the state during August and September.





PAID MEDIA

Paid media efforts included statewide outdoor and radio, and selected market television placement in Amarillo, Dallas-Fort Worth, El Paso, Houston, Lubbock, and the Rio Grande Valley (markets with historically low child restraint compliance) and was targeted to Adults 18 – 49; with a secondary target of adults 55+ (grandparents and caregivers).

ADDED VALUE

Added value elements negotiated as part of the media buy included bonus television and radio spots, overruns on outdoor boards, and banner ads on station websites. The total added value reported for the 2010 FY was \$991,062.

EARNED MEDIA

Earned media efforts were coordinated in conjunction with National Child Safety Week, September 19 – 25. A statewide press release was distributed to media outlets across the state and TxDOT representatives along with child passenger safety specialists conduced desk-side briefings with local media stations.

At these briefings, a TxDOT designated spokesperson talked about the importance of child restraint use, and properly installing child safety seats. To further drive home the message, our team went to television stations where car seats of station employees were inspected on camera to demonstrate that the majority of parents, though unintentional, are not properly restraining their children. Proper restraint installations were also demonstrated during morning show programs, at newspaper desk-side briefings and during radio interview segments.

An audio news release was recorded in Spanish and distributed to Spanish language stations across the state, resulting in 31 airings.

Earned media efforts resulted in 325 news mentions (150 broadcast news stories, 157 online mentions, and 18 print mentions).

OVERALL CAMPAIGN VALUE AND RESULTS

Paid media generated over 157,000,000 impressions and achieved \$991,062 in added value placements. Public relations and earned media efforts resulted in over \$529,874 of added value. Total added value received for the campaign totaled \$1,859,325, which included \$338,389 of state funds utilized to support paid media.

FY10 LABOR DAY DRINK, DRIVE, GO TO JAIL, CAMPAIGN



Summers are an active time in Texas with celebrations, barbeques, sporting events, road trips, and vacations. Often times these events involve the consumption of alcohol, and research shows that along with a spike in vehicle miles traveled there is also an increase in alcohol-related crashes, injuries, and fatalities in Texas.

In 2010, TxDOT evolved the annual Drink. Drive. Go to Jail. campaign with a new message for Texas: there is no excuse for drunk driving, and getting behind the wheel while intoxicated will land you in jail. TxDOT partnered with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, the Texas Municipal Police Association, and local law enforcement organizations statewide to get drunk drivers off the road.

PAID MEDIA

The paid media campaign, which ran from August 20 to September 8, targeted adults from 18 to 34, with special emphasis on males 18–24. DWI-prevention messages were relayed through new radio and TV PSAs, new billboards, interactive advertising, and alternative media found in and around entertainment districts in major Texas markets.

In the weeks leading up to Labor Day, TxDOT placed \$858,606 in paid media for the statewide Drink. Drive. Go to Jail. campaign in the following outlets:

ADDED VALUE

Special programs with FOX Sports Network, Univision, Yellow Cab, and out-of-home vendors contributed greatly to added value totals for this year's campaign. Altogether, local television stations, radio stations, outdoor companies, and other media partners donated media services valued at over \$541,357.

INTERACTIVE

Online public education efforts followed the focused strategy of the larger campaign by targeting Texans online as they were planning to drink. Interactive media included online web ads, digital out-of-home, and mobile media, totaling more than 124 million impressions.

"Choose Your Ride" Website. To make it easier for Texans to plan a sober ride, TxDOT revamped the TexasDWI.org website to highlight the options available to Texans that don't include drinking and driving. The new RideFinder offers up transportation solutions based on the user's location, including taxi company phone numbers, bus routes, limo rental companies, and even pedicabs. The website, produced in English and Spanish, also incorporated information about DWI penalties and highlighted the Labor Day enforcement crackdown. During the campaign, 36,000 people came to the site to use the RideFinder.

Web Banners. TxDOT placed DWI-prevention messaging on local entertainment guides, Yelp.com and Facebook.com to reach users when they were looking for bars, clubs or events, and planning to go out with friends. Web banners, both in English and Spanish, invited users to click through to use the RideFinder and find a sober ride in their area.

