Executive Summary

The Louisiana Highway Safety Commission (LHSC) administers the State's highway safety grant program in accordance with the provisions and all amendments of the Highway Safety Act of 1966 (Public Law 89-564). Louisiana's highway safety program is designed to reduce traffic crashes and the resulting deaths, injuries, and property damage.

The following Annual Report reflects Highway Safety Program Objectives, which are derived from the Program Performance Budget Objectives as required by the State of Louisiana.

In addition to the Section 402 program, the LHSC expended funding from multiple special grant funds.

- Section 154/164 Open Container and Repeat Offender Hazardous Elimination Funds
- Section 163 .08 BAC Incentive
- Section 405a Occupant Protection Incentive Funds
- Section 406 Safety Belt Incentive
- Section 408 Data Program
- Section 410 Impaired Driving (Programmatic, High Fatality Rate, and High Visibility)
- Section 2010 Motorcycle
- CVARS Commercial Vehicle Analysis Reporting System

These funding areas support Louisiana programs for Planning and Administration, Alcohol, EMS, Motorcycle, Occupant Protection, Child Passenger Restraint, Youth I nvolved Crashes, Pedestrian, Bicycle, Police Traffic Services, Traffic Records, Traffic Records, Paid Media, Railroad, Safe Communities and Hazard Elimination. Each program area has associated performance goals and the FFY 2007 Annual Report will follow the order of the approved 2008 Highway Safety Plan

The Louisiana Highway Safety Commission's mission is to develop and implement a comprehensive strategy aimed at saving lives and preventing injuries on our highways. We strive to attain our mission through a comprehensive statistical analysis, thorough planning, and the development of partnerships, supportive implementation, consistent evaluation, and program assessments. The 2008 Annual Report reflects on the previous year and highlights success toward many of our goals and targets areas that need additional focus.

Louisiana was impacted by hurricanes Gustav and I ke in FFY2007. An estimated 1.9 million people were safely evacuated from the threat of these storms.



Traffic safety programs were impacted. Police focused on contra-flow and rescue efforts; not enforcement strategies. Except for emergency personnel state and local government offices were closed, industry shut down, and offshore companies evacuated.

Due to the path of these storms to the north power outages were wide spread and endured for an extensive period. Traffic was virtually non-existent until the all clear was given the people rushed in to check on their belongings and homes. LHSC projects were interrupted during storm(s) preparation, storm(s) onslaught, and storm recovery periods.

- OVERVIEW OF FATAL AND INJURY CRASHES
 - Fatal crashes increased from 890 in 2006 to 900 in 2007, an increase of 1.1%
 - Persons killed increased from 987 in 2006 to 993 in 2007, an increase of 0.6%
 - Injury traffic crashes decreased from 48,800 in 2006 to 48,200 in 2007, a decrease of 1.2%
 - Traffic crashes injuries decreased from 80,100 in 2006 to 78,900 in 2007, a decrease of 1.5%
 - Property-damage-only crashes decreased from 112,500 in 2006 to 110,700in 2007, a decrease of 1.6%
- Of the 993fatalities::
 - 111 were killed as pedestrians which increased by 12.1% from 2006
 - 662 were killed as drivers of vehicles which decreased by 3.8% from 2006
 - o 109 were killed as passengers
 - o 88 were killed on motorcycles which decreased by 6.4% from 2006
 - o 23 were killed on bicycles which remained the same from 2006
- Louisiana's 2007 mileage fatality rate was 2.19 per 100 million miles traveled, an increase of 0.63% from 2006
- Louisiana's 2007 fatality rate was 23.13 per 100,000 Population, an increase of 0.48% from 2006
- Louisiana's 2007 fatality rate was 34.98 per 100,000 licensed drivers.
- FATALITY INFORMATION SUMMARY
 - The likelihood of fatal crashes increases on weekends (Friday to Sunday) compared to the rest of the week.
 - While Friday to Sunday accounts for about 42.9% of time in a week, Friday to Sunday accounted for 51.1% of all fatal crashes in 2007.
 - Fatal crashes are not equally distributed throughout the day. More fatal crashes occur during the late evening and early morning hours.
 - In 2007, about 66.7% of all traffic fatalities were drivers; about 22.2% were passengers and about 11.2% were pedestrians.
 - In 2007, 72.5% of all traffic fatalities were male and 27.5% were female.

