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Executive Summary

Mission Statement

The Ohio Traffic Safety Office (OTSO) mission is dedicated to saving lives and preventing injuries on Ohio's roads by using creative leadership, innovative education and comprehensive enforcement programs. OTSO strives to work in partnership with local, state, and federal entities to advance equity in highway safety programs, ensuring they benefit all road users in Ohio.

Highway Safety Office Program

The Federal Highway Safety Act of 1966 directed the U.S. Department of Transportation to administer various highway safety programs. This grant program provides federal funds administered through the Ohio Department of Public Safety (ODPS) / Ohio Traffic Safety Office (OTSO) to eligible entities to be used for such projects as traffic safety education, enforcement, and engineering. Funds are to be used for highway safety support, based on problem identification, with the intent of reducing overall fatal and injury crashes. This program operates on a reimbursement basis.

Housed under the Ohio Department of Public Safety (ODPS), the Ohio Traffic Safety Office (OTSO) administers Section 402 State and Community grants, Section 405 National Priority Safety Program grants, related National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) awards and initiatives and contracts for traffic safety activities.

Fatalities and Injuries

Preliminary state data shows 1,242 fatalities and 7,492 serious injuries in traffic crashes in 2023. The number of traffic fatalities in Ohio has decreased 7.72 percent since 2019 and the number of injuries has decreased 1.30 percent in the same timeframe.

Top Priorities

Ohio has prioritized its problem areas as follows: Impaired Driving (alcohol and/or drugged), Occupant Protection, Speed, Motorcycles, Youthful Drivers, Aging Road Users, Distracted Driving, Traffic Records, Pedestrian, and Bicycle. This selection was determined based upon problem identification as it relates to the core measures. Ohio's impaired driving fatal crashes has increased and Ohio is now considered a mid-range state. Ohio's non-motorized fatalities have also increased and Ohio is now eligible for non-motorized funding.

Updates to 2024 – 2026 Highway Safety Plan

Ohio has already identified the Black/African American population as an affected/potentially affected community. Within this community, Ohio is experiencing an increase of Haitian born immigrants. The U.S. Department of State states that 95 percent of Haitians are considered African descent and the remaining five percent are considered to be mixed Caucasian/African descent. Springfield, Ohio (Clark County) is one city that is experiencing an increase in this population. Springfield's percent of Black or African American population has been higher than Ohio's percent of Black or African American population since 2018.

Description:

For FFY2025, the OTSO conducted an in-depth analysis of traffic crash data to identify and prioritize traffic safety problems and to target fatal crash locations for traffic safety programming. Safe Communities are multi-jurisdictional programs with many different agencies and organizations within the county making up the coalitions. Traffic safety will be addressed through partnerships with local businesses, law enforcement, engineering, hospitals, health care providers, schools, faith-based organizations, ethnic/non-English speaking communities, community groups and others that have a vested interest in traffic safety.

These coordinated communities will play an active role in addressing traffic safety issues. Each program must include strategies focusing on seat belt use, impaired driving (alcohol and impaired), distracted driving, motorcycle safety, and youthful drivers. Ohio's Safe Communities network uses local coalitions to deliver traffic safety messages and programs throughout the year at the local level. Safe Community programs are required to conduct events where they interact with the community. Some examples of events are county fairs, community festivals, and high school programs including Think Fast. Safe Communities provides the education/earned media portion of our enforcement campaigns while our law enforcement agencies, including the Ohio State Highway Patrol, conduct enforcement.

All Safe Community sub-recipients are required to attend scheduled OTSO/Sub-recipient meetings. Items discussed at the meetings include re-caps of previous blitzes/national campaigns, upcoming blitzes/national campaigns, current crash trends, enforcement activities, educational activities, and other timely traffic related information specific to the district. Sub-recipients coordinate activities and plan locations based on their local data and data shared at these meetings to ensure all activities are highly visible and are based on problem identification.

Each Safe Communities program can direct programming based on local problem identification. Franklin, Hamilton and Mahoning counties have proposed activities to specifically reach pedestrians. These counties had 243 pedestrian fatal crashes and 781 pedestrian serious injury crashes between 2019 and 2023. This represents 31.07 percent of the statewide pedestrian fatal crashes and 30.99 percent of statewide pedestrian serious injury crashes in those years.

Maximum amounts for each county were set based on the average number of fatal crashes for 2021, 2022, and 2023. New programs had to have a minimum of a three-year average of 7.05 fatal crashes to be eligible for funding. Ohio will fund up to 42 countywide Safe Communities programs which will involve around 1,200 communities. These counties reach 81.17 percent of Ohio's total population, 96.56 percent of Ohio's Black or African American population, and 90.81 percent of Ohio's Hispanic population. Almost 75 percent of the fatal crashes between 2019 and 2023 occurred in these counties.

Paid media is an important component of Ohio's communication and outreach strategies to inform the public of the dangers of impaired driving (alcohol and/or drugged). In FFY2024, Ohio will continue to model the NHTSA National Communications Plan to bridge the media gaps around the national alcohol crackdowns with an appropriate mix of media, enforcement, and social-norming initiatives to extend highway safety messages.

The goal will be to sustain impaired driving (alcohol and/or drugged) messaging throughout the year with the highest concentration of paid media conducted during the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over Crackdown and the December / January crackdown. Between these times, using secondary messages like Fans Don't Let Fans Drive Drunk and Buzzed Driving is Drunk Driving provides an opportunity to extend the core safety messages. Embracing social-norming messages allows us to look for marketing alliances with businesses and organizations already branded and important to our target audiences. Ohio will also be adding messaging aimed at reducing drug impaired driving, due to the new recreational marijuana law.

An emphasis is being placed on working with media partners who not only reach our target audience, but also embrace traffic safety messages and are willing to go above and beyond the traditional media buy to provide additional bonus spots, public service announcements with high profile talent, on the ground events and integrating traffic safety messaging into social media and enforcement campaigns, live reads during major events and other

innovative and unique opportunities that will help reach specific segments of our targeted audience. Media will also be directed toward Ohio's multicultural communities.

Media tactics will include a combination of television, radio, social and print media that will be used to maximize resources for the sustained impaired paid media plan.

Ohio runs impaired driving messages during home games throughout the season with the following sports teams in Ohio to target this high-risk population: Cincinnati Bengals, Cincinnati Reds, Cleveland Browns, Cleveland Cavaliers, Cleveland Guardians, Columbus Crew, Columbus Clippers, Toledo Mudhens, and The Ohio State University. These partners generally include television, radio, interior and exterior signage. The broadcast coverage for the Major League Baseball teams includes a broad network of stations in the region beyond just the metro market that it primarily serves. The sustained impaired paid media plan will complement the NHTSA National Communications Plan and the NHTSA Marketing Calendar, which prioritizes NHTSA special events and messaging opportunities throughout the year. New campaign messaging not using NHTSA messaging will be submitted to NHTSA for review/approval before placing paid media.

Impaired driving (alcohol and/or drugged) print advertising/educational materials are one of Ohio's communication and outreach strategies to inform the public of the dangers of impaired driving (alcohol and/or drugged). The national Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over alcohol crackdown around the Labor Day Holiday combines highly visible enforcement with both local and national media exposure. Paid media during the crackdown will highlight that law enforcement will be strictly enforcing impaired driving laws. All law enforcement agencies across the state will be encouraged and funded agencies are required to participate in the 2025 crackdown. Funds will be used to provide law enforcement agencies and other partners (Safe Communities, traffic safety partners, etc.) around the state with approved print advertising/educational materials that will be distributed in a systematic manner to promote the message through earned media. Print advertising/educational materials are evaluated in several ways: knowledge surveys, gross impressions, and numbers distributed.

Project Title: Impaired Driving Enforcement Program

Description:

High Visibility Enforcement is designed to convince the public that there are consequences to traffic violations. Grants are awarded to law enforcement agencies whose jurisdictions experienced an average of 2.0 or more fatal crashes over the three-year period of 2021, 2022 and 2023. Each agency must conduct alcohol impaired driving enforcement activity to impact their alcohol impaired fatal crashes. Highly visible enforcement activities are conducted at strategic times throughout the year consistent with the NHTSA Communications Calendar. In addition to the required Blitzes and National Campaigns, overtime enforcement based on local fatal/serious injury crash problem identification is eligible for funding. All IDEP subrecipients are also required to submit for the STEP hours to conduct all other traffic related overtime activities (i.e., speed, seat belts, aggressive, etc.). Included in the STEP grant are funds to be used for education. These funds can be used for training officers or for educating the public on all areas of traffic safety including impaired driving. All IDEP sub-recipients are required to attend scheduled OTSO/Sub-recipient meetings. Items discussed at the meetings include re-caps of previous blitzes/national campaigns, upcoming blitzes/national campaigns, current crash trends, enforcement activities, educational activities, and other timely traffic related information specific to the district. Sub-recipients coordinate activities and plan locations based on local data and data shared at these meetings to ensure all activities are highly visible and are based on problem identification.

