

# FY 2020 Annual Report

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## **Mission Statement**

To reduce the number and severity of traffic crashes in Indian Country by supporting education, enforcement, and safe tribal community programs.

## **Vision Statement**

To create a safe tribal community environment where roadways in Indian Country are safe for all.

#### Introduction

According to the 2010 U.S. Census, the United States is home to 308,745,538 people. Of these individuals, approximately 2,932,248, 0.9%, identify themselves as American Indian and/or Alaska Native. Consistent with the general population in the United States, the largest age group for American Indian/Alaska Natives is 35-44 years of age. These American Indians/Alaska Natives represent over 574 federally recognized tribes throughout the country.

Despite their small ethnicity numbers, American Indians/Alaska Natives continue to be killed and injured in traffic crashes at rates that are 2 to 3 times that of other ethnic groups and that of the national average.

The tribes that comprise the Indian Nation are geographically spread throughout the United States, and it is extremely difficult to affect change in motor vehicle deaths in each of them. Each tribe is unique in its heritage, language and lifestyle. The lack of motor vehicle crash data and tribal reporting are areas of continual struggle.

The FY20 Request for Proposal (RFP) was mailed to the tribal leaders of all federally recognized tribes in the United States in February 2019. Prospective applicants were required to submit proposals no later than May 1, 2019. The Indian Highway Safety Program (IHSP) received **49** tribal project proposals for FY20. Out of the 49 proposals received 49 were awarded; 34 for Police Traffic Services and 15 occupant protection.

A Selection Committee met in May of 2019 to review and score all proposals. This Selection Committee was comprised of representatives from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, Indian Health Service, and a representative from the New Mexico Highway Safety Office. 49 Tribal highway safety projects were included in the initial FY20 Highway Safety Plan (HSP) submitted to NHTSA for final approval. NHTSA approved 49 projects for funding. 34 Police Traffic Services and 15 Occupant Protection, 42 total, tribal grantee accepted FY20 grant awards (34 Police Traffic Services and 8 Occupant Protection).

The approved IHSP projects for FY20 consisted of 49 grants, for tribes in 20 different states, in the program areas of Police Traffic Services straight-time, overtime enforcement, and occupant protection. The projects included some of the largest tribes in the country. Data provided in this report is based upon statistics submitted from 34 of the Police Traffic Services 8 Occupant Protection Tribal projects and the national Fatality Analysis Reporting System. The IHSP utilized FARS reporting for FY17 because FY20 was not available at the time. The FY20 Annual Report will be using the most current FY17 FARs data.

The IHSP staffing for FY20 included a Program Director, Program Coordinator, Financial Analyst, and two (2) Law Enforcement Assistants.

#### **FY20 CARES Act**

The BIA IHSP was greatly affected by the Covid-19 pandemic. The management and oversight of the program had to adapt quickly to operating procedures to comply with the CDC recommendations. Two exemptions were requested during this time period.

The first was the use of the NHTSA funded "BATmobile", this specialized vehicle was desparately needed in the Navajo Nation due to the high infection rate in the community. There existed a great need for a command type vehicle to provide an area for Navajo Officers to check in with their command staff in order to provide continued police services.

The second exemption was for the Click it or Ticket campaign. This recommendation was sent from NHTSA and the IHSP accepted it. The granted programs were notified and with only two agencies following though with a normal campaign. The other tribes conducted the seat belt campaign in November.

## **FY20 Tribal Project Reports**

The BIA IHSP utilizes the funding in order to provide supplemental funding to tribes for strategic targeted enforcement activities. This year the IHSP funded 49 programs, 8 Occupant Protection grants with 34 Police Traffic Services grants, Indian Country Seat Belt Survey and funding for BAT mobiles; other funds are also provided in support through training activities. The focus of all funded programs is to have an impact on the total number of Native Americans killed in traffic related deaths nationwide. The information provided in this section outlines the activities which our tribal programs have produced in order to have an effect on the overall fatalities as reported to FARS each year.

The Tribal Project Reports contain information on the results put forth by each tribal grantee's hard work in traffic safety. Their individual tribal efforts are aimed to collectively have an effect on the Indian Nations safety targets identified in the 2020 HSP.

## **FY20 IHSP 402 Expenditures**

The IHSP expended a total of \$5,126,868.15 in FY20 for Tribal Highway Safety Projects, BAT Mobile operation and maintenance costs, and Planning and Administration.

In FY20, many tribal governments across the United States were forced to shut down their tribal operations and mandate lock downs on their reservations due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This was done to keep their people safe and to slow the spread of the COVID-19 virus among tribal members and employees. The lock downs limited access to the reservation roadways not only to tribal members but also non-tribal members.

Tribal law enforcement limited their interactions with the general public to assist in containing the spread of COVID-19. COVID-19 is spread by person-to-person through respiratory droplets, tribal law enforcement officers were at an increased risk of exposure due to their close contact with the public. COVID-19 pandemic did not allow for tribal police departments to fully expend their grant budgets. Officers were forced to suspended training, community outreach initiatives, increase traffic patrol and decrease traffic contacts on their roadways. COVID-19 prohibited the tribal police departments from reaching their traffic goals in reducing motor vehicle crash fatalities and issuing citations and increasing DUI arrests for the FY20 grant year.

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## **IHSP Targets for FY20**

To reduce death and injury rates resulting from traffic crashes among Indian Tribes and on the reservations within the United States.

To reduce all fatalities on Indian reservations by 13% from the 2016 FARS number of 383 to 334 by the end of FY2020. According to 2017 FARS data there were 394 motor vehicle fatalities on reservations.

In FY20: The 34 funded Tribes reported a total of 4,074 motor vehicle crashes, of which 961 were injury crashes. 448 of the crashes involved alcohol and 423 were speed related.

In FY19: The 37 funded Tribes reported a total of 3,908 motor vehicle crashes, of which 951 were injury crashes. 364 of the crashes involved alcohol and 330 were speed related.

In FY18: The 26 funded Tribes reported a total of 3,218 motor vehicle crashes, of which 768 were injury crashes. 354 of the crashes involved alcohol and 294 were speed related.