- INJURY INFORMATION SUMMARY
 - o In 2007, of the 78,901 people injured, 51,454 were drivers
 - Approximately, 65.2% of the injured persons in 2007 were drivers, 33.5% were passengers, and 1.3% were pedestrians.
 - Males and females made up 50% and 49.9% of injured drivers respectively. The remaining percentage is drivers with unknown gender.
- DRIVER INFORMATION SUMMARY
 - In 2007 there were 1,363 drivers in fatal crashes, 662 of whom were killed in the crash.
 - The age group 18-20 had 5.2% of licensed drivers, but this age group made up 9.8% of drivers involved in fatal crashes.
 - For comparison, the age group 35-44 represents 18.2% of licensed drivers in 2007 and 18.3% of drivers in fatal crashes.
- DRIVER FATALITIES
 - o In 2007, there were 662 drivers who died in fatal crashes.
 - The fatality rate of drivers was 23 fatalities per 1000,000 licensed drivers
 - In general, the fatality rates of drivers decline with age, but increased considerably for seniors.
- DRI VER GENDER
 - In 2007, the fatal crash rate of male drivers in the 18-20 year-old group was several times higher than the fatal crash rate of female drivers of the same age group, i.e. 148 compared to 33.
 - In 2007, on the average, twenty-one (21) out of 100,000 licensed female drivers were involved in fatal crashes.
 - In 2007, on the average, seventy-three (73) out of 100,000 licensed male drivers were involved in fatal crashes.

- AGE AND GENDER
 - Of the 662 driver fatalities in 2007, five hundred twenty-four (524) were male and one hundred thirty-eight (138) were female.
 - The fatality rate of male drivers is significantly higher than the fatality rate of female drivers. For example, in 2007 the fatality rate of male drivers in the 18-20 year-old age group was 61 versus 10.
 - While 79.2% of all driver fatalities were male in 2007, only 48.35% of all licensed drivers were male.
- VIOLATIONS
 - Sixty-six (66%) of all drivers involved in fatal crashes had a violation.

Planning and Administration

P & A Objectives set in the FFY 2007 HSP

- 1. Provide staff training throughout FY 2007 to all full time LHSC staff per Louisiana State civil service rules.
- 2. Ensure planning and administration costs do not exceed the 10% allowance during FFY 2007.
- 3. The LHSC implemented planning and administration strategies identified in the FFY 2007 HSP.

Status:

- 1. Staff completed all required training per Louisiana State Civil Service rules, additional courses were completed based on personal interest or need. LHSC staff also participated in a variety of traffic safety conferences.
- 2. The LHSC cost for planning and administration was 10% for FFY 2007.




- 1. Raise the level of awareness among Louisiana citizens regarding traffic safety issues throughout 2008.
- 2. Establish a legislative framework for the LHSC program throughout 2008.
- 3. Reduce the percent of alcohol related traffic fatalities in Louisiana from 46% in 2006 to 43% by 2008.


Status:

- 1. During FY07 \$1,751,493.00 was spent on impaired driving paid media resulting in 16,881 radio spots and 18,550 television spots, with 6,907 earned media spots, and 872,002 print ads.

- 3. The percentage of alcohol related traffic fatalities increased from 45% in 2004 to 49% in 2007; three points above the objective. The diversion of police forces statewide due to hurricanes Gustav and I van led to a decline in DI W arrests and police enforcement. We believe, along with other factors, these storms prevented Louisiana from achieving this objective.

Alcohol Narrative

The LHSC contracted with 60 law enforcement agencies and the Louisiana State Police to conduct impaired driving overtime enforcement. The contracts specified that the 19 sheriff's offices and 37 municipal police departments would work during specific "enforcement waves" during FY 2008. The Louisiana State Police contract specified that they would work every month during the 12 month period. These agencies worked a combined 20,495 overtime hours during these four "enforcement waves," resulting in 168 DWI checkpoints and 1,995 DWI arrests. It is very important to note that these same agencies provided a yearlong maintenance-of-effort attacking impaired driving by conducting 18,857 DWI arrests. Over 10,000 of these maintenance-of-effort DWI arrests came from the Louisiana State Police.