There were 1,888 alcohol related fatal crashes and 4,182 alcohol related serious injury crashes in Ohio between 2019 and 2023. Highly visible enforcement activities are conducted at strategic times throughout the year consistent with the NHTSA Communications Calendar. In addition to the required Blitzes and National Campaign, overtime enforcement based on local fatal/serious injury crash problem identification is eligible for funding. In FFY2025, the OSHP will continue with their Impaired Driving Enforcement grant. They will conduct at least 120 checkpoints in addition to saturation patrols. All OSP district and post commanders are required to attend scheduled OTSO/Sub-recipient meetings. Items discussed at the meetings include re-caps of previous blitzes/national campaigns, upcoming blitzes/national campaigns, current crash trends, enforcement activities, educational activities, and other timely traffic related information specific to the district. Sub-recipients coordinate activities and plan locations based on local data and data shared at these meetings to ensure all activities are highly visible and are based on problem identification.

Using state funds, the OSHP conducts speed, occupant restraint, impaired driving (alcohol and/or drugged) and motorcycle enforcement activity statewide to impact fatal crashes. The state funds activity that occurs during regular working hours. The portion of these funds that are impaired driving related is used towards match for the 405d funds.

Project Title: OVI Task Force Program

Description:

Ohio's OVI Task Force program is a countywide initiative to conduct high visibility enforcement, public awareness and education focusing on impaired driving (alcohol and/or drugged). In order to reach our goal of reducing fatalities in crashes involving a driver or motorcycle operator with a blood alcohol concentration of 0.08 g/dL or higher, Ohio is concentrating its OVI Task Force program in the counties that experience the highest number of alcohol-related fatal crashes. The counties that have a yearly average of at least six alcohol related fatal crashes were eligible to apply.

The ten counties that submitted proposals represent 47.31 percent of the alcohol related fatal crashes between 2019 and 2023. These counties reach 51.90 percent of Ohio's total population, 86.17 percent of Ohio's Black or African American population, and 63.56 percent of Ohio's Hispanic population. Each OVI Task Force is required to conduct a minimum of 16 checkpoints (two during the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over Crackdown) and three press events (one during Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over). Saturation patrols are conducted in conjunction with the checkpoints. OVI Task Forces conduct meetings with participating agencies to coordinate activities within the task force. All OVI Task Force sub-recipients are required to attend scheduled OTSO/Sub-recipient meetings. Items discussed at the meetings include re-caps of previous blitzes/national campaigns, upcoming blitzes/national campaigns, current crash trends, enforcement activities, educational activities, and other timely traffic related information specific to the district. Sub-recipients coordinate activities and plan locations based on local data and data shared at these meetings to ensure all activities are highly visible and are based on problem identification.

Description:

Ohio will continue to implement and expand the national seat belt mobilization model around the Memorial Day holiday. Campaign components will include earned media (education and outreach), paid media, high visibility enforcement and evaluation.

A higher frequency of messaging directed at low usage populations helps increase awareness and equates to a higher overall compliance rate for belt use. New media partnerships and earned media will help expand the campaign's message into the low usage populations. TV and radio spots will continue to be concentrated and aired on stations most likely to reach Ohio's targeted demographic. Media will also be directed toward Ohio's multicultural communities. Additionally, social media and a limited amount of targeted outdoor and print media will be used during this effort.

The target audience is defined as anyone who drives or rides in a motor vehicle within the State of Ohio. According to the 2023 Observational Survey of Safety Belt Use, younger drivers/passengers (ages 15 ½ - 25) and males are less likely to use seat belts. A heavy emphasis of paid media will be directed toward younger males with the primary media target being 18 - 34-year-olds. A secondary emphasis will continue to be male urban audiences, rural and pick-up truck drivers.

Media tactics will include a combination of television, radio, social and print media that will be used to maximize resources for the Click It or Ticket paid media plan. Bonus inventory will be required by each station. Regional radio will be negotiated in counties receiving less significant impact from the larger cities. Additional cost-efficiency and greater message reach

are available in many of the smaller regions by also employing a statewide radio network in part for this effort. New campaign messages using NHTSA's messaging with Ohio's graphics will be submitted to NHTSA for review/approval before placing paid media.

Description:

Ohio will continue to model the NHTSA National Communications Plan to bridge the media gaps around the national seat belt mobilization with an appropriate mix of media, enforcement, and social-norming initiatives to extend highway safety messages.

The goal will be to sustain the message throughout the year and to hit the highest peak during the national mobilization. Throughout the year, using secondary messages like *Buckle Up in your Truck - What's Holding You Back?* provides an opportunity to extend the core safety messages. Embracing social-norming messages allows the OTSO to look for marketing alliances with businesses and organizations important to our target audiences. We have learned that many partners are not comfortable spending their resources to aggressively promote a strong enforcement message. A year-round mix of enforcement and social-norming messages helps to avoid these conflicts and provides OTSO with more opportunities to keep our messages in front of the public and target audiences. A portion of the Sustained Belt Paid Media budget will be spent on Child Passenger Safety messaging.

An emphasis is being placed on working with media partners who not only reach our target audience, but also embrace traffic safety messages and are willing to go above and beyond the traditional media buy to provide additional bonus spots, public service announcements with high profile talents, on ground events and integrating traffic safety messaging into social

media and enforcement campaigns, live reads during major events and other innovative and unique opportunities that will help reach specific segments of our targeted audience.

Media tactics will include a combination of radio, television, social media, outdoor advertising, and print materials to maximize resources for the sustained belt paid media plan.

High Risk Populations

Teens

Ohio is working to target rural teen seat belt usage. Currently, 25 rural school bus shelter locations statewide are also printed with the *Buckle-Up in Your Truck* message to target teens and adults. Another 25 rural school bus shelters will be printed with a teen driver message. These bus shelters are located along rural routes.

Rural

Ohio is working to target rural seat belt usage. Currently, 25 rural school bus shelter locations statewide are also printed with the *Buckle-Up in Your Truck* message. These bus shelters are located along rural routes. The message is placed on the outside of the shelter for passing traffic to see.

18 - 34-year-old Male

This target audience has been identified throughout the State of Ohio as a low-usage population. Qualitative research information has generally identified the younger males (16 - 24 years) within this demographic as the most "high risk" drivers and passengers. These males are also less likely to use seat belts if they travel in pick-up trucks, consume alcohol, or ride at night and/or are African American. Ohio runs seat belt messages during home games throughout the season with the following sports teams in Ohio to target this high-risk population: Cincinnati Bengals, Cincinnati Reds, Cleveland Browns, Cleveland Cavaliers, Cleveland Guardians, Columbus Clippers, Toledo Mudhens, Columbus Crew and The Ohio State University. These partners generally include television, radio, interior and exterior signage. The broadcast coverage for the Major League Baseball teams includes a broad network of stations in the region beyond just the metro market that it primarily serves.

Black or African American and Hispanic/Latino

Ohio is working with Black or African American and Hispanic/Latino communities to develop seat belt messaging that is culturally relevant. Both communities have been identified as overrepresented and underserved.

The sustained belt paid media plan will complement the NHTSA National Communications Plan and the NHTSA Marketing Calendar, which prioritizes NHTSA special events and messaging opportunities throughout the year. New campaign messaging not using NHTSA messaging will be submitted to NHTSA for review/approval before placing paid media.

Description:

Ohio Department of Health (ODH) will continue to be the lead agency for the Occupant Protection Coordinator (OPC) program. ODH plans to sub-grant with up to eight OP Coordinators to provide occupant restraint programming to all 88 Ohio counties. OPC responsibilities include coordinating a child safety seat distribution program for low-income families, conducting car seat check-up events, coordinating the NHTSA 32-hour Standardized Child Passenger Safety (CPS) Technician Training course and associated refresher course, disseminating occupant protection education and training for youth, and the National Campaigns for CPS and booster seats.

Each OPC Coordinator is responsible for conducting car seat check events and overseeing each partnering established fitting station within the region. Ohio currently has 197 established fitting stations. Ohio currently has 1,087 certified technicians. Ohio's training includes a minimum of 16 classes. Following this program, Ohio can maintain sufficient coverage at fitting stations and events. Ohio's technician retention rate is 57.06 percent, which is above the national average of 52.77 percent. Ohio has 141 fitting stations in rural areas (an at-risk population), 92 in urban areas (some of these are also at-risk populations that include predominantly minority populations and low-income areas), 145 in low income (at-risk) areas.