## Planning & Administration:

The target of the BIA IHSP is to effectively administer highway safety funds, offer technical assistance to all tribes requesting assistance and monitor funded projects to reduce traffic related deaths and injuries in Indian Country.

The BIA IHSP awarded 49 project grants in FY20. During the fiscal year, services and technical assistance were provided to approximately 49 Tribes throughout the country. This was accomplished by providing media materials for the impaired driving and safety belt mobilizations. Tribes not currently funded by the IHSP also attend Lifesavers Conference and Grant Writing training.

## **Impaired Driving:**

The BIA IHSP planned to reduce the incidence of impaired driving by increasing DUI/DWI/OWI arrests by all funded traffic activity within the participating tribes by 5% from the FY2018 total of 2,795 to 2,934 by the end of FY2020

34 tribes were funded for traffic enforcement grants and 0 OWI Court grant in FY20

41 tribes were funded for traffic enforcement grants and 0 OWI Court grant in FY19

26 tribes were funded for traffic enforcement grants and 0 OWI Court grant in FY18

In FY 20: 34 funded Tribes reported 3,483 DUI/DWI/OWI arrests. Although the target was achieved. Tribal governments also limited access on reservation roadway to tribal members only and implemented lock downs. Limited access and lock downs contributed in the decreased number of traffic violations during the FY20 grant year.

## **Occupant Protection:**

The BIA IHSP planned to increase safety belt usage rates in Indian Country from the FY 2018 "national" Indian Country rate of 78% to 80.3% by the end of FY2020.

Safety Belt usage experienced a slight decreased from 77% in FY19 to 76.3% in FY20. The Safety Belt usage rate in Indian Country decreased by 1.0% is statistically at a standstill due to the relative error rate of the survey is  $\pm 1.96\sigma$ . The safety belt target was not achieved but the seat belt usage rate in Indian Country is continuing to be a priority. 49 grant funded tribes provided 24 educational presentations to their communities to raise awareness on traffic safety and occupant protection. COVID-19 pandemic kept many grant funded tribes from providing educational presentations due to tribal governments shutting down tribal run facilities to reduce the spread of the virus.

Two grant funded tribes participated in the "Click It or Ticket" national safety belt mobilization and reported statistics on activity reports.

To increase the number of seat belt citations issued on Indian Reservations by 5% from the FY18 number of 2,816 to 3,265 by the end of FY2020.

Performance Measure to be tracked: Number of seat belt citations issued during grant-funded enforcement activities.

In FY20: The 34 Tribes funded by the BIA IHSP reported issuing a total of 1,732 safety belt violations and 518 child passenger safety violation citations throughout the project year.

In FY19: The 37 Tribes funded by the BIA IHSP reported issuing a total of 2,638 safety belt violations and 633 child passenger safety violation citations throughout the project year.

In FY18: The 26 Tribes funded by the BIA IHSP reported issuing a total of 2,816 safety belt violations and 657 child passenger safety violation citations throughout the project year.

## **Police Traffic Services:**

The Police Traffic Services grants are designed to provide an ongoing sustained impaired driving, speeding, occupant protection and child passenger safety enforcement throughout the grant year.

The BIA IHSP planned to reduce the number of speed related fatalities, on Indian reservations, by 5% from the 2016 FARS number of 117 to 101 by the end of FY2020.

In FY20: The 34 Tribes funded by the BIA IHSP reported a total of 23 speed-related motor vehicle fatalities on their reservations during the project year.

In FY19: The 37 Tribes funded by the BIA IHSP reported a total of 13 speed-related motor vehicle fatalities on their reservations during the project year.

In FY18: The 26 Tribes funded by the BIA IHSP reported a total of 20 speed-related motor vehicle fatalities on their reservations during the project year.

The BIA IHSP planned to increase the number of citations issued for speed, on Indian reservations, by 14% from the FY2018 number of 29,217 to 33,307 by the end of FY2020.

This target was not met in the FY20 grant year. Tribal governments also limited access on reservation roadway to tribal members only and implemented lock downs. Limited access and lock downs contributed in the decreased number of traffic violations during the FY20 grant year.

In FY20: 34 Tribes funded by the BIA IHSP reported 26,065 speed citations issued during the project year.

## **Evidence Based Enforcement Program Activities:**

The evidence based enforcement activities utilized in order to meet the identified targets included:

- Indian Country evidence based activities included individual tribal analysis of crashes, crash fatalities and the identification of high risk crash areas utilizing local crash data.
- The tribal agencies then deployed a range of enforcement activities through the use of tribal enforcement resources based on the crash analysis and other elements. The activities included: saturation patrols, sobriety checkpoints, overtime enforcement activities and other proven strategies to alleviate unsafe roadway behavioral issues.
- · The tribes utilized crash date to educate and inform tribal members on roadway safety dangers through

educational presentations and other communication efforts at the local tribal level.

## **Impaired Driving Program Area**

The BIA IHSP has over the years funded many projects aimed at reducing the high rates of drinking and driving on the reservations. The program also remains committed to providing training, educational materials and equipment necessary to assist tribal law enforcement officers and police departments in their efforts to remove drunk drivers from the roadways through sustained enforcement efforts.

All funded projects in FY20 signed a commitment to participate in all national traffic safety campaigns. Tribes were also required to participate in, and report on, the "Don't Shatter the Dream", Indian State Impaired Driving Mobilization. Funded Tribes participated by conducting checkpoints, saturation patrols and/or enhanced enforcement. Extra funding was added to each project budget for high visibility sustained enforcement throughout the year.

Each of the tribal projects funded in FY20 had an alcohol related performance measure.

## **Impaired Driving Program Area Target:**

The BIA IHSP planned to reduce the incidence of impaired driving by increasing DUI/DWI/OWI arrests by all funded traffic activity within the participating tribes by 5% from the FY2018 total of 2,795 to 2,934 by the end of FY2020

In FY20: 34 Tribes funded by the BIA IHSP reported 3,483 DUI/DWI/OWI arrests.