The LHSC conducted media events throughout Louisiana to support the "Drunk Driving. Over-the-Limit-Under-Arrest" campaign and partnered with the NHTSA contractor to make a paid media buy in the Louisiana market. Local and state government, various enforcement agencies, and medical personnel participated in the press events and public information campaigns. In addition, Louisiana Youth Prevention Service, educators, business and industry, students, victims and citizens have planned, participated in, and attended many media related events, training seminars, and public information events during the DWI mobilizations.

During FY07 \$1,751,493.00 was spent on impaired driving paid media resulting in 16,881 radio spots and 18,550 television spots, with 6,907 earned media spots, and 872,002 print ads.

Pre and Post Labor Day attitudinal surveys were implemented to measure the impact of change attributed to the campaign. The polls were designed to address Louisiana licensed motorists' opinions on drinking and driving laws and perception on enforcement efforts directed toward drinking and driving. Interviews were conducted with 1,600 licensed motorists statewide; 800 each during two different time periods, one before Labor Day 2008 and the other after Labor Day 2008. During the intervening time, an initiative to reduce drinking and driving was implemented.

The overall margin of error for the statistics obtained from the survey data in the sample of 800 licensed motorists was not greater than plus or minus 3.5 percentage points at the 95% level of confidence. In simple terms, there is a 95% certainty that the statistics presented for the results obtained on this survey are not more than 3.5 percentage points above or below the figure that would have been obtained if all of the licensed motorists in the state would have been interviewed.

The results of the surveys showed that although there was not a significant increase in the proportion of licensed motorists who said they recalled having heard or seen something recently about drinking and driving, there was a significant increase in recall about certain ads/announcements and slogans. Of the four ads/announcements tested, the ads about "how many drinks it takes to reach .02 and .08" and "breath interlock device" showed a statistically significant increase in recall. Of the four slogans tested the three showing significant recall were: "If you drive drunk, you're going to jail," "Had enough," and "We're getting drunk drivers off the road, because in Louisiana, we've had enough". Recall of the slogan "Drunk driving, over the limit, under arrest" did not show a statistically significant change in recall.

Table 1 below provides alcohol related fatality crash data for 15–24 age drivers. It shows an increase in driver fatalities in the 15-24 year age group over the average of the previous 5 years but indicates decreases in driver fatalities in the 15-17 and 18-20 year age groups.

Enforcement, public information, education, and paid media are were strategies employed to address impaired driving issues in Louisiana, but we would be neglectful not to also attribute Louisiana's attempts to in reduce impaired driving crashes to the partners and stakeholders of the LHSC. A complete list of stakeholders is provided in Appendix A.

Motorcycle

Objective in the 2008 HSP

- 1. Raise the level of awareness among Louisiana citizens regarding traffic safety issues throughout 2008.
- 2. Establish a legislative framework for the LHSC program throughout 2008.
- 3. Reduce the percentage of motorcycle fatalities as a percent of all fatalities from 9.47% in 2006 to 8.1% in 2008.


Status

The LHSC implemented motorcycle strategies identified in the 2008 HSP.

 Paid media advertising depicting motorcycle deaths were effectively used statewide. Paid media resulted in 343 radio spots, 59 billboards, and 20 donated spots for a total cost of \$50,461.86



- 2. There was a legislative attempt to repeal the motorcycle helmet law in the 2007 legislative session but it failed.
- Motorcycle fatalities, as a percent of total fatalities was 8.9% in 2007 down from 9.5% in 2006. LHSC missed the reduction of motorcycle deaths to 8.1% but did achieve a reduction of 6 percentage points from 2006.
- 4. There were 1,689 motorcycle injuries in 2007, an increase of 5% from 2006.
- 5. There were 88 motorcycle fatalities in 2007, down from 94 in 2006; a decrease of 6.4%.
- 6. Motorcycle helmet usage in crashes occurred at 83% in 2007 as compared to 84% in 2006.



Motorcycle Narrative

During 2007 eighty-eight (88) motorcyclist were killed compared to ninety-four (94) in 2006. This decrease may be contributed in part to the monthly motorcycle safety meeting conducted to promote safety and awareness of motorcyclists. Meeting participants are comprised of riders, leaders among motorcycle enthusiast groups, Department of Education, the Louisiana Highway Safety Commission, and the Department of Transportation and Development. This group will continue to meet in upcoming fiscal years and will promote safety and create programming to encourage a decrease in motorcycle fatalities. The group, the Louisiana Motorcyclist Safety & Awareness Committee, held an extremely successful 2nd 1st Annual Motorcycle Safety Summit that was very well attended. In addition, the LHSC conducted a paid media effort during May 2008 in conjunction with the Motorcycle Awareness month. The campaign provided media in the Baton Rouge, New Orleans, Lafayette and Monroe media markets. This resulted in 343 radio spots, 59 billboards, and 20 donated spots for a total cost of \$50,461.86.