The ODH has an approved Indirect Cost Rate of 28.1 percent.

Project Title: Selective Traffic Enforcement Program

Description:

High Visibility Enforcement is designed to convince the public that there are consequences for traffic violations. Grants are awarded to law enforcement agencies whose jurisdictions experienced an average of 2.0 or more fatal crashes over the three-year period of 2021, 2022 and 2023. Each agency must conduct enforcement activity (i.e., speed, seat belt, aggressive, etc.) to impact their fatal crashes. Highly visible enforcement activities are conducted at strategic times throughout the year consistent with the NHTSA Communications Calendar. In addition to the required Blitzes and National Campaigns, overtime enforcement based on local fatal/serious injury crash problem identification is eligible for funding. All STEP sub-recipients are also required to submit for the Impaired Driving Enforcement (IDEP) hours to conduct alcohol impaired driving related overtime activities. Included in the STEP grant are funds for education. The amount available for education is based on the jurisdiction's population (\$1,500 for small; \$2,500 for medium; \$3,500 for large). These funds can be used for training officers or for educating the public on all areas of traffic safety including the importance of seat belts. All STEP sub-recipients are required to attend scheduled OTSO/Sub-recipient meetings. Items discussed at the meetings include re-caps of previous blitzes/national campaigns, upcoming blitzes/national campaigns, current crash trends, enforcement activities, educational activities, and other timely traffic related information specific to the district. Sub-recipients coordinate activities and plan locations based on local data and data shared at these meetings to ensure all activities are highly visible and are based on problem identification.

High Visibility Enforcement is designed to convince the public that there are consequences for traffic violations. If funding allows, this grant program will be offered mid-year to agencies that have an average of 1.67 fatal crashes over a three-year period (these jurisdictions don't qualify for the traditional IDEP/STEP program). Additional details will be provided once finalized. Each agency must conduct enforcement activity (i.e., speed, impaired, seat belt, aggressive, etc.) to impact their fatal crashes. Highly visible enforcement activities are conducted at strategic times throughout the year consistent with the NHTSA Communications Calendar.

All Holiday Blitz Enforcement Program sub-recipients will be required to attend scheduled OTSO/Sub-recipient meetings. Items discussed at the meetings include re-caps of previous blitzes/national campaigns, upcoming blitzes/national campaigns, current crash trends, enforcement activities, educational activities, and other timely traffic related information specific to the district. Sub-recipients coordinate activities and plan locations based on local data and data shared at these meetings to ensure all activities are highly visible and are based on problem identification.

Description:

OSHP chairs the TRCC committee. The committee is comprised of state, local and federal agencies who are stakeholders in the traffic crash records system. Committee members oversee implementation of the Traffic Records Strategic Plan. A Traffic Records Assessment was completed in FFY2021. To streamline the project management process, the OSHP has been awarded a grant to oversee the TRCC grant projects. All project suggestions will continue to be submitted to the TRCC Committee. The committee will decide as a whole on whether to submit the project(s) to NHTSA for funding approval. Projects that will be completed by internal ODPS agencies will be overseen by OSHP through this grant. This should help liquidate the Section 405c funds in a more efficient manner. A brief description of the projects being funded under the OSHP grant with the data system/attribute are listed below.

Travel - \$10,000

Travel costs associated with traffic records management training and conferences (Traffic Records Forum) for the TRCC Chair/Co-Chair.

Title: Court Case Management System Upgrades – Promise Project

Description: Assist local courts in upgrading case management systems to facilitate e-filing of traffic citations. This project was approved by the TRCC on June 13, 2019 and by NHTSA on October 3, 2019.

Performance Measure: Increase the number of courts, by at least 20 that will be ready to

The team will also investigate ways to automate some of the data extraction, validation, and update. This project was approved by the TRCC on September 15, 2022 and by NHTSA on October 19, 2022.

- Collect each of the 3 data elements for 50% of the applicable roadway network (~18,209 miles) by September 30th, 2023.

Title: ODOT No Passing Zone Data Collection – Promise Project

Description: The Ohio Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (OMUTCD) requires the Ohio Department of Public Safety (ODOT) to establish no-passing zones at vertical and horizontal curves and other locations where an engineering study indicates that passing must be prohibited because of inadequate site distances.

No Passing Zones can change over time as sight distances change due to roadway construction projects and changes in natural and manmade landscapes. Having the most upto-date and accurate No Passing Zone data possible is essential for the safety of motorists performing passing maneuvers.

The required engineering study for ODOT was last conducted by MasterMind between 2002-2008 when more than 14,000 miles of undivided rural state routes was surveyed using the standard two-vehicle method. This project was approved by the TRCC on September 15, 2022 and by NHTSA on October 19, 2022.

Database: Roadway

Attribute: Completeness

Performance Measure:

- Collect no-passing zone data for 33% of applicable roadway segments (~4,667 centerline miles) by September 30th, 2023.
- Collect no-passing zone data for 67% of applicable roadway segments (~9,380 centerline miles) by September 30th, 2024.
- Collect no-passing zone data for 100% of applicable roadway segments (~14,000 centerline miles) by September 30th, 2025.

Title: Crash Outcome Data Evaluation System – Promise Project

Description: Crash Reports do not provide comprehensive and complete injury outcomes and financial consequences of individuals involved in motor vehicle crashes. Crash data alone contribute to only a portion of the traffic records collected before, during and after a crash. The linkages of crash and medical data will provide the comprehensive crash outcome data that is needed to improve traffic safety.

The Crash Outcome Data Evaluation System (CODES) links Crash Reports, Emergency Medical Services Incidence Reporting System, and Emergency Department Visits and Hospitalizations to improve the injury and financial conditions of the data. The linked data describes a complete picture on what occurs before, during, and after a crash.

The proposed data integration project will fund the CODES team to link crash reports with Emergency Medical Services Incident Reporting System (EMSIRS) and link crash reports with emergency department visits and hospital discharge data. Through this integration the CODES team will produce fact sheets, presentations, and manuscripts with a focus on medical and financial consequences of motor vehicle crashes. In addition, provide feedback on the accuracy and completeness of the data elements in crash and EMS data. This project was approved by the TRCC on September 15, 2022 and by NHTSA on September 15, 2022.

Database: Crash and EMS/Injury Surveillance

Attribute: Integration

Performance Measure:

The number of data years of crash data linked to EMS data will be increased from 0 years to 6 years by Jun. 2023, 7 years by Jun. 2024, and 8 years by Jun. 2025.

The number of data years of crash data linked to the emergency and hospitalization data will be increased from 8 years to 13 years by Dec. 2023, 14 years by Dec. 2024, and 15 years by Dec. 2025.

Baseline: Zero records have been integrated.

Amount: \$200,000.00

Title: Fatal Crash and Injury Database – Promise Project

Description: This project will create an integrated database of fatal crash and injury data to support accurate data sharing with NHTSA via FARS. A primary objective of NHTSA is to reduce the human toll that motor vehicle crashes inflict on our society. Each year crashes result in thousands of lost lives and hundreds of thousands of injured individuals. Accurate data are required to support the development, implementation, and assessment of highway safety programs aimed at reducing this toll.

This project will develop a secure, searchable database that will integrate injury data via Autopsy Reports, AIS coded injuries, and FARS key data elements for all fatal crashes within Ohio. Autopsy reports will be obtained by Dr. Harden via Ohio Coroner's Offices. Preliminary discussions with the President of the Ohio State Coroner's Association and individual Coroners have demonstrated support for this project and autopsy reports from various agencies are currently being compiled. This project will support the Data Use and Integration record system and directly improve integration and accuracy of fatal crash injury data. This project was approved by the TRCC on June 15, 2023 and by NHTSA on October 10, 2023.

Database: Crash Data System

Attribute: Integration

Performance Measure:

Integration of injury and crash data: Abbreviated Injury Scale (AIS) coded injuries will increase from 0% to 100% for fatal crash injury data.

Description: This project will identify accuracy rates in each of the core categories within the Traffic Crash Report and identify validations, trainings, and strategies that will directly improve data integrity and accuracy. This project was approved by the TRCC on June 15, 2023 and by NHTSA on October 10, 2023.

Planned Participation in National Mobilizations

Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over Mobilizations

Ohio will continue to implement and expand the national impaired driving mobilization efforts in FFY2025. Following the national model, campaign components will include earned media (education and outreach), paid media, high visibility enforcement and evaluation. Ohio will participate in both the Winter Holiday Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over (DSOGPO) and the Labor Day DSOGPO campaigns.