In FY20: 34 Tribes reported conducting 77 checkpoints.

In FY20: 34 Tribes reported conducting 2,361 saturation patrols

In FY19: 37 Tribes funded by the BIA IHSP reported 3,251 DUI/DWI/OWI arrests.

In FY19: 19 Tribes reported conducting 149 checkpoints.

In FY19: 30 Tribes reported conducting 2,947 saturation patrols.

In FY18: 26 Tribes funded by the BIA IHSP reported 2,795 DUI/DWI/OWI arrests.

In FY18: 15 Tribes reported conducting 107 checkpoints.

In FY18: 24 Tribes reported conducting 1,019 saturation patrols.

The White Earth Nation, Minnesota Chippewa Tribe -Leech Lake Band, and Upper Sioux Tribes in Minnesota and the Shoshone Bannock Tribe in Idaho could not conduct sobriety checkpoints as state law does not permit, but did participate in the saturation patrols.

*Note:* For each Tribal project, the Reservation Population and Land Base information is from Tiller's Guide to Indian Country updated with 2010 Census data with the exception of the Upper Sioux Tribes.

# AL-20-01 – BIA OJS (Office of Justice Services)

**Grant Award:** \$100,000.00 **Amount Expended:** \$17,707.21

## TARGET:

To provide support for the continued operation and maintenance of the Breath Alcohol Testing (BAT) Mobiles purchased for use in Indian Country which will result in decreased alcohol related motor vehicle crash injuries and fatalities within the participating Tribes.

In FY20 the BAT Mobile was deployed 0 times, in 0 check points, used for traffic control 0 times and once for educational purposes.

In FY20 the BAT Mobile was used for zero (0) educational event on the reservation.

To support the tribes the BIA IHSP purchased four (4) BAT Mobiles in FY10. This was a collaborative effort between the IHSP and OJS Districts. The BAT Mobiles are available for tribal use in OJS Districts I (South Dakota), III (Phoenix), IV (Albuquerque), and V (Billings).

The purchase of these BAT Mobiles has allowed Tribes to more effectively combat drunk drivers on the reservations and to decrease alcohol related motor vehicle crash injuries and fatalities within the participating tribes in OJS Districts I, III, IV, and V.

This allowed for a total of approximately zero (0) Tribes to have access to the BAT Mobiles in these OJS Districts for education, checkpoint and traffic control use.

The BAT Mobile was utilized in zero (0) BIA OJS District IV at sobriety checkpoints and made available for viewing to tribal community members and school students during health fairs and public safety days. Due to the COVID 19 pandemic BAT Mobiles were not deployed.

## **Occupant Protection Program Area**

Motor vehicle crashes (MVC's) are the leading cause of death and injuries to Native Americans in the United States. Native Americans are killed at rates at least twice that of all other ethnic groups in this country. These high death rates can be attributed to a number of factors including the low and non-use of safety belts and child passenger safety restraint usage on the reservations.

## **Occupant Protection Program Area Target:**

To increase safety belt usage rates in Indian Country from the FY 2017 "national" Indian Country rate of 76.8% to 80.3% by the end of FY2020.

Indian Country is now at 76.3% in 2020. While Native American utilization is still lower than the national rate, there has been progress made in Indian Country; seat belt use will continue to be one of the primary focus areas of the IHSP as seat belt usage continues to rise.

## **Child Passenger Safety**

For several years, the BIA IHSP has collaborated with the Indian Health Service to provide child passenger safety seats for Native American children and child passenger safety support safety materials for clinics, checkpoints and fitting stations for those tribes working with their respective Indian Health Service Injury Prevention Specialists.

In FY20, the BIA IHSP awarded Occupant Protection grants to the Tribes. The BIA IHSP reimbursed a total of \$18,497.80 to grant funded tribes for child safety seats in FY20. The reaming seats that were not distributed during the period of performance will remain with the tribe and are not reimbursable.

## **Police Traffic Services Program Area**

The BIA IHSP has remained committed to providing the necessary tools and training that tribal law enforcement departments need in order to effectively enforce traffic laws and ordinances.

All Tribal law enforcement agencies funded in FY20 signed commitments to participate in all national mobilizations as well as enhanced enforcement at other times of the year and sustained enforcement throughout the year. Additionally, extra funding was added to each project so they could conduct high visibility enforcement throughout the year.

The BIA IHSP staff depends on the NHTSA Region 6 Media Consultant to provide mobilization campaign material to distribute to tribes nationwide. It is invaluable during the national mobilizations the grant funded Tribes are required to participate in. The media services were available but didn't provide much for the tribes to utilize in this time period.

The BIA IHSP Director did not conduct any site visits in FY20. The site visit are used to ensure compliance with grant agreement requirements and evaluate the project progress toward stated goals.

In FY20, the BIA IHSP Director and Program Coordinator continued to evaluate and assist tribes to meet their performance measures/targets. Tribal Police departments had difficulty in meeting their overall and individual performance measures. This could be due to high visibility enforcement which would deter traffic infractions and keep impaired drivers off the road. It should be noted Tribal Police Departments issued 27,971 verbal and written warnings during the grant year. This may not be effective to change driver behavior, it illustrates Tribal Police are making vehicle contacts.

#### Police Traffic Services (PTS) Program Area Target:

To reduce the number of speed related fatalities, on Indian reservations, by 5% from the 2016 FARS number of 117 to 101 by the end of FY2020. FARS 2017 reported 119 speed related fatalities on reservations.

34 Tribes funded, by the BIA IHSP, in FY20 reported a total of 23 speed- related motor vehicle fatalities on their reservations during the project year. This target was met.

The BIA IHSP planned to increase the number of citations issued for speed, on Indian reservations, by 14% from the FY2018 number of 29,217 to 33,307 by the end of FY2020.

34 Tribes funded, by the BIA IHSP, in FY20 reported 26,065 speed citations issued during the project year. This target was not met in the FY20 grant year. Tribal governments also limited access on reservation roadway to tribal members only and implemented lock downs. Limited access and lock downs contributed in the decreased number of traffic violations during the FY20 grant year.