Occupant Protection


Objectives in the 2008 HSP

- 1. Increase the level of awareness among Louisiana citizens regarding traffic safety issues throughout 2008.
- 2. Establish a legislative framework for the LHSC program throughout 2008.
- 3. Increase statewide safety belt usage for vehicle occupants age 5 and older from 77% in 2006 to 81% in 2008.
- 4. Increase safety belt usage for vehicle occupants from 74.8% in 2006 to 78% in 2008.

Status

- 1. The overall percentage of vehicle occupants using safety belts was 75% in 2004 and increased slightly to 75.5% during 2008. Child restraint usage rate increased from 86% in 2004 to 88% in 2008.
- 2. Sixty-three percent (63%) of drivers killed were not wearing a safety belt.
- 3. Sixty-eight percent (68% of passengers ages 5 and older who were killed were not wearing a safety belt.

4. Eighty percent (80%) of children ages 4 and younger who were killed were not properly seated in a child seat.



The chart above illustrates the National seat belt use rate and Louisiana's seat belt use rate. While safety belt use rates have improved nationally since 1999, Louisiana has also improved but at a lower rate.



The chart above shows Louisiana's unreastrained fatality percentage from 1999 to 2007. Unfortunately these data point to the need to maintain the highest levels of enforcement and media coverage supported by legislation requiring all persons in a moving motor vehicle to use a seat belt.

Occupant Protection Narrative

The LHSC contracted with 55 law enforcement agencies and the Louisiana State Police to conduct safety belt overtime enforcement during emphasis campaigns. The 19 Sheriffs Offices and 37 Municipal Police Departments were contracted to work various enforcement waves during FFY 20078 and the Louisiana State Police were contracted to work each month during the 12 month period to support the "Click I t or Ticket" campaign. These agencies worked a combined 12,220 overtime hours, resulting in 20,690 adult citations and 653 child restraint citations. It is important to note that these same agencies provided a yearlong maintenance-of-effort to improve safety belt use through aggressive enforcement. Law enforcement agencies reported issuing 96,926 adult safety belt citations and 14,293 child restraint citations for a total of 111,219.

The LHSC conducted media events throughout Louisiana and partnered with the NHTSA contractor to make a paid media buy in the Louisiana market. Local and state government, various enforcement agencies, medical personnel, educators, business and industry, students, victims and citizens participated in the press events and public information campaigns.



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The following surveys were conducted in 2008:

1. Pre and Post attitudinal surveys were implemented during May and June 2008 to assess message recall, determine public perception of using seat belts and the enforcement of safety belt use, and to measure the impact of change as a result of

the campaign. The overall margin of error is +/- 3.5% with a 95% confidence level. Telephone interviews were conducted with 1,600 licensed drivers. Eight-hundred drivers were contacted in May and eight-hundred in June. Results of the interviews indicated a highly significant increase of 13% in recall of having heard or seen anything recently about seat belts.



2. A safety belt observational survey was conducted in June and July 2008. Observational data was collected 418 locations selected from Louisiana's eight regions. There were 85,204 vehicles observed including autos, pickup trucks, SUVs and Vans. The results of this survey showed a slight increase of .3% points in seat belt usage from 2007. The 2008 statewide usage rate is 75.5% compared to 75.2% in 2007. Gains were measured in the Baton Rouge, Houma, Lafayette and Lake Charles regions. The gain in the Houma region was a substantial eleven percentage points. The regions with decreases in belt use were New Orleans and north Louisiana (Alexandria, Shreveport and Monroe regions.)

3. A child restraint observational survey was conducted during May 2008. A total of 2,194 observations were made at 68 sites. Slightly over eighty-five (85.6%) percent of children subject to Louisiana's child safety restraint law were restrained while in the motor vehicle. The use of child safety restraints decreases as age increases. Almost all (99.1%) of the infants observed were restrained. The child restraint usage rate for children ages one through three was 96.2%, up from 89.4% in 2007. Among four and five year olds, the usage rate increased to 90.7%, up from 83.0% in 2007. Child restraint usage among children aged six through twelve was 80.5%, up from 75.7% in 2007. The usage rate among children under thirteen (85.6% is about ten points higher than seat belt usage among adults (75.5%) in Louisiana.