The goal of the paid media plan for the 2025 alcohol crackdown is to decrease the number of impaired drivers and alcohol related fatalities. The media objective is to increase awareness of highly visible enforcement with both local and national media exposure.

The target audience is defined as anyone who drives impaired or is likely to drive impaired on Ohio's roadways. In 2025, media will be heavily directed toward a younger male audience. Once again, the primary media target will be 18 – 34-year-old males; however, other demographic audiences might be targeted based on Ohio's current crash data. Media will also be directed toward Ohio's multicultural communities.

Media tactics will include a combination of television, radio, social and print media that will be used to maximize resources for the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over alcohol paid media plan. Bonus inventory will be required by each station. Regional radio will be negotiated in counties receiving less significant impact from the larger cities. Additional cost-efficiency and greater message reach are available in many of the smaller regions by employing spot radio as a part of this plan.

Funds will be used to provide law enforcement agencies and other partners (Safe Communities, traffic safety partners, etc.) around the state with approved print advertising/educational materials that will be distributed in a systematic manner to promote the message through earned media. Print advertising/educational materials are evaluated in several ways: knowledge surveys, gross impressions, and numbers distributed.

Ohio's Law Enforcement Liaisons (LELs) will continue to seek commitments from additional agencies (non-sub-recipients) to also participate in the national mobilizations and increase participation in the mobilizations. Ohio's goal is to have more than 65 percent of agencies participate and report their results.

Ohio will continue to participate in Tri-State Kick-Off Events for DSGPO. In addition, Safe Community programs are required to conduct a DSOGPO kick-off event in their county and each OVI Task Force is required to hold a media event for DSOGPO. This will total between 50 and 60 events for DSOGPO.

Click It or Ticket Mobilizations

Ohio will continue to implement and expand the national seat belt mobilization efforts in FFY2025. Following the national model, campaign components will include earned media (education and outreach), paid media, high visibility enforcement and evaluation. Ohio will participate in the Memorial Day CIOT campaigns.

Campaign components will include earned media (education and outreach), paid media, high visibility enforcement and evaluation. A higher frequency of messaging directed at low usage populations helps increase awareness and equates to a higher overall compliance rate for seat belt use. New media partnerships and earned media will help expand the campaign's message into the low usage populations. In FFY2025, television and radio spots will continue to be concentrated and aired on stations most likely to reach Ohio's multicultural communities. Additionally, social media and a limited amount of targeted outdoor and print media will be used during this effort.

The target audience is defined as anyone who drives or rides in a motor vehicle within the State of Ohio. According to the ODPS 2023 Observational Survey of Safety Belt Use,

younger driver/passengers (ages 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ - 25) and men are less likely to use seat belts. Throughout 2025, a heavy emphasis of paid media will be directed toward younger men with the primary media target being 18 -34-year-olds. A secondary emphasis will continue to be male urban audiences, rural and pick-up truck drivers.

Media tactics will include a combination of television, radio, social and print media that will be used to maximize resources for the sustained seat belt paid media plan. Bonus inventory will be required by each station. Regional radio will be negotiated in counties receiving less significant impact from the larger cities. Additional cost-efficiency and greater message reach are available in many of the smaller regions by also employing a statewide radio network in part for this effort.

Funds will be utilized to provide law enforcement agencies and other partners (Save Communities, traffic safety partners, etc.) around the state with approved print advertising/educational materials that will be distributed in a systematic manner to promote seat belt use through earned media. Print advertising/educational materials are evaluated in several ways: knowledge surveys, gross impressions, and numbers distributed.

Ohio's Law Enforcement Liaisons (LELs) will continue to seek commitments from additional agencies (non-sub-recipients) to also participate in the national mobilizations and increase participation in the mobilizations. Ohio's goal is to have more than 65 percent of agencies participate and report their results.

Ohio will continue to participate in Tri-State Kick-Off Events for CIOT. In addition, Safe Community programs are required to conduct a CIOT kick-off event in their county. This will be approximately 42 events for CIOT.

Crash

Description

The continued development and deployment of a statewide, electronic crash submission system remains a priority for the State of Ohio. Per the Ohio Revised Code (ORC), all traffic crash reports involving personal injury and/or property damage in excess of \$1,000 are required to be submitted to ODPS within five days. To support the electronic submission of traffic crash records, the state developed the Ohio Law Enforcement Information System (OLEIS) and the State of Ohio Law Enforcement Virtual Exchange (SOLVE) which are provided at no cost to law enforcement agencies. There are also a number of third-party systems that operate in the state. Since OLEIS and SOLVE have been made available, there has been a substantial increase in the number of crash reports being submitted electronically, and participation continues to improve. In 2023, there were 252,627 total traffic crashes in Ohio, and approximately 90% (226,971) of reports were submitted electronically. Year-to-date 2024, there have been 54,646 total traffic crashes, and approximately 96% (52,383) of reports have been submitted electronically. Currently, 251 law enforcement agencies are submitting crashes electronically using the OLEIS Crash Module.

The electronic crash process results in the instantaneous receipt of crash information. This eliminates the mailing and manual data entry of crash reports, therefore drastically improving both the timeliness and accuracy of Ohio's traffic crash data. Ohio crash data is publicly available on the ODPS website. Electronic crash submission functions are funded through federal grants provided to TRCC from NHTSA as well as through state agency funding sources.

Great strides have been made to ensure all agencies are submitting crashes, as required. With the transition to electronic submissions, deficiencies existed in the lack of follow-up to ensure electronic submissions were being received. Reports are now run on a routine basis; if a significant decrease is noticed in the number of agency reports, contact is made with the agency. Usually, there is either an IT issue or misunderstanding on how to complete the crash through all phases. Tracking now exists on paper crash reports that are returned to agencies for correction.

During 2018 and 2019, Ohio's crash report, the OH-1, underwent a significant re-write. A committee was assembled and met to ensure the integration of both ANSI D.16-2017 and Model Minimum Uniform Crash Criteria, Fifth Edition (2017). As a result of OH-1 changes, a complete overhaul of the platform on which Ohio received the data was made. These changes will require Ohio to develop a new crash data dictionary.



Driver Distraction Section of Most Recent Crash Report (OH-1)







- 3. The Recipient will insert the clauses of appendix A and E of this Assurance (also referred to as DOT Order 1050.2A) [1] in every contract or agreement subject to the Acts and the Regulations.
- 4. The Recipient will insert the clauses of appendix B of DOT Order 1050.2A, as a covenant running with the land, in any deed from the United States effecting or recording a transfer of real property, structures, use, or improvements thereon or interest therein to a Recipient.

The Recipient will provide for such methods of administration for the program as are found by the Secretary of Transportation or the official to whom he/she delegates specific authority to give reasonable guarantee that it, other recipients, sub-recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, subcontractors, consultants, transferees, successors in interest, and other participants of Federal financial assistance under such program will comply with all requirements imposed or pursuant to the Acts, the Regulations, and this Assurance.
- 10. The Recipient agrees that the United States has a right to seek judicial enforcement with regard to any matter arising under the Acts, the Regulations, and this Assurance.

By signing this ASSURANCE, the State highway safety agency also agrees to comply (and require any sub-recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, successors, transferees, and/or assignees to comply) with all applicable provisions governing NHTSA's access to records, accounts, documents, information, facilities, and staff. You also recognize that you must comply with any program or compliance reviews, and/or complaint investigations conducted by NHTSA. You must keep records, reports, and submit the material for review upon request to NHTSA, or its designee in a timely, complete, and accurate way. Additionally, you must comply with all other reporting, data collection, and evaluation requirements, as prescribed by law or detailed in program guidance.

The State highway safety agency gives this ASSURANCE in consideration of and for obtaining any Federal grants, loans, contracts, agreements, property, and/or discounts, or other Federal-aid and Federal financial assistance extended after the date hereof to the recipients by the U.S. Department of Transportation under the Highway Safety Grant Program. This ASSURANCE is binding on the State highway safety agency, other recipients, sub-recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, subcontractors and their subcontractors', transferees, successors in interest, and any other participants in the Highway Safety Grant Program. The person(s) signing below is/are authorized to sign this ASSURANCE on behalf of the Recipient.