Online Video. Seven out of every ten people watch TV or other video content on the web, and that ratio is even higher in this young target demographic. To extend the reach of the newly produced "Last Words" PSA, we placed online video ads and companion banners on Hulu.com.

Digital Jukeboxes. TxDOT placed "Choose Your Ride" ads on the Ecast network of touch-screen digital jukeboxes, reaching Texans when they were out drinking alcohol at bars and clubs. Bar goers were able to click through to a localized cab finder application and could send taxi company phone numbers right to their cell phones. The microsite also featured an alcohol IQ quiz where users could answer educational trivia questions about DWI and other alcohol-related topics. Ecast served over 13 million impressions and 35,510 users touched through to the cab finder microsite.

Mobile. The target audience is not only wired, they are wireless: nine in ten of 18- to 29-year-olds own a cell phone. Mobile gave TxDOT the opportunity to effectively reach Texans, often at the point of alcohol consumption. TxDOT placed mobile ads on smart phone web applications and mobile sites during late afternoon and evening hours when people were more likely to be out drinking. Mobile ads touched through to a simplified mobile RideFinder site, where users could find rides based on their phone's GPS location. The mobile ads reached Texans more than 3 million times, and resulted in 24,500 clicks to the mobile RideFinder.

OUTREACH

Cop Cabs. TxDOT continued the successful Cop Cab program, partnering with nine law enforcement agencies around the state to produce 14 of the iconic DWI-prevention units. The units were used in entertainment districts, at sporting events, and during outreach events as a stunning reminder to find a sober ride or face the consequences of a DWI arrest. Law enforcement partners and TxDOT representatives used the Cop Cab units as a draw and backdrop for public relations efforts, and they were featured on local TV news broadcasts, in major newspapers and covered by relevant websites and blogs across Texas.

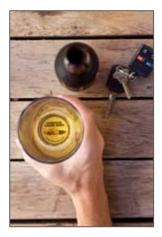
Outreach Events. New to the campaign this year was a second round of media events during the enforcement period that saw a more grassroots approach to DWI-prevention. TxDOT and campaign partners set up outreach tents and tables in the top Texas markets to highlight the Cop Cab units and unique alternative media tactics, and to distribute public information and education materials to the public. These events were held at iconic locations during community events to increase exposure to the general public and remind Texans that work is being done to curb the problem of drunk driving.





Alternative Media Placement. TxDOT continued the use of innovative and unexpected advertising placement to remind Texans to find a sober ride home and never get behind the wheel after they've been drinking. Using the Cop Cab icon and a "Choose Your Ride" message, this year's campaign featured street posters, car window clings and bar/restaurant decals in major market entertainment districts. New to this year's efforts were custom pint glasses with "Choose Your Ride" messaging on the bottom of the interior. These glasses were distributed to hundreds of bars and restaurants in Texas and served as a startling reminder about DWI-enforcement. The combined efforts of these alternative media tactics, dubbed the "bars-to-cars" program, successfully raised awareness of the impaired

driving mobilization by Texas law enforcement and kept DWI prevention top-of-mind among those purchasing and consuming alcohol.









EARNED MEDIA

This 2010 Drink. Drive. Go to Jail. impaired driving mobilization launched with a media event atop the Long Center for the Performing Arts in Austin on August 6, 2010. Traffic safety officials, law enforcement, and those personally affected by drunk driving spoke to the media against the backdrop of the Austin skyline. Also in attendance were the iconic Cop Cab outreach vehicles and other sober ride options like public transportation, pedicabs, designated driver services and several local taxi operators. Similar versions of this event were held in 13 additional Texas cities as part of a statewide media tour promoting the campaign and DWI crackdown.