A comparison of 2008 findings to 2007 findings indicate the 2008 estimate of child safety restraint use is 5.3 percentage points higher than the 2007 estimate.


Pedestrian

Objectives in the 2008 HSP

1. Support the Department of Transportation and Development pedestrian program throughout 2008.

Status

The LHSC had no planned pedestrian projects funded in FFY 2007. Pedestrian fatalities increased from 10.05% in 2006 to 11.22% in 2007 of all traffic fatalities, an increase of 1.17% from 2006.

Demographic data show that 32.4% of pedestrian fatalities were alcohol related. The Louisiana DOTD has been the primary provider of pedestrian programming, and the LHSC will continue its partnership with the DOTD and the Federal Highway Administration.


Bicycle

Objectives in the 2008 HSP

1. Support the Department of Transportation and Development bicycle safety program throughout 2008.

Status

The LHSC has no planned bicycle projects funded in FY 2008; however, in 2007, twenty-three (23) persons were killed on bicycles which remained the same as in 2006.



Bicycle Narrative

Bicycle fatalities as a proportion of all fatalities have remained relatively unchanged since 2005. Overall there were 695 bicycle crashes in 2007. Statistics will continue to be monitored and the LHSC will continue to participate in partnerships and planning meetings with various groups concerned with bicycle safety.

Police Traffic Services

Objectives in the 2008 HSP

- 1. Reduce the number of traffic fatalities by six percent per year through 2008.
- 2. Raise the level of awareness among Louisiana Citizens regarding traffic safety issues throughout 2008.
- 3. Establish a legislative framework for the LHSC program throughout 2008.
- 4. Reduce the percent of impaired driving traffic fatalities in Louisiana from 46% in 2006 to 43% by 2008.
- 5. Increase statewide safety belt usage for vehicle occupants age 5 and older from 77% in 2006 to 81% by 2008.
- 6. Increase safety belt usage for all vehicle occupants from 75.8% in 2006 to 78% by 2008.
- 7. Reduce the number of fatal crashes among drivers age 15-24 from 322 in 2006 to 317 by 2008.
- 8. Maintain the highway-rail grade crossing fatalities at 8 throughout 2008.
- 9. Support a comprehensive traffic records management program throughout 2008.

The LHSC implemented police traffic services strategies identified in the 2008 HSP.

Status

1. The number of fatalities increased from 987 in 2006 to 993 in 2007. We believe that the complete interruption of police services due to hurricanes

Gustav and I van in 2008 was a contributing factor in not meeting this objective.

- 2. The fatality rate per 100 million VMT was 2.0 in 2006 and remained at 2.0 in 2007.
- 3. The number of injuries decreased from 81,000 in 2006 to 78,900 in 2007.
- 4. The fatality rate per 100K population increased from 22.1 in 2004 to 23.1 in 2007.
- 5. The fatal and injury crash rate per 100K population increased from 1,115 in 2004 to 1,122 in 2007.
- 6. The number of alcohol related fatalities increased from 457 in 2006 to 487 in 2007.
- 7. The percentage of alcohol related fatalities as a proportion to all fatalities increased from 46% in 2006 to 49% in 2007.
- 8. The alcohol related fatality rate per VMT increased from 1.01 in 2006 to 1.07 in 2007.
- 9. The percentage of the population using safety belts increased from 75.2% in 2007 to 75.5% in 2008.

Police Traffic Services Narrative

The LHSC contracted with the Louisiana State Police, 19 Sheriff's Departments, and 36 municipal agencies to conduct three primary types of enforcement. Impaired Driving, Occupant Protection and Speed are the leading causes of traffic fatalities and injuries, and law enforcement efforts have historically been a critical component to addressing each issue.

The LHSC contracted with 55 law enforcement agencies and the Louisiana State Police to conduct impaired driving overtime. The contracts specified that the 19 sheriff departments and 36 municipal police departments would work only during various waves during FY 2008. The Louisiana State Police contract specified that they would work each month during the 12 month period. These agencies worked a combined 20,495 overtime hours, resulting in 1,995 DWI arrests. The maintenance-of-effort reported by these agencies resulted in 18,730 DWI arrests.