THE DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE ACT OF 1988 (41 U.S.C. 8103)

The State will provide a drug-free workplace by:

(This provision is not applicable to the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.)
- 4. The State's highway safety program provides adequate and reasonable access for the safe and convenient movement of physically handicapped persons, including those in wheelchairs, across curbs constructed or replaced on or after July 1, 1976, at all pedestrian crosswalks. (23 U.S.C. 402(b)(1)(D))
- 5. As part of a comprehensive program, the State will support a data-based traffic safety enforcement program that fosters effective community collaboration to increase public safety, and data collection and analysis to ensure transparency, identify disparities in traffic enforcement, and inform traffic enforcement policies, procedures, and activities. (23 U.S.C. 402(b)(1)(E))
- 6. The State will implement activities in support of national highway safety goals to reduce motor vehicle related fatalities that also reflect the primary data-related crash factors within the State, as identified by the State highway safety planning process, including:

- Participation in the National high-visibility law enforcement mobilizations as identified annually in the NHTSA Communications Calendar, including not less than 3 mobilization campaigns in each fiscal year to
 - o Reduce alcohol-impaired or drug-impaired operation of motor vehicles; and
 - o Increase use of seat belts by occupants of motor vehicles;
- Sustained enforcement of statutes addressing impaired driving, occupant protection, and driving in excess of posted speed limits;
- An annual statewide seat belt use survey in accordance with 23 CFR part 1340 for the measurement of State seat belt use rates, except for the Secretary of Interior on behalf of Indian tribes;
- Development of statewide data systems to provide timely and effective data analysis to support allocation of highway safety resources;
- Coordination of triennial Highway Safety Plan, data collection, and information systems with the State strategic highway safety plan, as defined in 23 U.S.C. 148(a); and
- Participation in the Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS), except for American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, or the United States Virgin Islands
- 7. The State will actively encourage all relevant law enforcement agencies in the State to follow the guidelines established for vehicular pursuits issued by the International Association of Chiefs of Police that are currently in effect. (23 U.S.C. 402(j))
- 8. The State will not expend Section 402 funds to carry out a program to purchase, operate, or maintain an automated traffic enforcement system, except in a work zone or school zone. (23 U.S.C. 402(c)(4))

 "The [name of Recipient], in accordance with the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C 2000d to 2000d-4) and the Regulations, hereby notifies all bidders that it will affirmatively ensure that in any contract entered into pursuant to this advertisement, disadvantaged business enterprises will be afforded full and fair opportunity to submit bids in response to this invitation and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, color, or national origin in consideration for an award."
- 3. The Recipient will insert the clauses of appendix A and E of this Assurance (also referred to as DOT Order 1050.2A) [1] in every contract or agreement subject to the Acts and the Regulations.
- 4. The Recipient will insert the clauses of appendix B of DOT Order 1050.2A, as a covenant running with the land, in any deed from the United States effecting or recording a transfer of real property, structures, use, or improvements thereon or interest therein to a Recipient.
- 5. That where the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance to construct a facility, or part of a facility, the Assurance will extend to the entire facility and facilities operated in connection therewith.
- 6. That where the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance in the form of, or for the acquisition of, real property or an interest in real property, the Assurance will extend to rights to space on, over, or under such property.

structures or improvements thereon, in which case the Assurance obligates the Recipient, or any transferee for the longer of the following periods:

- a. the period during which the property is used for a purpose for which the Federal financial assistance is extended, or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits; or
- b. the period during which the Recipient retains ownership or possession of the property.
- 9. The Recipient will provide for such methods of administration for the program as are found by the Secretary of Transportation or the official to whom he/she delegates specific authority to give reasonable guarantee that it, other recipients, sub-recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, subcontractors, consultants, transferees, successors in interest, and other participants of Federal financial assistance under such program will comply with all requirements imposed or pursuant to the Acts, the Regulations, and this Assurance.
- 10. The Recipient agrees that the United States has a right to seek judicial enforcement with regard to any matter arising under the Acts, the Regulations, and this Assurance.

By signing this ASSURANCE, the State highway safety agency also agrees to comply (and require any sub-recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, successors, transferees, and/or assignees to comply) with all applicable provisions governing NHTSA's access to records, accounts, documents, information, facilities, and staff. You also recognize that you must comply with any program or compliance reviews, and/or complaint investigations conducted by NHTSA. You must keep records, reports, and submit the material for review upon request to NHTSA, or its designee in a timely, complete, and accurate way. Additionally, you must comply with all other reporting, data collection, and evaluation requirements, as prescribed by law or detailed in program guidance.

The State highway safety agency gives this ASSURANCE in consideration of and for obtaining any Federal grants, loans, contracts, agreements, property, and/or discounts, or other Federal-aid and Federal financial assistance extended after the date hereof to the recipients by the U.S. Department of Transportation under the Highway Safety Grant Program. This ASSURANCE is binding on the State highway safety agency, other recipients, sub-recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, subcontractors and their subcontractors', transferees, successors in interest, and any other participants in the Highway Safety Grant Program. The person(s) signing below is/are authorized to sign this ASSURANCE on behalf of the Recipient.

THE DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE ACT OF 1988 (41 U.S.C. 8103)

The State will provide a drug-free workplace by:

- a. Publishing a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the grantee's workplace, and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;

- An annual statewide seat belt use survey in accordance with 23 CFR part 1340 for the measurement of State seat belt use rates, except for the Secretary of Interior on behalf of Indian tribes;
- Development of statewide data systems to provide timely and effective data analysis to support allocation of highway safety resources;
- Coordination of triennial Highway Safety Plan, data collection, and information systems with the State strategic highway safety plan, as defined in 23 U.S.C. 148(a); and
- Participation in the Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS), except for American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, or the United States Virgin Islands
- 7. The State will actively encourage all relevant law enforcement agencies in the State to follow the guidelines established for vehicular pursuits issued by the International Association of Chiefs of Police that are currently in effect. (23 U.S.C. 402(j))
- 8. The State will not expend Section 402 funds to carry out a program to purchase, operate, or maintain an automated traffic enforcement system, except in a work zone or school zone. (23 U.S.C. 402(c)(4))

2024 Impaired Driving Strategic Plan

Executive Summary

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), aka Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) is the most recent enactment authorizing federal funding for surface transportation programs. Under BIL, states qualify for impaired driving grants based on the state's average impaired driving fatality rate. The rate, which uses the most recently available FARS data, is based on the number of fatalities in alcohol-related motor vehicle crashes for every 100,000,000 vehicle miles traveled. For purposes of this calculation, a crash is considered alcohol-related if it involves at least one driver with a blood alcohol concentration of at least 0.08 percent.

Ohio's average impaired driving fatality rate for the prior three years is 0.34, which makes Ohio a "mid-range state." Due to this classification, Ohio is required to submit a statewide impaired driving plan that is developed by a statewide task force by August 1st, 2024.

Mission Statement

The Ohio Traffic Safety Office (OTSO) mission is dedicated to saving lives and preventing injuries on Ohio's roads by using creative leadership, innovative education and comprehensive enforcement programs. OTSO strives to work in partnership with local, state, and federal entities to advance equity in highway safety programs, ensuring they benefit all road users in Ohio.

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Operation of Impaired Driving Working Group

On September 10, 2020, Ohio Governor Mike DeWine established the Ohio Traffic Safety Council through Executive Order 2020-37D (see Appendix A). The Council, led by the Ohio Department of Public Safety, includes representatives from federal, state, county, and local agencies along with traffic safety partners and advocates who are all dedicated to making Ohio's roadways safer. Together they identify the leading causes of motor vehicle crashes, serious injuries, and fatalities on Ohio's roadways and take action to save lives using proven education, engineering, enforcement, emergency response, and public policy countermeasures.

The Executive Order establishes that the Director of the Department of Public Safety, or his designee, shall chair the council. In 2023, Director Andy Wilson designated Ohio Traffic Safety Office's (OTSO) Director Emily Davidson as the Chair of the Ohio Traffic Safety Council. As the Chair, Director Davidson is responsible for setting the direction of the Council and any working groups it establishes and is therefore responsible for approving any plans or actions of these working groups.

The Impaired Driving Strategic Plan Working Group was created under the Ohio Traffic Safety Council to develop the Impaired Driving Strategic Plan. This working group is chaired by the Ohio Traffic Safety Office's (OTSO) Federal Administrator, Lori Genzen. Members were selected to ensure representation of key stakeholders throughout the state and to encourage a diversity of opinions and perspectives. The complete list of members is provided in the following section.

The working group met virtually five times: April 25, 2024; May 9, 2024; May 23, 2024; June 11, 2024; and July 9, 2024. An agenda was provided for each meeting, which centered around the statewide impaired driving programs and efforts. Open discussion fostered genuine opinions on successes and pitfalls of efforts currently under way, and what the group of experts deemed would elevate those efforts.