To decrease the number of motorcyclist fatalities, on Indian reservations, by 5% from the 2016 FARS number of 20 to 19 by the end of FY2020.

Number of motorcyclist fatalities reported by 34 funded Tribes was 2.

Number of un-helmeted motorcyclists was 1.

To reduce the number of pedestrian involved in fatal crashes by 15%, on reservations, from 2016 FARS number of 52 to 50 in 2020.

Number of pedestrian fatalities reported by 34 Tribes in FY20 was 10.

According to 2017 FARS data there were 394 motor vehicle fatalities on reservations. FARs shows motor vehicle crash fatalities have continued to rise from the 316 reported in 2013 to 394 reported in FY17.
  - In FY20: 34 Tribes reported a total of 68 motor vehicle fatalities.
- **C-4 Core Measure:** To reduce the total number of un-restrained passenger vehicle occupant fatalities, all seat positions by 13% from the 2016 FARs number of 154 to 134 by the end of FY2020. Current FARS 2017 data reflects 144 un-restrained passenger vehicle occupant fatalities all seat positions. Unrestrained passenger vehicle-occupant fatalities all seat positions have decreased for the 2015 number of 156.
  - **In FY20:** 34 Tribes reported a total of 22 un-restrained passenger vehicle occupant fatalities all seat positions on their reservations.
- **C-5 Core Measure:** Reduce crash fatalities on Indian reservations involving drivers or motorcycle operators with a BAC of 0.08 or above, by 5% from the FARS 2016 number of 177 to 169 by the end of FY2020. Current 2017 FARS data reflects the number of on reservation fatalities in crashes involving a driver/motorcycle rider decreased to 158.
  - **In FY19:** 34 funded Tribes reported a total of 8 fatalities with drivers with .08+ BAC.
- **C-6 Core Measure:** To reduce the number of speed related fatalities, on Indian reservations, by 5% from the 2016 FARS number of 117 to 101 by the end of FY2020. Current 2017 FARs data reflects a downward trend of 119 fatalities on reservations.
  - In FY20: 34 funded Tribes reported a total of 23 speed-related motor vehicle fatalities on their

reservations during the project year.

**C-7 Core Measure:** To decrease the number of motorcyclist fatalities, on Indian reservations, by 5% from the 2016 FARS number of 20 to 19 by the end of FY2020. Current FARS 2017 data shows motorcyclist fatalities decreased to 17 on reservations.

In FY20: 34 funded tribes reported 2 motorcyclist fatalities on their reservations during the project year.

**C-8 Core Measure:** To reduce the number of un-helmeted motorcyclist fatalities, on reservations, from 2016 FARS number of 11 to 10 by the end of 2020. Current 2017 FARs data reflects an upward trend of unhelmeted motorcycle fatalities on reservations to 11.

**In FY20:** 34 funded tribes reported 1 un-helmeted motorcyclist fatality on their reservations during the project year.

**C-9 Core Measure:** To decrease the number of drivers 20 or younger, on reservation, involved in fatal crashes from 2016 FARS number of 14 to 13 in 2020. Current 2017 FARS data reveals an upward trend of 18 driver fatalities age 20 and younger on reservations.

**In FY20:** 34 funded tribes reported a total of 4 fatalities of drivers 20 or younger fatalities on their reservations during the project year.

**C-10 Core Measure:** To reduce the number of pedestrians involved in fatal crashes, on reservations, from 2016 FARS number of 52 to 50 in 2020. Current FARS data from 2017 shows an increase in pedestrian fatalities on reservations at 62.

**In FY20:** 34 funded tribes reported a total of 10 pedestrian fatalities on their reservations during the project year.

**C-11 Core Measure**: To reduce the number of bicyclists involved in fatal crashes, on reservations, by 33% from 2016 FARS number of 3 to 2 in 2020. Current FARS 2017 data shows the number of pedal cyclist fatalities of 2 which reflects a decrease from the FY15 number of 5.

#### **SUMMARY:**

The grant funds were not fully expended due to COVID-19 pandemic high number of cases began March 2020 on the Navajo Nation and across the United States. Highway Safety Officers (HSO's) were reassigned back to their districts to assist with the COVID-19 pandemic due to high number of cases and calls for service. The HSO's continued conduct traffic enforcement on weekends in April, May 2020 and June 2020. HSO's were reactivated as a team in July 2020 during the pandemic. Non-essential Navajo Nation Offices were closed and limited services; they did not provide copies of check stubs but mail them out directly to employees. Vehicle and equipment purchases were difficult to do during

this time. The Police Department had COVID-19 related deaths and numerous resignations during the pandemic.

Speed and traffic citation targets were not achieved due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. The Navajo Nation had executive orders in place for weekend lockdowns and curfews as well as daily curfews until with the hope of decreasing the spread of the virus. The department did not purchase any equipment due to COVID-19 pandemic on the Navajo Nat ion and across the country. Most businesses on the Navajo Nation and states were closed and late r in the months were limited.

Targets were not achieved due to the COVID-19 pandemic due the lockdown and the stay at home order. Unfortunately, in this fiscal year the HSO was not able to do presentations due to the pandemic. No equipment purchased.

## **SUMMARY:**

The Miccosukee Police Department had a productive and exciting year in traffic enforcement, and met many of our goals. Some unusual events posed challenges. The most significant and unusual events or circumstances encountered during the fiscal year period were the Moon Fish Wildfire, Hurricanes, and the Coronavirus pandemic of 2019-2020 As a result of these challenges, some of the goals for the fiscal year were unmet.

Many Miccosukee Police officers were quarantined for direct exposures and or tested positive for the virus. This affected manning and scheduling resulting in reassignments, revised scheduling, and mandated overtime shifts. These unusual occurrences resulted in emotional exhaustion, forced social distancing, eliminated training, unusual work

details, stress, anxiety, PTSD, and additional shifts, (Baker, et al., 2020; Charoensukmongkol & Phungsoonthom, 2020; Regehr et al., 2019; Sutton, 2020).