Enforcement agencies worked a combined 12,220 occupant protection overtime hours in support of the "Click it or Ticket" campaign. This resulted in 20,690 adult citations and 653 child restraint citations being issued. The maintenance-of effort resulted in 14,293 child restraint and 96,926 adult safety belt citations being issued.

The LHSC did not conduct any special speed enforcement campaigns during 2008; however, during the year, enforcement agencies did work 10,666 overtime speed enforcement hours and issued 19,983 speeding tickets during those hours. During non-overtime hours (maintenance of effort) agencies issued 185,904 speeding tickets.



Traffic Records

- 2. Use a systems approach in engineering to strike a balance between single unique locations and addressing the safety of the road network.
- 3. Develop a comprehensive, timely, and accurate information and decision support system.
- 4. Develop a comprehensive, data driven legislative agenda that all partners actively support and implement.

Status

The LHSC implemented traffic records strategies identified in the 2007 HSP.

- 1. An effective, comprehensive, systems approach for improving road user behavior was implemented.
- 2. A systems approach in engineering to strike a balance between single unique locations and addressing the safety of the road network was developed.
- 3. A comprehensive, timely, and accurate information and decision support system was developed.
- 4. A comprehensive, data driven legislative agenda that all partners actively supported and implemented was developed.

Traffic Records Narrative

The Traffic Records Coordinating Committee (TRCC) has sole authority to expend TRCC funding. The TRCC Chair is a DOTD employee. The LHSC is only a member of the TRCC, but serves as the fiscal agent for TRCC approved projects. The TRCC continued efforts to work on establishing a network that links crash files with roadway files, GIS data, EMS data, driver licensing and vehicle registration data, prosecution and courts. The LHSC continues to monitor crash data and provide feedback to local law enforcement with the goal to improve data quality, timelines and crash investigations. The TRCC worked closely with municipal and parish law enforcement agencies, providing training and computer equipment.



The Commercial Vehicle Analysis Reporting System (CVARS) project continues to work toward improving the quality and quantity of data collected from crash reports of commercial vehicles. The CVARS staff also participated in the revision of the Louisiana Uniform Motor Vehicle Traffic Crash Report.

Paid Media

Objectives in the 2008 HSP

- 1. Raise the level of awareness among Louisiana citizens regarding traffic safety issues throughout 2008.
- 2. Reduce the percent of impaired driving traffic fatalities in Louisiana from 46% in 2006 to 43% by 2008.
- 3. Increase statewide safety belt usage for vehicle occupants age 5 and older from 77% in 2006 to 81% by 2008.
- 4. Increase safety belt usage for all vehicle occupants from 74.8% in 2006 to 78% by 2008.
- 5. Reduce the number of fatal crashes among drivers age 15-24 from 322 in 2006 to 317 by 2008.
- 6. Reduce the motorcycle fatality rate from 9.47% in 2006 to 8.1% in 2008.
- 7. Maintain the highway rail grade crossing fatalities at 8 through 2008.

Paid Media Narrative

The LHSC prepares an annual Marketing and Communications Plan that drives the coordination of each NHTSA campaign and the collaborative enforcement overtime. The goal of the media campaign was to reach a targeted audience by purchasing a combination of radio and television advertisements for both alcohol and occupant protection program areas. Motorcycle and speed were also addressed during FY 2008. Each campaign has an identified problem identification and demographic audience.

Paid media flights were planned based on each individual campaign's demographic audience. Media outlets were selected based on their programs GRP's (gross rating points) for the specific targeted audience and the available dollars were then distributed among the media outlets based on their ability to deliver the best CPP (cost per point) for targeted audience.

Media flights for each campaign were planned based on Gross Rating Points (GRP's) and high crash statistics for geographical location and demographics. One (1) GRP is equal to 1% population of the targeted audience in that market. Where GRP's were

not available (some cable systems), networks geared to our target audience were selected. We made up missed spots during the flight where applicable but did not run outside our flight date perimeters.

The LHSC maintains affidavits of performance on all paid media buys and implements a more extensive assessment to measure target audience reaction for paid media campaigns that exceed \$100,000.00. The LHSC has implemented telephone attitudinal surveys to assess how the target audience's knowledge, attitude, and actions were affected by the impaired driving and occupant protection messages.