In addition to agreeing with the current efforts that align with the strategic plan, the Working Group suggested additional work in the following areas, which are addressed further in this strategic plan:

- Focused communication/education attention on drug-impaired driving to coincide with the new adult use marijuana law.
- Training for local law enforcement on how to conduct alcohol sale compliance checks.
- A review of Ohio's drug laws, specifically "Drug of Abuse" language.
- Additional and expanded training opportunities for the judicial, prosecutor, law enforcement communities.

A draft version of the Impaired Driving Strategic Plan was provided to each of the working group members prior to the final meeting on July 9, 2024. This allowed members to review the contents of the document, make suggested changes, and afforded the opportunity to provide recommended actions. Suggested changes were incorporated into the document and the final version was approved by the Impaired Driving Strategic Plan Working Group Chair, Lori Genzen, on July 16, 2024 and by the Ohio Traffic Safety Council Chair, Emily Davidson, on July 22, 2024. Final and updated versions of the plan are shared with the working group.

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Problem Management and Strategic Planning

Ohio's impaired driving program efforts are driven by data research, focused on populations and geographic areas that are most at risk, incorporates science-based planning, and is determined through independent evaluation as likely to succeed. Programs and activities are guided by problem identification and are carefully managed and monitored for effectiveness.

It is the responsibility of the Ohio Traffic Safety Office to ensure that statewide impaired driving program activities are implemented as intended and that sufficient funding, staffing and resources are allocated sufficiently. The Ohio Traffic Safety Office and the Impaired Driving Strategic Plan Working Group will continue to advise and consult on impaired driving strategies.

Strategic planning for statewide impaired driving program efforts will incorporates data research and records from sources such as the U.S. Census, Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS), Crash Outcome Data Evaluation System (CODES), and Ohio's Electronic Crash System (OSTATS).

Comprehensive communications efforts, led by the Ohio Traffic Safety Office, in collaboration with other federal, state and local partners that support high priority policies and program efforts. These are directed at reducing impaired driving, underage drinking, and reducing the risk of injury or death; while also reducing resulting medical, legal, social, and other costs.

In 2024, the Impaired Driving Strategic Plan Working Group was created under the Ohio Traffic Safety Council in a cooperative effort to develop the Impaired Driving Strategic Plan and to foster ongoing statewide impaired driving program efforts.

Prevention (Community Engagement and Coalitions)

Ohio's impaired driving prevention programs aim to reduce impaired driving through public health approaches, including altering social norms, changing risky or dangerous behaviors, and creating safer environments. The state's prevention programs aim to promote communication strategies that highlight and support specific policies and program activities and promote activities that educate the public on the effects of alcohol and other drugs, limit the availability of alcohol and other drugs, and discourage those impaired by alcohol and other drugs from driving.

Prevention programs across Ohio include responsible alcohol service practices, transportation alternatives, and community-based programs carried out in schools, work sites, medical and health care facilities, and by community coalitions. Prevention efforts are specifically directed toward populations at greatest risk, with focus on effective science-based efforts, which include a communication component. Ohio will continue to collaborate with federal, state, and local partners to build on a strong framework to lower the impaired driving rate across the state, by utilizing targeted enforcement efforts, strong laws and prosecution, and data-driven solutions.

Examples of current prevention efforts that align with this strategic plan include:

Underage Alcohol Sales Compliance Checks

OIU concentrates underage alcohol sales compliance checks on establishments in counties that have the highest number of youth alcohol-related fatal crashes. The working group has recommended the expansion of training efforts to local law enforcement agencies to bolster the compliance checks.

College Campus Impaired Driving Program

A partnership with The Ohio State University's, the Higher Education Center for Alcohol and Drug (HECAOD), and Recording Artists Against Drunk Driving (RADD) uses entertainment-driven and social media focused outreach programming to engage 18 – 24-year-olds in impaired driving prevention efforts both on campuses and through concert venues and peer musicians.

Youthful Driver Print Advertising/Educational Materials

Print advertising/educational materials are distributed throughout the state in a systematic manner to promote safe driving behaviors. Materials can be focused on any traffic safety behavior, including impaired driving.

Impaired Driving Print Advertising/Educational Materials

Print advertising/educational materials are distributed throughout the state in a systematic manner to promote impaired driving messaging.

Peer-to-Peer Youth Programming

Projects include partnering with Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD) and Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA). Both organizations use evidence-based programming to facilitate peer-to-peer education. Peer-to-peer education can be conducted on any traffic safety behavior, including impaired driving.

Criminal Justice Systems

Ohio has and will continue to use the various components of its criminal justice system—laws, enforcement, prosecution, adjudication, criminal and administrative sanctions and communications—to achieve both specific and general deterrence of impaired driving.

Specific deterrence focuses on individual offenders and seeks to ensure that impaired drivers will be detected, arrested, prosecuted, and subject to swift, sure, and appropriate sanctions. Using these measures, the criminal justice system seeks to reduce recidivism. General deterrence seeks to increase the public perception that impaired drivers will face severe consequences, discouraging individuals from driving impaired.

A multidisciplinary approach and close coordination among all components of the criminal justice system are needed to make the system work effectively. In addition, coordination is needed among law enforcement agencies at the State, county, and municipal levels to create and sustain both specific and general deterrence.

Laws

Ohio has enacted laws that prohibit impaired driving, facilitate the acquisition of evidence against impaired drivers, and permit a range of administrative/ judicial penalties and actions.

Appendix B of this document illustrates Ohio's laws to deter impaired driving.

The working group has recommended a law review of Ohio's laws (see Appendix B). Specifically, the language of "Drug of Abuse." Ohio's JOL will review this recommendation to determine next steps for a legal review.

Enforcement

Ohio conducts frequent, highly visible, well publicized and fully coordinated impaired driving (including zero tolerance) law enforcement efforts throughout the State, especially in locations where alcohol-related fatalities most often occur. To maximize visibility, increased interaction and contact between officers and drivers using sobriety checkpoints and saturation patrols is required, and these efforts are widely publicized before, during, and after they occur. Highly visible, highly publicized efforts are conducted periodically and also on a sustained basis throughout the year. To maximize resources, the State coordinates efforts among State, county, and municipal law enforcement agencies. Ohio utilizes law enforcement liaisons for activities such as promotion of national and local mobilizations and increasing law enforcement participation in such mobilizations, and for collaboration with local chapters of police groups and associations that represent diverse groups to gain support for enforcement efforts.

Ohio also regularly coordinates efforts with state liquor law enforcement officials.

Examples of current enforcement efforts that align with this strategic plan include:

Impaired Driving Enforcement Program (IDEP)

High visibility impaired driving enforcement is conducted throughout the year consistent with the NHTSA Communications Calendar. Local law enforcement agencies whose jurisdictions experience an average of 2.0 or more fatal crashes over a three-year period are eligible to apply.

Countywide OVI Task Force Program

Countywide initiative to conduct high visibility enforcement (checkpoints and saturation patrols), public awareness, and education focusing on impaired driving. A lead agency in counties that have a yearly average of at least six alcohol-related fatal crashes are eligible to apply. The lead agency is responsible for coordinating county wide programming.

Statewide Impaired Driving Enforcement Program

High visibility impaired driving enforcement is conducted throughout the year statewide by the Ohio State Highway Patrol (OSHP) consistent with the NHTSA Communications Calendar.

Statewide Drugged Driving Enforcement Program

High visibility drugged driving enforcement is conducted throughout the year statewide by the Ohio State Highway Patrol.

Law Enforcement Liaisons (LEL)

Ohio funds 4 regional LELs. The LELs work with law enforcement in their regions on national campaigns, partnering with Safe Communities, partnering with OTSO, serving as resources for all traffic safety initiatives.

Trace Back Program

The Ohio Investigative Unit (OIU) conducts "trace back" investigations on alcohol-involved fatal and serious injury crashes to determine where the alcohol was consumed prior to the crash. Trace back investigations are available to local law enforcement as well as OSHP.

Drug Recognition Expert Program

The OSHP coordinate's Ohio Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) program. DRE classes and Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE) classes are held throughout the year across the state. Classes are open to local law enforcement as well as OSHP.

Oral Fluid Toxicology Pilot

This pilot project encompasses the entire process of collecting and analyzing oral fluid samples from suspected drug impaired drivers. This pilot project will include samples collected from certified DREs.

Publicizing High Visibility Enforcement

Ohio communicates its impaired driving law enforcement efforts and other elements of the criminal justice system to increase the public perception of the risks of detection, arrest, prosecution and sentencing for impaired driving. Ohio has developed and implemented a year-round communications plan that provides emphasis during periods of heightened enforcement, provides sustained coverage throughout the year, includes both paid and earned media and

uses messages consistent with national campaigns. Publicity is aimed to be culturally relevant, appropriate to the audience, and based on market research.