While most of the goals for the fiscal year were met and exceeded, some goals were not met. Significant and unusual events encountered during the fiscal year period taxed the officers and resulted in the use of traffic officers to meet the needs of the Tribe. Significant challenges were the Moon Fish Wildfire, Hurricanes, Coronavirus pandemic of 2019-2020, and the protest riots of 2020. As a result of these challenges, some of the goals for the fiscal year were regrettably unmet.

A laptop, monitor, docking station, MS Office, and HP LaserJet all in one printer scanner were purchased with IHSP grant funding. These items were purchase for use by the data clerk to do reporting and administrative functions. Additional equipment purchased with BIA funds included RADAR and LIDAR units for speed measurement.

## **SUMMARY:**

Grant funds were not fully expended during October 2019 through September 2020. A few months into the frant year, Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe (LLBO) had a fansomware occur that effected all computer systems and personal information for LLBO employees. It took LLBO several months to try to implement a new systems and all process reverted back to paper forms, which took time to get approved. During this ransomware, the entire country was hit with the COVID-19 pandemic. This completely shut down all travel, training, and overtime. Data Clerk worked from home, HSO's were not able to perform many traffic stops due to social distancing set forth by Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe (LLBO). One of the HSO's vacated their position and took a job with the Minnesota State Patrol, so funds for the

second HSO were not expended. Overtime was not allowed, and mobilizations were cancelled.

Grant target were not met during the grant year as LLTPD lost one of their HSO for another employment opportunitiy, in turn made reaching target numbers a little more difficult with only one HSO. LLTPD did hold interviews to replace former HSO but LLTPD and surrounding Law Enforcement agencies are understaffed so filling the second HSO position has been a difficult task. COVID-19 pandemic which created more obstacles in reaching target numbers. Social distancing was set forth, the HSO and Police Officers of the LLTPD had to take more precautionary measures and that included only stopping vehicles when it was a higher risk stop such as impaired driving or motor vehicle crashes.

Equipment purchased during the FY2020 IHSP grant year include two 2020 Police Interceptor squads and a desktop computer for the Data Clerk. The HSO and Data Clerk also attended DMT G certification Training. This training assisted HSO and other officers with DWI/DUI cases and increasing DUI arrests. When COVID-19 virus spread LLBO passed a travel and training ban for all employees.

#### **SUMMARY:**

The Red Lake Police Department was not able to fully expend grant funds due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Red Lake Band Tribal Chairman issued an executive order declaring Medical Martial Law putting a ban on all travel and training. This interfered with HSO's encountering individuals due to social distancing requirements and the high risk of contracting and transmitting the virus to others.

Meeting the goals of the grant were difficult due to do the pandemic. Social distancing requirements kept Officers from conducting normal traffic stops. The department did not reach the target goal of zero motor vehicle fatalities and ended the year with 2 fatalities. Motor vehicle related crashes was not met but DUI arrests increased, and that goal was met.

The department fell short in meeting the speed citation goal by 11 for the grant year. Traffic citations was also not met. Prior to COVID, traffic stats were increasing, but quickly declined once the pandemic hit the tribe and traffic violations declined the highways. Officers also issued 1,621 warnings for driving habits.

HSO's conducted only one presentation of the SIDNE at the Red Lake Boys and girls club. Due to COVID-19 Red Lake Chairman issued a Tribal Resolution Martial Law which required citizens to quarantine at home this made it difficult to conduct educational presentation on the reservation. With grant funds, the department was able to purchase 2 new PBT's and a PBT Calibration Kit to ensure all instruments were maintaining accurate certification for use. The purchase of these items were used on DUI stops, for developing probable cause to make an arrest to achieve our targeted problem id goals for DUI/ OWI arrests. A speed enforcement trailer was also purchased and placed out in the communities to slow traffic down and impact the problem areas where accidents have occurred. The purpose of the speed trailer was successful in slowing down traffic in problem areas.

#### **SUMMARY:**

In February 2020 the COVID-19 pandemic hit the Upper Sioux Community. The Police Department lost officers who transferred agencies and then encountered staff reduction due to COVID-19. The COVID-19 pandemic prohibited conducting educational presentations. In March 2020 the Upper Sioux Community effectively shut down and went into isolation.

The shut down made it difficult meet the traffic goals of the grant. Traffic numbers plummeted and where we were averaging hundreds of cars a day, we now notice less than 100 cars per day. The casino our main traffic destination for the community was also shut down for months. We failed to maintain our target motor vehicle crash fatality rate of zero.

We had one motor vehicle fatality that was caused by a combination of drug and alcohol use. The driver was subsequently charged with criminal vehicular homicide for causing the death of his front seat passenger.

The Police Department purchased 1 radar unit, 1 lidar unit, 3 portable breath test units.

The police department met their goal in reducing fatal accidents and it is a great accomplishment. However, motor vehicle crashes were up about 15 percent from the FY2018 number of 197. In 2018 due weather-related accidents there was an increase in crashes. There was also a decrease in OWI's and driver's that were under the influence for both crashes and fatal accidents. Low DUI/OWI numbers could be attributed to high visibility enforcement and the increased numbers

speed and traffic citations issued. No equipment was purchased during this fiscal year.

#### **SUMMARY:**

The nation in its entirety experienced immediate effects of COVID-19 pandemic. Our department was no exception. Starting March 16th, 2020 our law enforcement officers, including HSO's implemented three 24-hour checkpoints on our reservation. They were tasked with manning the checkpoints and overseeing security detail at each check point in effort to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Much of the grant funds budgeted for highway safety overtime for our two remaining mobilizations (DSTD & CIOT) was not used because both events were cancelled or not feasible for our department to run. Our tribe implemented Stay at Home Orders, Curfew, and a few times a total lock down. This limited

traffic extensively. Not limited to the lockdown, curfew, and stay at home orders COVID-19 directly affected our police department as a whole and staff has been ordered to quarantine later in the fiscal year.