This year's campaign introduced a new program that coordinated law enforcement ride-alongs with local news media. These ride-alongs gave the press a unique view of the Labor Day impaired driving mobilization and were incredibly well received across the state. TxDOT also produced and distributed a broadcast video package, which aired on news stations across the state, helping garner TxDOT \$3,046,098 in earned broadcast coverage. TxDOT developed a print news release and distributed it to more than 500 newspapers across Texas bringing in more than \$438,870 in earned media value. Combined with the \$555,880 in earned media value produced through online news sources, this year's Labor Day campaign totaled \$4,040,848 in earned media value.

OVERALL CAMPAIGN VALUE

Combining the \$541,357 in added value from media partners with \$4,040,848 of earned media value, the 2010 Drink. Drive. Go to Jail. public education campaign garnered \$4,582,205 million in match funds during the 2010 campaign.

FY10 On The Road In Texas And Street Smarts News Features

On the Road in Texas and Los Caminos de Texas: Long-Format Radio NEWS Features
With more miles of road than any other state. Texas has a special duty to

With more miles of road than any other state, Texas has a special duty to educate its driving population about how to best navigate those streets and highways. That's why for more than a decade, the *On the Road in Texas* (OTR) radio series has been delivering driving tips, information on traffic laws, and reminders about dozens of traffic safety issues to millions of Texans, many of whom are in hard-to-reach rural areas. In each spot, Department of Public Safety (DPS) Troopers serve as the voice of authority, informing listeners about everything from distracted driving to dangerous road conditions.



The On the Road in Texas inventory of 60-second radio news features now includes:

- More than 360 English spots
- More than 200 Spanish spots

In 2010, TxDOT distributed *On the Road in Texas* English features and *Los Caminos de Texas* Spanish features to the Lone Star News Network, delivering timely driving tips, information on traffic laws, and reminders about dozens of specific traffic safety issues. A network of 235 radio stations throughout Texas played the spots regularly.

To enhance its library of spots in the 2010 fiscal year, TxDOT also researched, developed, and produced:

- 15 new and 12 revised English spots, along with
- 15 new and 12 revised Spanish traffic safety radio news features.

STREET SMARTS AND LISTOS PARA MANEJAR: SHORT-FORMAT RADIO NEWS FEATURES

TxDOT also offered 30-second versions of its traffic safety radio features to meet the request of radio stations in the state's largest metropolitan areas. This urban radio program, dubbed *Street Smarts*, targets a younger audience with features on driving under the influence, distracted driving, and speeding.

TxDOT researched, developed, and produced 26 new *Street Smarts* radio features in FY10. *Street Smarts* traffic safety radio features were distributed to 13 large-market and 64 mid-size-market radio stations.

STREET SMARTS AND LISTOS PARA MANEJAR: 60-SECOND TELEVISION NEWS FEATURES



In 2010, TxDOT changed the format of its six-year-old *Texas Driver's Quiz* (TDQ) program. Where TDQ used a question-and-answer format, *Street Smarts* features are more similar to the type of "news minute" segments TV news stations typically feature. We refreshed this educational TV series with updated graphics and unique new perspectives. We involved local crews from different regions across Texas to highlight personal stories of real people in

their own communities, giving this news series a local slant. In addition to DPS Troopers, we began to incorporate additional traffic safety and law experts to bring fresh faces to this news series. We auditioned and selected a new on-camera host to give new life to the updated English TV news segment.

TxDOT researched, developed, and produced 26 new 60-second English *Street Smarts* TV features on topics ranging from motorcycle safety to driving under the influence of prescription drugs. We also adapted 26 Street Smarts scripts into 60-second Spanish *Listos Para Manejar* TV news features. TxDOT secured free airplay for its new English and Spanish traffic safety TV news features on 22 television stations across Texas.

