For 25 years, Amy Artuso has worked in the area of children’s health and wellness. In her role at the National Safety Council (NSC), Artuso serves as a subject matter expert and manages federally funded programs supporting the safety of children in and around vehicles.

Prior to joining NSC, Artuso worked in pediatric injury prevention at All Children’s Hospital, part of Johns Hopkins Medicine. In this role, she worked extensively with funding from the Florida Department of Transportation. Programs included child passenger safety, and bicycle and pedestrian safety.

Artuso has served as a Safe Kids Coordinator, and has managed Safe Routes to School initiatives. She has worked as a civilian training and curriculum specialist in child and youth services for the U.S. Department of the Army, and was a certified child life specialist in pediatrics for 16 years.

A native to western New York, Artuso earned a bachelor’s degree from East Carolina University in Child Development with a focus on children in healthcare settings. She completed post-baccalaureate courses at Yale University, training at Yale New Haven Hospital, and worked as a research assistant for the Yale School of Medicine. Artuso earned a master’s degree in public health from the University of South Florida, and this fall begins a DrPH (Doctor of Public Health) program in Advanced Practice Leadership, also with the University of South Florida.

Artuso is a nationally certified Child Passenger Safety Technician Instructor. She is a past-chairperson of the National Child Passenger Safety Board and is currently its secretariat. She resides in Tampa, Florida, with her husband and children.