The pandemic created challenges for our department to take an aggressive stance on traffic, especially without being able to continue with our remaining mobilizations. Unfortunately, there was 1 motor vehicle crash that accounted for 5 fatalities. In FY2020 there were 94 motor vehicle related crashes. We had a decrease from 176 DU1 arrests (FY18) to 160 DU1 Arrests FY20. Even though we are amidst a pandemic, and the DUI Arrest number still being 160 this demonstrates a problem with motorist driving while impaired and it is still an area of focus. FY2020 we had a decrease of speed citations from 851 to 545. This is a direct result of lessened traffic and with curfew and stay at home orders being enforced. The Officers missed meeting the traffic citations goal by 1 citation.

All three HSO's attended Selective Traffic Enforcement Program to assist with the development traffic safety program and to apply to the traffic problem. Two HSO's attended Advanced Search & Seizure for Traffic Stops. No equipment was purchased.

## **SUMMARY:**

The Isleta Police Department did not fully expend their grant budget for the FY20 grant year due to COVID-19 restrictions placed on training and overtime by the Tribal Governor and IPD Command Staff. The department started the grant year with two HSO's and later hired two more HSO but due to the limited tribal services hiring the HSO's was delayed.

The COVID-19 state/tribal restrictions limited contact with the public and effect reaching target numbers. The goal to reduce the number of traffic fatalities was met not due to a traffic fatality on the I-25 Freeway. The fatality was alcohol/speed related, no seatbelt used, and the driver was ejected. The goal to reduce the number of traffic crashes, was

reached due to the closure of businesses/casinos for the COVID-19 virus. There were 181 crashes on the reservation for this grant year. The goal for DWI/OWI was at 68 for the grant year, even with the COVID-19 travel restrictions, missing the goal for 72 arrests. Speeding Citations and other general traffic infractions targets were not reached due to shortage/delay of hiring two (2) new HSOs due to Tribal Courts closure for background checks.

Majority of officer's presentations are scheduled were cancelled due to COVID-19. The officers were able to provide one presentation.

The department purchased office supplies, but due to the Ransom Virus that disabled the entire POI computer system, Accounting was unable to provide proof of purchase. There was also a purchase of a Pro Laser Lidar 4 for the 4th officer, and assisted traffic monitoring, which helped to increase speed citations. A Lidar was also purchased in August, he was still able to increase the numbers for speeding citations in the months of August and September.

#### **SUMMARY:**

The Pueblo of Laguna (POL) LE Highway Safety Program had planned to spend all awarded funds during the FY20 grant year. However, those plans, events and activities were greatly impacted by the following: COVID-19 deeply affected the POL community and prevented most highway safety activities since the beginning of 2020. State mandates and POL Executive Orders issued for public safety/essential workers restricted the majority of HSO activities (presentations, CIOT mobilization, car seat installations, training or travel); HSO positions were not filled until July 2020 due to transitions in positions of the HSOs; and priority was given to filling the open positions for regular patrol first. Due to the shortage of regular patrol personnel available, HSO personnel were required to assist the regular patrol officers with non-traffic calls/patrols/activity. With the impact of COVID-19 on the Pueblo community, the HSOs also

assisted regular patrol in COVID-19 related activities. Such activities are disallowed under the grant requirements/guidelines including the fringe and indirect costs for non-traffic activity. These issues resulted in only 49% of the FY2020 grant funds expended.

Targets for FY20 were not met except for Target 2- reduce the number of MV related crashes. Highway traffic was greatly reduced during the grant year due to COVID-19 restrictions on travel. POL Executive Orders also restricted the travel of Pueblo members and workforce which helped reduce the number of crashes on Pueblo roadways and Interstate 40. Target 1- reduce the number of MVC fatalities; there were four fatalities in FY20. Two were DWI related, and the other two resulted from the victim being ejected from the vehicle due to not wearing a seat belt. COVID-19 restrictions affected reaching targets 3-5- which was to increase the number of DUI/OWI arrests, speed and traffic citations. Check points were not allowed, and the CIOT mobilization was cancelled which affected the number of citations issued. The POL purchased Roll-Up Reflective Traffic Safety Signs and Sign Stands, 2019 Chevrolet Tahoe, 4 Wheel Drive, White with Police Upfit Package with grant funding.

#### **SUMMARY:**

The Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes were unable to secure a candidate to fill the Highway Safety Officer position necessary to satisfy the primaly strategy of the project grant which further hindered the Tribes Transportation Safety Program to accomplish established targets of the project grant. The candidate selected was required to complete the Indian Country Police Officer Training Program at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC) located in Artesia, NM. The candidate was anticipated to complete the required training from April 13, 2020 through July 10, 2020 however due to COVID-19, the Highway Safety Officer's training schedule was moved to July 6, 2020 through October 19, 2020 class. The candidate did complete the TCPOTP training however not until after the closing (09/30/2020) of the Law Enforcement Grant Project and therefore the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes were unable to allocate salary, mileage, travel, training, supplies, media, equipment, or indirect costs to capture data specific to the targets identified

within the project grant, enhance safety efforts, and increase enforcement or safety activities within the Tribes' 9 county service area located in Northwest Oklahoma.

# **SUMMARY:**

The funds were not fully expended due to the COVID-19 pandemic. It was hard to order supplies because the tribal employees were not available on an 8-5 basis, which made it difficult to get signatures for approval. The employees came in on certain days and worked for only for 3-4 hours. They worked from home but did not have the telephone service to transfer calls to their homes when needed. When they were there, we were not allowed into the building and the paperwork was taken to their offices for signatures. We did not have the "Click It or Ticket" mobilization which would have helped expend funds. The IHSO's assisted with regular patrol duties when needed, but this was disallowed

and paid by COVID-19 funds. IHSO's were put on 12-hour schedule with more hours.

Motor Vehicle Related Fatalities was not because there were 3 fatalities at the end of the grant year. Motor Vehicle Related Crashes -The target was 164 but we had (182) crashes that were mostly animal related and overdriving on icy roads. The DUI arrest target was 441, but we had (401) crashes. The decrease was because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The tribe set up health checkpoints and had a curfew of 10pm, plus required travel permits to leave or enter the reservation. One of the HSO was on medical leave and the 3rd HSO was hired later in the grant year therefore the grant targets were not met. The police department purchase a computer, printer and Microsoft software for the Data Clerk. A SIDNE Trailer and Kart were purchased with grant funding.