OVERALL VALUE

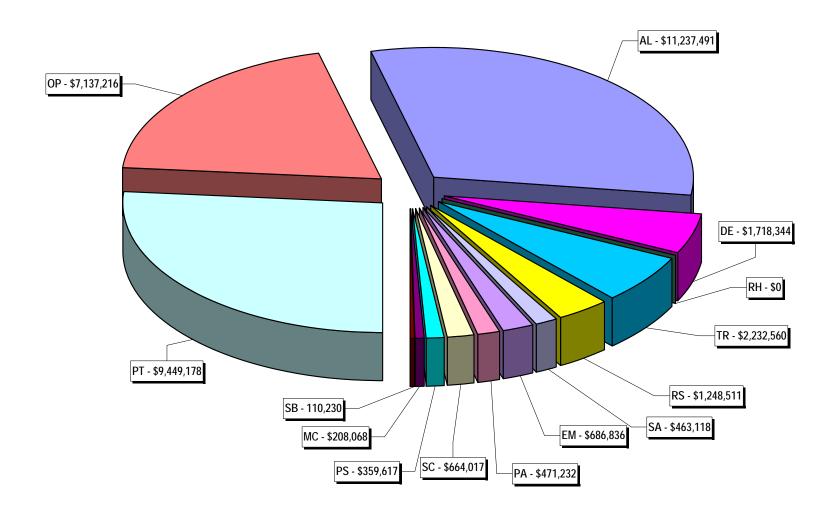
Thanks to longstanding relationships with TV and radio stations across the state, TxDOT was able to secure airplay—at no cost to TxDOT—on a total of 335 radio and TV stations. The *On the Road in Texas* and *Street Smarts* series generated a combined value of \$3,345,600 in free coverage for traffic safety messages.

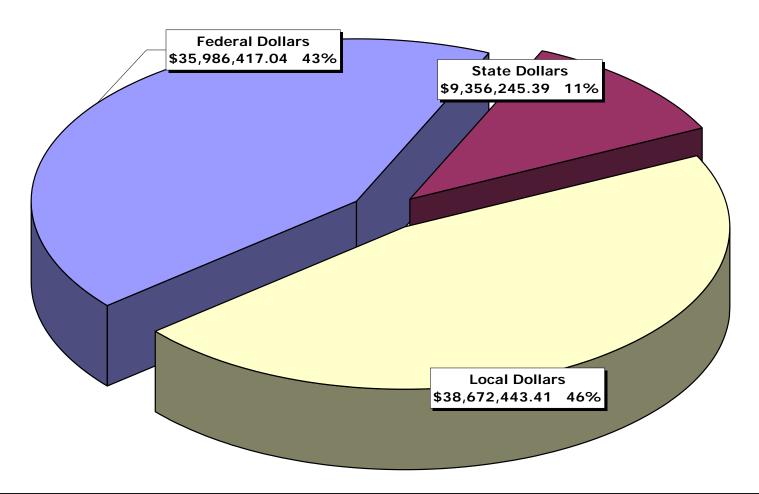
FEDERAL EXPENDITURES BY PROGRAM AREA FOR FY2010

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Section Six BEST PRACTICES



OVERVIEW

Texas has identified best practices employed by projects within the Traffic Safety Program. These are practices which significantly increased the effectiveness and efficiency of the project in meeting the goals of the program. When shared, these best practices can hopefully help improve other projects within the Texas program, as well as similar programs in other states.

BIKETEXAS EDUCATION FUND

Organization:	BikeTexas Education Fund
Project Title:	ParentsPlus Program

Noteworthy Practices:	BikeTexas is a non-profit organization with the mission of advancing bicycle access, safety and education for children and adults across the state of Texas.
	The one-year ParentsPlus program provides useful tools to parents plus other adults concerned about bicycling and walking safety in the community. The product delivered for this grant is the step-by-step community manual How to Organize Bike & Walk Safety Events for Your Community.
	Basic bicycling and walking safety activities were developed on a level that parents and others can present to children and their families. Step by step instructions and easy to use checklists are provided in the manual to conduct several types of community bike/walk safety events, including bikeathons and walkathons. The manual provides detailed information and easy to use templates, plus educational safety handouts in English and Spanish.
	BikeTexas conducted field tests of the safety lessons and event management components with parents, children, and professionals concerned about bicycle and walking safety. The wide range of field test venues including the following: Texas PTA Annual Conference, BikeTexas Kids Kup events, community injury prevention professionals training seminar, Lee County Fair, public safety officers in-service training, Girl Scout safety fair, bike rodeos and Fitness Feria, a family physical activity promotion event for Spanish speakers.
Evidence of Success:	Success for this one-year grant is measured by the delivery of the manual How to Organize Bike & Walk Safety Events for Your Community. Over the past 12 months, BikeTexas has sent out 16 e-mail news stories to its distribution list on the promotion of the manual and other related bike/walk safety topics, resulting in over 59,000 cumulative e-mail contacts. Feedback to BikeTexas has been overwhelmingly positive as BikeTexas now moves into the distribution phase.