In addition to paid media, the LHSC contracted for specific earned media efforts to supplement the paid campaign. The LHSC issued numerous news releases and editorial columns throughout the fiscal year and arranged for numerous television and radio appearances for the Governor's Highway Safety Representatives. Two-thousand four hundred forty-two (2,442) press clippings were printed throughout fiscal year 2008.

The impaired driving and occupant protection campaigns focused primarily on television and radio outlets. University outreach for both campaigns included live reads at football games, static signage at multiple University sporting events, and allowed for the opportunity for live broadcast interviews.



Rail Grade


Objectives in the 2008 HSP

- 1. Raise the level of awareness among Louisiana citizens regarding traffic safety issues throughout 2008.
- 2. Establish a legislative framework for the LHSC program throughout 2008.
- 3. Maintain the highway rail grade crossing fatalities at 8 through 2008.

Status

The LHSC implemented rail grade strategies identified in the 2008 HSP.

- 1. The number of rail grade related fatalities increased from 8 in 2006 to 9 in 2007.
- 2. By comparison to total fatalities rail grade crossing fatalities represent 1.2% of all Louisiana fatalities. LHSC remains committed to support Louisiana Operation Lifesaver by partnering with the LADOTD.



Rail Grade Narrative

Louisiana Operation Lifesaver continues to be partially funded by the LHSC. In 2007-2008, LHSC funded a portion of the director and administrative assistant's salaries and travel, along with training materials for the Grade Crossing Collision Investigation

course for law enforcement and the implementation of the Highway Safety Summit. In 2008, LHSC contracted to partially fund the director's salary for the 2008-2009 fiscal year.

Partnerships with the railroad industry, preventative legislation on clearings, and ongoing public information and education programs make the Louisiana program a national model. Rail traffic continues to increase, and many crossings in rural areas lead to the unfortunate number of crashes in the state. Louisiana Operation Lifesaver evaluates crash data to concentrate its educational in target parishes with increased highwayrail grade crossing and trespassing incidents.

In 2008, Louisiana Operation Lifesaver conducted more than 500 school and community education programs to more than 17,000 people. Display booths were included at more than 25 conferences and fairs, reaching more than 23,000 people. Approximately 325 people attended the Rail Safety for Emergency Responders course statewide, and nearly 350 law enforcement personnel attended 12 GCCI courses statewide.

Louisiana Operation Lifesaver has undertaken strategic planning to define its future direction for the next five years, and LHSC is participating in this process.

Safe Communities

- 7. Reduce the number of fatal crashes among driver age 15-24 from 322 in 2006 to 317 by 2008.

Status

1. In 2008 the LHSC planned to issue Safe Community grants in the amount of \$285,374.75.

Safe Communities Narrative

The LHSC is involved in multiple Safe Community programs. Programs under the Safe Community model include, South Central Planning and Development Commission, Southeast Louisiana DWI Task Force, the North Central Partners in Prevention, Louisiana Youth Prevention Services, Baton Rouge Traffic Committee, St. Martin Parish Safety Community and Louisiana Passenger Safety Task Force.

Each of these safe community programs has a different connection with the LHSC. Three were funded directly through a LHSC sub-grant, some receive supplemental assistance from LHSC and its partners, and the LHSC holds board positions with many of the organizations. Many of the safe community efforts that exist in Louisiana have a specific focus within traffic safety. However, all of the organizations strive to include a diverse population of professional, advocates, community leaders, and other interested persons.

The safe Communities concept continues to be shared with existing contractors and explained to potential new contractors. The LHSC facilitates community events that provide the opportunity for local community leaders, traffic safety professionals, and advocates too focus on local traffic safety. These events provide a forum for local participants to develop partnerships with other interested parties and learn more about the mission of the LHSC and the Safe Communities program.

St. Martin is an example of a LHSC Safe Community program that has continued to flourish under FY 2008 funding. The Coalition membership has expanded to include all municipal enforcement agencies in the parish, the Sheriff and the State Police; city councilmen and state Senators; and educators. They work in partnership with Louisiana DOTD and their local road safety program and have made improvements to engineering issues and had the opportunity for feedback on design studies for new road development. The overall program works to include input from many disciplines and is thriving from the participation and planning of the Coalition.




Section 163 (.08)