Examples of current publicizing high visibility enforcement efforts that align with this strategic plan include:

Impaired Driving Paid Media

Paid media is placed during the national Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign, over the winter holiday period (Christmas and New Year's), and throughout the year consistent with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) national communications plan. Media tactics include television, radio, social and print media.

Youthful Driver - College Paid Media

Paid media is placed to specifically target college-age adult drivers (18 - 24) to encourage not driving impaired by planning a safe ride home. Media tactics include radio, social and print media.

Earned Media Efforts – Law enforcement agencies publicly notify and publicize high visibility enforcement activities before and after the enforcement period.

Prosecution

Ohio has implemented a comprehensive program to visibly, aggressively, and effectively prosecute and publicize impaired-driving-related efforts, which includes the use of two experienced traffic safety resource prosecutors (TSRP), to help coordinate and deliver training and technical assistance to prosecutors handling impaired driving cases throughout the State.

In addition to providing impaired driving technical assistance, the current TSRPs conduct/participate in multiple trainings throughout the state for law enforcement and prosecutors. Trainings include, ARIDE, SFST Refresher, Cops in Court, and Prosecuting the Drugged Driver.

The working group recommends increasing current training efforts to ensure more prosecutors are provided educational opportunities, specifically those related to OVI prosecution and Green Labs. Additional training is being considered in accordance with this recommendation.

Adjudication

Ohio has imposed effective, appropriate, and research-based sanctions, followed by close supervision and the threat of harsher consequences for non-compliance when adjudicating cases. See Appendix B of this document for related allowable sanctions.

In addition to the TSRPs mentioned in the previous section, Ohio has also provided a Judicial Outreach Liaison (JOL), who conducts and/or participates in multiple judicial trainings, and serves as a judicial resource to courts and judges throughout the state.

The working group recommends increasing current training efforts to ensure more judicial education is available on OVI offenses and certified DUI courts, as well as Green Labs. Additional trainings are being considered in accordance with this recommendation.

Administrative Sanctions and Driver Licensing Programs

Ohio uses administrative sanctions, including the suspension or revocation of an offender's driver's license; the impoundment, immobilization or forfeiture of a vehicle; the impoundment of a license plate; or the use of ignition interlock devices, which are among the most effective actions to prevent repeat impaired driving offenses.

- Administrative License Revocation and Vehicle Sanctions: Ohio's Motor Vehicle Code authorizes the imposition of administrative penalties by the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles upon arrest for violation of the State's impaired driving laws, including administrative driver's license suspension. Courts have the authority to impose vehicle sanctions and and/or installation of ignition interlock devices.
- Programs: The state of Ohio currently provides a graduated driver licensing (GDL) program for novice drivers, education programs that explain alcohol's effects on driving, and efforts to prevent individuals from using a fraudulently obtained or altered driver's license.

Communications Programs

Ohio has developed and implemented a comprehensive communication program that supports priority policies and program efforts. Communication programs, materials, and media campaigns are created with an eye towards reflecting Ohio's diverse make up and cultures. Ohio translates materials into appropriate languages, or provides resources for translation, when needed. Ohio has:

- Hired a Public Information Officer specifically for the Ohio Traffic Safety Office to coordinate all media relations, communication efforts, materials, public affairs/advocacy for OTSO, and to ensure alignment with the strategic plan.
- Developed and implemented a year-round communication plan that includes policy and program priorities; core message platforms; campaigns that are audience-relevant; collaboration with private and public partners; media relations and public affairs; special emphasis periods during high-risk times; and evaluation and survey tools;
- Employed a communications strategy principally focused on increasing knowledge and awareness, changing attitudes, and influencing and sustaining appropriate behavior; and
- Used traffic-related data and market research to identify specific audience segments to maximize resources and effectiveness.

In response to recently enacted legislation that allows for adult use recreational marijuana, the working group recommended focusing communication/education attention on drug-impaired driving to coincide with the new law. Numerous state agencies are working together to produce drug-impaired messaging.

Ohio will continue to collaborate with federal, state, and local partners to build on a strong framework to lower the impaired driving rate across the state, by utilizing targeted enforcement efforts, strong laws and prosecution, and data-driven solutions.

Alcohol and other drug misuse, including screening, treatment, assessment and rehabilitation

Ohio encourages its employers, educators, law enforcement, and health care professionals to implement a system to identify, intervene, and refer individuals for appropriate substance abuse treatment. The Ohio Traffic Safety Office works with the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OMHAS) and the Ohio Department of Health (ODH), as well as their local community partners, on matters of screening, treatment, assessment, and rehabilitation.

The Working Group recommended exploring impaired driving recidivism and the impact of the current interrelated processes of law enforcement, the judiciary, and treatment. As a result, OTSO and OSHP will establish an Impaired Driving Recidivism Task Force to further evaluate how current criminal justice and treatment processes currently work together and where there may be areas for improvement and better collaboration. Subjects to be explored include screening efforts, effectiveness of current court-ordered treatment programs, and ongoing rehabilitative support.

• Assessment, Treatment, and Rehabilitation: Ohio works with health care professionals, and public health agencies to establish and maintain treatment programs for persons referred through the criminal justice system, medical or health care professionals, and other entities. This will help ensure that offenders with alcohol or other drug dependencies begin appropriate treatment and complete recommended treatment before their licenses are reinstated.

An example of this collaboration is the Ohio State Highway Patrol's drug impairment referral program, which coordinates behavioral health referral outreach in participating counties by community health and treatment partners after an impaired driving arrest. This project cross-references OSHP's arrest data with Mental Health and Addiction Services (MHAS) data to determine how many people arrested for impaired driving has sought out behavioral health services. Data will be used to determine if this project reduces recidivism.

As mentioned earlier in this report, Ohio has piloted an Oral Fluid Toxicology effort. This pilot project encompasses the entire process of collecting and analyzing oral fluid samples from suspected drug impaired drivers. This pilot project will include samples collected by certified DREs.

• Monitoring Impaired Drivers: Ohio has an established Ignition Interlock Device (IID) program to help facilitate close monitoring of impaired drivers. The IID program is housed within the Ohio Traffic Safety Office, which works closely with the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, who in turn works with the courts and law enforcement, to administer the process of adding court orders for IID to individual's driving records. OTSO also monitors and inspects the installation locations to ensure compliance with Ohio law and the integrity of the devices.

Program Evaluation and Data

Ohio has access to and analyzes reliable data sources for problem identification and program planning. Ohio conducts several different types of evaluations to effectively measure progress, to determine program effectiveness, to plan and implement new program strategies, and to ensure that resources are allocated appropriately.

A data researcher position was added to the OTSO staff to focus on data analysis and to aid in identifying trends and problem ID. Data analysis is a fundamental basis in the regular review of program efforts and assessing successes and future funding allocation.


A new program administrator position has also been added to the OTSO staff. This position will focus on programmatic activities and best practices, to include strengthening programmatic evaluations.

Because problem ID may fluctuate from year to year, annual evaluations are conducted to ensure efforts are focused on current problem ID, and adjustments to priorities and programs are made as needed.


Ohio has established and maintains a records system that uses data from other sources (e.g., U.S. Census, FARS, CODES) to fully support the impaired driving program. A statewide traffic records coordinating committee that represents the interests of all public and private sector stakeholders and the wide range of disciplines that need the information guides the state's records system.

Ohio's driver licensing agency maintains a system of records that enables Ohio to: (1) identify impaired drivers; (2) maintain a complete driving history of impaired drivers; (3) receive timely and accurate arrest and conviction data from law enforcement agencies and the courts, including data on operators as prescribed by the commercial driver licensing regulations; and (4) provide timely and accurate driver history records to law enforcement and the courts.


Current Data Analysis Related to Ohio's Impaired Driving




The number of alcohol-related fatal crashes has increased 15.11% over the five-year period (2019-2023).




Nearly 33% of fatal crashes were alcohol-related over the five-year period (2019-2023).




The number of drug-related fatal crashes has increased 37.40% over the five-year period (2019-2023).