TEXAS TRANSPORTATION INSTITUTE (TTI) - DRINK. RIDE. LOSE.

Organization:	Texas Transportation Institute
Project Title:	Campaign to Reduce Alcohol Impaired Motorcycle Operation
Project ID:	2010-TTI-G-SYG-0062
Noteworthy Practices:	The Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) developed a new statewide impaired riding campaign to educate riders about the importance of not operating a motorcycle under the influence of alcohol or other impairments. The <i>Drink. Ride. Lose.</i> anti-impaired riding campaign aims to bring awareness about the significance of the impaired rider crash problem in Texas and encourage safe motorcycle riding practices.
	TTI worked with riders groups, advertised in newspapers and on the web, and posted flyers to identify family or friends willing to film video testimonials, or provide written accounts of how an impaired riding crash had changed their life. Unfortunately, this proved challenging because for some people, talking about their loss was too painful, and for others, they could not discuss crash details because of current or impending litigation.
	An alternative plan was quickly put into place. Experts from the Texas Motorcycle Safety Coalition (TMSC) Board and Standing Committee members were identified and contacted to provide expert testimony on the consequences of drinking and riding. Because of TTI's established cooperative relationship with members of the TMSC, several riders agreed to participate in the video testimonials. Their participation helped accomplish one of the project's several goals which may not have been possible.
Evidence of Success:	Four video PSAs were produced and posted to the LookLearnLive.org website (see http://www.looklearnlive.org/live/public-service-announcementsvideos/). These included testimonials on: how riding impairment is addressed in the basic rider training course; how personal views about drinking and riding changes who you ride with; how motorcycle crashes involving alcohol differ from non-alcohol involved crashes; and what are the financial and punitive consequences if an impaired rider is stopped by law enforcement.

TEXAS TRANSPORTATION INSTITUTE (TTI) - I RIDE FOR TOMORROW

Noteworthy Practices:	The Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) coordinates activities and meetings for the Texas Motorcycle Safety Coalition (TMSC), Board, and eight Standing Committees. The Education Standing Committee identified a need for a bikers' responsibility initiative which promotes safe and responsible riding. Together with committee input, TTI developed and launched "i Ride For Tomorrow" initiatives which encourages motorcyclists of all ages and types to pledge to ride responsibly, sober, smart, and safe. Riders can go to www.LookLearnLive.org to download the pledge form and sign up.
	The "i Ride For Tomorrow" is an excellent example of a proactive approach geared toward riders to increase motorcyclist safety in Texas. This was made possible through the collaborative efforts of law enforcement, riders, instructors and educators working together to help reduce motorcycle crashes in Texas.
Evidence of Success:	i Ride For Tomorrow is available for download and rider participation on the http://www.looklearnlive.org/bri/ . The initiative is gaining momentum and expected to grow as promotions on rider forums (http://www.motohouston.com/) and other social media sources increase.