# **SUMMARY:**

The FY20 grant award was not signed by our tribal leadership until late October 2019 due to our lengthy administrative review process and the requirement to present to tribal council after the review process, therefore we were not able to begin spending on the grant until the end of October. Two of our officers that spent time in the HSO position experienced medical issues and due to department short staffing, we were unable to fill one of the positions while the officer was out. The Data Clerk position was not posted until January of 2020 due to our HR process and we did not begin spending on that position until February. Due to department short staffing, we were unable to spend down the other officer overtime as much as we would have liked. Between officers out on medical and the data clerk being out, that also reduced the amount of fringe and indirect costs we were able to charge to the grant.

The police department was unable to reduce the number of fatality collisions from 3 to 2 during this fiscal year. There were four fatalities in as many months to end calendar year '19 and begin '20. Two of the collisions were medical related, while the other two were caused by impairment. With an increase in patrols, we did not see another fatality until July of 2020. HSO conducted two educational presentations by video. Two officers attended advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement and one officer attended Collision Investigations training. Mobile sign, in car videos, and PBT's and radars were purchased with grant funding.

This year the Yakama Nation Department of Public Safety was not able to meet the DUI/OWI target goal due to the COVID Pandemic, Yakima County had the highest number of transmission rates in Washington State. The Yakama Nation was closed as were local business during phase one of the mandatory closure in Washington State. This affected the HSO's ability to run traffic and capture DUI's. This year the HSO was not able to complete two educational

presentations due to COVID all actives within Yakima County were limited and social distancing prevented the HSO from putting on community presentations. The RU2 Systems Radar Speed Trailer was purchased this year to assist with reducing speed in school zones and other high traffic areas.

#### **SUMMARY:**

The Fort McDowell Police Department was unable to use all the funding awarded. Officers utilized funding to the best attempting to conduct saturation patrols every month. Unfortunately, this fiscal year the nation was hit with the COVID-19 pandemic, limiting the ability to hold required mobilizations. Officers attempted saturation patrols, with proper PPE, to use visual presence as a deterrent for driving behavior, with corrective action taken when needed. The department has utilized Facebook, Instagram and a traffic/messaging board to promote good driving behaviors and announce the saturation patrols.

The department was able to meet 3 of the 5 targeted goals. There were 0 fatalities in FY2020, and the goal was reduced by 100%. Speed and other traffic citations goal was med in FY2020. Unfortunately, the department failed to meet the

targeted goals for motor vehicle crashes and DUI arrests. The department is currently working with ADOT to work on a solution to multiple crashes, injury and non-injury, at a major intersection within the boundaries of the Nation, involving a major highway. The Nation continues to have a high number of private property crashes, from the Casino, hotel and golf course parking lots. The Nation is still considered open range and continue to have livestock vs. automobile crashes. DUI arrest targeted goal was not met either. Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit in early March, the department did not participate in the DSOGPO mobilization and internally, the department cut back on traffic stops, unless obvious serious violations, due to the uncertainty of the safety of officers in face to face contacts with the public. Once necessary PPE was obtained to conduct daily calls for service, some traffic contacts improved.

Child Passenger Safety Seat presentation was scheduled in March of 2020 but was cancelled with other events due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Radar/messaging board was purchased with grant funds. The board is used to display traffic safety messages reminding people to drive safely and to wear masks.

#### **SUMMARY:**

Our FY20 IHSP grant funding was not fully expended due to unanticipated events with the COVID-19 pandemic. Due to the pandemic, the White Mountain Apache Tribe went under a Tribal State of Emergency in March 2020 and continued throughout the rest of the fiscal year. The Tribal Council ordered the White Mountain Apache Police Department to put the majority of our overtime resources toward fighting the COVID- I 9 pandemic. Nonetheless, the department still did what they could and put what efforts they could toward traffic enforcement. In spite of not expending all of the funding, the department was able to meet most of their target goals, and even went above and beyond some of these targets.

The only target goal the department did not achieve was the reduction of Motor vehicle Crashes. MVC's are so dynamic

and is an element. COVID-19 pandemic Tribal State of Emergency reallocated traffic overtime funds toward fighting the pandemic, by enforcing other tribal laws to help slow the spread of the virus. If the order was not put in place it is possible the department could have seen a reduction in MVC numbers. The department purchased a total of 100 traffic cones, four (4) Kustom Signals Lidars (ProLaser4) and four (4) Kustom Signals Radars (Raptor RP- I). The traffic cones were for checkpoints and the speed measuring devices were used for speed enforcement.

#### **SUMMARY:**

Line item OT Mileage stayed with some funding due to the. The Pueblo did not fully participate in the Indian Highway opportunity during early calendar 2020 due Novel Coronavirus Pandemic and the requirement to social distancing efforts to combat the virus. Throughout the Pandemic, enforcement efforts have lacked with direct correlation with the Pueblo's closures, as well as housing low risk COVID- 19 infected and/or exposed patients at Buffalo Thunder Resort. All efforts were focused on keeping the Pueblo safe by providing roadblocks and denying access to non-residents. Officers were working 12-hour shifts during the pandemic.

Again, with the onset of the Pandemic, enforcement efforts were focused elsewhere through the Pueblo leaving the Pueblo's roadways exposed to heaver traffic, and subsequent traffic violations and more motor vehicle accidents.

Officer's did work overtime to provide a visual deterrent, however that only lasted so long before drivers became braver and more blatant with traffic offenses.

Educational presentations were not provided due to the pandemic. The Pueblo of Pojoaque shut down operations and closed the Pueblo to combat the spread of the disease. The closure of the Pueblo combined with the State of New Mexico's stay-at-ho me order since March 2020 did not allow the tribe to host any activities such as educational presentations.