Executive Order 2020-37D

Establishing the Ohio Traffic Safety Council

WHEREAS, overall fatalities on Ohio's roads have increased in five of the last six years; and

WHEREAS, in 2018 there were more than 294,000 traffic crashes on Ohio's roads alone; and

WHEREAS, between 2014 and 2019: Youthful drivers were involved in 582,710 crashes;

Unbelted drivers and passengers were involved in 272,747 vehicle crashes; Speed contributed to 186,803 crashes; Impaired drivers contributed to 83,489 crashes; Distracted drivers contributed to 79,515 crashes; and

WHEREAS, National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) national research estimates that 94 percent of serious crashes are due to driver errors; and

WHEREAS, traffic safety expertise and resources already exist within public, private, and nonprofit entities; and

WHEREAS, many factors contribute to traffic crashes, I believe that it is critical that our public and private traffic safety partners collaborate and make recommendations to address behavioral and educational methods to increase traffic safety; and

WHEREAS, we need to do all that we can to reduce crashes, to decrease injuries and to save lives.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Mike DeWine, Governor of the State of Ohio, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this State do hereby order and direct that:

 The Ohio Traffic Safety Council ("Council") is hereby established as an advisory body.

- 2. The Council shall advise on the coordination of Ohio's traffic safety efforts with a focus on behavioral aspects and educational opportunities.
- 3. The Council will bring together Ohio's traffic resources along with traffic safety partners to collaborate and share information in an effort to improve traffic safety, drivers training initiatives, and ensure the safety and wellbeing of all those using Ohio's roadways.
- 4. The Council will advise the Director of the Department of Public Safety.
- 5. Thomas Stickrath, the Director of the Department of Public Safety and any successor in office, or designee, shall serve as Council Chair.
- 6. The Council will include the following members from within the Government of the State of Ohio who represent traffic safety stakeholders from State agencies:
 - a. A designee of the Ohio Department of Transportation;
 - b. A designee of the Ohio Turnpike Commission;
 - c. A designee of the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio;
 - d. A designee of the Ohio Department of Health;
 - e. A designee of the Ohio Department of Insurance; and
 - f. A designee of the Ohio Department of Education.

Designations under this section will be made by the relevant agency head with the approval of the Director of Public Safety and in consultation with the Office the Governor.

- 7. I hereby invite the following federal, State, county, local governmental agencies, non-profit businesses, educational institutions, and private industry partners to submit the name of a representative to join the Council as a member:
 - a. Ohio Attorney General's Office;
 - b. National Highway Safety Administration;
 - c. Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration;
 - d. Federal Highway Administration;
 - e. Buckeye State Sheriff's Association;
 - f. Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police;
 - g. County Engineers Association;
 - h. Ohio Township Association;
 - i. Metropolitan Planning Organizations;
 - j. The Ohio State University;
 - k. Bowling Green State University;
 - 1. American Automobile Association;
 - m. Mothers Against Drunk Driving;
 - n. Family Career and Community Leaders of America; and
 - Students Against Destructive Decisions.

- 8. The Director of Public Safety may, at his discretion, appoint additional members to the Council in consultation with the Office of the Governor. Any member is subject to removal by the Director of Public Safety in consultation with the Office of the Governor.
- 9. The Council shall meet no less than quarterly.
- 10. Members of the Council shall serve without compensation.
- 11. The Department of Public Safety shall provide support staff and resources necessary for the Ohio Traffic Safety Council to function.

I signed this Executive Order on September 20, 2020 in Columbus, Ohio and it will not expire unless it is rescinded.

Role of the Ohio State Trooper / Highway Patrol Act

The course will discuss the complexity of the Peace Officer role in a democratic society.

Career of State Trooper

The course will consist of a panel of retired members of the OSHP who will provide insight on the career of a law enforcement officer.

Report Writing

The course will discuss Academy Rules and Regulations, which are based on Patrol Regulations and Ohio Peace Officer Training Council mandates, and Core Values: Strength, Courage, and Character.

Academy Orientation

The course will consist of a tour of the facility and available training equipment.

Military Courtesy

The course will discuss military courtesy and professional etiquette; to include, Ohio State Highway Patrol Policy 302.07; Ohio State Highway Patrol Rules and Regulations.

Military Drill

The course will consist of drill history, drill manual (movement), and ceremonial drill (flag etiquette).

Ethics & Professionalism

The course will discuss Law Enforcement demeanor, social media, Division/Department expectations, and judgement and decision making skills.

Benefits/Payroll (Entrance/Exit)

The course will discuss Departmental, state and federal benefits, payroll operations, Oath of Office and Divisional pay scales, leave, Occupational Injury Leave (OIL) and Worker's Compensation benefits.

Patrol Retirement System

The course will discuss the Highway Patrol Retirement System.

Computer Basics/Notebook Design

The course will discuss how to properly format notes utilizing Microsoft Word, Excel, and Power Point. To include active listening, the importance of accurately recording information, how to interpret, condense, and organize information.

Statement of Facts (SOF) & Narrative Writing

The course will discuss the types of field notes, application in report writing, and elements and structure importance.

Highway Patrol History Presentations

The course will discuss Core Values and history of the Ohio State Highway Patrol. Starting with the birth of the Ohio State Highway Patrol in 1933 to the 2000's, this course will cover the strategic and economically events that have shaped the OSHP to what it is today.

MCT / CAD Training

The course will consist of introduction to the Mobile Computer Training (MCT) and Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) systems. To include capabilities, purpose, and access of the MCT and CAD.

L.E.A.D.S. Certification

The course will consist of user certification on L.E.A.D.S and issuance of credentials.

Uniform Standards

The course will discuss Division/Departmental standards for uniform requirements, and the need for proper care and wearing of a uniform and maintenance of equipment.

This stage will be divided into two phases: 1) Vehicle Maneuverability and Emergency Vehicle Operation (EVO); and 2) Night Scenarios. Building Searches (classroom and practical)

The course will consist instruction on perimeter control; visual indicators at a crime scene; fatal funnel; single officer search techniques; two officer search techniques; hallway movement; stairway movement; and bomb threat safety. Practical exercises will be conducted utilizing moving scenarios.

Stops and Approaches

The course will consist instruction on procedures for making vehicle stops and approaches; vehicle patrol techniques and responding to crimes in progress; officer initiated contacts; cruiser positioning; risk assessment; controlling the suspect and taking custody; high-risk vehicle stops; officer discretion and communication. Practical exercises will be conducted utilizing both moving and stationary scenarios.

Ride-Along

Deadly Errors

The course will discuss the "The Deadly Errors" and how they relate to law enforcement officers.

Body Armor

The course will consist of understanding of the proper care and cleaning of issued body armor; and benefits and limitations of the armor.

Emotional Survival and Resilience

The course will consist an understanding of the importance of survival preparedness and the psychology needed to survive a deadly encounter.

High Intensity Tactical Training (HITT)

The course will consist of a culmination training learned during Firearms and Self Defense Technique training. The student will apply their training in a practical exercise under the supervision of a commissioned officer.

<u>Taser Training – Conductive Energy Weapon (CEW)</u>

The course will discuss the history and technology involved with Conductive Energy Weapons (CEW). The student will take a proficiency exam, which will certify them to operate the Taser. A practical exercise will expose the student to the CEW under the supervision of a certified instructor.

Hostage Situations

The course will discuss conflict resolution; victim resources; command and control; communication with law enforcement, emergency services, media.

Officer Safety (Cress/Welsh)

The course will be a panel discussion on deadly encounters by guest instructors and the aftermath of their encounters.

Physical Conditioning

The course will consist training and skills to improve the student's physical condition in the area of body composition, flexibility, dynamic strength, and endurance. To include nutritional information.

Exercise Physiology

The course will discuss the study of the body's response and ability to adapt to physical activity; methods to change and improve; the Divisional Health Standards based on the Cooper Standards.

Physical Conditioning Testing/Evaluations

The course will consist learning the process of training to become physically fit by a regimen of exercise, diet, and rest. The trainees will be tested throughout training to track their physical conditioning progress.

Critical Incident Survival

The course will discuss the importance of survival preparedness and the psychology needed to survive a deadly encounter.

High Risk Stops – Simunition

The course will consist of ethical decision making; critical thinking in a practical application scenario; high risk vehicle stops and approaches procedures; officer safety; custodial care; communication. Practical exercises will be conducted utilizing both moving and stationary scenarios.

Nutrition

The course will discuss energy balance and the function of macronutrients in the body. The trainee will learn how to create a healthy eating plan for weight control based on the body's estimated energy needs.

National Institute of Justice (NIJ) Standards

The course will discuss NIJ established performance standards for body armor.

Terrorism and Sovereign Citizen

The course will discuss the elements of Terrorism; sovereign citizen extremists; indicators and behaviors of potential criminal or noncriminal activities; identify the indicators and behaviors of defined criminal activity and potential terrorism nexus activity.

Bombs & Explosives

The course will discuss awareness level of training for bombs and explosives; motives and targets; types of bombs and explosives; bomb threats; searching techniques; and evacuation procedures.

Impact Weapons

The course will discuss the legal standards as they pertain to use of an impact weapon.