THINKSTREET

Organization:	ThinkStreet
Project Title:	Teen Safety Belt Demonstration Project

Noteworthy Practices:	In FY 2010, the Texas Department of Transportation and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, in conjunction with local law enforcement continued an effort to increase teen safety belt use in the following Texas counties: Bexar, Dallas, Tarrant, Harris and Hidalgo. ThinkStreet contacted 211 high schools and 42 community colleges in the five-county demonstration area. Schools were sent materials to display on campus. Each school received an implementation kit that included 10-foot parking lot banners, lawn signs, window decals, business card handouts, and posters. A CD with digital materials was also included. Campuses displayed materials for one month during the program waves.
	Whataburger, a Texas-based chain, provided over 150,000 coupons for schools to use as peer incentives by holding parking lot seat belt checks or seat belt pledge drives. Texas PTA and the Texas Education Agency supported the program with material distribution and including program details in their monthly communications to parents. All campus materials encouraged students to visit the web site, www.seatbeltsrock.com . Each wave of the program had a different theme and teens were offered an incentive for visiting the site and learning about seat belt safety.
	In October 2009, the site was updated to include an interactive quiz narrated by an animated mouse, teens that completed the quiz were automatically entered into a contest to win a Gibson donated Les Paul guitar, an IPOD Touch donated by State Farm, or a \$250 gift card donated by the Buckle.
	In February 2010, the site included a Valentine's Day theme and an interactive valentine. Teens were encouraged to send the valentine to five friends for a chance to win an IPOD touch.
	In May 2010, the site was updated with a "paparazzi/ caught-on-tape" theme and included a "personalized" flash video that teens can send to their friends (a "personalized" video allows the viewer to see his/her name actually embedded into various frames of the video).
	During each wave of the program, an earned media campaign was launched to target teen influencers and local media were invited to press events at high schools, the Texas State Fair, and to Six Flags over Texas to announce campaign efforts and results.
Evidence of Success:	The campaign reached over 375,000 high school students for thirty days during each of the campaign's four waves. Conservatively, this generated 45,000,000 high school on-campus impressions with another 9,000,000 impressions on college campuses. The web site received over 69,000 visits. ThinkStreet placed media in three out of the four waves; in the three waves placed by ThinkStreet, paid media generated 44,590,898 impressions and achieved over \$600,397 in added value placements. Public relations and earned media efforts resulted in over \$1,275,327 of added value with partnership added value and contributions totaling \$669,573. But, most importantly, surveys from the Texas Transportation Institute indicated that teen driver and passenger seat belt use increased by 6.2 percent in the five counties.

Noteworthy Practices:	Public relations efforts are integral to TxDOT public information and education campaigns by reaching a large target audience and delivering a great deal of earned media dollars towards the federally mandated match requirements.
	The 2010 <i>Drink. Drive. Go to Jail.</i> campaign expanded on previous efforts to include pitching, coordinating and conducting a series of police ride-alongs with the news media in major Texas markets. These opportunities were pitched to press members through existing relationships and coordinated through TxDOT and local law enforcement agencies. The press was extremely receptive to this program as it allowed them to get an inside look on the annual impaired driving mobilization and present their viewers with a new angle on law enforcement efforts.
	These police ride-alongs and subsequent news stories provided an unprecedented amount of coverage for TxDOT's impaired driving efforts around Labor Day. Through tracking services and internal searches the Sherry Matthews Advocacy Marketing team collected and documented all the media hits and used standard formulas to determine the value of the coverage.
Evidence of Success:	The 2010 Drink. Drive. Go to Jail. campaign delivered \$4,462,508 in earned media and more than \$5 million in total match, more than double the \$2.4 million match requirement. The police ride-along period accounted for more than \$1.9 million of the television earned media alone.

Noteworthy Practices:	Strong media relations are crucial for disseminating information, schedules, and campaign assets to statewide and local press organizations. Sherry Matthews Advocacy Marketing maintains relationships with hundreds of broadcast, print and online news sources and provides campaign content, video and print assets, and other relevant elements for potential news stories during campaign periods.
	During the 2010 <i>Click It or Ticket</i> campaign, Sherry Matthews Advocacy Marketing developed and launched a simple web resource for news media partners to access the wealth of content produced for the campaign. The press where able to visit a single site and download materials including:
	Campaign news releases and fact sheets
	Broadcast ready TV and radio PSAs
	 B-roll footage, law enforcement interviews and TxDOT press quotes for use in potential news stories
	 Event photos and cut lines for newspaper and online news stories
	This simple site allowed Sherry Matthews to keep a constantly updated resource center to send press inquires to and encourage coverage of campaign activities.
Evidence of Success:	The online campaign resource site for the press proved to be a strong support piece for the public relations team in day-to-day interaction with news media across the state. During the news pitching process, hundreds of press members were directed to the site to download public relations materials for use in their stories. With an original requirement of \$2.4 million, the 2010 Click It or Ticket generated \$5,853,590 in total match dollars with \$3,983,396 delivered through earned media efforts.