The police department purchased the following with grant funding: 3 Eagle 3 Radars; 1 Smart 800 speed trailer; 1 LaserCam4; 16 sixteen Dell Computers; 11 WatchGuard In-car camera systems.

#### **SUMMARY:**

The Saint Regis Mohawk Tribe was on track to expend grant funding at the beginning of the grant year. In March 2020, COVID-19 pandemic hit the Akwesasne Mohawk Territory. Tribal Police issued a no overtime policy, in order to keep contact limited to the general public. The pandemic started to become a new type of normal that we adjusted to as the days went by. Traffic stops were scaled back due to contact, as Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) shortage became an issue. The state stepped in to help until we could find vendors for PPE. In August, Chief authorized overtime to resume as the COVID numbers were low in our community and we could safely interact with the public. A curfew was implemented during those months also, which also closed all restaurants and bars, and there was a decrease in traffic.

Targets were not achieved due to the COVID-19 pandemic. If the pandemic had not hit, our targets would have been

achievable. The months of March to July 2020 were prime traffic months for traffic enforcement. Officers were told to issue verbal warnings during this time to limit contact with each motorist. We did not meet the target of 0 for motor vehicle fatalities. The Motor Vehicle Related Crash target was almost met, the target was 145, the actual MVC data is 159. The DUI arrests target is 43, the actual is 27 DUI arrests. The number could have been higher but during the COVID-19 pandemic, all local establishments were closed and there was a curfew limiting traffic flow. If we did not suspend traffic enforcement overtime during this period, the targets would be met. The speed citations target of 552 was not met, the actual citations issued is 250 tickets. The target of 726 traffic citations was not met, the actual is 595 citations. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our targets were not obtainable, if we were able to work the months of March to July, our targets would have been reached.

The department conducted 5 traffic safety presentations in the beginning of the grant year meeting the requirements of the agreement. The Saint Regis Mohawk Tribal Police purchased (3) Nikon Coolpix digital cameras to be used to photograph motor vehicle accidents for accurate and precise photos of accident scenes, Target#1 & #2.

#### MOBILIZATION AND MEDIA ACTIVITY

In FY 20 the BIA IHSP reimbursed funded projects for media activity. This included billboard rentals, radio, and other media outlets. Posters and flyers were displaced in communities, schools, and bus stops. Newsletters and e-mail sent out to tribal community and staff. Highway signs were also posted.

#### LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

In summary, FY20 was a challenging and successful year for the Tribes funded by the IHSP. We will continue to be dedicated to working closely with the Tribes and strive to remain in close partnership with all our traffic safety partners.

2020 has disclosed several matters that will be addressed in 2021. They include:

- Request for Reimbursement process continues to be too document heavy and with minimal staff, limits the amount of programs we can provide to the tribes.
- The documentation of Officer productivity will continue to evolve to a digital format when the tribal police have the abilities to do it in a confirmable format.
- Traffic data collection for tribes continues to be a priority and the IHSP will continue to
  encourage partnerships with state reporting formats or utilizing the tribal crash data tool which
  was introduced this fiscal year.
- The BAT Mobile continues not being utilized and oversight of these vehicles continues to be the
  issue. The issue has been brought to upper management and commitment was stated. The IHSP
  will continue to monitor.
- The continued issue of the 5% P&A allowance continues to hamper the growth of services to Indian Country. The new transportation bill held the hope of increased P&A to be raised to the level the states are currently at, which is 15%, but the signing of the new transportation bill has been set aside until September of 2021.

Motor vehicle crash fatalities continue to increase within the projects funded by IHSP from FY17 (30) to FY20 (68). The percentage of Alcohol involved has increased and noted to be 26.5%, excessive speed increased to 33.8% and non-seat belt use is at 32.3% in the fatal crashes reported. Continuing to increase enforcement efforts in all of these areas will be made in FY21.

Straight time and overtime grant programs worked aggressively on traffic safety/enforcement and impaired driving laws up until the pandemic hit in FY20. Although the IHSP collectively didn't achieve the targets and goals in some areas for FY2020, the tribal programs had to initiate social distancing due to the pandemic for the officers health and safety. The tribes did conduct high visibility traffic patrol in an effort to "be seen" and be a deterrent to unsafe driving behavior. As the year went on the nation was able to understand the virus, Personal Protective Equipment was issued, and the numbers of contacts has steadily risen and will continue to rise as the officers receive the vaccine and continue utilizing Personal Protective Equipment.

The IHSP plans to continue to work toward meeting and surpassing the Performance Measures/Targets outlined in our FY21 HSP. The IHSP is prepared to meet the targets and challenges in the coming year. The IHSP will continue to provide technical assistance to each tribe when requested.

The priorities for the IHSP are to continue to reconfigure the manner which the tribes submit for reimbursed costs in an effort to lessen the document burden of the grant and maintain accountability. The IHSP currently has a pilot program for reporting daily activities and continues to assess the results. The lack of P&A costs and issues with staffing-created by continuing to utilize a paper based reimbursement process has been clearly illustrated this past year.

FY2020 the IHSP will continue to work with the Indian Police Academy on training. The SFST

Instructor training was held in Camp Grafton ND and was attended by a mix of Tribal and BIA officers last year, but this year training has essentially been halted-other than webinar.

The IHSP will continue its efforts in FY21 to improve the collection of traffic crash data. NHTSA has activated a traffic crash data tool for the tribes and our program supports the use of the tool.

In FY2021, the IHSP will offer Traffic Safety Coordinators to the tribes as a permanent position to work with all tribal departments in the interest of traffic safety. The position is intended on bringing in all tribal departments in an effort to identify and address traffic safety concerns; and then initiate programs to address the local traffic concern. The position will be working with tribal roads, EMS, law enforcement, tribal injury prevention, schools and higher education personnel, courts and other tribal entities interested in prevention of traffic related matters.

In FY2021 the IHSP will continue to offer Police Traffic Services and Occupant Protection grants to the tribes. The IHSP will continue with positive working relationships with the tribes whom have received the grants and actively recruit other tribal programs in need.