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CONTINUED FOCUS ON ALCOHOL-RELATED FATALITIES

From 2003 – 2007, Texas experienced a reduction in fatalities from year to year. Unfortunately, Texas experienced a slight increase in fatalities from 3,461 in 2007 to 3,468 in 2008. Alcohol continues to be a major contributing factor in traffic crashes and fatalities. In August 2010, Texas was awarded \$17.8 million dollars in Section 410 funds dedicated to reducing alcohol-related fatalities. This is an increase of \$9.1 million over the FY 2009 Section 410 award amount. These additional funds will increase statewide high visibility DWI enforcement and paid media efforts.

IMPAIRED DRIVING ASSESSMENT

Texas, in conjunction with NHTSA, will undergo an Impaired Driving Assessment in FY11. TRF-TS chose to conduct the assessment in order to obtain technical assistance on the approach the State of Texas uses to address the problem of impaired driving. As mentioned previously, Texas was designated as a high fatality state by NHTSA based upon the rate of alcohol-related fatalities. The Impaired Driving Assessment is a process other states have used to successfully address the high fatality rate status.

The assessment involves assembling a team of nationally recognized experts in the area of alcohol and other drugs and bringing them to Texas to review the statewide traffic safety alcohol program. The panel of experts will review the current State of Texas traffic safety alcohol program and will interview numerous stakeholders. The assessment will take place the week of October 17-22, 2010 and the process will result in a comprehensive report outlining recommendations to the state. The report will then serve as a management tool to assist the state in planning, setting objectives and effectively using available resources to reduce impaired driving.

SHARE THE ROAD

An alarming concern in the overall number of traffic fatalities is the significant increase in motorcycle fatalities. A record 524 motorcyclists (operators and passengers) died in crashes in 2008. Sixty-one percent (61%) of motorcyclists killed were not wearing helmets at the time of the crash. Motorcycle fatalities were 10% of Texas' overall fatalities two years ago. In 2008, they were over 15% of the fatalities. However, motorcycles represent only 2% of the vehicle mix. Additional attention needs to be placed on motorcycle training, being properly licensed, wearing protective equipment, driving while impaired issue, and enhancing public information and education campaigns such as Share the Road to improve motorcycle safety.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

Texas will conduct Strategic Planning for the Traffic Safety Program during FY 2011. The last formal Strategic Planning Meeting was conducted in FY 2003. At that time a Performance Plan with goals, strategies and objectives was developed that addressed FY 2004-2009. Now that recent crash data is available to assist with program planning, a Strategic Planning process will be conducted to review and update program goals, strategies, and objectives for FY 2012- 2016.

IMPROVED CRASH REPORTING

A new crash form (CR-3) became effective in Texas on January 1, 2010. Training was provided to more than 400 law enforcement agencies, reaching more than 2,000 officers throughout the state on the new form to help increase timely reporting and accuracy. Training also addressed the 2010 Edition of the *Instructions to Police for Reporting Crashes* (CR-100). The CR-100 has undergone significant changes in an effort to make it more user-friendly and to clarify instructions and requirements.

Section Seven: TRAFFIC SAFETY OUTLOOK

Law enforcement agencies can opt to have trainers come to them for individual form training or they can participate via video tele-conference sessions. TxDOT is also beginning to test the new Crash Analysis for Safer Highways (CRASH) application that is expected to be deployed during the first quarter of 2011. This application will eliminate the need for agencies to report by submitting paper forms and instead allow them to key the data directly into the state's data repository.

- Implement a new eGrants User Interface
